Today I'm looking back to the years 1930 and 1940 when my stepchildren were growing up. New toys were few and far between in those days but they didn't seem to mind. One item that we recycle today, an old tin can, they found they could spend many happy hours with. They used them for "can walking" by pushing them down as hard as they could on the thin metal until the can stuck fast to their shoe. What fun they had chugging around and what a racket they made, but I was young in those days and didn't mind a bit.

#### **Catskill Mountain Wild Cats**

Last Wednesday when we were heading up to the Blue Hill Lodge and saw a huge cat cross the road just as we were coming into Claryville.

My guess is that it was a large Bobcat.

The bobcat (Lynx rufus gigas) a/k/a Wildcat, is a North American mam-

mal of the cat family Felidae, appearing during the Irvingtonian stage – around 1.8 million years ago. Currently they still live in wooded areas of the Catskills.

Bobcats are about two to three times the size of a domestic cat. Their fur is dense, short, and soft and is generally shorter and more reddish in the summer and longer and more gray in the winter. Spotting occurs in some bobcats and is faded in others. The face has notable long hairs along the cheeks and black tufts at the tops of each ear.



Males on the average are one-third larger than females. Both female and males can weigh more than 30 pounds. Body length for males is 34 inches and 30 inches for females. They have short tails between five and six inch long - thus the name 'bobcat'.

Bobcats are not often sighted in the Catskills as they are stealthy creatures that are timid and typically avoid human contact, but do not let their relatively small size fool you. They are tremendously strong and can bring down a small deer. They can become ferocious when challenged. It is wise not to approach a bobcat. However, while there is still snow on the ground, you may find their tracks. The average foot print is around 1.75 inches, but

can be as large as 3 inches. The prints will have 4 roundish paw prints in front with a "M" shaped paw print in back of the 4 front paw prints. Most prints will not show claws. Like, domestic cats, Bobcats need to use their muscles to extend their claws.

Bobcats are nocturnal and most active from sunset to near sunrise when they are hunting.

Bobcats are carnivores. Their diet consists mostly of rabbits, rats, mice and small wild game. Bobcats easily adapt whatever prey is available. They will stalk their prey and swiftly move in once the prey is within 20 feet. Bobcats can leap up to 12 feet high.

Bobcats live near areas where there are rock ledges and small caves or near swampy areas. They are territorial. They choose an area of a few square miles that has enough prey to feed on, however, they can travel up to 50 miles a day.

It takes a bobcat about two years to mature to breeding age. They mate between February-and-March and have 2-4 kittens between April and May. On occasion they have a second brood in September. The kittens are born blind and won't see until they are around 10 days old. The female bobcat raises its kittens alone and nurses them for about two months before teaching them how to hunt. They remain with their mothers the first year. After that, they will live in the wild for the next 6 to 8 years. The oldest recorded bobcat in the wild lived to be 16 years old!

Bobcats were very abundant in the Catskills until the 1800's when they were hunted – almost to extinction Today, we are seeing a moderate increase in the population of bobcats.

Bobcats are incredibly beautiful creatures that exist in varied colors from orange to gray with black markings similar to a domestic tabby cat.

Bobcats are often noted as the inspiration of the region's name – the Catskills!





by Mark Greaney and H. Ripley Rawlings IV, have combined their immense talents to produce the best military action adventure since Tom Clancy wrote The Hunt for Red October nearly forty years ago.

Red Metal opens in Kenya, where the Russians are mining a mountain of precious, rare earth minerals; a necessity in manufacturing everything high-tech, from satellites to cell phones, under an agreement with the government. It's a treaty signed in greed and ignorance, that hugely favors the Russians, and the Kenyans, with assistance from the United States, kick the Russians out by force . . . humiliating a Spetsnatz (Special Forces) Colonel named Yuri Borbikov in the process. He gets his revenge a few years later, when threats of war between China and US ally Taiwan cause the President to order nearly all US military assets to the Far East, leaving a lethargic, loosely defended Europe inadequately protected. Colonel Borbikov presents a war plan that he's drawn

Writing is becoming a lost art. We rely on our phone to record notes and connect with others. We forget that writing connects our brain to the world. I think I spend more time deleting messages to me than creating messages to send out. Also, out of the messages I send, once they are written, they get deleted to make more space for more messages to come in.

Think of housekeeping the mind allowing what might be important to separate from the constant streaming of random thoughts.

Lastly, writing is cathartic. Our sadness can be recorded and eliminated; our joys can be relived.





# Ulster County Advances Affordable Housing Initiative at Elizabeth Manor Property in Kingston Maeda Construction Team Selected as Development Partner

Maeda Construction Team Selected as Development Partner KINGSTON, NY - County Executive Jen Metzger today announced the selection of a development team - including Maeda Construction, GA/GA architects, Community Preservation Corporation, and RUPCO - for the development of affordable housing on the site of the County-owned Elizabeth Manor property in Kingston. This significant step brings the County closer to its goal of providing much-needed affordable housing opportunities for local families.

The team's project proposal envisions a new 15-unit housing cooperative for affordable homeownership, with one-, two-and three-bedroom units for households earning 60% or less of Ulster County's Area Median Income (AMI). The building, designed to be consistent with neighborhood character, would

replace the former boarding house building.

"This is an exciting project that helps meet a major need for deeply affordable homeownership in Kingston, and it would be the first cooperative ownership structure in the County," said County Executive Jen Metzger. "We also very much wanted a project design consistent with the character of the neighborhood, and Maeda and team have developed a beautiful concept for this property. We look forward to working with the City and with Elizabeth Street neighbors as we move this project forward."

Legislator John Gavaris, Chair of the Ulster County Housing Development Corporation stated "the HDC is pleased to be able to continue its role in the County's affordable housing efforts and will work with the County and project team to ensure that the project can move forward."

Planning Board and Neighborhood Engagement

Ulster County and its partners will now engage with the City of Kingston Planning Board and the local neighborhood to present and seek feedback on the project. This engagement is a crucial next step to ensure the development is well-integrated with and beneficial for the community.

21 Elizabeth St. Project Highlights

- o Project Scope and Units: The development at 21 Elizabeth Street will replace an existing vacant building that has been difficult to renovate due to multiple environmental hazards. The project includes a total of 15 units and includes a mix of studios, 1-bedroom, 2-bedroom, and 3-bedroom units, including four (4) ADA-accessible units, to serve a diverse population.
- o Innovative Design and Construction: The project will utilize modular construction, a method expected to offer greater quality control, speed, and efficiency in construction. The design is intended to be contextual to the neighborhood, replicating the structure, material, and color of the area's three-bay homes while conforming to the City of Kingston's Form-Based Code.
- o Sustainability and Health: The building is designed to be fully electric and will employ double framing and high-quality insulation to perform at passive house levels. It will also include a next-generation heat pump with internal energy recovery ventilation, aiming for long-term savings. Using an architectural style that promotes health and well-being, the project features floor-through units with ample windows for cross-ventilation and natural light. It includes spaces for both privacy and gathering, recognizing post-pandemic needs for healthy indoor environments and community interaction.



o Long-Term Affordability Model: A core element of the proposal is the formation of a limited equity housing cooperative. This model is designed to ensure immediate affordability at the 60% AMI level and maintain affordability in perpetuity, while also allowing owners to accrue equity and move on to other local housing opportunities over time.

o Community Integration and Amenities: Units will be entered via gracious front porches and communal stairwells, fostering social interaction. The ground floor will be fully accessible to prioritize residents with disabilities and elderly individuals. The rear of the building will feature two community rooms for gathering and a children's room, along with ample building storage.

o Parking Solution: Recognizing potential street parking burden, an agreement is being sought with the Kingston City School District to allow for an easement to use a portion of the adjacent school's parking lot, providing one parking space for every unit and simultaneously increasing spaces available to the school.

o Timeline: The overall process, from design and permitting to homeowner marketing, is anticipated to take approximately 30 months.

**Project Team** 

Maeda Construction has assembled a strong team of trusted partners, including GA/GA Architects, the law firm Goldman Hall (for legal and innovative financing structures), the Community Preservation Corporation (CPC) (as lender and advisor), and RUPCO (for marketing, targeting, and vetting future homeowners, as well as development guidance). Jesse McCormick is also a policy consultant contributing to the innovative ownership model.

Further updates on the 21 Elizabeth St. project will be shared as the planning and engagement processes move forward.





#### **Bacon Wrapped Garlic Scapes**

A garlic scape is the slender bright green flower shoot that has shot up from the stem of a garlic bulb

12 six to eight inch long tender pieces of garlic scapes, peeled 12 pieces of thin-cut bacon


Tightly wrap each of the scapes with one piece of bacon, spiraling down the scape as you go. When all the scapes have been wrapped, heat a heavy skillet over medium heat and then add the scapes.

Cook the scapes until the bacon browns on one side and then turn them. Cover the pan with a lid (this helps to ensure the scapes inside the bacon are well-cooked), removing the lid and turning the scapes as needed until the bacon is brown on all sides.

Remove the bacon wrapped scapes and drain them on a paper towel.

Serve immediately.

# UC Secures \$1,000,000 State Funding for New Paltz Water/Sewer Infrastructure to Support New Housing KINGSTON, NY - Ulster County Executive Jen Metzger

KINGSTON, NY - Ulster County Executive Jen Metzger announced today that Ulster County has been awarded one million dollars through the New York State County Infrastructure Grant Program (NYS CIGP) for the Village of New Paltz Water and Sewer Upgrade Project. This significant funding, provided by Empire State Development, will support critical water and sewer improvements that directly support the creation of housing in the Village.

The state grant program created by Governor Hochul is funding \$50 million in grants statewide, with enhanced awards

for projects supporting housing creation. This program specifically targets smaller-scale infrastructure projects identified as county priorities that may otherwise lack stand-alone funding sources. The Ulster County Planning Department put out a call for projects in December 2024 to all Ulster County Town Supervisors and Village Mayors, and the Village of New Paltz project was chosen for the housing-supportive components of the project. The Village's Water and Sewer Upgrade Project, with an estimated total cost of \$2,345,500, meets this criterion and will receive the maximum award. The New Paltz Village Board has formally committed to providing the required 50% match.

"We are thrilled to have secured this significant infrastructure grant for the Village of New Paltz, which has been a real champion in addressing the housing crisis," said County Executive Jen Metzger. "The constraints of the existing water and sewer systems have long presented a barrier to new housing, and we thank Governor Hochul and ESD for supporting this essential investment."

"For years, New Paltz has been diligently pursuing various highly competitive water and sewer grants. Ensuring that our water and sewer services are affordable, safe, and reliable remains one of the most critical responsibilities we hold as local elected officials," said New Paltz Village Mayor Tim Rogers. "This commitment extends directly to our efforts in providing affordable housing, which goes hand in hand with municipal water and sewer infrastructure. Our colleagues in Albany and the Ulster County government have consistently been valuable partners in supporting these infrastructure investments, and they do their utmost to identify opportunities to support New Paltz. Today is indeed one of those days where their dedicated efforts have truly delivered for our community."

#### **Key Project Components and Transformative Impact:**

The Village of New Paltz Water/Sewer Upgrade Project consists of two primary locations and initiatives:

o North Chestnut Street Water Loop will connect two existing dead-end water mains on North Chestnut Street (NYS Route 32) and Huguenot Street with a new 8-inch water main, forming a water loop for this section of the Village's water district. This connection is expected to improve water pressure and quality for existing properties and will significantly reduce the need to shut down the entire northern portion of the Village water system during most water main emergencies. Critically, this Water Loop Project is essential for the development of four major mixed-use development projects along the North Chestnut Street corridor, which are currently at various stages of planning approval or construction. These new projects will collectively add 253 new residential units, including approximately 37 affordable units, to the Village's North Chestnut Street corridor, representing an estimated 10% increase in the Village's total housing units and directly supporting the County government's housing affordability goals.

o The Wastewater Treatment Facility Entrance Channel Replacement will develop a new entrance channel for sewage to the Village of New Paltz Wastewater Treatment Facility (WWTF) to reduce or eliminate stormwater overflows that occur during rainfall events at manholes on Huguenot Street and Water Street, which has been a concern of NYSDEC. Improvements will also include the installation of an automatic screening system for the entrance channel. This upgrade is critical for supporting the new housing projects in the North Chestnut Street Corridor and future development in the Village.

For several years, the Village of New Paltz has faced challenges with its aging water infrastructure, including "brown water" incidents. Unlike the Village's sewer system, which has received consistent state funding due to a consent order, the water pipes have seen limited grant success. This new grant will address these critical water and sewer infrastructure needs, improving system performance and reliability, protecting the environment, and supporting crucial housing development for current and future residents of New Paltz





# Stefanik Leads Letter Exposing Columbia University's Leadership for Potential Title VI Violations and Betrayal of Jewish Students and Board Members

July 1, 2025 Saratoga, N.Y., - Today, House Republican Leadership Chairwoman Elise Stefanik and Education and Workforce Committee Chairman Tim Walberg (R-MI) sent a letter to Columbia University Acting President Claire Shipman exposing the university for failing to protect Jewish students from antisemitic harassment, requesting clarification on a variety of concerning text and emails sent by Acting President Shipman, and addressing Columbia's potential violations of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act. In the letter, Stefanik and Walberg raised grave concerns about several of Shipman's emails and text messages discovered in Columbia's disclosures that clearly attempt to diminish and trivialize the pervasive culture of antisemitism on Columbia's campus, raising questions about Columbia's compliance with Title VI.

The lawmakers wrote, "The Committee on Education and Workforce (Committee) is continuing to investigate antisemitism at Columbia University (Columbia), including whether there was or is a hostile environment against Jewish students on Columbia's campus and whether the university is fulfilling its obligation under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (Title VI) to end any harassment, eliminate any hostile environment and its effects, and prevent any

harassment from recurring."

The lawmakers said, "Throughout the Committee's investigation, Columbia has continued to be plagued by antisemitic harassment. The Department of Education's Office for Civil Rights has launched three separate investigations into antisemitic discrimination on campus. In May, the Department of Health and Human Services and Department of Education found that Columbia had acted with deliberate indifference toward the severe and pervasive harassment faced by Jewish students at the university. Columbia officials have also repeatedly made shameful statements about the plight of Jewish students on campus, raising questions about their willingness or ability to comply with Title VI."

The lawmakers wrote, "As antisemitism continues to rise across the United States, it is critical that our institutions of higher education have leaders who firmly understand and carry out their obligation to protect Jewish students. The Committee is therefore seeking clarity regarding several messages you sent that appear to downplay and even mock the pervasive culture of antisemitism on Columbia's campus. Obtaining clarity on these statements will aid the Committee in considering whether potential legislative changes, including legislation that specifically creates further accountability

for campus leaders, are needed."

The lawmakers added, "On October 30, 2023, you wrote to thenpresident Minouche Shafik and stated, "[P]eople are really frustrated and scared about antisemitism on our campus and they feel somehow betrayed by it. Which is not necessarily a rational feeling but it's deep and it is quite threatening." Your description-that people feel "somehow" betrayed and that this is "not necessarily a rational feeling," but that it is "threatening"-is perplexing, considering the violence and harassment against Jewish and Israeli students already occurring on Columbia's campus at the time."

The lawmakers continued, "On January 17, 2024, you said, "We need to get somebody from the middle east [sic] or who is Arab on our board. Quickly I think. Somehow." Were Columbia to act on this suggestion and appoint someone to the board specifically because

of their national origin, it would implicate Title VI concerns. The Committee's request for clarification will inform its understanding of Columbia's compliance with Title VI and current approach towards discrimination in appointments. In addition, this statement raises troubling questions regarding Columbia's priorities just months after the October 7th attack, which was the largest massacre of Jews since the Holocaust."

The lawmakers said, "In another communication on December 28, 2023, you stated: "This piece was pretty amazing given the moment. Headline terrific... And most critically I think it inoculates us for a while from the capital [sic] hill nonsense and threat." Your reference to "capital [sic] hill nonsense" is disturbing given Congress's role in conducting oversight to ensure universities are fulfilling their obligations to protect Jewish students. Congress's efforts to ensure the safety and security of Jewish students-who make up almost a quarter of your campus population-is not "capital [sic] hill nonsense."

The lawmakers continued, "In the same December communication, you stated, "I do think we should think about . . . . how to do some things with Rashid [Khalidi]. Events. That won't be popular in some groups but he is a respected academic."We agree. Columbia further promoting Rashid Khalidi, an individual who has consistently supported and excused terrorist violence-and served as spokesman for a designated terrorist group-would likely not have been "popular" with most Jewish students, who felt and continue to feel fear and hostility on campus after the October 7th attack."


The lawmakers added, "Finally, in multiple communications, you expressed distrust and dislike for Shoshana Shendelman, a Jewish member of Columbia's Board of Trustees and one of its most outspoken members against the bullying, harassment, and intimidation of Jewish students. In a communication on January 25, 2024, you said of Shendelman, "I just don't think she should be on the board."In another communication on April 22, 2024, Wanda Greene, vice-chair of the Columbia University Board of Trustees, asked you-referring to Shendelman-"do you believe that she is a mole?" She added, "A fox in the henhouse?" You agreed, stating, "I do." Greene added, "I am tired of her." You agreed, "so, so tired." These exchanges raise the question of why you appeared to be in favor of removing one of the board's most outspoken Jewish advocates at a time when Columbia students were facing a shocking level of fear and hostility."

The lawmakers concluded, "Congress's oversight powers are derived from the U.S. Constitution and have been repeatedly affirmed by the United States Supreme Court. Under House Rule X, the Committee's legislative and oversight jurisdiction is broad, extending to "education . . . generally" and "laws, programs, and Government activities relating to domestic educational programs and institutions and programs of student assistance within the jurisdiction of other committees."This includes enforcement of Title VI and other antidiscrimination laws by the Department of Education. Further, as set forth in House Rule X, the Committee "shall review and study on a continuing basis the application, administration, execution, and effectiveness of laws and programs addressing subjects within its jurisdiction." The information gathered will also aid the Committee in considering whether potential legislative changes, including legislation to specifically address antisemitic discrimination, are needed."



# Speed Dating Tonight Opens this weekend! July 12 at 7pm and July 13 at 2pm

Composer and songwriter Michael Ching is best known for his opera, SPEED DATING TONIGHT! With nearly 130 performances since 2013, it is one of the most popular operas of the 21st century. The DVO production is Directed by our Artist in Residence for 2025, Jonathan Stinson.

If you miss it this weekend you can catch it next weekend July 19 at 7pm or July 20 at 2pm.

Since the first production commissioned, produced, and directed by Dean Anthony at the Janiec Opera of the Brevard Music Center, SpDT! has been done over a hundred times. The episodic, inclusive structure of the opera proved very useful during the COVID-19 pandemic of 2020-2021.

#### AN INTRODUCTION AND ORIENTATION by Michael Ching (Composer and Librettist) based on a concept by Dean Anthony

SPEED DATING TONIGHT! is what I call a "new numbers opera." Much of traditional opera is based on musical numbers: arias, duets, ensembles, finales. SpDT! is similarly structured but with some twists. First connecting material such as recitative is minimized. As for the songs and ensembles themselves, most of the material is not gendered and not limited to one vocal type. Even the order of the pieces is up to the producer. The cast needn't be based on a 50/50 gender balance. (It doesn't need to be binary either.) In the over 130 productions the smallest cast has been four and the largest around fifty. The goal is to have one hundred options, with the idea being that you use only the material you want for your cast. Currently there are 95 options--I count a true duet as two options, for example, but a piece with only a couple of response lines, counts as one option.

The opera starts and ends with a frame and premise that isn't varied. At a local pub, the bartender, server, Dating Coordinator and busboy get ready for the event and greet the daters as they enter. We are introduced to two nervous characters ("I could just die") and Dater #22. He's got a singing birthday card. The actual speed dating starts and the show ends when everyone has had their song, duet, or trio. There are a few subplots to hold the show together. The finale starts with the server commenting in a Brechtian manner about the event ("Daters are a lot like singers"). Dater #22, a failure so far, gives it one more try, and in a parody of the Pappageno/Pappagena duet, finally finds his true love, a fellow cell phone addict. The daters exit and the bartender and server decide to go have a coffee. Alone, the busboy, dances with their broom.

Michael Ching is also known for BUOSO'S GHOST, a sequel to GIANNI SCHICCHI. Other projects include RSBE, DINNER 4 3, THREE PIGS REMIX, A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM, ALICE RYLEY, ANNA HUNTER, SLAYING THE DRAGON, CORPS OF DIS-

COVERY, KING OF THE CLOUDS, OUT OF THE RAIN, LEO, and COMPLETING THE PICTURE. Opera and art song consultant at EC Schirmer Music Publishers. Former Artistic Director of Opera Memphis, 1992-2010.

# NY'ers and Visitors Encouraged To Take Simple Steps To Stay Healthy While Enjoying New York's Great Outdoors Governor Hochul Urges New Yorkers to Take Precautions Against Ticks and Mosquitoes

Governor Kathy Hochul today urged New Yorkers and visitors about the importance of protecting themselves against tick- and mosquito-borne illnesses while enjoying time outdoors. Warmer temperatures and changing climate conditions have contributed to a steady rise in tick populations across New York and an increased risk of tick bites even in areas and seasons where risk was once considered low. Reported cases of Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses have continued to climb in recent years.

"New York's parks, mountains, lakes and beaches are the perfect places to spend the holiday weekend, so make the most of your time outdoors by protecting yourself from ticks and mosquitoes and the diseases they can carry," Governor Hochul said. "Remember to use protective clothing and repellent to help keep you, your family and pets safe and healthy."

Tick and mosquito populations can vary with weather conditions, habitat and other environmental factors including elevation. For example, warmer temperatures and rainfall can create more mosquito breeding habitats and faster development time, leading to higher mosquito populations.

Ticks are active throughout the spring, summer and fall. Lyme disease is the most commonly reported tick-borne disease in the State. Over the last three years, New York State has averaged more than 17,500 new cases of Lyme disease each year, with more than 19,000 cases reported in 2023 alone, the highest in recent history.

Lyme disease is caused by bacteria transmitted by black-legged (deer) ticks (both nymphs and adults) and is spread when an infected tick bites a person and remains attached for 36 hours or more. Bites from the nymphal life stage of this tick lead to most cases of Lyme disease, because the tick is so small - the size of a poppy seed - and is often not detected within that 36hour window. Nymphal blacklegged ticks are active right now across the State. Lyme disease can affect people of any age. The most common symptom is an expanding rash resembling a bull's eye or solid patch that appears near the site of a bite. Flu-like symptoms such as fever or chills and muscle aches, headache, or fatigue may also occur within 30 days of infection. If these symptoms develop, it's important to seek treatment from a health care provider immediately.

Tick bites can also transmit other diseases. Since 2015, the Department of Health has reported an average of 600 babesiosis infections and an average of 1,300 anaplasmosis infections across New York each year, as well as cases of more rare diseases such as ehrlichiosis, Rocky Mountain spotted fever and Powassan virus disease. Governor Hochul Urges New Yorkers to Take Precautions Against Ticks and Mosquitoes

(From Pg. 26) All of these diseases can vary in severity, and without treatment, they can cause serious illness and even death. Avoiding tick bites and prompt removal of attached ticks are important, as transmission of these diseases can occur more quickly than Lyme disease. Powassan virus can be transmitted within 15 minutes of a tick bite.

Mosquito-borne diseases are also a potential threat to New Yorkers. Cases of West Nile virus infection occur each year with an average of 55 cases reported each year from 2020-2023. Last year, two human cases of Eastern equine encephalitis were reported (the first human cases reported in NYS since 2015). Diseases transmitted by mosquitoes can affect people of any age and may not lead to any symptoms but can also result in mild to severe illness and rarely, can result in death.

New York State Health Commissioner Dr. James McDonald said, "When spending time outside, it's important to take precautions to protect against diseases that can be transmitted by ticks or mosquitoes. New Yorkers should remember that it only takes one bite from a tick or a mosquito to potentially cause illness. Stay healthy and keep pests away this fourth of July weekend by following simple methods to avoid being bitten."

New Yorkers and holiday visitors should continue to take measures to protect themselves, their children, and their pets against all tick and mosquito-borne diseases that are present in New York State.

While hiking, working or spending time outdoors, follow these simple steps to help prevent tick bites:

- Wear light-colored long pants, long-sleeved shirts and closed-toed shoes.
- o Keep long hair tied back, especially when gardening.
- o Check for ticks often while outdoors and brush them away before they attach.
- o Perform a full body check multiple times during the day, as well as at the end of the day, to ensure that no ticks are attached.
- o Tumble clothes in a dryer on high heat for 10 minutes to kill ticks on dry clothing after you come indoors.
- o Shower soon after coming indoors.
- o Remember to check pets thoroughly for ticks after spending time outdoors and talk to your veterinarian about ways to reduce ticks on your pet.
- o Consider using EPA-registered repellents labelled as effective against ticks containing 40 percent DEET, 20 percent picaridin or IR3535, and follow label instructions. If you are using sunscreen, apply sunscreen first and insect repellent second.
- o Consider wearing clothing treated with permethrin. Permethrin is an insecticide that kills and repels ticks. While it should not be applied directly to skin, perme-

thrin-treated clothing provides protection through multiple washings.

If you find an attached tick, use fine-tipped tweezers to remove it right away. Avoid risky removal strategies such as detergent or burning, as these could increase your risk of infection. See the Department of Health's website for a video on proper tick removal technique.

There will be a daily 1:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. concert at Chevy Court (located near Gate 1) with an extra show at 9:00 p.m. on Friday nights, as well as a daily 8:00 p.m. concert at Suburban Park (located on the western end of the Fairgrounds, beyond the Midway).

#### HOW TO PURCHASE TICKETS AND PARKING TO THE GREAT NEW YORK STATE FAIR

There are three ways to buy admission tickets and/or parking: online, over the phone, and in-person from August 20 through September 1.

- o Online: The link to purchase admission tickets and parking will go live at 9:00 a.m. on Monday, July 7, at The Great New York State Fair's website.
- o Over the Phone: Starting July 7, tickets and parking may also be purchased over the phone by calling Etix toll-free at 1-800-514-3849 from 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Monday through Saturday, and 12:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. on Sunday.
- o At the Gate: Beginning Wednesday, August 20, kiosks positioned at all gates will be available for electronic ticket purchases. To minimize waiting time for the kiosks, large signs featuring QR codes will also be available at all entrances and in parking lots so fairgoers can use their smartphone to purchase tickets.

Including fees, the total cost for fairgoers will be:

o Admission: \$8.32 per ticket (\$8 admission, ticket fee of 14 cents, credit card processing fee of 18 cents)

o Frequent Fairgoer: \$25.70 (\$25 Frequent Fairgoer pass, ticket fee of 14 cents, credit card processing fee of 56 cents; note that the Frequent Fairgoer passes are available exclusively online)

o Parking: \$12.41 per vehicle (\$12 parking, ticket fee of 14 cents, credit card processing fee of 27 cents)

Upon arrival to The Fair, drivers must show their parking ticket to lot attendants electronically on their phones or through a printed copy. Please note that again this year, EZPass Plus is not an option for parking. Parking passes may be purchased with a credit card at the lots. Please note that cash is not accepted.

There will be no cash sales at The Fair's entrance gates or in parking lots. Machines that can convert cash into a usable card will be positioned at The Fair's Main Gate for those fairgoers bringing cash to the grounds.

#### HOURS OF OPERATION

The Great New York State Fair begins on Wednesday, August 20 and continues through Labor Day, September 1. The Fair's hours of operation are from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. every day, except for Labor Day, when The Fair closes at 9:00 p.m. Gates open to the public at 9:00 a.m. and close at 9:00 p.m. every day except for Labor Day, Monday, September 4, when no entry will be permitted after 8:00 p.m.

Parking Hours: The Orange parking lot opens at 9:00 a.m. daily, with the Brown and Pink lots opening daily at 6:00 a.m., and the Gray lots opening daily at 8:30 a.m. The Willis Ave parking lot opens at 10:00 a.m., but will only be accessible only on Friday, Saturday, Sunday, and Labor Day.

Trams: For the convenience of fairgoers, trams will run continuously on the Fairgrounds, stopping at 10 stops from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.\* every day. Plus, a dedicated ADA shuttle runs between the Gray Accessible Parking lot, located outside Gate 10, to Tram Stop #3 at the rear entrance of the Horticulture Building from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m.\* each day.

\*Note, on Monday, September 1, the trams stop running one hour earlier.

#### CENTRO'S PARK-N-RIDE DIRECT SHUTTLE SER-VICE TO AND FROM THE FAIR

Centro's Park-N-Ride direct shuttle service will provide passengers with transportation from the Centro Transit Hub Downtown, Long Branch Park, and Destiny USA to and from the Fairgrounds with drop-off and pick-up points to the left of the Main Gate. To ride the shuttle one way, the fee is \$1 for adults, and 50 cents for senior citizens, children six to nine years old, and those who are living with disabilities. The last shuttle leaves the Fairgrounds each day at 11:15 p.m. Shuttles will run on a limited schedule after 9:00 p.m. on September 1 as The Fair closes earlier that day.

# Governor Hochul, Mayor Adams and NYCHA Announce Completion of Elevator, Heating and Facade Improvements Serving Nearly 39,000 NYCHA Residents Made Possible by \$12 Billion in State Funding

- Additional Capital Investments Currently Under Construction, in Design or Procurement Will Bring Improvements to a Total of 75 Developments, Benefitting 122,996 Residents
- Under Governor Hochul's Leadership, Total State Capital Funding Provided to NYCHA for Critical Capital Upgrades Reaches \$1.6 Billion Since 2019

Governor Kathy Hochul, New York City Mayor Eric Adams and New York City Housing Authority (NYCHA) CEO Lisa Bova-Hiatt today announced the completion of 125 elevator replacements, 17 heating system upgrades, and 36 building facade renovations, benefitting 38,974 NYCHA residents at 24 developments across the five boroughs, made possible by \$1.2 billion in funding that has been provided by the State of New York through the Dormitory Authority of the State of New York (DASNY). Additionally, State capital funding is also supporting an additional 126 elevator replacements, 105 heating systems upgrades, and 29 building facade renovations all currently under construction, and an additional 172 elevator replacements and 59 building facade renovations in design and procurement. In total, these capital investments are expected to benefit nearly 123,000 residents across 75 developments. As part of the FY25 and FY26 budgets, Governor Hochul allocated an additional \$365 million to NYCHA, bringing the total state capital funding allocation to \$1.6 billion since 2019.

"With this important milestone, NYCHA has completed major building improvements, leveraging \$1.2 billion in state investment to improve the homes and lives of tens of thousands of NYCHA residents," Governor Hochul said. "NYCHA residents deserve access to a safe, affordable, and quality place to live and these improvements are critical to making that reality. I am proud to partner with NYCHA, its residents, and local and state officials to support NYCHA communities."

New York City Mayor Eric Adams said, "We are proud to call ourselves the most pro-housing administration in New York City history and that includes public housing. From unlocking over \$4.7 billion for capital repairs through the PACT program to delivering free internet to over 150,000 NYCHA households through our Big Apple Connect initiative, we are putting public

housing first every day. These renovations will help tens of thousands of NYCHA residents stay safe, stay warm, and stay healthy. Thank you to the state for funding these critical upgrades and to all our NYCHA leaders for their tireless advocacy on behalf of our public housing tenants."

NYCHA CEO Lisa Bova-Hiatt said, "Since 2019, NYCHA has worked diligently to address the pillar areas of the HUD Agreement and make tangible quality of life improvements for NYCHA residents. The Authority has made tremendous progress in the face of decades of federal disinvestment, and the support of our partners at the State has been integral as we continue working to improve building infrastructure and make much needed capital improvements across the portfolio. We deeply appreciate the State's ongoing dedication to all the New Yorkers that call NYCHA home."

Dormitory Authority of the State of New York President and CEO Robert J. Rodriguez said, "Governor Hochul's commitment to public housing is making a real difference for NYCHA residents. DASNY is proud to support this work by disbursing critical resources that help advance essential upgrades - from modern elevators to reliable heating systems. These improvements reflect the quality of life all New Yorkers deserve, and we're honored to partner with the State and NYCHA on this transformative effort."

New York State Homes and Community Renewal Commissioner RuthAnne Visnauskas said, "This \$1.2 billion investment of state funds has helped make significant improvements to NYCHA properties that will improve the quality of life for nearly 39,000 residents throughout the five boroughs. This investment reflects Governor Hochul's continued commitment to ensure NYCHA residents have a safe and affordable place to call home."

Nearly 39,000 residents will benefit from 125 elevator replacements, 17 heating system upgrades, and 36 building facade renovations at 24 developments. Since Governor Hochul has taken office, NYCHA has received a total capital funding allocation of \$1.2 billion from the State through three funding agreements: \$450 million for boiler and elevator upgrades in November 2021; \$300 million for additional elevator upgrades in April 2022; and \$485 million for facade restoration and additional heating system upgrades in December 2023.

As part of the FY25 and FY26 budgets, Governor Hochul secured \$140 million to fund additional facade and heating system upgrades and \$225 million to fund additional capital improvements, including \$25 million for vacant NYCHA units and \$200 million other capital work, providing vital support to this essential housing stock and critical quality of life improvements for the residents who call it home. This builds on the Governor's ongoing commitment to public and subsidized housing, including her dedication of \$391 million in additional state Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP) and other funding in her FY24 budget to help ensure public housing residents who fell behind on their rent due to the COVID-19 pandemic received payments. An estimated 58,000 households have been assisted as a result to date. In June 2022, Governor Hochul previously signed legislation creating the New York Public Housing Preservation Trust, aimed at addressing overdue repairs, rehabilitation, and modernization of up to 25,000 NYCHA apartments.

#### DEC Forest Rangers - Week in Review Recent Statewide Forest Ranger Actions

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Forest Rangers respond to search and rescue incidents statewide. Working with other state agencies, local emergency response organizations, and volunteer search and rescue groups, Forest Rangers locate, and extract lost, injured, or distressed people from across New York State.

In 2024, DEC Forest Rangers conducted 362 search and rescue missions, extinguished 122 wildfires covering nearly 6,500 acres, participated in 60 prescribed fires that served to rejuvenate more than 1,155 acres of land, and worked on cases that resulted in more than 1,200 tickets and arrests.


"DEC's Forest Rangers bravely protect State-owned and managed lands, as well as the people who use them. Whether conducting a search and rescue call or responding to a wildfire burning out of control, Rangers are always ready when emergencies strike," DEC Commissioner Amanda Lefton said. "Every day and in all conditions, Forest Rangers demonstrate their expertise and leadership in protecting the public and State lands, serving as role models for the next generation of environmental stewards. DEC encourages interested New Yorkers to visit DEC's website to learn how to become the next New York State Forest Ranger."

#### **Honoring Assistant Forest Ranger Jackson:**

Earlier this month, Assistant Forest Ranger Brendan Jackson passed away while camping. Since joining DEC in 2008, Brendan served as a remarkable steward of natural resources focused on educating and assisting New Yorkers seeking to connect with nature, particularly in the remote Adirondack wilderness. With his most recent service as Assistant Forest Ranger in the High Peaks, Brendan put the public's safety above his own when responding to rescues, suppressing fires, patrolling trails, and helping maintain backcountry facilities. He continued much of this work into the winter as a trusted interior caretaker at Marcy Dam and Colden and, early in his career, as an intern at DEC's Five Rivers Environmental Education Center, repeatedly demonstrating his commitment to educating New Yorkers about the importance of protecting our natural resources. A Division of Forest Protection Honor Guard served at the funeral last week. We offer our condolences to his friends and family. Brendan was 42 years old.

# **Environmental Conservation Police on Patrol**

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation's (DEC) Division of Law Enforcement enforces the 71 chapters of New York State's Environmental Conservation Law (ECL), protecting fish and wildlife and preserving environmental quality across New York. In 1880, the first eight Game Protectors proudly began serving to protect the natural resources and people of New York State. In 2024, the Division of Law Enforcement fielded more than 105,717 calls, resulting in Environmental Conservation Police Officers (ECOs) and Investigators across the state responding to more than 30,109 complaints and working on cases that resulted in 15,755 tickets or arrests for violations ranging from deer poaching to solid waste dumping, illegal mining, the illegal pet trade, and excessive emissions violations.

"DEC Environmental Conservation Police Officers (ECOs) and Investigators protect New York's air, water, wildlife, and public safety, while also working to connect New Yorkers with the outdoors," Commissioner Amanda Lefton said. "As we tackle environmental threats on all fronts, I applaud the critical work DEC's ECOs and Investigators are undertaking to enforce New York's Environmental Conservation Law and ensure a cleaner, greener, safer, and more resilient New York State."

#### **Snake in the House - Delaware County**


On May 24, ECO Osborne responded to reports of a snake inside a residence in the town of Kortright, Delaware County. Officer Osborne, a member of DEC's Division of Law Enforcement Wildlife Response Team, arrived at the home and observed a three-foot-long milk snake in the living room. The Officer safely removed and relocated it back into the wild away from the residence. The eastern milk snake (Lampropeltis triangulum triangulum), a non-venomous snake native to the northeast, is often mistaken for a rattlesnake due to the light and dark blotches on its skin and rapid shake of its tail when approached by a potential predator.

#### Get Outdoors and Get Together - Nassau County

On June 14, ECOs Francis, Ruffle, and Smith participated in the New York State Parks "Get Outdoors and Get Together Day" at Hempstead Lake State Park in Nassau County. Celebrations were held across the State for the annual event encouraging people of all ages, abilities, identities, and backgrounds to get together with family and friends for outdoor fun at DEC facilities and State Park lands as part of Governor Hochul's "Get Offline, Get Outside" initiative.


# **Peregrine Falcon Rescue - Westchester County**

On June 17, ECO Franz responded to a report of an injured bird on the shore of the Kensico Reservoir in the town of Harrison. Officer Franz located the Peregrine falcon on a rock just off the shoreline, apparently unable to fly or flee. ECO Franz did not observe any noticeable injuries but safely transported the bird to a local wildlife rehabilitator for an assessment out of an abundance of caution. The falcon, initially lethargic, recovered quickly once with the rehabilitator and was released back to the wild after a brief stay.

The scientific name for a peregrine falcon is Falco peregrinus, which means "wandering falcon," derived from the bird's migration patterns where they may travel great distances, as much as 15,500 miles. They are also the fastest animal on earth, reaching speeds of more than 200 miles per hour in a hunting dive called a stoop in pursuit of other birds, their preferred prey.







As we celebrate the Fourth of July, we remember the bold vision our Founders set in motion 249 years ago, a nation built on individual liberty, limited government, and the rule of law. On July 4, 1776, they signed the Declaration of Independence that changed the course of history and secured the freedoms we cherish today.

That legacy lives on in the hardworking families, farmers, veterans, and service members of NY-24, who embody the resilience and spirit that make America exceptional. This Independence Day weekend, and every day, let's honor those who came before us by defending and supporting the freedoms they risked everything to secure.

# Passing President Trump's One Big Beautiful Bill

House Republicans kept our promise to the American people by passing the One Big Beautiful Bill Act by a vote of 218-214 this past week. This historic legislation preserves and builds on President Trump's Tax Cuts and Jobs Act, which I voted for in 2017. The bill provides a significant tax cut to lower-income seniors, most of which rely on Social Security benefits that they earned through a lifetime of hard work while also eliminating taxes on tips and overtime. This bill not only lowers taxes for working families but provides tax incentives for small businesses and family farms. It also prevents the largest tax hike in American history, delivers an average \$1,300 tax cut, and paves the way for a nearly \$14,700 increase in take-home pay for New York families.

This legislation protects our farmers and small businesses by preserving and strengthening the small business pass-through deduction and permanent relief from the death tax. It also restores 100% immediate capital expensing, which is a critical tool that will empower investment and drive job growth across NY-24. This bill will secure our borders by funding ICE and CBP, finishing the wall, and stemming the flow of taxpayer-funded benefits like Medicaid to illegal immigrants. This bill will also unleash American energy and end our reliance on foreign sources of energy while lowering costs for consumers and businesses.

The One Big Beautiful Bill also includes many standalone bills that I championed, including H.R. 1103, the

New Markets Tax Credit Extension Act, and H.R. 1752, the Technology for Energy Security Act. The New Markets Tax Credit fosters private investments into economically distressed communities, particularly in rural areas, and has led to billions of dollars in investments into rural communities like NY-24. The Technology for Energy Security Act extends the credit for fuel cells and linear generators, helping to solidify America's role as the leading manufacturer of these emerging technologies.

The One Big Beautiful Bill restores economic freedom, strengthens our national security, and puts hardworking Americans first. This is a major victory for the American people and a significant step in restoring prosperity, security, and strength for all Americans across our great nation.

As your representative in Congress, my top priority is championing legislative initiatives that benefit you and your families. Each week, I review numerous bills and letters, engaging in thorough discussions with members of our community to determine which actions to support and address your needs. Below are a few bills I recently cosponsored.

H.R. 4207, the No WHO Pandemic Preparedness Treaty Without Senate Approval Act: This bill would explicitly require any new pandemic preparedness treaty to be submitted to the Senate for ratification. This would preserve the Senate's vital role in ratifying treaties and prevent future Democratic Presidential administrations from skirting around the Senate by arbitrarily declaring this new radical treaty to be an "executive agreement", which does not require Senate ratification. This commonsense bill upholds the Constitution and will stop the WHO's attempts to infringe on our national sovereignty.

H.R.4242, the De-Escalate Tax Modernization Act: Our courageous law enforcement officers deserve access to the most effective tools to protect themselves and the communities they serve. This bill updates outdated and burdensome laws to ensure new nonlethal technologies, like the TASER 10, are treated appropriately under U.S. law and not treated as firearms. This clarification will allow these nonlethal technologies to be utilized by our law enforcement officers to de-escalate dangerous situations without resorting to deadly force.

H.R. 4254, the Iranian Campaign Medal Act: This legislation authorizes the Secretary of Defense to establish and award a United States military decoration to service members who served in Iran in direct support of Operation Midnight Hammer. On June 22, 2025, American service members flawlessly executed Operation Midnight Hammer and struck key Iranian nuclear sites in Fordow, Isfahan, and Natanz. This Medal would recognize these service members valiant contributions to U.S. national security and provide the Department of Defense a new way to honor these soldiers' contributions.

# VOTING AGAINST TRUMP'S BIG, UGLY BETRAYAL

This week, I voted strongly against Trump's agenda, which is a betrayal of my constituents and the American people. The bill is fundamentally unfair and un-American; and I am furious that it is now law.

This 'Big Ugly Betrayal' is a triple-whammy: it makes devastating cuts to healthcare and food programs while driving up costs for everyone; gives massive tax breaks to big corporations and the ultra-rich instead of the middle class; and irresponsibly adds nearly \$4 trillion to the national debt.

o Online: The link to purchase admission tickets and parking will go live at 9:00 a.m. on Monday, July 7, at The Great New

York State Fair's website.

- o Over the Phone: Starting July 7, tickets and parking may also be purchased over the phone by calling Etix toll-free at 1-800-514-3849 from 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Monday through Saturday, and 12:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. on Sunday.
- o At the Gate: Beginning Wednesday, August 20, kiosks positioned at all gates will be available for electronic ticket purchases. To minimize waiting time for the kiosks, large signs featuring QR codes will also be available at all entrances and in parking lots so fairgoers can use their smartphone to purchase tickets.

Including fees, the total cost for fairgoers will be:

- o Admission: \$8.32 per ticket (\$8 admission, ticket fee of 14 cents, credit card processing fee of 18 cents)
- o Frequent Fairgoer: \$25.70 (\$25 Frequent Fairgoer pass, ticket fee of 14 cents, credit card processing fee of 56 cents; note that the Frequent Fairgoer passes are available exclusively online)
- o Parking: \$12.41 per vehicle (\$12 parking, ticket fee of 14 cents, credit card processing fee of 27 cents)

Upon arrival to The Fair, drivers must show their parking ticket to lot attendants electronically on their phones or through a printed copy. Please note that again this year, EZPass Plus is not an option for parking. Parking passes may be purchased with a credit card at the lots. Please note that cash is not accepted.

There will be no cash sales at The Fair's entrance gates or in parking lots. Machines that can convert cash into a usable card will be positioned at The Fair's Main Gate for those fairgoers bringing cash to the grounds.

#### HOURS OF OPERATION

The Great New York State Fair begins on Wednesday, August 20 and continues through Labor Day, September 1. The Fair's hours of operation are from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. every day, except for Labor Day, when The Fair closes at 9:00 p.m. Gates open to the public at 9:00 a.m. and close at 9:00 p.m. every day except for Labor Day, Monday, September 4, when no entry will be permitted after 8:00 p.m.

Parking Hours: The Orange parking lot opens at 9:00 a.m. daily, with the Brown and Pink lots opening daily at 6:00 a.m., and the Gray lots opening daily at 8:30 a.m. The Willis Ave parking lot opens at 10:00 a.m., but will only be accessible only on Friday, Saturday, Sunday, and Labor Day.

Trams: For the convenience of fairgoers, trams will run continuously on the Fairgrounds, stopping at 10 stops from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.\* every day. Plus, a dedicated ADA shuttle runs between the Gray Accessible Parking lot, located outside Gate 10, to Tram Stop #3 at the rear entrance of the Horticulture Building from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m.\* each day.

\*Note, on Monday, September 1, the trams stop running one hour earlier.





# Good Trouble Lives On A celebration of the life and legacy of Congressman John Lewis

Liberty, NY- Date - On Thursday, July 17th Join We Are One Sullivan, NAACP Chapter 2187-B, the Committee for Equity and Justice and Rural and Migrant Ministry for a joyful celebration of the courage and commitment of Congressman John Lewis on the fifth anniversary of his passing. The event, part of a national day of nonviolent action, will take place from 6:00 pm to 7:30 pm at Hanofee Park in Liberty, NY. Speakers will include Emmy award-winning journalist and historian Janus Adams, the Reverend Douglas Bowman of Grace Lutheran Church and Maria Christina Martinez, an experienced organizer who currently serves on the National Advisory board of Project Groundwork.

Congressman Lewis famously asked us to get into "good trouble, necessary trouble to help redeem the soul of America." He spent the final years of his life fighting to protect the right to vote. This is our moment to carry the torch, continue his legacy, and pass it forward to future generations. Voter registration and voter information will be available at the event.

#### **About John Lewis:**

Born in 1940, Lewis was inspired to work for equal rights by the Montgomery Bus Boycott in 1955-56. He learned about non-violent protest at Baptist Theological Seminary in Nashville, organized sit-ins and participated in the Freedom Rides of 1961. As chairman of the Student Non Violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC), Lewis helped to plan the 1964 March on Washington and at that march, he spoke powerfully by saying "We all recognize the fact that if any radical social, political and economic changes are to take place in our society, the people, the masses, must bring them about." In 1965, Lewis and Hosea Williams led the now-famous march across the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, Alabama, where he was brutally beaten and suffered a fractured skull at the hands of the Alabama State Troopers. The day became known as Bloody Sunday and, along with other protests and events, led to the passage of the Voting Rights Act of 1965 which outlawed discriminatory voting practices common to the South and the established federal examiners to enforce the Act. It required federal preclearance of any changes to voting laws, ensuring the right to vote for many. He continued organizing through work with the Field Foundation, and his leadership in the Voter Education project led to millions of new voter registrations. Lewis became a US Congressman in 1987 and served

until his death in 2020. After the Supreme Court gutted provisions of the Voting Rights act in its decision in Shelby County v Holder, some states began to enact discriminatory voting laws, particularly after the 2020 elections. The John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act was first introduced in 2021 and has been re-introduced each year since then. It would restore and modernize the protections of the 1965 Voting Rights Act.
