Today's History

August 10, 1949 - No news available.

August 5, 1959 - A local contractor, the McDole Construction Co. of Wawarsing, NY has been awarded the contract to construct a new Telephone company building in Grahamsville for the New York Telephone Company. It is planned that the work will be completed by next spring.

Between 14 and 15 hundred persons attended the stock car races on Friday night. Ray Birchall of Ulster Heights driver of car No 22 was the big winner of the day with three races to his credit.

Oland Erath replaces Chan Dayton as Secretary of the Neversink Agricultural Society this year. Mr. Robert Many is General Superintendent. Don't look for the old-time Ferris Wheel and Merry-go-round owned by the Fair Association which is usually taken out of storage and set up. Instead Reithoffer Shows of Kingston, Pennsylvania will set up their House of Fun, Ferris Wheel and Merry-go-round.

Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller will be speaker at the annual County Republican Dinner September 30th at Grossinger Hotel.

Mr. and Mrs. Theron Hasbrouck and Mr. and Mrs. Thomas D. Smith attended the "Open House" and celebration at the Hasbrouck House and Museum at New Paltz on Sunday. It was ancestors of Mr. Hasbrouck's who settled, built these homes and lived there their whole life time.

The Sundown Rural Free Delivery mail route has been extended to include delivery on the Peekamoose Road to the Morrell place.

Mr. and Mrs. Manville Wakefield and two children are enjoying their vacation away. During the absence, Mr. and Mrs. Manville Wakefield of Newburgh are staying at the Wakefield home and attending to the "Grahamsville Peekamoose Railroad."

August 6, 1969

A rainmaker hit the Tri Valley with a hard punch, but not a knock-out blow las week. The Aden, West Branch and Willowemoc region was struck much harder than the Rondout

watershed. Two bridges on Blue Hill were washed out. A county bridge near the home of Otto Lowits in Aden was swept away and town bridge further up Aden Hill on the same road was taken by high water. The Willowemoc bridge near the church was badly battered and had abutments damaged but is still in use. The Flugertown Road (Town Road No. 22) out of Willowemoc virtually disappeared, bridge and all.

Winning bids for the 90th Annual Little World's Fair were: soda, cigarettes, etc. - Ray Krum; ice cream, candy apples and pop corn, Aden Hunting Club; milk and pizza, Bruce Gillette; hot dogs, Franklin Smith.

Miss Bonnie Lawrence of Bradley, was at the Little Texas Ranch Horse Show. She won two blue ribbons and one red ribbon, also \$15 and trophy with her horse Goldie White.

About the Time and the Valleys Museum: Connecting Water, people and the Catskills, the Time and the Valleys

Museum is open from Memorial Day to Labor Day, Thursday through Sunday, noon to 4 p.m. and weekends in September.

Current exhibitions:

- o Water and the Valleys, an exhibit on the history of the Rondout and Neversink watershed area from early geological times to the 20th century. This newly renovated exhibition includes interactives such as a Native American artifact guessing game, grinding corn with a mortar and pestle, videos and more.

- o Tunnels, Toil and Trouble: New York City's Quest for Water and the Rondout-Neversink Story, an interactive exhibit on NYC water supply system and the towns that were removed to build the system, which includes computer interactives, games, puzzles, videos and building a dam and tunnel.

Millions of Years Old Moss

Last weekend our son Joe, his wife Brianna and baby daughter, Aurora joined us down back by by the stream. Joe did a little snorkling and pointed out to the rest of us, different types of moss that were growing in the water. When you looked closely, the little patches of moss looked like underwater fairy gardens.




Star Moss

Water moss is just one of over 14,000 species and is one of the oldest plants on Earth. Moss can be found fossilized as far back as millions years ago, even before the plant-eating dinosaurs roamed through the wetlands munching on drippy moss waterweeds?

Moss (Musci, subclass of Bryophyta) originally came from water bound one-cell green algae.

Leaving the water after millions of years, it scrambled up on dry land and survived! A miracle plant with no roots, no stem, no leaves! How did this happen?

Keeping to moist stream banks and splash zones of waterfalls, moss put out root-like hairs called rhizoids that anchored the plant and absorbed moisture.

Next, moss developed cells that joined end to end, a primitive stem that also supported tiny leaf-like tissues only a single layer of cells thick. If this simple structure dried out, it easily soaked up twenty five times its own weight of rain or dew drops.

Moss accomplishes this by osmosis, a natural process whereby water is drawn through cell walls along the whole plant and refills storage cells. This is

how moss regains its fresh green condition so quickly.

Besides storing water, moss leaf cells also make plant food by photosynthesis.

Moss reproduces in a primitive two-step cycle: a green generation of two separate plant tissues, the protonema, a tiny green pancake from which grows the moss plant that we recognize; and the fruiting generation, a stalk rising out of this new moss plant with a capsule full of spores on top. When the capsule splits open, ripe spores are windblown to fertilize nearby female plants (sporophytes).

Spores are so small that hundreds packed together look like a puff of dust, a miniature version of stepping on a puffball or mushroom.

Empty spore capsules remain on the moss and are the easiest way to identify these small plants. Mature capsules look like tiny tan footballs with a cap at one end. Some are pear shaped.

Using a hand lens, compare different features of moss that grows in your backyard and compare them to moss in a field guide book to distinguish the type of leaves, ferny or spiky and whether the moss grow erect or creeping, and the moss's given name.

If you get the opportunity while the weather is still nice, take a walk in a nearby forest and see how many different types of moss you can find and identify.

Throughout the Catskills you can easily find Pin Cushion moss, Star moss in plushy green mats and sphagnum moss.

Because moss is so absorbent and contains a natural anti-septic, people have used it to dress wounds from 2000 B.C. to World War 1. Europeans have burned peat moss to heat their homes for centuries. Some American Indian tribes used moss to diaper their babies.

When you see all that green moss in the woods that was here before the dinosaurs, we should be happy the moss survived and dinosaurs didn't!



Bones of the Earth Mysterious Book Report No. 383


Inspector Shan Tao Yun was a senior detective on the Beijing Police Department until, “*I investigated the wrong people and they sent me to prison in Lhadrung,*” (Western Tibet the notorious work camp number 404), “because the death rate is so high there. But the governor had a problem. I helped him, unofficially, and to show his gratitude he pulled me out of the hard labor camp.”

Now, in his tenth murder mystery, *Bones of the Earth*, (Minotaur Books, \$27.99, 344 pages, ISBN 978-1-250-16968-6) by Eliot Pattison, the indomitable Inspector Shan is a lowly constable consigned to the small town of Yangkar, in the far west of Tibet . . . where a massive hydroelectric dam is being constructed.

As the novel begins, Shan is ordered by Colonel Tan, the county governor and overseer of the 404 prison camp, to attend an official function in Lhadrung, the county seat. There, he is forced to watch an execution. The dead man, a Tibetan engineer on the Five Claws Dam project, was accused of corruption, and summarily shot and killed in front of twenty official witnesses by the project manager, who didn't bother to have a trial. Shan thinks he may have witnessed a murder, not an execution.

But Shan is trying to keep a low profile, lest he run afoul of the authorities in Beijing again . . . perhaps fatally this time. So, when Colonel Tan hands Shan a special deputies badge and says, “*I need your help,*” even though it puts him in a precarious spot, he can't refuse, because Tibet is one of the most sacred places on earth. It's where more monasteries have been built by more different religions, all in harmony with each other, than anywhere else on the planet. The valley that's being transformed into a reservoir by the Chinese is sacred to the Tibetans. It holds thousands of religious objects, deposited by many different cultures over thousands of years. The mountain overlooking the valley is known as Gekho's Roost. It's home to one of the most powerful gods in the Tibetan Buddhist pantheon, who's known as the Shaker of Mountains.

As the allegations and denials of corruption at the Five Claws site increases, more murders take place and the oppression of the Tibetan people reaches a crescendo in this finely crafted and carefully written novel, the diligent Inspector Shan must protect the Tibetans, solve the crimes, help absolve Colonel Tan of complicity in the widening dam scandal, all while keeping himself in the clear. It's a tall order but as Shan himself remarks, “*One thing I've learned in the Tibet we live in, is that everyone has their own unique path to enlightenment.*” This is the rarest of novels . . . it will entertain, educate, enthrall, and yes, enlighten every reader!

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

DEC Celebrates Smokey Bear's 75th Anniversary

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Commissioner Basil Seggos today announced that DEC is participating in events across the state this month to celebrate Smokey Bear's 75th anniversary. DEC is teaming up with the U.S.D.A. Forest Service, the National Association of State Foresters, and the Ad Council to celebrate 75 years since the 1944 launch of the Smokey Bear Wildfire Prevention campaign, the longest-running public service advertising campaign in U.S. history.

Smokey Bear has successfully educated generations of Americans about how we can all help prevent wildfires," Commissioner Seggos said. "We invite all New Yorkers to join us and celebrate this national icon at events across New York State this summer. Smokey's words are still an urgent and relevant reminder for all of us to follow - Only YOU can prevent wildfires."

Smokey Bear was "born" on August 9, 1944, when the Forest Service and the Ad Council agreed on using a fictional bear to serve as the symbol for their joint effort to promote forest fire prevention during World War II. Roughly nine out of 10 forest fires are caused by humans. Wildfires can be deadly and destructive, and the national annual cost of their consequences can range anywhere from \$71.1 to \$347.8 billion, according to recent study by the U.S. Department of Commerce. Last year's Camp Fire in northern California destroyed the city of Paradise and killed more than 80 people, making it the nation's deadliest wildfire in more than a century.

New York State has 18.5 million acres of public and private forest lands susceptible to seasonal wildfires, and DEC's Forest Rangers are the state's lead division tasked with forest fire mitigation and the control and prevention of wildfires. In 2018, DEC Forest Rangers extinguished 105 wildfires that burned a total of 845 acres. For more information about the Forest Rangers, go to NYS DEC's website.



First, let me thank AAA and the tow truck driver Steve who got me home after I broke down in New Jersey. Second, let me thank my Garmin GPS (not!) for telling me I needed to go 30 miles down the Garden State Parkway to get to my hotel that was 10 minutes North of the venue - not once but TWICE. (makes me wonder about interference from other countries). And third and most important, a big thank you to Johnny 'Guitar Man' Childs for the Seventh Annual International Blues Music Day!

Johnny and I had been speaking off and on for years but had never met. I honestly don't know HOW we initially came in contact with each other, but there it is. Meeting for the first time under these circumstances is awkward, and that's ok. I was there for the music. But then later, when things became more comfortable, he reminded me that a) I had been in this from the beginning and b) how when he fielded the idea of this to me, how I had encouraged him. Huh. Wow.

Who knew that 7 years later, I'd be there at the Blue Moon in South Amboy, New Jersey, one of a packed house from the time I got there at 4:30 to when I left at 10:30, on the day that at least eight other countries around the globe have taken up the mantle to celebrate what is rapidly living up to its name "International Blues Music Day".



So what did I experience? I've seen the Guitar Man on video, most impressive, but nothing, not one thing comes close to seeing him live. That man get your heart pumping and reminds you that you ARE alive! with an ease that makes you wonder how he does it. BIG MIKE DEVITA (he stands 6'5") is a wicked good harp (harmonica) player. I knew him 20 plus years ago when he was in SILK CITY BLUES with my late husband. He has not lost one bit of his edge, instead he's added vocals and together with the equally wicked guitar work of RONNIE RAUSO did "Waiting For That Black Night" along with their other pieces some serious justice. DAVE FIELDS was in from the city with his "Rabbi Blues". DANNY DRAHER, who played with some of the greats including BUDDY GUY and PAUL BUTTERFIELD, was in from

Connecticut. THE POWER TONES brought in a mellow mood and the only female blues singer on the roster, GLADYS BRYANT. GARY WRIGHT and PHIL PROCTOR brought in that slow real Southern Blues. STEW CUTLER, RYAN HARTT, JONATHAN KALB....OMG one sweet sweet guitar after another until I thought I was going to melt! I am doing none of them the justice they truly deserve.

Even more so, was the precision with which this took place. I have done events like this, and what Johnny put together puts them to shame. There was mere minutes between acts and the several solo performers were backed up by 'event drummer' Liviu Pop and 'event bassist' (both electric AND stand up) Dave Young, another brilliant move by Johnny. Each performer did four pieces and each and every one of them was unbelievably terrific.

I'm still on a Blues high, so until next time.....

The Bethel Council of the Arts ("BCA") will be celebrating the Woodstock 50th Anniversary with a multi-faceted exhibit at ARTSPACE, its gallery, performance and exhibition space located at 3575 State Route 55 in the heart of Kauneonga Lake, from Friday, August 2, 2019 through Monday, August 26, 2019. The exhibit will include an impressive array 1969 Woodstock concert photographs taken by Mark Goff, many of which have never been previously exhibited or published, an exhibit of unique Dove designs by local artists, and 1969 Woodstock event memorabilia and Woodstock-themed arts and crafts.

1969 Woodstock Photography Exhibit

While serving in the US Navy during the Vietnam war, photographer Mark Goff began to develop his skills as a photojournalist and from the beginning demonstrated a delicate eye and a sense of dynamic composition. At the age of 22, he returned from his tour of duty in Vietnam, and while working in a factory to save money for college, soon found himself with a press pass granting unrestricted backstage access for the 1969 Woodstock concert and pitched a tent on the festival grounds for 4 days while photographing the festival. Rain, mud and spectacular musical performances are Goff's most lasting impressions from the event. His Woodstock photos include iconic close-up shots of Janis Joplin, Richie Havens, Arlo Guthrie, Joan Baez, Sly Stone, Ravi Shankar, Roger Daltry, Gerry Garcia, Bob Weir, Levon Helm and "The Band," Leslie West and Mountain, and more. In addition, Mark's photos of the people of Woodstock illustrate a rich story that only a skillful photojournalist can convey.

This exhibit has been brought to the BCA courtesy of BCA member Nick Clemente who discovered the photos after a long search for the photographer who had taken one particular photo. While researching an unattributed online photo of Woodstock's opening ceremony featuring Swami Satchidanada, Nick tracked the photo to Mark Goff. Seeking permission to use the work, Nick learned that Mark Goff had died in November 2018 and had left a large number of mostly unseen 35mm negatives of the festival. Nick has been given direct access to the original film, including black and white along with color frames from Mark Goff's daughters, with the intention of bringing this treasure trove of work to the public at large while acknowledging and celebrating the life of Mark Goff.

Over the last five months, Nick has brought the film back to life, restoring them to their pristine condition involving the delicate process of scanning, photo retouching and printing the photographs in the form of high-quality archival prints. The Catskills are Busy - What are We Doing to Protect Them?

ARKVILLE, NY - 30,915 is the number of people that have interacted with the Catskill Stewards Program thus far during the 2019 season. At Kaaterskill Falls, Peekamoose Blue Hole, and Platte Clove, the Catskill Center's stewards can be found educating visitors of the region how best to have a safe and enjoyable visit without leaving a trace.

The Catskill Park has been at the center of American tourism since the early 1820's (SOURCE 1). Fresh air, mountain houses and nature-inspired art made the scenic Catskills a refuge. Much like today, travelers in the 1800's sought the wilderness and expansive views of upstate New York - a reprieve from their NYC daily routines.

The iconic views in the Catskill Park have been made witness to another, more recent, surge of the tourism industry. With pristine waters, exceptional landscapes, and a plethora of amazing agricultural tourism, it's no wonder the Catskills were named "number two" in Lonely Planet's

Top Regions, Best of Travel for 2019. Visitation provides a needed economic driver for Catskill communities, and the increase in sightseers brings people and their travel dollars to our rural towns, as well as our natural spaces.

Two of the most iconic, visited, and cherished destinations in the Catskill Park are Kaaterskill Falls and the Peekamoose Blue Hole. A quick internet search of 'things to do in the Catskills' yields a top recommendation of visiting Kaaterskill Falls... and for good reason! The natural gem boasts a drop of over 260 feet over 2 tiers. The stream continues past the main falls area over numerous smaller falls and ledges before cascading over the final falls of this section of stream, Bastion Falls. Needless to say, if you're one to hike, take pictures in nature, or just looking for a big waterfall, Kaaterskill Falls is the place to visit.

After the successful 2018 season of stewardship at the Peekamoose Blue Hole, the Catskill Center prepared for 2019 by identifying other high-use locations in the Catskills. Taking what was learned from the Blue Hole and adapting our language, outreach technique, and ultimately the size of the program to better meet the needs of other locations; the Catskill Stewards Program now covers three iconic locations within the Catskill Park.

Kaaterskill Falls - Peekamoose Blue Hole - Catskill Center's Platte Clove Preserve

Stewards are on site to:

- o Welcome people to the Catskills
- o Provide info re. where to explore and what to avoid
- o Describe impacts that are harmful to each location
- o Educate how everyone can help reduce their impacts
- o Inform people of the most important rules and regulations
- o Be a resource for any questions people have about these areas and others across the Catskills

The 2019 steward season is breaking the Catskill Stewards Program's 2018 records.

15,180 total visitors interacted with in the season	23,555 visitors interacted with before July 15th (still so many more to greet!)

Visitors will continue to come to the Catskills in ever increasing numbers, and bring with them the reminder that everyone needs the tools and skills necessary to enjoy the outdoors responsibly. When stewards are not present, litter increases, natural resources are harmed, and people are less informed about the intricacies of the unique landscape they're visiting.

Next time you visit one of our three stewarding locations, take a moment to introduce yourself to a steward and perhaps thank them for their time and commitment to protecting the pristine quality of the Catskills. After all, the Catskills belong to all of us, a beautiful resource of public lands to enjoy, and protect, for future generations to come.

UC Health Department Confirms Powassan Virus Fatality

Kingston, N.Y. - The Ulster County Department of Health was notified today that an Ulster County resident passed away from the Powassan virus, a rare and often serious disease spread by infected ticks. This is the first known case of an individual diagnosed with the Powassan virus in New York State this year. The resident, who lives in Gardiner, had additional underlying health conditions and passed away earlier this week.

The Ulster County Commissioner of Health has been in communication with the New York State Department of Health which follows the reports of testing for tick-borne diseases and reports positive results to the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Powassan virus is transmitted by the bite of an infected deer tick. Since this is a viral disease, it cannot be treated with antibiotics. The risk of getting Powassan is exceedingly low. Tens of thousands of people get tick bites every year, and typically, in New York State, anywhere from only 0-6 cases of Powassan infection are diagnosed each year.

Dr. Carol M. Smith, Ulster County Commissioner of Health and Mental Health

"It is imperative that all residents take every precaution necessary against tick-borne illnesses, especially during outdoor activities. Residents should vigilantly check themselves and their pets for ticks and tick bites."

Symptoms of the Powassan virus include fever, headache, vomiting, weakness, confusion, loss of coordination, speech difficulties, and memory problems. If you or a family member has been bitten by a tick and are experiencing one or more of these symptoms, please consult your doctor as soon as possible.

The best way to avoid becoming ill with tick borne diseases is to take proper precautions when spending time outdoors. These include:

- o Staying on clear well-travelled paths.
- o Wearing light colored clothing to spot ticks easily.
- o Tucking pants into socks.
- o Use of insect repellents containing DEET for skin applications and Permethrin for clothing and shoes.
- o Showering as soon as possible after spending time outdoors.
- o Checking everyone including pets frequently and at the end of each day, and removing all ticks promptly and properly.
