Ellenville Regional Hospital to Break Ground on New Building

The area community is invited to the Ellenville Regional Hospital's groundbreaking ceremony for its new building, which will connect the hospital with the Ellenville Family Health Center located next door to the hospital. The ceremony will take place on Tuesday, July 29th at 10:30 am.

The new building will be dedicated to Neil Calman, MD, the CEO of the Institute for Family Health, which operates the Ellenville Family Health Center. The Institute is the largest federally-qualified health center in New York State and has been serving the Ellenville and Wawarsing community since 2007, providing primary care,

dental care, podiatry care and behavioral health services, as well as providing hospitalist services at Ellenville Regional Hospital. The Institute operates the Mid-Hudson Family Practice Residency, which is the first recipient of a Teaching Health Center award in New York State. By placing Medical Residents at the hospital, the hospital inpatients have gained access to the quality care provided by the Residents, and the Residents have been able to experience the challenges of providing healthcare in our rural community. This program has also created an avenue for attracting new physicians to our medically underserved area. In addition, the Residency program has enhanced the prestige of ERH as the smallest teaching hospital in the country!

The Neil Calman, MD Medical Arts Building, will serve many functions. It will the hospital's new Cardiac Rehabilitation unit, which will open in late fall, as well as the Health Quest Medical Practice Cardiology Suite. The hospital will be purchasing a new MRI unit, which will also be located in the new Medical Arts Building. Nature Column - Linda Comando A tribute to the memory of all of the Townsman ladies that we have lost and loved so much... Peggy DeWire, Avril Pappa, Joan Hall ,Polly Hill and Joyce Lockhart.

One of my favorite plants this time of the year is the tall bee balm with their vivacious red flowers that attract the hummingbirds.

Bee balm is a native plant in the Catskills and is frequently used as a tea. In fact, that delicious Earl Grey tea secret taste ingredient is from Bee Balm! Bee Balm, also known as Bergamot, Oswego Tea or Monarda can growto over five feet tall.

The scientific name, Monarda, came from Nicolas Monardes, who wrote a book in 1574 describing plants found in the New World, included Monarda.



But long before Nicolas wrote the book, the Native Americans, including the Blackfoot, Menominee, Ojibwa and Winnebago knew the wonderful properties of this plant. The Blackfoot Indians recognized the strong antiseptic action of bee balm and used poultices of the plant for skin infections and minor wounds. Bee balm is the natural source of the antiseptic Thymol, the primary active ingredient in modern commercial mouthwash formulas. The Winnebago used a tisane made from bee balm as a general stimulant. Bee balm was also used as a carminative herb by Native Americans to treat excessive flatulence. An infusion of crushed Bee Balm was used to treat headaches and fevers.

Bee balm is easily recognized and grows quite well in full sun where the soil is moist, yet well drained. I guess a sunny spot in Sundown is the perfect spot, especially if you want the plants to produce beautiful blossoms. Bee balm will grow in shade, and will spread rapidly, but will not produce abundant flowers.

The individual flowers are narrowly tube-shaped, tightly clustered together in 2 in. heads and set atop a square stem. The stem is lined with large dark green oval leaves that have a minty aroma. Hummingbirds, butter-

The beautiful red Bee Balm that is common in our area, Monarda didyma, is not the only member of the Monarda family that grows in the Catskills. Monarda fistulosa, commonly known as wild bergamot, has lavender Monarda citriodora and or smoky pink flowers. Monarda pectinata have light lavender to lilac-colored blooms and have slightly decreased flower quantities.

All are commonly called Bee Balm and are members

of the mint family.

What did John Burroughs have to say about Bee Balm? Quoted from the book, Our Friend John Burroughs, he states, "I shall long remember the enticing stream, the pretty cascades, the high shelving rocks sheltering the mossy nest of the phoebe, and the glowing masses of bee balm blooming beside the stream; yes, and the eagerness of one of the fisherman as he slipped along ahead of me, dropping his hook into the pools. Occasionally he would relinquish the rod, putting it into my hands with a rare self-denial as we came to a promising pools; but I was more deft at gathering bee balm than taking trout, and willingly spared the rod to the eager angler."

Today bee balm has even found its way into the florist's shop. Definitely a Catskill Mountain prize, this beautiful red blossomed flower certainly has a long history that surely goes back long before John Burroughs or Nicolas Monardes, to the days when the native's of this land had their own name for this outstanding plant that once upon a time was called Oswega tea!

Are your white socks getting a little dingy? To whiten them, start by adding 1 cup vinegar to 1 1/2 quarts tap water in a large pot. Bring the solution to a boil, then pour it into a bucket and drop in your dingy socks. Let them soak overnight. The next day, wash them as you normally would.

Mysterious Book Report No. 155

Some of the best thriller and crime fiction stories are built around the premise of an ordinary person being put into an extraordinary situation. For example . . . Peter Parker is bitten by a radioactive spider and as a result, develops supernatural powers which totally change his life as he becomes 'The Amazing Spiderman,' a crusading crime fighter and doer of good deeds. Far fetched? Absolutely, you betcha. Does it make for good stories? Ditto. What I want to emphasize however, is not the Spiderman stories, but that one extraordinary event which changed him forever and made him a super hero.

In Chance, (Scribner, \$26.00, 320 pages, ISBN 978-0-7432-8924-5) by Kem Nunn, we're introduced to Dr. Eldon Chance, a forensic psychiatrist who makes his living by reviewing the medical files of persons accused of committing a crime, then testifying in court as to their sanity. He's a perfectly ordinary guy who's estranged from his wife, about to be divorced, living in an apartment while his soon to be ex-wife is living

with her personal trainer boyfriend and Chance's estranged teenaged daughter in the house Chance used to own, and is still paying for. He's a guy who is teetering on the precipice of ruination, if not damnation. It's been years since Chance has seen a patient, because his type of practice doesn't require it. He's a disaster just waiting to happen, and happen it does when a patient named Jaclyn Blackstone is referred to him, suffering from periods of memory loss and an inability to concentrate for long periods of time. Dr. Chance diagnoses her as possibly having a multiple personality disorder, brought about by physical, psychological or sexual abuse. She's married to an abusive Oakland homicide detective who's threatened to kill her if she tries to leave him. Of course, she's a gorgeous California beauty with drop dead good looks and a huge sexual appetite . . . making it oh, so easy, for Chance to commit the ultimate breach of medical ethics and tumble head over heels into bed with her. Suddenly, his ordinary life is turned upside down as Dr. Chance is hunted by Jaclyn's morally bent, jealous husband and his cohorts in the police department. In fear of his life, Chance hooks up with a misfit, ex-special forces soldier known only as 'Big D' who tries to instruct the hapless psychiatrist in urban guerilla fighting techniques without much success. The novel is twisted, suspenseful and diabolic, just what you'd expect from a writer of TV shows like Sons of Anarchy and Deadwood, which in fact Kem Nunn has done. Action and intrigue fans will be entranced, delighted and absorbed!



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
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The Olive Jar - By Carol LaMonda Scared Stiff



"First responders put their lives on the line every day and that is why it is important to make sure they have access to critical equipment," said Senator Gillibrand. "This investment for Ulster County will go a long way in helping to ensure their safety and the safety of the com-

munity.

"The Olive Fire Dept. No.1 Inc. in connection with Senators Gillibrand, Schumer, and Seward's office is pleased to announce the receipt of the Assistance to Firefighters Grant through the Department of Homeland Security," said Chris Winne, Olive Fire Department Chief. The department serves the entire Town of Olive using five stations that are spread across approximately 67 square miles. Our Department is very excited about this news as it will allow us to purchase personal protective equipment needing to be updated."

"We are ecstatic here at the Marbletown First Aid Unit to be awarded \$71,368 in AFG grant funds to support critical Medical Equipment and Personal Protective Equipment. We are a 100% all Volunteer Ambulance Company that provides Ambulance service to 7 fire companies," said Beth Anderson, Marbletown First Aid Unit Board Treasurer and Secretary . "We are not funded by fire companies and this is the first time in 53 years that we



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Tri-Valley Lions Visit Guiding Eyes For The Blind (From Pg. 1)



So, again on July 12th, 2014, Tri-Valley Lion President, Esta Jacob, Immediate Past President, Pauline Vetter-Staats, 1st Vice President, Lorraine Nilsen, and Lion Donna Schick, headed down to this event. Not only did we get to tour the kennels of approximately 160 yellow and black Labrador Retrievers and about 12 German Shepherds in the final stages of training before they go off to be somebody's guide dog, but we toured the veterinary hospital, which has the only MRI machine for dogs in the United States, and also learned how the whole training process starts from soup to nuts. Puppies are born in The Guiding Eyes for the Blind breeding center, and at about 8 weeks old are sent home with "Puppy Raisers," who are very carefully screened and selected. The Puppy Raisers take the pups home and immediately start their training by getting them used to people, taking them out onto the streets and into stores, training them to stop at curbs, having them interact in noisy and crowded situations, so eventually they are able to guide their person through the obstacles of life, including getting on trains and going to work. These guide dogs give a blind or otherwise impaired person their lives back and gives them the confidence to proceed in life. Puppy raisers return the dogs to The Guiding Eyes For The Blind at about 18 months old for final training with expert trainers.

The Guiding Eyes does not charge a penny to the recipient of the guide dog for the training of the guide dog, the training of the recipient, nor the housing, veterinary bills, etc. Last year through the donations of Lions Clubs all across the country, The Guiding Eyes For the Blind was able to purchase 11 air-conditioned vans to use to take the guide dogs and the recipients of the dogs to locations to maneuver through malls, train stations, restaurants, and other places that the recipient of the guide dog will have to navigate.

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
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Each year that we attend this function, we are treated to success stories. This year, we were delighted to meet two individ-




uals and their guide dogs, but one story was particularly poignant. It was that of Randy Pierce, Guiding Eves For The Bilind Graduate of the November 2006 class. Here Randy's story...

Randy was a college graduate, had a great job, and was an avid hiker and

mountain climber. Shortly after graduation an unknown neurological order attacked Randy's eyes, and at the age of 22 in 1989, he began losing vision. He did get his first guide dog from another organization, and went on with his life, but by the year 2000, Randy was completely blind and lost the little light perception he had. In 2003, he suffered additional neurological episodes, which left him with no balance and confined to a wheelchair for 1 year, 8 months and 21 days. After six surgical procedures, Randy was able to walk with a cane, but was weak and did not have full control of his balance.

In June of 2006, and having lost his first guide dog, Randy met with Guiding Eyes For The Blind to determine if he was a candidate to receive one of their amazingly trained guide dogs, and he was found to be so. He spent 21 days being housed and trained at The Guiding Eyes For The Blind Training Center where he ate, slept, and trained. He was paired up with Quinn, a beautiful and brilliant yellow lab. The bond between the two, and Quinn's intelligence and strength made Randy dub him "The Mighty Quinn." In any case, Randy and Quinn returned home to Randy's home in New Hampshire. Randy went out into the world with Quinn, but Randy was still slow, unsteady, and walked with a cane while out with Quinn. Randy decided one day in 2009 to take Quinn to the mountains to see if Quinn could actually help Randy navigate some of the low mountains. Quinn could and did. He pulled Randy up the mountains and after some time, Randy's pace was quicker and his step much steadier to the point where he no longer needed the cane. Randy was determined to show other sightless folks that they could do pretty much whatever they wanted to do if they had the right attitude, perfectly matched guide dog, and the will. Randy was determined to climb the 48 highest peaks (4000 plus feet each) in New Hampshire's White Face Mountains, and with the perseverance of Quinn, he reached every one of the 48 peaks. Randy also started an organization called 20 20 Vision Quest, and you can read more about Randy by googling his name or 20 20 Vision Quest. Randy also married in 2010 to a lovely young woman by the name of Tracy, who had to gain Quinn's trust, did so, and they became a happy family.

Quinn passed away from cancer in January of 2014, just after his 9th birthday, but what a gift he was to Randy and all that knew him for what he helped Randy to accomplish.



Randy now has a new guide dog from Guiding Eyes For The Blind, but he will never ever forget The Mighty Quinn, nor will those that heard this story.

And this, folks, is one of the main reasons that The Tri-Valley Lions exist and work to fundraise to support organiza-tions like this. This year at this Guiding Eves For The Blind Function, The Tri-Valley Lions turned over a donation check to this organization in the amount of \$1,000.00, and we hope that next year it could be even more. Over \$60,000 was donated to this fantastic organization on July 12, 2014 by Lions Clubs all through the country. We are very fond of this organization as they have provided 3 guide dogs to our own Tri-Valley Lion, Monty LaHanko.

Come to our Soda Booth during Fair time this year, and meet Monty and his guide dog Buddy Boy, and you can see firsthand how terrific The Guiding Eyes For The Blind is, and why it is one of the organizations The Tri-Valley Lions

Pursuant to the agreement, which covers the years 2010 through 2015, the County employees represented by UCSEA will receive a 0% wage increase for 2010, 2011 and 2012 and a 2% wage increase in 2013, 2014 and 2015. In addition, employees hired after ratification of the agreement will be

2015. In addition, employees hired after ratification of the agreement will be required to contribute 20% of the County's cost for health insurance benefits.

"I am committed to fairly balancing the need to protect Ulster County taxpayers with the need to properly compensate hard-working County employees such as corrections officers," said County Executive Mike Hein. "They perform a difficult and dangerous job day in and day out. I want to thank Sheriff Paul VanBlarcum for his professionalism as we worked together in this process and I also want to recognize UCSEA leadership for bargaining in good faith and under-standing and appreciating today's challenging economic realities, as well as the UCSEA members for ratifying this agreement."

According to George Gunning, President of the Ulster County Sheriff's Employee Association and a sergeant with the Ulster County Sheriff's Office Corrections Division, "UCSEA is proud how we worked with the County to reach a reasonable agreement, keeping in mind the current economic conditions. I want to thank County Executive Hein and Sheriff VanBlarcum for being willing to listen and keeping the lines of communication open throughout this process.

The UCSEA agreement will now go before the Ulster County Legislature for approval.

Belleayre Conservatory Takes Issue With NYS Comptroller DiNapoli's Audit of ORDA

The Board of Directors of the Belleayre Conservatory announced today that they have passed a resolution taking strong issue with the Office of Comptroller DiNapoli's findings and suggestions in regard to the relationship between ORDA and the Conservatory.

The resolution noted that the opening statement of the Audit Report refers to the hundreds of millions of dollars in economic impact and benefit derived from ORDA activity. Nowhere else in the entire audit text is this benefit mentioned again, calling into question the Comptroller's Office grasp of the history, operation and mission of the Authority.

This lack of understanding is clearly demonstrated on page 17 of the audit where it faults ORDA for not demanding more fees and charges for the operation of the Conservatory on the State owned site of Belleayre Mountain. It also does not acknowledge the revenue ORDA receives through its concessionaire which operates at festival events.

Since 1991 the Conservatory has produced and presented a concert series, known as the Belleayre Music Festival at Belleayre Mountain Ski Center. The Conservatory is a 501c3 tax-exempt organization with minimal administration expenses. As with most arts organizations, ticket prices cover but a fraction of the costs. The entire budget over ticket prices is, and has for 23 years been made up by charitable donations. In these 23 years the citizens of this region and the patrons of the festival have donated millions of dollars to make this Festival possible.

The mission of the Conservatory, in addition to bringing entertainment and culture to an underserved region, is to enhance the Belleayre Mountain role as the economic driver of the Ulster/Delaware region and the Route 28 corridor by making its presence and impact known in the summer and fall season in addition

to the ski season.

The suggestion by the audit report that ORDA should demand a portion of these charitable donations shows a lack of understanding of the relationship between the two organi-zations. The NYS Legislature clearly understood the importance of the Festival when it mandated that ORDA do all it could to support the Festival and other year round activities as it assumed responsibility over Belleayre Mountain's operation.

The very suggestion that the State should somehow get a cut of the charitable contributions that make the Festival possible puts the ability to raise these donations in jeopardy. Without them the Festival is not possible and the citizens of this region and the economic future of its towns would be the losers. The loss of the Festival would compromise both the State and ORDAs mission of economic development and job creation.

Agreeing Bargain Collectively Deputy Published Comptroller in National Magazine

Deputy Comptroller Joseph Eriole, Esq. has had an article on labor negotiations published in one of the government finance profession's most prominent periodicals.

the Finance Officer's Role in Labor Negotiations," appears in the June issue of the Government Finance Review, a nationally distributed magazine covering all aspects of the world of government finance and

The topic of controlling labor costs while remaining faithful to basic principles of fairness to employees is extremely relevant in challenging economic times," says

The article focuses on the government finance officer's unique ability to provide analytic tools to the negotiating table. "Labor negotiations are often confined to reviewing the previous collective bargaining agreement and identifying the two or three issues that are 'hot topics' that year," says Eriole. "The negotiations are typically left to the administration, who are (appropriately, from their point of view) focused on the bottom line impact of labor costs on the budget process in the near term, and the lawyers, who are representing specific positions which serve those goals. But the finance officer can track trends in every aspect of labor costs over an extended period of time, and be a catalyst for innovative long-term solutions.

Ulster Comptroller Elliott Auerbach has recommended labor positions on certain issues in past reports and general interaction within Ulster government. Eriole has been a presenter at the last two national Government Finance Officers' Association national conferences and has publishing credits in the areas of municipal and consti-

tutional law.

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Governor Cuomo Announces \$3.2 Million in Grants to Expand College Access for Low-income Students

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo \
announced the release of a \$3.2 million College Access Innovation Grant
application that will be used by organizations to increase college enrollment
and completion among low-income
students across the State.

"New York's legacy is built on providing opportunities for all, and through this competitive grant we are continuing that reputation and investing in programs that work for the people," Governor Cuomo said. "This grant allows us to implement successful strategies that help low-income students entering college achieve greater educational and economic opportunities for their future."

The College Access Innovation Grant will support strategies for student success by:

i. Connecting college-ready, low-income students to colleges and universities that match their academic achievement levels by providing customized information and assistance throughout the college application process. This allows for students to be matched to several colleges that best match their academic and financial levels.

ii. Removing barriers that lowincome students face in accessing financial aid. Completion of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), the federal financial aid eligibility form, will be promoted by making available workshops and individual attention to guide prospective students through a potentially prohibitive process.

iii. Providing intensive college preparation, enrollment, and persistence through counseling, coaching and direction on the transition to college beginning in middle school through completion of the college freshman year.

iv. Reconnecting adult learners to higher education through services that increase their college completion rates, as well as reduce their time to completion.

iv. Establishing new and creative uses of technology to increase college opportunities for low-income students.

The average college-educated worker in New York State earns an estimated \$25,000 more each year than somebody with only a high school diploma, and an estimated 53 percent of new jobs are projected to require at least some college education. Low-income students are 30 percent less likely to attend college after graduating from high school.

The College Access Innovation Grant is New York's fifth federal College Access Challenge Grant award, which is awarded by the U.S. Department of Education. The Grant is administered by the New York State Higher Education Service Corporation (HESC), which has successfully applied for the State's four previous awards that total \$29 million. In the last two academic years, the funds have provided services to more than 124,000 New Yorkers.

Applicants can seek grants of up to \$500,000 through this Request for Proposals. Applications are due August 13 and interested organizations can apply at the HESC website.

Elsa Magee, Acting President of HESC, said, "In New York State,

fewer low-income high school students attend college, and successfully complete a degree, than their higherincome peers. To reverse these trends and create a system of opportunity and performance, the State is supporting high-quality, research-backed college access and success programs targeted to these students."

Congresswoman Nita Lowey said, "Access to higher education is essential to economic mobility and a stronger middle class. We need to do all we can to ensure each and every person has the opportunity to access a quality education, and this federal investment will help hard-working New Yorkers looking for a brighter future. As the top Democrat on the House Appropriations Committee, I will continue to fight for funding that helps higher education dreams become reality."

Congresswoman Carolyn McCarthy said, "Every student who can get into a college, university, or trade school should be given the opportunity to earn a degree, regardless of their financial situation. This grant will help students and their families make higher education a reality."

Microbeads and Microplastics Pose Severe Risks to Ecosystem -New Listing Would Create Opportunity To Study And Address Growing Issue

Washington D.C - In response to a recent report that identified thousands of plastic particles per square kilometer in Lake Erie and up to 1.1 million particles per square kilometer in Lake Ontario, U.S. Senator Kirsten Gillibrand today urged the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to add microbeads and microplastics to the list of Great Lakes contaminants. Microbeads are found in personal care products like facial scrubs, body washes, hand cleansers, and toothpaste. These products are designed to be rinsed down the drain but are too small to be captured by wastewater treatment plants. They are subsequently found in large bodies of water, such as the Great Lakes, and can be ingested by birds and fish, posing serious environmental and health risks. This could have a devastating effect on the Great Lakes fish populations, hurting the \$7 billion recreational fishing industry, tourism industry and the general economic well-being of the entire region. The state of Illinois has already banned microbeads in consumer products, with legislation being considered in New York, Ohio and California. Adding these contaminants to the list would allow them to be studied further.

to New York waterways' natural ecosystem," said Senator Gillibrand. "I urge EPA to add microbeads and microplastics to the list of emerging contaminants in the Great Lakes, to ensure the proper improvements can take place to help remove them from Lake Erie and Lake Ontario. I will continue to do all that I can to make sure New York's waterways are protected from pollution and are preserved for generations to come."

"From the Great Lakes to the Hudson River to Long Island Sound, our commitment to protecting and restoring New York's waters is among our most important responsibilities," Attorney General Schneiderman said. "While they may be invisible to users, roughly 19 tons of microbeads are washed down the drain in New York every year. I applaud Senator Gillibrand for her leadership in fighting to stop the flow of plastic from ill-designed beauty products into our vital waters, protecting our natural heritage against this hidden threat."

Microbeads have been banned from personal care products in Illinois and there are several other states including New York, currently considering similar legislation. Attorney General Eric T. Schneiderman has spearheaded efforts in New York to ban the beads and released a report which found that more than 19 tons of microbeads wash down drains each year and possibly into New York's waterways. They can last for decades and when found in oceans and lakes, pose environmental and health risks because of the pollutants they can attract and carry. Wildlife and aquatic animals ingest the beads, which causes internal issues and exposes them to toxins.

In her letter to EPA Administrator Gina McCarthy, urging the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI) Interagency Task Force to include microbeads and microplastics as contaminants in the GLRI Action Plan II FY15-19, Senator Gillibrand wrote, "Explicitly identifying microplastics and microbeads as an emerging contaminant in the GRLI Action Plan II will ensure this critical issue receives the attention it deserves."

The Great Lakes Restoration Initiative leverages federal resources to forge initiatives that improve water quality and protect native species. After releasing their GLRI Action Plan II for fiscal years 15-19, EPA has opened a comment period. By adding microbeads and microplastics to the list of emerging contaminants in the Great Lakes, there will be opportunities to better study the microbead and microplatic problem and allows for the development of proper remediation.



Reps. Gibson and Maloney hopeful FERC will Reconsider Capacity Zone

 Representatives Chris Gibson (NY-19) and Sean Patrick Maloney (NY-18) are encouraged by comments made today by Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, who told the media the two nominees to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) would review the agency's reckless decision to implement a new capacity zone in the Hudson Valley that will raise electric rates on thousands of consumers.

Senator Reid told the CQ Roll Call newspaper that he has discussed the capacity zone with FERC nominees Norman Bay and Cheryl LaFleur, FERC's acting chairwoman. The senator said both nominees would "take a hard look at it."

"We're encouraged by this, and we hope FERC will vacate the capacity zone and work on pragmatic solutions," said Rep. Gibson. "I appreciate the support of my House and Senate colleagues in fighting these rate increases, which make it even harder to raise a family and run a business in Upstate New York."

"Working together with our Senate colleagues, we're taking another step

toward stopping this new capacity zone, which is hurting our Hudson Valley businesses and families," said Rep. Maloney. "FERC can and should reconsider this reckless decision by vacating the order and working with us on real solutions."

Last week the House approved an amendment introduced by Reps. Gibson and Maloney that prohibits FERC from implementing, administering, or enforcing FERC's decision to create a new capacity zone.

The amendment to the Energy and Water Appropriations bill was accompanied by a committee report that calls on FERC to hear and consider the concerns of local ratepayers as it makes decisions regarding increased electric rates.

As the comment period comes to a close for the Federal Communications Commission's (FCC) proposed rulemaking on its Open Internet order, Senators Charles Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand, along with eleven Senate Democrats, are calling on the Commission to reclassify the transmission component of broadband Internet access as a telecommunications service under Title П of the Telecommunications Act. In a letter to be sent to the FCC today, the lawmakers point to the need for the FCC to use its authority to "prevent broadband providers from creating Internet fast lanes for those who can pay, leaving others stuck in traffic." In the 2nd quarter, 10 counties had negative growth. In the 1st quart of 2014 and the last quarter of 2013, 27 counties had negative growth; the latest numbers show some improvement.

According to the data, New York City is up 5 percent in total dollars for the first six months of 2014.

The New York State Association of Counties (NYSAC) reports that counties continue to struggle as this important revenue stream sputters.

o 6 counties (10% of all counties) have had negative growth year over year in all 3 quarters,

o 15 counties (26%) have had negative growth in 2 out of the last 3 quarters, and

 o 16 counties (28%) have had negative growth in 1 out of the last 3 quarters

o Overall 37 counties (65%) have experienced negative sales tax growth in 1 of the last 3 quarters

The uneven growth reveals significant pockets of weakness across the state - only 35 percent of counties have seen positive growth in each of the last three quarters.

"Sales tax revenue is crucial to counties, as it is one of only a handful of revenue sources available," said NYSAC President Mark Alger. "The state must make an ongoing commitment to targeted Mandate Relief in health and human programs and relieve the burden on local taxpayers."

NYSAC Executive Director Stephen J. Acquario said, "Sales tax collection data provides a key indicator of our state and local economy. Clearly we are still in recovery mode, and while the numbers show improvement we have a long way to go. There is a need for continued focus on economic development, at both the local and state level."
