
ANNUAL TOWN HOLIDAY TREE LIGHTING CEREMONY TO BE HELD

Are Reindeer Really Deer?

We are familiar with the white-tailed deer that is common in the Catskills and perhaps the most iconic of deer as people associate it from the 1942 movie 'Bambi". Rudolph the Red-nosed Reindeer actually

> was around a few years before Bambi. Rudolph first appeared in 1932 by author Robert L. May.

> Both Bambi and Rudolf are deer. The difference between deer and reindeer is that the term 'deer" refers to a family and reindeer is a particular species. Although the

term "deer" usually refers to a common species such as the White-tailed Deer and not reindeer, technically

reindeer or caribou are a type of deer.

Rudolph is not the only reindeer with a special they breathe in before it reaches their lungs. Another This course is instructed by a Retired Senior attribute of the Reindeer that allows them to withstand the cold is they have two layers of fur; a thick woolly undercoat and a longer-haired overcoat which consists of hollow hairs that trap the air. This not only provides them with excellent insulation, it also keeps them buoyant in water when they have to travel across massive rivers and lakes while migrating. Reindeer travel the furthest of any land mammal.

> The reindeer hooves adapt to the season. During summer when the tundra is soft and wet, the reindeer's footpads become sponge-like and cover a larger surface area which allows them to walk on the damp group. In the winter, the reindeer's footpads shrink and tighten, exposing the rim of the hoof which cuts into the ice and crusted snow to stop the reindeer from slipping. This also enables the reindeer to dig down through the snow to their favorite food, a lichen known as reindeer moss.

> Reindeer can be found in the Arctic tundra, forests, and mountains in Russia, Northern China, Canada, Alaska, and Scandinavia. They are very well adapted to the cold and harsh arctic tundra where they migrate

great distances each year.

According to the Smithsonian Institute, there were two major types of caribou that were separated during the last glacial period. One group, the caribou was the reindeer that became domesticated in Europe and Asia. Reindeer have been domesticated for over 3,000 years and are one of the earliest domesticated animals.

A baby reindeer called a Fawn weighs between 10 and 14 pounds at birth. Reindeer are usually grow between 4 and 5 ft tall, not including their antiers that grow to 3 ft tall! Both male (bull) and female (cow) reindeer grow and shed their antlers annually. Their antlers grow as much as an inch a day. The antlers of the males drop off in early winter while the female does not lose her antlers until later in the winter. Like a human's fingerprint no two reindeer antlers are exactly the same.

Just recently, researchers at University College London discovered reindeer are the only mammals that can see ultraviolet light. While human vision cuts off at wavelengths around 400 nm, reindeers can see up to 320 nm. This range covers the part of the spectrum we can see with the help of a black light. For the reindeer it helps them see things in the glowing white of the Arctic that they would otherwise miss such as white fur, and things that are impossible for humans to see in the snow. For reindeer, they show up in high contrast.

Until Clement C. Moore wrote "A Visit from Saint Nicholas" in 1823, no one thought about reindeer coexisting with Santa Claus. Moore introduced the world to Dasher, Dancer, Prancer, Vixen, Comet, Cupid, Dunder and Blixem (the last two of which were later changed from Dutch to German, becoming Donner and Blitzen). While the first six names all make sense in English, the last two actually mean "thunder" and "lightning," respectively.

The word Reindeer comes from the Old Norse word "hreinin," which means horned animal.

As for little Rudolph, the new 'deer' on the sleigh, his name means "famous wolf" in German and Bambi's name has its origin from Italy. Bambi means 'young girl'. Wait a minute, wasn't Bambi a young buck? Maybe Bambi was really a reindeer after all!

Palace of Treason

Mysterious Book Report No. 220

Is there any doubt amongst well-informed people, that the tectonic plates of government spheres of influence are being shifted

these days in ways we couldn't even imagine as little as twenty-five years ago? Would you have thought for example, back in 1990 when the Soviet Union was collapsing and the U.S. led coalition was busy kicking Sudan Hussein out of Kuwait, that by the year 2015 a resurgent Russia would be superseding America in critical areas of the globe as the dominant world power? Or that we would be smack-dab in the middle of an emerging cold war, vying for world hegemony with a renewed sense of urgency

because the potential for a nuclear catastrophe is growing exponentially as more nations, some of whom are politically unstable, or run by fanatical regimes join what is ruefully called a Club? ... meaning of course, the nations who possess nuclear weapons. It's the kind of conflict that makes for the absolute best spy yarns . . . those which are based in fact and take place on a world stage while civilization itself teeters on the edge of destruction. MBR No. 220 covers just such a novel. It rings with veracity and authenticity because the author was a real-life, card-

carrying CIA case officer for more than thirty years, working in denied-access areas of the world such as Russia, eastern Europe and the Middle East. He's retired now and has turned his hand to writing novels about the clandestine services. Red Sparrow, Jason Matthews Edgar Award winning debut novel, electrified readers and hit the New York Times best seller list a little less than a year ago. It featured a brave and fearless woman espionage agent named Dominika Egorova of the Russian Intelligence Service (SVR) and American CIA agent Nate Nash in a classic spy novel that left readers wiping sweat from their faces and begging for

more. I'm happy to say our wishes have been granted.

Palace of Treason, (Scribner/Simon & Shuster, \$26.99, 468 pages, ISBN 978-1-4767-9374-0) by Jason Matthews is now out and continues the story, picking up where the first novel ended. Egorova, now promoted to captain in the SVR, has been incommunicado for nearly a year. Nash, stationed in Athens, Greece, doesn't know if she's alive or dead. But Dominika is not only healthy and well . . . she's come to the attention of President Putin himself . . . which has put her in conflict with a sadistic, jealous and sociopathic SVR colonel who's bent on destroying her. He's obsessed, hunting for the mole he thinks is giving away state secrets, but hasn't been able to catch, and believes is Dominika Egorova. The tension begins in the first chapter and never lets up, intensifying with each new revelation. The plot is serpentine, the tradecraft exact and the action non-stop-with treachery, double-agents, mole hunts, sex, danger, venality, double-crosses and gunfights enough to make Palace of Treason stand as an equal to any of the greatest spy yarns ever written. Huge praise indeed, but it's so well done I doubt that anyone will be able to stop reading once they get to the last seventy-five pages. Jason Matthews will soon be recognized as one of the greatest thriller writers ever. He's that good!

DEP Announces 2,186 Additional Watershed Acres Open for Hunting

With New York's regular hunting season set to begin Saturday, new or expanded access in four counties provides additional opportunities for sportsmen and sportswomen

The New York City Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) today announced that it has opened access this year to 2,186 additional acres of water supply land where outdoor enthusiasts can hunt, hike and fish. The expanded access includes 714 acres on nine new parcels of recreation land, and 1,472 acres that were added to existing recreation areas throughout the Catskills. With the state's regular hunting season starting on Saturday, Nov. 21, sportsmen and sportswomen are encouraged to utilize the 90,727 acres of water supply land managed by DEP that are open for hunting. That includes 66,125 acres known as "public access areas" that are open for hiking, hunting, and trapping without a DEP Access Permit. Parcels open for hunting are spread across 326 recreation areas in Delaware, Dutchess, Greene, Putnam, Schoharie, Sullivan, Ulster and Westchester counties. Many hunters have

already started to enjoy this expanded access during the early bow-hunting season that began in October.

"As DEP acquired forests and meadows in the watershed to protect water quality in our reservoirs, we also understood that it was important to keep these lands open for recreational activities that were important to our neighbors," DEP Commissioner Emily Lloyd said. "The sportsmen and sportswomen who participate in hunting season are important to the ecology of our watershed, and we welcome them to make safe and productive use of the prop-

erties we've opened in their communities."

Deer management is critical to protecting and maintaining water quality because forests, especially those immediately adjacent to New York City's reservoirs, are ideal buffer lands that need to continually regenerate. Dense populations of deer can stunt the regeneration of forest lands that serve as an important natural filter for surface waters before they enter reservoirs and their tributaries. To help address deer overpopulation, more than 250 hunters entered into a lottery for Deer Management Assistance Permits (DMAP) that will allow them to harvest antlerless deer on lands immediately adjacent to Ashokan, Cannonsville and Neversink reservoirs. DEP also received DMAPs for a 2,400-acre parcel in Roxbury and an 800-acre parcel in East Fishkill. The DMAPs are provided annually by the state Department of Environmental Conservation. DEP has also continued its partnership with the Westchester County Parks Department this year to provide a limited number of DMAPs to those who are enrolled in a county program that allows hunting at certain county parks that are adjacent to reservoirs. Many of these buffer lands immediately adjacent to the reservoirs are also being managed by DEP foresters to promote the growth of young, vibrant and diverse forests. Promoting hunting in these areas will improve the success of those forestry projects by allowing the next generation of trees to take root and grow to a height where they are no longer vulnerable to deer browsing.

The expanded access areas are located in Delaware, Greene, Schoharie and Ulster counties. Some highlights

All state hunting regulations - including antler restrictions throughout most of the watershed region - apply on city-owned lands. Also, those using water supply lands for recreation and hunting should pay careful attention to posted signs that outline what uses are allowed. Access to some areas may be restricted due to ongoing forestry projects and entering areas marked as closed will be considered trespassing. In addition, some parcels open for recreation require a free DEP access permit, which can obtained through an online permitting system found by going to https://a826-web01.nyc.gov/recpermitapp/

Additional information about hunting on City-owned property in the watersheds can be found by going to nyc.gov/dep and clicking on the "Watershed Recreation" link. A complete list of recreation units, including maps and more information on the parcels listed above, can be found by going to this http://www.nyc.gov/html/dep/html/watershed_protection/maps.shtml on the DEP website. Hunters who are unclear about what activities are allowed in each unit should check the DEP website or call (800) 575-LAND during regular business hours.

Since 2003, DEP has more than tripled the amount of City-owned water supply lands that are open for recreation to 130,298 acres. Of those acres open to recreation, roughly 94,000 are land and 36,000 are water.

DEP manages New York City's water supply, providing more than one billion gallons of high quality water each day to more than 9 million New Yorkers. This includes more than 70 upstate communities and institutions in Ulster, Orange, Putnam and Westchester counties who consume an average of 110 million total gallons of drinking water daily from New York City's water supply system. This water comes from the Catskill, Delaware, and Croton watersheds that extend more than 125 miles from the City, and the system comprises 19 reservoirs, three controlled lakes, and numerous tunnels and aqueducts. DEP has nearly 6,000 employees, including almost 1,000 scientists, engineers, surveyors, watershed maintainers and other professionals in the upstate watershed. In addition to its \$70 million payroll and \$157 million in annual taxes paid in upstate counties, DEP has invested more than \$1.7 billion in watershed protection programs-including partnership organizations such as the Catskill Watershed Corporation and the Watershed Agricultural Council-that support sustainable farming practices, environmentally sensitive economic development, and local economic opportunity. In addition, DEP has a robust capital program with nearly \$14 billion in investments planned over the next 10 years that will create up to 3,000 construction-related jobs per year. Annual Student Food Drive Helps Fill Fallsburg Food Pantries







Frost Valley Retreat Teaches **Urban Families to Live Healthy**



Frost Valley YMCA hosted its first-ever "Family Retreat for Healthy Living," which taught 17 New Jersey families how to cook healthy meals, grow their own food, and develop a plan to get more physically active at home. Families from Trenton, Camden, New Brunswick, Vineland and Newark received scholarships to participate in classes and active fun over the weekend of November 13-15.

"Several participants had never been outside their city and never experienced being in outdoor settings, but all were very motivated to participate and each person actively engaged in every activity they could possible get to," said Olivia Lightle, Frost Valley's Assistant Director of Program Innovation. "Families learned a great deal about cooking healthy meals, increasing physical activity, and growing their own food, which a majority of participants indicate that they plan to do at home!"

Families participated in cooking lessons at Frost Valley's Teaching Kitchen (where they learned to substitute healthy ingredients in their own family recipes), enjoyed small-space gardening classes, and took part in a wide variety physical activity programs. Each family received materials and skills to take home so that they can put their new knowledge to use, including recipe booklets; sub-irrigated planters with herbs; pedometers to monitor their daily steps (with a goal of doing a minimum of 10,000 steps per day); knowledge of local community gardens, farms, and farmers' markets; and a renewed enthusiasm to continue their journey towards healthier lifestyles. In addition, they were able to enjoy Frost Valley's active pro-

grams: archery, dance, hiking, climbing, zipline, and more.

The Retreat was developed in collaboration with the NJ Alliance of YMCAs and the NJ Partnership for Healthy Kids as a part of Frost Valley's commitment to youth development, healthy living, and social responsibility. The program has been awarded a \$90,000 grant from the National

Recreation Foundation to host four more weekends in 2016.
