There will be caroling in the Square, special music, holiday readings and refreshments. This will officially open the holiday season in the town.



The Magic of the Christmas Tree

For early Christians evergreens symbolized everlasting life because their boughs stayed green all year. Thousands of years before Christianity, in the Northern hemisphere, as the Winter solstice approached, the ancient peoples observed the air becoming colder, the days getting shorter and the deciduous trees, bushes, and crops dying and they became afraid that the sun was disappearing and that the Earth would eventually freeze. They did notice that some plants and trees remained green all year long and believed that

such trees and plants had magical powers that allowed them to withstand the cold of winter.

No one explained the magic of the evergreen better than Peggy. Here is a gift from Peggy; her story, HOW EVERGREENS STAY

GREEN - By Peggy DeWire "I looked at the Christmas tree and marveled again at how evergreens remain green year around. Once they covered the whole world and over millions of years perfected three magic tricks on behalf of all trees to

The first and most important is photosynthesis or trans-

forming sunlight into green chlorophyll.

Think of one sunbeam composed of tiny particles of electromagnetic radiation energy called photons. Each wee photon has zero rest mass and charge plus spin of one. How it changes sunlight into chlorophyll is a technology called photonics. Here's what happens:

As a sunbeam shines on a pine needle filled with water, the photons radiant energy splits each molecule of water into hydrogen and oxygen. The oxygen is discarded back into the air. The hydrogen mixes with air inside the needle or leaf and builds a new molecule of chlorophyll, which is carbohydrate (sugar). The whole process takes thirty seconds!

To split the water molecule requires the color bands of red, orange and blue - from the rainbow light spectrum. Only these colors transform light into chlorophyll or carbohydrate (sugar). The middle of the rainbow, where green is located, is mostly reflected. This is why a pine needle or leaf looks green.

Trees store little packages of carbohydrate as liquid sugar cells everywhere in the tree - needles, limbs, trunk, bark and roots - and in cold weather convert the sugar into an alcoholic substance slow to freeze. Pioneers made a tasty drink called Spruce Beer by boiling young twig tips in water and adding molasses and yeast to taste.

The second magic trick performed by evergreens is transporting the alcohol throughout the whole tree in long pipeline cells whose woody side walls thicken in

winter weather.

The last trick is that all evergreens except tamarack and cypress keep sap flowing through needles year around. Broadleaf trees by contrast make cork cells at the end of the leaf stem, thus blocking water and causing the leaf to drop off in autumn.

Just imagine - 50 million years ago there was nobody around to appreciate a Christmas tree.'

Did you know the first sale of a "Christmas Tree" was in 1851 when a Catskill Farmer Mark Carr hauled two ox sleds of evergreens into New York City and sold them all? By 1900, one in five families had a Christmas Tree, and 20 years later the custom was nearly universal.

As each of us decorates a perfect Christmas tree this year with our cherished ornaments reminding us of our faith and our family we will also be reminded of friends that we hold dear and family and friends that we have loved and lost. The ornaments each tell a story and after they are all carefully placed upon the tree, standing in a mess of papers and boxes, we will fall in love again, with each other, our family, our life and our purpose.

Yes, there is magic in a Christmas tree!

Come witness this magic at the Annual Tree Lighting ceremony this Saturday and witness Bi-Centennial Park in Grahamsville, once again, become a winter wonderland scene declaring the Yuletide season has begun!

May the magic of the love that shines from your Christmas tree follow you the whole year through bringing peace and joy wherever you go.

Mysterious Book Report No 173 by John Dwaine McKenna

Mention "World War II Prison Stories" in any group and the resulting discussion will invariably focus around one of three classic and much admired movies: Stalag 17, The Great Escape, and The Bridge on the River Kwai. But, if you're willing to do more than sit on the couch with a dazed look and the TV remote in hand, if you'll take the time to find and read this week's novel-you'll be introduced to an author who's wildly popular and influential in Asia. His name is Jung-Myung Lee, and he's the author of a newly translated novel entitled *The Investigation*, (Mantle/Macmillan, £16.99 (about \$26.00) 325 pages, ISBN 978-0-230-76871-0)

The story is based upon real events which took place in Fukuoka Prison in 1944. Fukuoka is a maximum security facility housing hardened criminals mixed together with political prisoners, who are mostly 'filthy Koreans who spread sedition and lies about the Emperor and the Japanese Empire' according to Watanabe Yuichi, the narrator and book loving young guard who is assigned the

impossible task of investigating the murder of Sugiyama Dozan. He was the most brutal, feared and merciless guard in the entire prison . . . despised by all, guards and inmates alike. Soon after Watanbe begins his investigation, a hard-core prisoner confesses to the murder, but after interviewing him and finding a hand-written poem in Sugiyama's pocket, Watanabe thinks that the confession is a lie and continues digging into the mystery. What he finds is that many hidden events are taking place within and without the violent penitentiary walls, including a man who's determined to let nothing stop him from digging his way out, a governor whose greed is limitless, a young girl with a kite trying to make friends wherever she can, a terrible, vicious guard who isn't what he appears to be, and Yun Dong-Ju, a Korean poet whose "works hold such beauty they can break your heart."

The Investigation is a complex, beautiful and enlightening work that will illuminate an obscure, but brilliant poet, while showing the reader that beauty and genius are indefatigable and found in the unlikeliest of places. Dark and brooding at times, it's moving and always entertaining as well.

CWC contributes to Catskills Interpretive Center

project; establishes municipal loan program
The Catskill Watershed Corporation (CWC) Board of Directors voted November 4 to allocate \$123,000 from the Catskill Fund for the Future to help develop the Catskill Interpretive Center (CIC) in the Town of Shandaken.

The Board also approved a new program to provide low-interest loans to CWC member towns and vil-

The CIC funds will be provided to the Catskill Center for Conservation and Development which owns the 62-acre site in Mt. Tremper and is coordinating a cooperative venture to build the 1,700square-foot facility. It will be named for retired Congressman Maurice D. Hinchey who was a devoted advocate for it for the past three decades.

The CWC funds will go towards costs of construction of a replica of a Ranger Station/Observer's Cabin Museum adjacent to a full-sized fire tower to be con-

structed with other funds.

The CWC grant will also fund an interactive digital display unit that will feature a database of outdoor recreational opportunities and cultural activities in the Catskill Region, and will be accessible to several people at a time using touchscreen technology. It will be connected to a new CIC website and to the Catskill Association for Tourism Services (CATS) website. Included in the CWC grant is \$10,000 per year for five years for maintenance and operation. The NYC Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) has allocated \$100,000 for operation and maintenance over the next five years.

In addition to the Catskill Center, the CWC and the DEP, other partners in the venture are the Friends of the Catskill Interpretive Center, the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation, the NY/NJ Trail Conference, the Central Catskills Chamber of Commerce and other organizations and

municipalities.

Construction of the CIC, which will serve as a gateway to the Catskill Park, Forest Preserve and the wider region including the New York City Watershed, is well underway using \$1 million in NYS funds and a \$380,000 federal appropriation. Eastman Associates from Oneonta is the general contractor. Completion is anticipated in early 2015.

Municipal loan program

In other business at its November meeting, the CWC Board authorized establishment of a new program to offer low-interest loans of up to \$250,000 to West-of-Hudson Watershed municipalities.

The Catskills Municipal Assistance Loan Program will provide loans to towns and villages as an alternative source of funding. At the same time it will offer a secure rate of return for the CWC's Catskill Fund for the Future through local investment rather than purchasing bonds on the open market.

Applicants must be signatories to the 1997 Watershed Memorandum of Agreement and voting members of the CWC. A municipality must issue a bond or note as evidence of its obligation for the

repayment of the loan within one year, renewable for up to five years.

The CWC is a non-profit, Local Development Corporation responsible for several environmental protection, economic development and education programs in the New York City Watershed West of the Hudson River. Visit www.cwconline.org for more information.





Feds tell service members to scrub social media accounts, which could offer clues to extremists.

The FBI on Sunday issued the strongest warning to date about possible attacks by the ISIS terrorist group against the U.S. military inside the homeland,

officials tell ABC News.

In a joint intelligence bulletin issued overnight by the FBI with the Department of Homeland Security, officials strongly urged those who serve in uniform to scrub their social media accounts of anything that might bring unwanted attention from "violent extremists" or would help the extremists learn individual service members' identities.

"The FBI and DHS recommend that current and former members of the military review their online social media accounts for any information that might serve to attract the attention of ISIL [ISIS] and its supporters," the federal bulletin sent to law enforcement agencies said, advising that troops "routinely exercise operational security in their interactions online."

Officials said they fear copycat attacks based on what happened in Canada last month, when two uniformed Canadian soldiers were killed in two separate incidents by young men who claimed they were ISIS followers.

ISIS Threat at Home: FBI Warns US Military About Social Media Vulnerabilities (ABC News) Homeland Warns of ISIS Retaliation in US by Sympathizers

Some in U.S. special operations and other military branches have told ABC News they deactivated, scrubbed or locked Facebook and other personal social media accounts months ago at the urging of security officers as the U.S. began bombing ISIS in Iraq and Syria last August.

But the government on Sunday night indicated they had obtained fresh intelligence that ISIS wants to recruit or inspire sympathizers inside America to hurt military members where they live.

'The FBI recently received reporting indicating individuals overseas are spotting and assessing like-minded individuals who are willing and capable of conducting attacks against current and former U.S.-based members of the United States military," the bulletin said.

Attacks such as those in Canada -which apparently were carried out without direct contact between ISIS and the perpetrators -- may "embolden" and "motivate" those who support ISIS, the FBI and DHS said.

The day before the U.S. launched its biggest air blitz against the terrorist group in Iraq and Syria in late September, ISIS spokesman Abu Môhammad al-Adnani called upon Muslims in the U.S. and Europe to attack members of the military.

"Do not ask for anyone's advice and do not seek anyone's verdict. Kill the disbeliever whether he is civilian or military, for they have the same ruling. Both of them are disbelievers. Both of them are considered to be waging war," Adnani said in an audio speech posted online on Sept. 21.

New Business Assistance Program Launched by Sullivan County Restaurants and Other Main Street Businesses Targeted for Entrepreneurial Training & Financial Assistance Monticello - County Manager Josh ment will help defray the local Potosek has announced that a new Microenterprise Assistance Program (MAP) has been launched to assist owners of small businesses in Sullivan County and people looking to start a business here. The program will provide entrepreneurial training to help small businesses survive and grow, along with low-interest loans, subsidies and other forms of support. The program will target the county's village and hamlet centers, with a priority given to restaurants and food service businesses that typically find it hard to obtain traditional financing but which are essential components of a thriving downtown.

Fifty percent of all small businesses do not survive past their fifth year, however small businesses are the backbone of Sullivan County's rural economy. The new program is aimed at improving this statistic by offering an eight session Entrepreneurial Training Program, covering such topics as small business basics; taxes, permitting and licensing, market research and analysis; preparing a business plan; financing; customer service, and finding and managing employees. Since the program is targeting applications from restaurants and food service entrepreneurs, an additional class will be conducted, specifically geared toward this sector, which will address common pitfalls and how to avoid them.

The training program will be limited to 20 people in order to create an environment where participants can learn from and support each other. Graduates of the training will be eligible to apply for lowinterest loans of between \$5,000 and \$35,000, which have been being made available under the program to new busi-

ness start-ups or existing enterprises with five or fewer employees. It is anticipated that approximately 10 loans will be made. Recipients must contribute a minimum of 10 percent of the total project cost in cash to demonstrate financial commitment. For larger projects, the program will assist participating businesses with seeking and packaging funding from other sources.

The new Microenterprise Assistance Program is made possible with a \$200,000 grant from the United States Department of Agriculture Rural Business Enterprise Grant Program (RBEG). The grant is being administered by the Sullivan County Division of Environmental Planning and Management in collaboration with the Sullivan County Partnership for Economic Development, the Sullivan County Chamber of Commerce, the Sullivan County Center for Workforce Development, and the County of Sullivan Industrial Development Agency.

UC Exec Hein Receives

Scenic Hudson Funding Commitment for Hudson Valley Rail Trail Extension Kingston, NY - Ulster County Executive Mike Hein was joined today by Scenic Hudson President Ned Sullivan in announcing the award of a \$100,000 grant to advance the planned extension of the Hudson Valley Rail Trail ("HVRT"). The grant, which will be directed to the Town of Lloyd, was awarded by Scenic Hudson at the request of County Executive Hein in support of the County Executive's vision for an interconnected rail trail network connecting the Walkway Over the Hudson to the Ashokan Reservoir and Catskill Park. The funding commitmatching cost for the Town of Lloyd's Hudson Valley Rail Trail West- Phase 3 project, which will extend the existing 3.6-mile HVRT an additional 0.7-miles from Tony Williams Park to New Paltz Road. In addition, to move the connection of the HVRT to New Paltz forward, Ulster County recently applied for and received federal Transportation Alternative Program ("TAP") funding to begin planning Hudson Valley Rail Trail West- Phase 4, which will further extend the HVRT to South Street, bringing the total trail length from the Walkway approximately 5.5 miles into Ulster County. The HVRT connects via the Walkway Over the Hudson to another 13 miles along the Dutchess Rail Trail.

"This action is a huge leap in connecting Lloyd to New Paltz for runners, walkers and cyclists. Ulster County is grateful for Scenic Hudson's generous support of the Hudson Valley Rail Trail and its commitment to the vision of a worldclass, interconnected rail trail network stretching from the Walkway Over the Hudson to the Ashokan Reservoir," stated County Executive Hein. "Scenic Hudson played a critical role in helping make the Walkway Over the Hudson a reality, and the grant award for this critical project is now helping connect the Walkway to New Paltz, and then via the Wallkill Valley Rail Trail to Kingston, and eventually the Ashokan Reservoir."

"Ulster County is rich with vibrant town centers, productive

farmland, waterways and recreational destinations, which contribute meaningfully to the quality of life of its residents and the region's \$4.2 billion tourism economy," stated Scenic Hudson president Ned Sullivan. "By working together and focusing on linkages between these assets, we can realize the vision of the Ulster County Executive and Legislature for an interconnected rail trail network connecting the Walkway Over the Hudson to the Ashokan Reservoir."

The Hudson Valley Rail Trail West- Phase 3 has received significant federal transportation funding, and Scenic Hudson's grant will help to offset the required local match by the Town of Lloyd. The Phase 3 project is currently in the final design stage and is slated to begin construction in summer 2015. The County also plans to begin design and planning work on Phase 4 in 2015. Upon completion of these two extensions, the HVRT will extend to less than 1.5 miles from the New Paltz sidewalk system, and the County and New Department State Transportation (NYSDOT) are working to identify options for completing the connection to New Paltz along the Route 299 NYSDOT right-of-way.

Connecting the HVRT and Wallkill Valley Rail Trail builds upon the ongoing success of the Walkway Over the Hudson and the growing popularity of the HVRT in Lloyd. Both of these trails have become beloved community assets for bicycling, walking, running, and hosting community events. Ulster County is moving forward to "fill the gaps" between these two trails. The County has also partnered with the Open Space Institute and Woodstock Land Conservancy on the first planning phases of the proposed rail trail along the Ashokan so it is working on both ends of the future trail system to build what the County intends will be a world-class tourism destination.

I read the Times Herald Record's front page November 16, 2014 article "Coldenham School Disaster - 25 Years Later" and once again my heart went out to the 10 children who died in the school wall collapse.

I also vividly remember when the same tornado struck Grahamsville at about the same time and miraculously no one was hurt. I was there.

The sky turned almost black, the rain hit my office picture window like several fire engine high powered water hoses, a garage was flattened on lower big Hollow Road, on Route 42, the large weeping willow was knocked over, and at the intersection with Route 55 my two tall pine trees were blown across tine road just short o the entrance to the Grahamsville

The tornado turned east on Route 55 up the hill to Tri-Valley Central School and raised the plastic roof on the school agricultural round Quonset hut building. They said there .. were several frightened students huddled

Then the unpredictable tornado suddenly rose, knocked over a tree by the bridge on Route 55 and apparently came back down with all its fury in Coldenham.

In Grahamsville, the electricity was knocked out, the residents and firemen voluntarily directed traffic. the chainsaws came out, the roads were quickly cleared and thanks and prayers were quietly said.

Dear Mr. Brenner:

Re: SCHOOL CROSSING SIGNS NYS ROUTE 55 HAMLET OF GRA-HAMSVILLE TOWN OF NEVERSINK, SULLIVAN COUNTY

This is a follow-up to our September 30, 2014 letter in which you requested a review of the school signs near the Tri-Valley Central School on NYS Route 55 in Grahamsville. We have completed our review, as requested, and have identified the following improvements.

The field review of the signs revealed there are newer advance school crossing signs in both directions on NYS Route 55 in advance of the school. Current standards recommend that these signs also include a subpanel indicating that the crossing is "ahead". Therefore, Department forces will add these panels to the existing signs to bring them up to current standards. Additionally and as you had indicated, it was discovered that the pavement markings "school" in each direction were severely faded. As a result of your request, the Department will refresh this pavement marking indication.

Thank you for calling our attention to this matter. The improved signing and pavement marking layout will meet Department standards set by the Federal Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices. 
