I can recall not so many years ago, when chickens were considered free spirits. A home was not complete in the country until you had a flock of clucking, pecking, scratching, crowing and sometimes singing chickens running around the yard. When a hen house was almost as necessary as an outhouse! Chickens roamed about the countryside before electricity, indoor plumbing or telephones were invented. Today's chicken is only seen through glass at Butcher Boys or some other general store.

In the good old days my dad owned a very large flock of chickens, all colors and sizes. The first time I decided to help my dad collect eggs I was about eight years of age. I followed him into one of the chicken coops with a little pail and those evil eyed hens just sat on their nests glaring at us, daring us to come closer. I didn't want my delicate hands being pecked by those evil eyed hens who diligently guarded their nests. Repeatedly, I tried to slide my hand under her only to retreat from her pointy beak. Finally, my dad lost his patience with my hide-and-seek antics and uprooted several hens from their nests. The coop seemed to explode with swirling feathers and squawking, angry chickens as daddy announced "Now Bea, you can pick up your eggs." I was thrilled and I soon filled my pail with white, tan and brown eggs which were very fresh

Out of my dad's large flock of chickens, one little white leghorn was my pride and joy. When I went outside, she always saw me and came running just like a puppy. She loved peanuts and that was one item that I could have as many as I wanted from our store.

Quite often I filled my apron pockets then went outside and sat on the steps. All too soon she would come running to share my peanuts. Just a plain little white hen, but very special to me.

Many times during the summer, hens would steal away to lay eggs in secret hiding places and then come walking out proudly with several cute little balls of fluffy chicks tagging along, so happy to be alive.

So where have the chickens gone? They have short lives as mass produced commodities of large commercial operations. Fortunately, "a mighty few" still demand respect at events such as the Grahamsville Fair every summer and to me they continue to roost in my childhood memories. Perhaps they will be seen as free spirits once again, sometime, some place roaming around for they deserve it.

Sweet Little Glow of the Evening Primrose

Throughout the summer there always seems to be at least one wildflower that brings a bit of 'sunshine' even on a rainy day. The Evening



Primrose (Onagraceae-Oenothera biennis) is one of those cheery flowers.

The cup-shaped flower has a bright yellow to gold corolla and is about 1 to 1 1/2 inches wide, with four petals. The fragrant flowers usually last only one to two days, although the plant flowers from June through October.

Its basal leaves form a rosette near the base of the plant. The erect stem, which sometimes branches near the top, can be covered with hairs.

The plant grows from 2 to 4 feet tall. The stem has alternate, lanceolate-shaped leaves that are 2 to 8 inches long and spiral around the stem starting from the ground. They are dark green, serrated and usually have reddish veins. The leaves are usually hairy.

The Evening Primrose, a native to the U.S. including the Catskills, is a biennial, herbaceous flowering plant. The family is so-named because the flowers are partially to fully closed during the day and usually open in the evening.

The evening primrose can become an invasive plant. It takes the task of seeding very seriously, producing seed in copious amounts.

Evening Primrose has several folk names including King's Cureall, night candle, fever plant, night willow herb, scabish, sun crop, scurvish, or wild beet In the Victorian language of flowers, evening primrose represents fickleness.

Evening primrose was used by Indigenous tribes in North America (namely the Cherokee, Iroquois, Ojibwe and Potawatomi) used this plant not just as food but medicine too. They used it to make poultices to heal wounds The Cherokee, Iroquois, Ojibwas, and Potawatomi were among several Native American tribes that used common evening-primrose for both food and for medicinal purposes and to improve their strength.

The evening primrose was introduced to Europe in the early 17th century as an ornamental plant in botanical gardens, without recognition of their ancient use as medicine. It wasn't until the 1930's that researchers discovered the oil was powerful. Today, Primrose Oil has become quite popular and the ripened seedpods on the tall stalks are cut to be used as interesting additions to dried floral arrangements.

Because the brilliant yellow goblets of the beautiful evening primrose grow so easily, you'll see them thriving uncared for along roadsides this time of the year reminding us with its sunny yellow glow that summer is in full bloom and there are still warm days ahead!

Lock No. 50 on the grounds marked the end of the 17-mile "Summit Level" section, which required no locks, before gradually descending to the Rondout Creek and the Hudson River. That's why the adjoining hamlet was named Summitville!

Over 100 stone locks were built to raise and lower coal barges along the 108-mile journey between Honesdale, PA and Kingston, NY. Learn how these "water elevators" functioned and about the lock tenders who operated them.


The last item in the late CWA Grand Master Elmore Leonard's famed "Ten Rules of Writing," is this:

Try to leave out the part readers tend to skip.

What he meant in his tongue and cheek way, is don't bore the reader with superficial, unneeded, and unwanted minutiae. Keep driving the story for-

ward with action and excitement.

Now, an emerging hard-boiled writing talent named Harry Dolan, is doing just that. He's a disciple of Leonard who took his lessons to heart and got them right . . . so right in fact, that we're looking at Mr. Dolan's fifth, and newest, to be his breakout novel. The one that vaults him into fame and national prominence. Yeah – it's that well done.



The Good Killer, (Mysterious Press, \$26.00, 339 pages, ISBN 978-0-8021-4841-4) by Harry Dolan, begins in Houston, Texas. That's where a socially inept loser named Henry Alan Keen has just been dropped by a woman he's dated a few times. Despondent, Henry Keen tries to kill himself, but chickens out when it's time to pull the trigger. Then, he has a better idea. He'll go to the mall where his former flame works and make her watch as he shoots the place up. That'll impress her for certain. Sure it will.

But when Keen puts his plan into action, killing and wounding a number of people in front of his terrified former dating partner, he's killed by an Iraq War veteran – and the main protagonist of this kinetic novel – named Sean Tennant. He runs toward the gunfire when it starts, and calmly shoots Keen . . . once in the chest and once in the head . . . all of that activity happens in the first twenty-five pages of this finely tuned, intricately-crafted and serpentine-plotted novel. Twists, revelations and action sequences are revealed in every chapter, on almost every page. Here's a few . . .

After aiding some of the wounded, Sean Tennant disappears. He's a man with a past, a national hero and a fugitive, all at the same time . . . running from a past too painful to face, and too dangerous to deny. Sean and his girlfriend Molly have been living on a razors-edge for more than five years now, hoping for the best, but expecting the worst as they run for their lives.



I love Mary Oliver's quote about writing. Her Instructions for living are: "Pay attention. Be astonished. Tell about it."

Second up on this stage was DEBBIE FISHER and her percussionist MR. MULLER. This is the second time in the last






few weeks I have heard someone playing percussion on a 'wooden box'. It's good, it's effective and I'm sure this item has a name in the music world, it's just a new one on me.

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Joint Statement on Proposed Closure of Sullivan Correctional

Fallsburg, NY - Sullivan County Legislature Chair Nadia Rajsz and Town of Fallsburg Supervisor Michael Bensimon jointly issued the following statement today:

"We are not at all happy about New York State's decision to shutter Sullivan Correctional Facility, which has been an integral part of our community for four decades and employs hundreds of local citizens. This action by the State will uproot whole families and shift good-paying, middle-class, union jobs out of our region, which will be difficult to replace.

We are also extremely dissatisfied with the lack of official notice from the State that this announcement was coming. In addition to the poor planning and communication from Albany, we very much feel this move to close was undertaken disingenuously and should be delayed for at least a year so that all sides can be heard and considered.

Sullivan County and the Town of Fallsburg will be assisting the employees of Sullivan Correctional Facility in any way we can, including by advocating with our State officials, providing needed services to impacted families, and offering the full support of our Center for Workforce Development in keeping our citizens locally employed."

Added Legislature Chair Rajsz: "As the wife of a retired State corrections officer whose prison was closed in 2011, I know all too well the hardships associated with these kinds of closures. I feel the pain and frustration of every displaced employee in a very personal way, and I will stand by them as this process unfolds."


SCAM ALERT - COMPUTER HACKERS ATTEMPTING IN PERSON ATTACKS

The Sheriff's Office is advising that there are bad actors posing as technicians for CrowdStrike and possibly other cyber security companies trying to compromise business and residential computer systems within the area. "We have a report of such an imposter showing up at a local institution and trying to download malware into their system", said Sheriff Mike Schiff. "If anyone shows up unsolicited to fix your computer, don't let them in. If you receive a phone call from someone claiming to be from a cyber security company, hang up immediately. And if you see a popup message on your computer screen that says your computer is infected with a virus, do not call the telephone number you see. You will most certainly be connected to a computer hacker overseas", said Schiff. The Sheriff is advising anyone who encounters one of these imposters in person to get a good description, take video or a photo if possible and get a license plate number from their vehicle. Sullivan County residents are asked to remain vigilant against any potential cyber threats.

The current production at Shadowland Stages in Ellenville - *Lend me a Soprano* - did exactly that. In


fact, it went way beyond my expectations.





Governor Hochul Unveils \$108 Million Proposal to Transform Former Bayview Correctional Facility into 124 Affordable Housing Units and Vibrant Community Hub

o Partnership by Camber Property Group and Osborne Association to Deliver Housing, Community Services, and Reentry Support for Formerly Incarcerated Individuals

Governor Kathy Hochul today unveiled Liberty Landing, a transformative project to convert the state-owned 100,000 square-foot former Bayview Correctional Facility in Manhattan into affordable housing for low-income residents and supportive housing for formerly incarcerated individuals reentering the community. The proposed project, a joint venture between Camber Property Group and Osborne Association, would invest over \$108 million in West Chelsea and provide 124 permanently affordable housing units and on-site supportive services.

"Every New Yorker deserves access to safe, stable, and affordable housing. Liberty Landing represents a significant step forward in our efforts to provide inclusive housing opportunities and support to vulnerable New Yorkers," Governor Hochul said. "This innovative project will transform a former symbol of incarceration into a beacon of hope, healing, and opportunity."

The Request for Proposals focused on the opportunity to increase the critical shortage of affordable housing options in the region and specifically prioritized the need for housing for New Yorkers who require services within a supportive living environment, while enhancing the neighborhood vibrancy and quality of life for residents in the surrounding area. Liberty Landing will adaptively reuse the historic Bayview Correctional Facility, transforming the space into a vibrant, multi-faceted community hub.

The redevelopment will keep the Main and Annex buildings largely intact while constructing a new addition in the interior courtyard to maximize housing opportunities. The project will include 124 affordable housing units, providing much-needed income-restricted residences for individuals and families. The development will also feature a 9,300 square foot community facility unit dedicated to youth-oriented programming, enabling the delivery of a wide range of services and activities tailored to the needs of young people in the surrounding community. Additionally, the project will feature a 15-unit short-term transitional residence to support individuals with mental health needs who are navigating life transitions and in need of temporary housing. The State Office of Mental Health is providing both capital and operating funding for these residences. The proposed project will be sponsored by Empire State Development under a General Project Plan, will undergo environmental review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act, and will be presented for public review and comment prior to its final consideration and approval.

Osborne Association, the supportive service partner at Liberty Landing, will provide a comprehensive array of on-site social services and programming designed to meet the unique needs of individuals reentering the community after incarceration. Services will be integrated into the fabric of the development, ensuring that residents have easy access to the resources they need to thrive. The services include workforce development programs, family and relationship coaching, independent living skills training, and onsite wellness services, such as nutrition education and chronic disease management. Residents will also have access to benefits advocacy, peer mentorship, and connections to healthcare, mental health support, and substance use disorder treatment through community partnerships. These holistic services are designed to provide residents with the resources they need to overcome challenges, achieve housing stability, improve their health outcomes, and successfully reintegrate into the community.

Camber Property Group Principal Rick Gropper said, "Solving the housing crisis requires bold leadership willing to act on transformative ideas, and we thank Governor Hochul for entrusting us with this important project. Liberty Landing will convert a former correctional facility into a true community amenity with new permanently affordable housing units and on-site wraparound supportive services for residents who need them most. We look forward to creating something that will be a beacon of West Chelsea and, along with our partners at the Osborne Association, being a part of this community for decades to come."

Osborne Association President and CEO Jon Monsalve said, "We are proud to partner with New York State and Camber Property Group to transform the Bayview Correctional Facility into a community asset. With decades of experience in reentry support, Osborne is expanding its housing portfolio in direct response to the overrepresentation of older adults and LGBTQIA+ people in our jails and prisons and the dearth of housing options for them when they return to the community. Thanks to Governor Hochul's investment, together we are turning a place of confinement into a beacon of hope and opportunity."

Governor Hochul's Housing Agenda

Governor Hochul is committed to addressing New York's housing crisis and making the state more affordable and more livable for all New Yorkers. As part of the FY25 Enacted Budget, the Governor secured a landmark agreement to increase New York's housing supply through new tax incentives for Upstate communities, new incentives and zoning relief to create more housing in New York City, a \$500 million capital fund to build up to 15,000 new homes on State-owned property, an additional \$600 million in funding to support a variety of housing development statewide, and new protections for renters. In addition, as part of the FY23 Enacted Budget, the Governor announced a five-year, \$25 billion Housing Plan, to create or preserve 100,000 affordable homes statewide. More than 40,000 homes have been created or preserved to date.

Governor Hochul's administration has taken positive steps to repurpose former prison sites, with a strong focus on addressing the state's housing needs. Projects like Liberty Landing and Seneca exemplify this approach, transforming decommissioned correctional facilities into vibrant, inclusive communities. These developments not only provide affordable housing but also integrate employment opportunities, cultural amenities, and essential supportive services. Furthering this strategy, Empire State Development has advanced key recommendations from the Prison Redevelopment Commission's report, demonstrating the state's commitment to reimagining these spaces for community benefit. Under the leadership of Governor Hochul, Empire State Development has issued a Request for Proposals for Watertown Correctional Facility and worked with Seneca County to develop the RFP for Willard Drug Treatment Campus. Additionally, a developer was conditionally chosen to transform the former Downstate Correctional Facility into a vibrant, mixed-income housing site and Livingston Correctional Facility was transferred to the Livingston County Industrial Development Agency, completing the first successful land transfer of a state-owned prison for potential redevelopment. Governor Hochul's Mental Health Agenda

Governor Hochul's historic \$1 billion plan enacted last year is strengthening the State's mental health care system. Adopted as part of the FY 2024 budget, this multi-year plan is now dramatically increasing access to services, reducing wait times, and ensuring appropriate levels of care statewide.

The plan provided \$890 million in capital and \$120 million in operating funding to establish and operate 3,500 new residential units for New Yorkers with mental illness. This includes 1,500 supportive housing units, 500 community residence-single room occupancy units; 900 transitional step-down units; and 600 licensed apartment units serving individuals who require an intermediate level of services.

Building on this investment, Governor Hochul made strengthening the state's mental health system a priority in the FY 2025 Budget, which will add 200 new inpatient beds at state-operated psychiatric centers, will establish mental health navigators in the court system; expand crisis intervention training for law enforcement; improve mental health admission and discharge procedures for Article 28 and 31 hospitals; and increase transitional and specialized housing. The Budget also provides start-up funding for school-based mental health clinics, increases resources for youth receiving treatment in their community or in residential care, and bolsters outpatient supports, such as Youth Assertive Community Treatment teams.

In addition the Budget supports a loan forgiveness program specifically for licensed mental health clinicians serving children and families and an expansion of peer-to-peer mental wellness efforts among young people across the state, including training programs like Teen Mental Health First Aid.

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Governor Hochul Announces Start of \$17.8 Million Rehabilitation Project on the Callicoon Bridge

New Bridge Deck and Pier Repairs Will Enhance Public Safety and Improve Resiliency Project Will Ease Travel Along Important Link Between Sullivan County and Pennsylvania

Governor Kathy Hochul announced that work is underway on a \$17.8 million project to rehabilitate the Callicoon Bridge - also known as Interstate Bridge #7-which spans the Delaware River and links Bridge Street in the Town of Callicoon, Sullivan County, with State Route 1016 in Damascus Township, Pennsylvania. The project will enhance public safety, improve resiliency and ease travel along a key connector that provides access to the many boating, fishing and other recreational destinations in the vibrant Upper Delaware River Corridor.


"New York State is making historic investments to modernize our infrastructure and we are committed to working with our partners in local government to help ensure that their bridges and culverts are ready to meet the challenges of today," Governor Hochul said. "This project to rehabilitate the Callicoon Bridge will extend the service life of an important connector and help maintain access to the scenic Upper Delaware River region for the tens of thousands of outdoor enthusiasts who enjoy this special place, especially in the summer."

Originally built in 1961, the 960-foot-long Callicoon Bridge is a steel, multi-girder structure that is jointly maintained by NYSDOT and the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation. The rehabilitation project includes the replacement of the bridge deck and repairs to the piers underneath the bridge. Workers will also build a causeway in the river to help workers access the bridge for repairs.

Motorists should be prepared for intermittent lane closures during the causeway construction. In 2025 and 2026 the bridge will be reduced to one lane with alternating traffic controlled by a signal. Work is scheduled to wrap up in 2027 with structural steel painting. The project is being jointly funded by New York State, Pennsylvania and the federal government.

Motorists are advised to slow down, follow signs and traffic signals in the work zone. In addition, boaters on the Delaware River should also follow signage directing them around the work zone. The river will be monitored by a National Park Service Upper Delaware Scenic and Recreation River unit.

Senator Chuck Schumer said, "The Callicoon Bridge is a vital connector from Sullivan County to Pennsylvania over the Delaware River, carrying hundreds of vehicles every day, but age and deterioration have taken a toll. Now, thanks to our Bipartisan Infrastructure & Jobs Law, we are bridging the gap to make these long overdue repairs which means goodpaying construction jobs and stronger more resilient infrastructure for Sullivan County. New Yorkers rely on this corridor for transportation, boating, fishing, and



the outdoor recreation that is critical to the region's economy. I'm thankful for Governor Hochul's work making sure that the federal funding I secured is put to good use and will keep working with her to invest in New York's bridges and roads."

Senator Kirsten Gillibrand said, "With the Callicoon Bridge being a critical link between Sullivan County and Pennsylvania, it is essential that the bridge is resilient to severe weather and safe for all travelers. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law has brought much-needed improvements to bridges and other key infrastructure across New York State, and I'm thrilled to see that the Callicoon Bridge will now receive critical public safety upgrades thanks to funding from the law. I'm proud to have worked to help secure funds for this rehabilitation project and will continue to fight to bring federal dollars home."

Governor Hochul Announces \$15 Million to Fund Suicide Prevention Services for At-**Risk Youth**

Funding to Develop Services for Hispanic/Latinx, Black/African American, Asian American/Pacific Islander, American Indian/Alaskan Native, and LGBTQ+ Youth Prevention Effort Focused on Unique Cultural Factors Putting Historically Underserved, Racial and Ethnic Groups at Heightened Risk

Governor Kathy Hochul today announced five conditional awards totaling \$15 million over five years to help community-based service providers to develop innovative programs that will help reduce suicide risk among youth from historically underserved populations. Administered by the Office of Mental Health, the state funding through the Connecting Youth to Mental Health Supports program will help develop programs and suicide prevention strategies among racial and ethnic minority populations and LGBTQ+ groups, including those in rural areas.

"While New York's suicide prevention efforts are nation-leading, we have seen alarming trends developing among youth and young adults since onset of the COVID-19 pandemic four years ago, Governor Hochul said. "These awards will help develop innovative and culturally appropriate programs to serve the mental health needs of the young New Yorkers - especially those at the center of these tragic trends.

The awards will develop community-based, treatment-adjacent mental health services aimed at building a sense of safety and connectedness at-risk populations and to establish partnerships to help these individuals access treatment when needed. Grant recipients with their total award amount over five years include:

- o Contact Community Services Inc., Onondaga County; \$2.9 mil-
- Child Center of New York, New York City; \$3.4 million
- o John R. Oishei Children's Hospital of Buffalo, Erie County; \$2.9
- Access: Supports for Living Inc., Orange County, \$2.9 million
- Comunilife Inc., Nassau County, \$2.9 million

Assemblymember Aileen Gunther said, "One of the most effective ways to address suicide in our state is to ensure those most at-risk are connected to and comfortable with prevention services. These programs are aimed at building trust with these populations and connecting them with the critical services designed to save lives. As a Registered Nurse and Chair of the Assembly Mental Health Committee I am keenly aware of the struggles New Yorkers are facing today and I commend Governor Hochul for continuing to make mental health and suicide prevention a focus of her administration."

New York State Office of Mental Health Commissioner Dr. Ann Sullivan said, "By focusing prevention efforts on young New Yorkers at risk, we can connect them with critical and sometimes life-saving services they might not otherwise encounter during a mental health crisis. This funding will help community-based service providers to tailor innovative programs to connect with traditionally marginalized groups and help them address their mental health issues in a culturally competent manner."

State Senator Samra G. Brouk said, "Suicide rates among Black youth have increased faster than for any other racial group and we know that New York's youth mental health crisis is impacting historically underserved populations at higher rates across many outcome measurements. I applaud Governor Hochul's work to make much-needed investments in community-based service providers to help reduce sui-



cide risk among these youth."

tate Senator Luis Sepulveda said, "I particularly want to applaud Governor Hochul for recognizing the unique mental health needs of at-risk youth in historically underserved racial and ethnic groups. Communities and families of color which I represent in my Bronx district are particularly vulnerable because of an acute lack of mental health resources and services targeted toward and reflective of their special cultural, racial and ethnic needs. Particularly when it comes to dual diagnoses requiring mental health and substance abuse services, as well as suicide prevention, there are profound gaps in the delivery system and countless youth and their families have suffered as a consequence. As someone whose family has endured the suffering of mental illness and addiction, I want to commend Governor Hochul for continuing to place the needs of the endangered at the top of her agenda. The \$15 million in grants and the unique programs that will be developed by community service providers as a result will go a long way in helping a formerly forgotten population."

State Senator Brad Hoylman-Sigal said, "We are facing a youth mental health crisis, particularly in the LGBTQ community. According to the Trevor Project, over 40% of LGBTQ youth and half of all trans and nonbinary young people in New York State have seriously considered attempting suicide. That is unacceptable. I applaud Governor Hochul for dedicating \$15 million for suicide prevention services for at risk young people across our state, including \$3.4 million for the Child Center of New York in New York City. By funding community-based service providers like this once, we can ensure that every New Yorker, especially those from underserved communities, has access to high quality mental health services."

DEC Announces 12-Pound, 6-Ounce Largemouth Bass Breaks 37-Year-Old State Record

Catch from Cayuga Lake in Cayuga County is Second State Record Fish Established for 2024 New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Interim Commissioner Sean Mahar today announced a new state record for largemouth bass was set on July 11, 2024. James Britenbaugh of Pennsylvania reeled in the



record-breaking 12-pound, ounce largemouth bass from Cayuga Lake, Cayuga County while fishing in prepafor ration an upcoming bass tournament. The record-breaking catch surpasses the previous 37year-old State record largemouth bass, caught from Buckhorn Lake, Otsego County, in 1987 by one pound and two ounces.

"It's no secret that New York has the

best bass fishing opportunities in the country and Mr. Britenbaugh's incredible fish certainly confirms that," Interim Commissioner Mahar said. "DEC encourages all anglers fishing in New York to check out the Angler Achievement Awards Program before dropping a line in the water. It's an exciting program that recognizes sizable catches and shines a light on the numerous lakes, rivers, ponds, and streams producing trophy-sized fish right here in New York."

This year, New York State landed five lakes on Bassmaster Magazine's Top 100 Best Bass Lakes in the country. https://www.bassmaster.com/best-basslakes/slideshow/top-10-best-bass-lakes-of-2024/

Among the New York waters included are the St. Lawrence River (Thousand Islands), ranked as the best bass water in the nation, and Lake Erie/Upper Niagara River, ranked as the seventh-best water. Lake Champlain, Cayuga Lake, and Oneida Lake made the list as well and are in Bassmaster Magazine's Top 25 Northeastern Best Bass Lakes of 2024. Other waters across the state also offer exceptional bass opportunities and New York continues to be a destination for world class fishing.

The largemouth bass record comes weeks after a new state record for longnose gar was set. On June 21, 2024. Chuck Zimmerman of Hilton, Monroe County, reeled in a 15-pound, 14-ounce longnose gar from Butterfield Lake in Jefferson County.

Both Mr. Britenbaugh and Mr. Zimmerman submitted details of their winning catches as part of DEC's newly

revamped Angler Achievement Awards Program, which recognizes anglers who catch any of the 40 eligible fish species that meet or exceed the minimum qualifying lengths established for that species and tracks state record fish. The program further supports the Governor's "Get Offline, Get Outside" initiative, which was launched earlier this month to promote physical and mental health by helping encourage New York's kids and families to put down their phones and computers, take a break from social media, and enjoy recreation and outdoor social gatherings.

Typically, during summer months the closer one fishes to the Portal, the cooler the water. Give trout a break this summer.

If you think conditions are bad here, chapter member Peter Marx, of Maryland, reports that Shenandoah National Park recently closed trout fishing in all their waters, FYI:

New York State Attorney General Letitia James is attempting to block a new Nassau County law that prohibits biological males from competing in girls' and women's sports. This move directly undermines female athletes in our state.

I recently supported H.J.Res 165, a resolution aimed at overturning the Department of Education's new rule that would mandate the inclusion of biological males in women's sports. Such policies disregard the inherent physical differences between men and women, leading to an unfair advantage and depriving women and girls of the athletic opportunities protected by Title IX.

Bills Cosponsored by Tenney

As your representative in Congress, my top priority is championing legislative initiatives that benefit you and your families. Each week, I review numerous bills and letters, engaging in thorough discussions with members of our community to determine which actions to support and address your needs. Below are some of the bills I recently cosponsored.

The Dismantle DEI Act: would ban any Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion programs and rescind any executive orders regarding DEI. This bill would also end DEI training and programming, DEI pledges, and prohibit taxpayer funding for entities that use DEI hiring practices

The CUTS Act: rescinds unobligated COVID-19 relief funds and certain infrastructure funds to offset the cost of supplemental foreign assistance totaling \$95 billion made available for fiscal year 2024.

Providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Environmental Protection Agency relating to "Reconsideration of the National Ambient Air Quality Standards for Particulate Matter:" Nullifies the EPA's rule for fine particulate matter, otherwise known as PM 2.5. This rule sets strict air quality standards for particulate matter and will have disastrous effects on the economy and manufacturing nationwide.

The CDC Must Delay Burdensome Pet Travel Rule

I am actively working to address concerns with the new CDC rule that will impose strict requirements on dogs entering the United States from Canada, set to take effect on August 1, 2024. This rule mandates that all dogs must be older than six months, "appear healthy," possess a USDA-endorsed export health certificate, and have a CDCapproved Dog Import Form. Not only is this rule unnecessary and burdensome, but it will also be costly for pet owners in our community. I signed a letter expressing my concerns about the logistical challenges of importing younger puppies, the confusion surrounding the new form, and the potential negative impact on lawful canine activities across borders. We must prevent this government overreach which will prevent Western New York families from traveling to Canada with their beloved pets to visit family and friends. I urge the CDC to reconsider this policy and implement an 18-month delay to prioritize the rights of pet owners and their pups over this unnecessary power grab.

DEC Announces Falconry, Wildlife Rehabilitator, and Leashed Tracking Dog Examinations

Exams Will be Held Online Aug. 9, 2024; Registration Deadline Aug. 7, 2024

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) today announced that examinations for individuals seeking a license to practice the sport of falconry, become

a volunteer wildlife rehabilitator, or use leashed tracking dogs to find wounded or injured big game animals are scheduled for Aug. 9, 2024. DEC is offering the examinations online and at no cost to participants to increase access to the examinations.

The registration deadline is Aug. 7. To register, visit the 2024 Special Licenses Exams Registration website. Applicants will receive an email acknowledgement of registration; an additional one-time link to access the website on the date of the exams is sent to registrants at a later date. The link to the exam registration webpage can also be found on each of the individual license webpages at Division of Fish and Wildlife Special Licenses and Permits.

Apprentice Falconry License

Falconry has a rich history and tradition throughout the world and requires a significant commitment of time and effort. Apprentices are limited to possessing one bird, either an American kestrel or a red-tailed hawk. To qualify for the Apprentice Falconry License, applicants must:

score 80 percent or higher on the written exam;

be at least 14 years of age;

possess a valid New York State hunting license;

maintain DEC-approved facilities for housing falconry raptors; and

be a resident of New York State.

A falconry study guide and examination manual are available from DEC at no cost on the DEC Falconry License webpage. The cost of a five-year falconry license is \$40. Birds of prey are protected species and cannot be possessed without a license or other authorization from DEC.

Wildlife Rehabilitator License

Wildlife rehabilitators provide for the care of injured, sick, and orphaned wild animals for the purpose of returning rehabilitated animals to the wild. Prospective applicants are encouraged to gain experience by serving as an assistant to a licensed wildlife rehabilitator. To qualify for the Wildlife Rehabilitator License, applicants must:

score 80 percent or higher on the written exam;

be at least 16 years of age;

be interviewed by DEC Regional wildlife staff; and

be a resident of New York State.

A wildlife rehabilitator study guide and examination manual are available from DEC at no cost on the DEC Wildlife Rehabilitator License webpage. There is no cost for the five-year wildlife rehabilitation license.

Leashed Tracking Dog Handler

Leashed tracking dog handlers use their dogs to track and recover dead, wounded, or injured big game. Leashed tracking dog handlers provide a valuable service in aiding hunters in locating wounded big game that otherwise may go unrecovered. To qualify for a Leashed Tracking Dog Handler License, applicants must:


score 80 percent or higher on the written exam; and possess a valid New York State hunting license.

A leashed tracking dog study guide is available from DEC at no cost on the DEC Leashed Tracking Dog License webpage. While the exam is free, first-time license applicants have a non-refundable \$25 license application fee. The five-year leashed tracking dog license is \$50.







Enjoy More of Our Shared New York Lands

The Nature Conservancy and DEC have recently announced the State's acquisition of two conservation easements that will both provide public recreational access, protect natural resources, and establish a research preserve on the Follensby Pond property in the Adirondacks. The Nature Conservancy retains ownership of the property, and DEC has acquired two conservation easements that will provide public access to nearly 6,000 acres along a 10 miles span of the Raquette River, as well as to the Follensby Pond and surrounding watershed, respectively. Through a partnership with SUNY ESF's Center for Native Peoples and the Environment, protection of these parcels will also provide opportunities for restoring Indigenous Peoples' access to and caretaking of their ancestral Homelands.

DEC has also announced the completion of Phase I Public Safety and Access Improvements at the Zoar Valley Unique Area. These improvements include a new, accessible trail called the Memorial Trail, which will replace the former Overlook Trail at Valentine Flats. The new trail has been crafted to federal accessibility standards and includes a new split-rail fence marked with four viewing areas at scenic locations, designed to keep visitors a safe distance from the gorge into Cattaraugus Creek. A permanent culvert was also installed to protect water and improve drainage along the trail. Phase II of the construction project is slated to begin in 2025.

All projects advance DEC's Adventure NY initiative, with the goal of connecting New York families and visitors with the great outdoors and improving their experience. Also available are a variety of programs aimed to accommodate people with disabilities, including discounts for outdoor recreation, free and reduced fee sporting licenses, and Motorized Access Permits for People with Disabilities (MAPPWD).

Damascus, PA- August 8-18 2024, Thursday-Sunday for a limited two week run, Farm Arts Collective will present Conference for Those Still Living, play #5 of DREAM ON THE FARM, a decade-long series of performances about climate change at the new Agri-Cultural Center on Willow Wisp Organic Farm. The conference becomes something nobody quite expected.

In this new immersive DREAM ON THE FARM experience, the audience will be immersed in the conference as delegates, and the collective's new Agri-Cultural Center will be transformed into a conference hall. The performance takes place both indoors and out and will feature live music composed by resident composer Doug Rogers and performed by the Farm Arts Collective band.

As part of the play experience, the audience will be invited to walk the farm led by a Willow Wisp Organic Farm farmer, with an interactive a stroll through the "conference exhibit field" where booths will be set up and each actor-presenter will share their research and work with the audience who will be able to stroll and mill about at their leisure for a period of time.

Like all DREAM ON THE FARM shows, the evening will conclude with a shared farm meal with our audience to offer space and nourishment so that we may continue the conversation inspired by the evening's performance.

We believe that Climate Change is the greatest local and global issue of our time. As rural artists, we are compelled to address this issue as it affects everyone, especially the most vulnerable. We have told many stories in the DREAM ON THE FARM series. In fact, we are at the midpoint of this decalogue.
