

The Charming Jewelweed

A few years back when our daughter, Janna was in Kindergarten she came home from school and was very excited when she told us what she had learned that day.

Mrs. DeWire had shown the class a very special plant that when you put it in water it turned to silver! Janna further explained, "... and we have a lot of it.

We ar rich!!"

The plant that Peggy DeWire had shown the class was the common Jewel-weed or Touch-menots a/k/a Silverleaf (Impatiens biflora) and it



is very plentiful this time of the year in the Catskills.

Jewelweed is an annual,; it only lives for one year. Jewelweed grows from 3 to 5 feet. It has leaves that are oval, round-toothed with lower leaves that are opposite and upper leaves that are alternate. Underneath, the leaves are very pale. They're water-repellent, so they look like they're covered with tiny jewels (raindrops) after it rains and when leaves are underwater, they do look like silver.

This herbaceous native plant has a distinctive succulent, translucent, hollow stem. There is a clear watery liquid inside the stems, especially in the nodes.

Their trumpet-shaped flowers hang from the plant like a jewel from a necklace. Generally the blossoms are orange with dark red dots. With all of these attributes it is easy to figure why they call this plant Jewelweed.

Jewelweed blooms from July to October.

Spotted Jewelweed is often visited by nectar-loving animals, such as hummingbirds, bees, and butterflies. These animals help pollinate the plant by accidentally taking pollen with them and dropping it off on another plant. Pollination allows jewelweed to grow fruits and seeds. The seeds are often eaten by Northern Bobwhite and White-footed Mice.

Once the long seed pods form and are ripe, the seeds will 'pop' when touched. The exploding pods have earned this plant the nickname, "Touch-me-not."

Jewelweed grows in wetlands, especially in the shade. Often it grows in dense stands (many jewelweed plants together). Jewelweed often grows on the edge of creek beds. We see a lot of Jewelweed along the Rondout Creek in Sundown, and there is plenty of jewelweed in the wild all over the Catskill countryside. It is not hard to find once you learn to identify it.

There are good things to know about Jewelweed. When you are out in the field or forest and find you have been exposed to poison ivy, oak, or stinging nettle you can reach for the jewelweed plant and slice the stem, then rub its juicy inside on exposed parts. This will promptly ease irritation. Poultices and salves from Jewelweed were a folk remedy for bruises, burns, cuts, eczema, insect bites, sores, sprains, warts, and ringworm.

Many Native American tribes, including the Cherokee, Iroquois, Mohegans, and Ojibwas, used this plant to heal poison ivy rashes, nettle stings, hives, burns, and even the measles. Some also turned the plant into a yellow or orange dye.

Our family learned Jewelweed will not really turn to silver, nor will it make you rich, but it certainly is worth its weight gold when you run into a patch of Stinging Nettles!! We have also observed that where Stinging Nettles grow, there is usually some Jewelweed close by.

Cleaning Your Non-stick Cookware

The Fixer

Mysterious Book Report No. 203

Do you remember a public works scheme called The Central Artery/Tunnel Project? It was started in 1982 and completed on the last day of December 2007. It was projected to cost 2.8 billion dollars, the final tab amounted to some 14.6 bilon and will ultimately cost the taxpayers about 22 billion after interest on the bonds is paid. It was called **The Big Dig**. It took place in Boston, Massachusetts; it was the most expensive single highway project ever undertaken in America. Plagued by leaks, engineering and design flaws, poor workmanship, substandard materials and criminality . . . the whole damn thing

was mostly paid for with Federal tax dollars, you and I and every other American taxpayer will be paying for it for the next twenty-some years! And it's all been done so that traffic can move through Boston more easily. Sounds like a great deal . . . if you live and drive through the city of Boston all the time. I wasn't going to mention the Kennedy family's part in all this, but the fact that the last phase of the Big Dig was a 1.5 mile greenway-a series of parks and public spaces named for Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy kinda speaks for itself, doesn't it. Is this a great country or what . . .

The Big Dig and its aftermath are at the red beating heart of a tense and exciting new thriller that ought to make it onto everyone's summer reading list. The Fixer, (Dutton/Penguin/Random House, \$28.00, 375 pages, ISBN 978-0-525-95461-3) by Joseph Finder, begins with a reality check for protagonist Rick Hoffman. He's an investigative reporter who's lost his job, his fiancé and his apartment. With no money and nowhere else to go, he's sleeping on a couch in a derelict house in Cambridge that used to be his family home. His mother is deceased, sister lives 3,000 miles away in Washington State, and his father-once a practicing attorney-has been a vegetable in a nursing home for the past twenty years as a result of a devastating stroke. Rick's prospects are slim. 


UC Executive Mike Hein Visits the Rosendale Trestle to Announce the Continued Growth of the Economic

Local Flood Hazard Mitigation Planning Process

The Local Flood Hazard Mitigation planning process is underway to provide technical resources and funding to communities in the process of exploring possible solutions to mitigate hazards caused by flooding. Inter-municipal Agreements were made by Denning, Neversink and giving Sullivan County Soil & Water Conservation District the ability to contract for engineering services on behalf of the Towns for the first analysis in Denning/Claryville.

Few rural towns are untouched by this issue. The Denning Neversink Local Flood Analysis Committee was delegated in 2014 by their respective Town Boards to coordinate a stepped process to identify and explain beneficial and cost-sustainable solutions with professional engineering support. Representatives include members from Town Zoning, Planning and Code Enforcement officials, in addition to technical and outreach staff of Sullivan County Soil & Water Conservation District through the Rondout Neversink Stream Program.

Progress to date: Planning for Flood Resilience

<u>Curt Gowdy</u> - Curt Gowdy is recognized as one of the top sportscasters in broadcasting history. He was also the host of the television series The American Sportsman on ABC television bringing fly fishing right into our homes. Curt served as the host for more than 200 episodes over 20 years, from 1965 to 1984. Because of him, The American Sportsman went on to become the most popular outdoor show in TV history and opened the door for many others. Most of his life has centered around two items a microphone and a fly rod. "Whether I caught fish or not, just the thrill of rolling out that line and watching my fly turn over has been good enough for me. That and the hundreds of treasured mem-

ories I have of this wonderful sport.

<u>Charles Ritz</u> - "Well, I had seen a brilliant performance and I thought I had understood. Clearly, Monsieur X was a Hercules, a magician, to catch a trout with a fly!" That is Charles Ritz recalling his reaction, as a boy, to seeing a frout landed on fly fishing tackle for the first time. The year was 1912. Ritz has fished the finest rivers in Europe and North America, learning and teaching everything there is to know about fly-fishing, becoming a magician himself. "Charles Ritz is one of the very finest fishermen I know," said Ernest Hemingway. "He is not only a great flyfisherman for trout and salmon but he is an articulate writer and splendid technician." He was a down-to-earth, incurable gadgeteer and inventor, full of curiosity and enthusiasm for a vast array of subjects from food and wine, to model trains, to ski shoes, to the design of fly fishing rods. He invented: the prototype "parabolic" fly rod; designed a Vario-Power rod with a glass butt and bamboo tip and an allglass rod called the LL/LF (Long Lift, Long Flex), and made famous a casting innovation he called "highspeed, high-line." Ritz was known for his outstanding casting ability. He loved casting more than catching fish. Presentation, for Ritz, was key. "When you get to heaven," he wrote, "Look me up ... I shall know where the best trout are lying. Even there, knowledge of the water and correct presentation should prove all-important factors.







Shared Renewables Program Provides New Opportunities for New York Residents and Businesses to Access Clean and Affordable Energy

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo today announced the approval of a bold new community initiative enabling millions of New Yorkers to access clean and affordable energy for the first time. Proposed in Governor Cuomo's 2015 State of Opportunity Agenda, Shared Renewables provides opportunities for renters, homeowners, low-income residents, schools and businesses to join together to set up shared renewable energy projects resulting in healthier and stronger communities.

"The Shared Renewables initiative will help people and communities across the state save money on local clean energy projects," Governor Cuomo said. "This program is about protecting the environment and ensuring that all New Yorkers, regardless of their zip code or income, have the opportunity to access clean and affordable power. Together, we will build a

cleaner and greener New York.

Renewable resources are already providing massive economic and environmental benefits across the state, with installed solar capacity having grown 300% between 2011 and 2014. Yet, many New Yorkers are still unable to participate because they rent their home, live in an apartment building, or own properties unsuitable for installing solar panels or

other clean energy technologies.

Under the Shared Renewables initiative (also referred to as community distributed generation), customers can join together to share in the benefits of local solar, wind, and other renewable energy projects. Each individual member's production would appear as a credit on their monthly utility bill. The first phase of Shared Renewables will focus on promoting low-income customer participation and installations in areas of the power grid that can benefit most from local power production.

"Democratizing the production of power allows individuals and communities to take control of their energy future and realize the economic, social, and environmental benefits of solar and other renewable resources," said Richard Kauffman, Chairman of Energy and Finance for New York. "As a direct result of Governor Cuomo's leadership and the Reforming the Energy Vision initiative, New York State is once again at the forefront of progressive energy policy by empowering millions of our residents, schools, and businesses to choose renewable power for the first time."

Governor Cuomo's REV initiative takes a proactive approach to meet the challenges facing today's power sector by building a regulatory framework to modernize the utility industry to create greater value for customers and support new investment in clean energy.

Public Service Commission Chair Audrey Zibelman said, "Under Governor Cuomo's REV initiative, Shared Renewables expands consumer access to reliable, low-cost electricity generated from renewable energy facilities. Shared Renewables places customers who do not own homes on an equal footing with traditional single-home customers and creates opportunities for low- and moderate-income families who don't have access to electricity generated from renewable resources."

During the first phase of Shared Renewables from October 19, 2015 through April 30, 2016, projects will be limited to those that advance one of two specific REV goals: siting distributed generation in areas where it can provide the greatest locational benefits to the larger power grid, or supporting economically distressed communities by ensuring at least 20 percent of the participants are low- and mod-

erate-income customers.

Beginning May 1, 2016, a second phase will make shared renewable projects available throughout

entire utility service territories.

In addition, other REV principles can be applied, such as aligning utility incentives to fully support Shared Renewables projects by allowing shared savings or revenues from new business models that facilitate projects at lower costs. In addition to these changes, the Public Service Commission will immediately commence a collaborative to determine how to continue the encouragement of low-income customer participation in community distributed generation during the second phase.

Customers interested in the Shared Renewables initiative can participate in a number of ways. For instance, the residents of a condominium may want to join together for a shared solar project. They would need to find a "sponsor" who will be responsible for organizing the project on behalf of the residents. A sponsor could be a developer or even the residents of the building banding together to form a legal entity such as a limited liability corporation, or LLC. State Expands Successful FreshConnect Program with More Funding and Year-Round Operation at Participating Markets across the State

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo announced that more than \$350,000 is available to help low-income families and veterans participate in the FreshConnect Checks Program, which increases the purchasing power of food stamps used at participating farmers markets. More than 84,000 checks have already been issued to 152 sites across the state to help eligible New Yorkers access healthy foods, including fruits and vegetables. As the season progresses, additional checks will be issued reaching even more consumers than last year and providing a boost to the agriculture industry.

The program has also been extended to operate year-round at participating farmers' markets, providing the opportunity to use checks 12 months a year. A full list and map of participating venues can be found

at http://freshconnect.ny.gov.

"The FreshConnect Program allows New Yorkers in need to access locally grown fruits and vegetables, and this year we're going above and beyond to help people eat healthy," Governor Cuomo said. "By increasing the amount of funding available and adding year-round partners to the program, we are promoting healthier habits and making a difference in communities across the state."

The FreshConnect Checks program encourages recipients to use their Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits at participating farmers' markets. The checks provide \$2 incentive checks for every \$5 in food stamps spent, increasing the purchasing power of SNAP consumers by 40 percent. In 2014, more than \$3.2 million in SNAP sales occurred at farmers' markets throughout the state.

Following the pilot program in 2014, \$60,000 in FreshConnect Checks will again be available to Veterans, Servicemembers, and their immediate family members at New York State Division of Veterans' Affairs offices, on a first-come, first-served basis. Office locations are located on the FreshConnect website.

The Division of Veterans' Affairs will also be bringing checks to a variety of outreach events throughout New York State. This is a new initiative this year to bring the checks directly to eligible recipients. Communities interested in having a State Veterans Counselor distribute FreshConnect checks at an outreach event are asked to call 518-474-6114.

In addition, \$50,000 will develop and implement the Market Manager Certification Program, a new initiative of the FreshConnect Program that will launch this fall. The Farmers' Market Federation of New York, SUNY Cobleskill and Cornell Cooperative Extension will partner to present an intensive, three-day training session in the coming months and develop online training modules for future market managers.

State Agriculture Commissioner Richard A. Ball said, "The FreshConnect program first launched five years ago as part of the Governor's efforts to invest in the state's agriculture industry. Every year, the program has grown as the local food movement continues to grow. This year, we're seeing an increased number of checks being distributed and an extended season to use them, which is benefiting both consumers looking for healthy alternatives and farmers expanding their reach into new markets."

New York State Division of Veterans' Affairs Director, Eric Hesse said, "The Division of Veterans' Affairs is proud to partner with the Department of Agriculture and Markets for the second consecutive year on this important initiative. Providing this benefit for Veterans and their families, and expanding the program this year to include active duty

Servicemembers and their families is a way that New York State can thank these men and women for their service. We look forward to giving these checks to them at our offices and at outreach events around the state."

Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance Commissioner Samuel D. Roberts said, "It's great news that the FreshConnect Checks Program has been extended year-round at some farmers markets. That means SNAP recipients can increase their benefits and have access to fresh produce all year."

Empire State Development President, CEO and Commissioner Howard Zemsky said, "FreshConnect's healthy food options will enrich the lives of low-income families and veterans and the Market Manager Certification Program will improve the ability of farmers' markets to promote participating vendors. Programs like FreshConnect and the Market Manager Certification help local farmers continue to grow their businesses in New York State."

Farmers' Market Federation of New York Executive Director Diane Eggert said, "The FreshConnect Program, dedicated to the growth and support of farmers markets, is helping to establish professional management for farmers markets. The program will teach best practices for farmers' market management, and tactics and techniques for expanding farmers markets. Certified managers will be in a position to leverage additional support for the market and ensure its overall success."

Director of the Office of Professional and Continuing Education at SUNY Cobleskill Anita Wright said, "We look forward to hosting the three-day training to provide farm market managers with the skills needed to manage and grow successful farmers' markets in New York State. Knowledge gleaned from the campus-supported online farmers' market Schoharie Fresh will be used to inform a workshop presented by Dr. Jason Evans, a faculty member at SUNY Cobleskill. Faculty and students from the School of Agriculture and Natural Resources will have an opportunity to participate in workshops which connect farm managers to industry experts and marketing professionals, accentuating SUNY Cobleskill's mission of Real Life - Real Learning."

Agricultural Economic Development Specialist Laura Biasillo of the Broome County Cornell Cooperative Extension said, "This unprecedented professional development opportunity for farmers market managers across New York State will position them to both become more well equipped to address rules and regulations related to food safety, as well as become more professional in their operations, learn to partner more effectively in their community to drive farmer sales. This will decrease turnover and increase the sustainability of farmers markets across the state."

FreshConnect-funded projects aim to ensure that all New Yorkers, regardless of income, have access to fresh fruits and vegetables and are encouraged to accept other nutrition incentives, such as Women, Infants and Children (WIC) Fruit & Vegetable Checks, Farmers' Market Nutrition Program checks, and Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition checks.

Governor Cuomo Warns Against Scam Tickets to See Pope Francis During Visit to NY

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo today warned New Yorkers of scams surrounding Popel Francis' scheduled September visit, urging those interested to only get tickets from verified sources. The Archdiocese of New York has confirmed that tickets will not be sold for any of the Pope's planned events and will only be made available through Catholic parishes. Additionally, other dioceses in New York State (Brooklyn, Rockville Centre, Albany, Syracuse, Ogdensburg, Rochester and Buffalo) will receive tickets to distribute to their members.

"We are proud to welcome Pope Francis to New York and I urge those interested in attending his events to obtain tickets only through the verified Catholic parishes," Governor Cuomo said. "Anyone attempting to sell tickets is a scam artist and should be avoided at all costs. Making certain that you receive valid tickets will ensure that this event remains joyous and

Pope Francis will visit New York City on September 24th and 25th as part of his visit to the United States-the first papal visit since 2008. Consumers are urged not to respond to any solicitation about purchasing tickets for the papal visit as tickets will not be sold and can only be obtained through the various Archdiocese in New York State and their parishes. There will be no tickets available through any other means.

New Yorkers should be aware that ticketing scams are not rare, and include previously used tickets, resale of lost or stolen tickets, online auction fraud, counterfeiting, tickets for non-existent events, fictitious tickets, and fake web sites. Scammers tend to victimize those dedicated New Yorkers who will spend generously to attend certain events. With their enthusiasm to obtain admittance to the event of choice, consumers fail to take safety precautions, and fall victim to scams.

The New York Department of State's Division of Consumer Protection is advising the public to follow these tips to avoid becoming a victim:- Check the validity of the Source: Always investigate the ticket source. If you obtain a ticket from an unverifi-

able source, you are taking a risk. Avoid clicking on links from unsolicited offers or unknown sources: These messages may direct you to mirror websites, sites that have a similar look as the legitimate site and pretends to perform the actions of the legitimate site. Mirror sites will try to obtain personal financial information that can further harm you and your credit. Don't wire transfer any money or payment: If someone asks you to send money via a wire service, that person is most likely a scammer. Don't fall for high-pressure tactics: The first line of defense against getting victimized is to remain calm and avoid pressure tactics. DEP Joins Statewide Effort to Educate New Yorkers About Invasive Species - DEP will support New York State Invasive Species Awareness Week with Public Education Stops in Delaware, Putnam and Westchester Counties

The New York City Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) today announced that it has joined a statewide effort to educate New Yorkers about invasive species, their effects on our ecosystems, and what citizens can do to prevent their spread across the watershed and other parts of the state. As part of New York Invasive Species Awareness Week, July 12-18, DEP will set up education tents at four farmers' markets in towns adjacent to the City's reservoir system. As the effects of invasive species continue to be seen throughout the state, DEP has continued to protect the watershed through education and outreach efforts, surveys to identify new infestations early, and control projects to suppress the growth of priority invasive species that could threaten water quality by hampering or changing forest regeneration, or affecting the ecology of watershed streams and reservoirs.

"The spread of invasive species is a unique environmental issue that deserves the attention of every New Yorker," DEP Commissioner Emily Lloyd said. "These animals, plants and microorganisms from other parts of the globe pose a risk to our forests and our water. That's why DEP has been aggressive with programs to identify them, remove them, and prevent their spread

New York State's Invasive Species Awareness Week was established in 2014 to promote knowledge of invasive species, to help stop their spread by engaging citizens in a wide range of activities, and to encourage New Yorkers to take action. For its part, DEP will share information about invasive species at four farmers' markets in the watershed, including Brewster (July 15), and Cold Spring (July 11) in Putnam County, Muscoot (July 12) in Westchester County, and Pakatakan (July 18) in Delaware County. The information booths will be manned by DEP employees and interns from Ulster County Community College. Students from the college have assisted DEP with its invasive species outreach and fieldwork for several years.

Because the spread of invasive species poses a risk to New York City's reservoirs and the forest lands that protect clean water, DEP has long administered programs to prevent, detect and remove them. DEP was among the first groups in New York to require steam cleaning for all boats entering its waters. Steam cleaning disinfects the boats and prevents the spread of invasive species such as zebra mussels, which can harm water quality and clog water intakes. The City has also encouraged local residents and watershed visitors to arrive with clean, drained, and dry gear, and to never dump leftover bait or aquariums that can contain invasive species.

New York City reservoirs are regularly surveyed for aquatic invasive species like zebra mussels, hydrilla and water chestnut. Particular focus is given to the areas where new invaders are most likely to be introduced, such as boat launches or areas where tributaries enter the reservoirs. When a species is detected, plans are immediately developed to control or remove it. For instance, water chestnut control is currently underway at Muscoot Reservoir where it was detected in 2014. Water chestnut can create dense mats of green vegetation at the surface, making waters hard to navigate by boat and reducing the oxygen supply for fish.

DEP has also been mitigating the impacts of the emerald ash borer, an invasive beetle that kills ash trees. The emerald ash borer was detected around Ashokan Reservoir in 2010. Several thousand beetle-infested ash trees were removed through timber harvests while the wood retained its value, allowing the trees to be used for cabinetry, wood flooring and other products. Hazard trees near roadsides and walking paths will continue to be removed. To mitigate its impact on public safety and other swaths of forest, DEP continues to survey other parts of the watershed to track the emerald ash borer's spread.

As the ash trees continue to die off, DEP has also taken steps to allow new forests to grow. This requires other invasive species to be managed. Invasive shrubs such as Japanese barberry and multiflora rose are controlled in areas where loggers will be working. Currently there is an experimental deer exclosure in one area that was recently harvested, designed to look at the impacts of deer and invasive species on young trees that are just becoming established.

Recent legislation has made it illegal to buy, sell or transport 126 invasive species in New York, including Japanese knotweed, hydrilla and Eurasian boars.

DEP encourages all its watershed neighbors to learn more about invasive species at New York's official invasive species website, www.NYIS.info, which also includes a list of events to mark Invasive Species Awareness Week. To learn more about what DEP is doing to protect the watershed from invasive

species, visit the invasive species page on our website. DEP manages New York City's water supply, providing more than one billion gallons of high quality water each day to more than 9 million New Yorkers. This includes more than 70 upstate communities and institutions in Ulster, Orange, Putnam and Westchester counties who consume an average of 110 million total gallons of drinking water daily from New York City's water supply system. This water comes from the Catskill, Delaware, and Croton watersheds that extend more than 125 miles from the City, and the system comprises 19 reservoirs, three controlled lakes, and numerous tunnels and aqueducts. DEP has nearly 6,000 employees, including almost 1,000 scientists, engineers, surveyors, watershed maintainers and other professionals in the upstate watershed. In addition to its \$70 million payroll and \$157 million in annual taxes paid in upstate counties, DEP has invested more than \$1.7 billion in watershed protection programs-including partnership organizations such as the Catskill Watershed Corporation and the Watershed Agricultural Council-that support sustainable farming practices, environmentally sensitive economic development, and local economic opportunity. In addition, DEP has a robust capital program with nearly \$14 billion in investments planned over the next 10 years that will create up to 3,000 construction-related jobs per year. 
