To cap off the celebration, the fireworks will begin at 9:30am at the Joseph Y. Resnick Airport off Route 209 in Wawarsing.



The Eagle - our National Emblem

The Eagle became the National emblem in 1782 when the great seal of the United States was adopted.

when the great seal of the United States was adopted.

In 1851 Herman Melville wrote, "What is needed more than anything else in the midst of a crisis is a calm, steadying dose of clarity, the kind of omniscient, all-seeing perspective symbolized by an eagle on the wing: 'And there is a Catskill eagle in some souls that can alike

dive down into the blackest gorges, and soar out of them again and become invisible in the sunny spaces."

The legend of the Catskill Mountain Eagle continues.

The once threatened, bald eagle is thriving in the Catskills. Almost daily you can see visitors at the Eagle Watch that is located at the Grahamsville end of the

Rondout Reservoir. And there have been many reports of Eagles flying over Claryville, Sundown and surround-

ing areas.

The bald eagle (Haliaeetus leucocephalus), is the only eagle unique to North America. The eagles that now make their home in the Catskills, originated from a reintroduction effort that released more than 200 eagles in New York State beginning in 1976. They found sanctuary in the Catskills. Since then, the eagle population in New York State has grown from one nesting pair to now over 145 pair. The eagle is still listed as threatened in the state.

The bald eagle, opportunistic carnivores, flourishes here in the Catskills partly because of the fish in the reservoirs and streams. The eagle subsists mainly on fish, which it swoops down and snatches from the water with its talons. When food is abundant, an eagle can gorge itself by storing up to 2.2 pounds of food in a pouch in the throat called a crop. Gorging allows the bird to fast for several days if food becomes unavailable. Because they are near the top of the food chain, they become an irreplaceable indicator for measuring the health of the entire ecological system in which we all live.

Bald Eagles are not actually bald. Their name originated from an older meaning of "white headed".

The Bald Eagle builds the largest nest of any North American bird. The height of a tree chosen for nesting appears to be more important than the species of tree.

Both male and female adult bald eagles have a blackish-brown back and breast; a white head, neck, and tail; and yellow feet and beak. A female bald eagle's body length varies from 35 to 37 inches; with a wingspan of 79 to 90 inches. The smaller male bald eagle has a body length of 30 to 34 inches; with a wingspan ranging from 72 to 85 inches.

Their feet are cold resistant, consisting of mostly tendon. Talons are important tools for hunting and defense. Eagles kill their prey by penetrating its flesh with their talons. They can open and close their talons at will.

Bald eagles mate for life. Courting begins in early April. Eagles lay from 1 to 3 eggs (commonly two) and the eggs usually hatch between late May and early June.

Young eagles are a mixture of brown and white; with a black beak in young birds. The adult plumage develops when they are sexually mature. It takes about five years for their head and tail feathers to gradually turn white. At four months of age, eaglets appear to be larger than their parents because of their longer flight feathers. These feathers serve as nature's training wheels, helping the juveniles stabilize during their early flying days. By the end of the summer, the parent eagles begin to suffer from "empty nest syndrome" as their offspring can generally fly and take off to be on their own.

It's possible for bald eagles in the wild to live longer than thirty years, but the average lifespan is fifteen to

twenty years.

The Bald Eagle remains a sacred bird in some North American cultures, and its feathers, are central to many religious and spiritual customs among Native Americans as eagles are considered spiritual messengers between gods and humans in their cultures. The eagle represents freedom. Living on the tops of the highest trees and the heights of our lofty Catskill Mountains, amid the solitary grandeur of Nature, whether with strong pinions sweeping into the valleys below, or upward into the boundless spaces beyond, the eagle has unlimited freedom!





Fountain at Ashokan Reservoir will be Temporarily Shut Down to Allow for Hydropower Upgrades - Park around fountain will remain open during work by New York Power Authority

The New York City Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) today announced that the fountain at Ashokan Reservoir will be shut down until mid-August while the New York Power Authority (NYPA) upgrades its below-ground hydropower facilities. The fountain is expected be turned back on about Aug. 15.

Water runs to the fountain only when NYPA's hydropower turbines, located below ground between the reservoir and the fountain, are in service. The shutdown was needed to update control mechanisms on the two hydropower turbine units. A fence has been installed and signs are posted around the work area to ensure public safety.

The 5-acre park area around the fountain will remain open while NYPA upgrades its infrastructure. The park is used each year by several thousand local residents and visitors, who enjoy the scenic view while picnicking, playing catch, bicv-


cling, walking and other activities. It is adjacent to the Ashokan Day Use Area that provides 2.5 miles of scenic walkways. The water fountain at Ashokan replaced the original Catskill Aqueduct aeration system in 1982 during the installation of two hydroelectric turbines by NYPA. The turbines produce 4,700 kilowatts of electrical power for surrounding electrical grids.

DEP manages New York City's water supply, providing more than one billion gallons of high quality water each day to more than 9 million New Yorkers. This includes more than 70 upstate communities and institutions in Ulster, Orange, Putnam and Westchester counties who consume an average of 110 million total gallons of drinking water daily from New York City's water supply system. This water comes from the Catskill, Delaware, and Croton watersheds that extend more than 125 miles from the City, and the system

comprises 19 reservoirs, three controlled lakes, and numerous tunnels and aqueducts. DEP has nearly 6,000 employees, including almost 1,000 scientists, engineers, surveyors, watershed maintainers and others professionals in the upstate watershed. In addition to its \$70 million payroll and \$157 million in annual taxes paid in upstate counties, DEP has invested more than \$1.7 billion in watershed protection programs-including partnership organizations such as the Catskill Watershed Corporation and the Watershed Agricultural Council-that support sustainable farming practices, environmentally sensitive economic development, and local economic opportunity. In addition. DEP has a robust capital program with over \$14 billion in investments planned over the next 10 years that will create up to 3,000 construction-related jobs per year. 





We have many veterans in our area who served our country during war times. Some of who left school to join the military and serve their country.

I understand that The School Board under the direction of the Superintendent, Tom Palmer, of Tri-Valley School District has made the decision that to be honored with a plaque on the Military Wall at Tri-Valley School a veteran must have gaduated from Tri-Valley School. Unfortunately, this decision left several members of our community who left school to join the military or were drafted, not eligible to deserve a plaque on the Military Wall in the high school.

Upon receiving this touching story regarding George Hulka, I did a little research and found out that indeed "Operation Recognition" allows certain Veterans who left high school without graduating to be eligible to earn New York State high school diplomas. Operation Recognition, created by Section 305 of New York's Education Law, recognizes the devotion and sacrifice of World War II, Korean War, and Vietnam Era Veterans who left school early by presenting them with a high

To be eligible, a Veteran must meet the following

requirements:

Be a New York State resident.

2. Attended a New York State school before entering military service.

3. Éngaged in active duty service for at least one day during one of the following wartime periods:

1. World War II: December

1. World War II: December 7, 1941 - December 31, 1946

2. Korea: June 27, 1950 -January 31, 1955

Vietnam: May 1, 1961 April 30, 1975

 Received a satisfactory discharge from military service.

Deceased Veterans can also receive a diploma. The child or spouse of a deceased Veteran who met the criteria listed above may apply and accept a posthumous diploma on the Veteran's behalf.

Qualifying Veterans or their family members must present evidence of the Veteran's military service, including dates of service and discharge status. Acceptable verifying documents include a DD Form 214 (the Department of Defense discharge form), a WD AGO Form 53-55 form (Enlisted Record and Report of Separation), an Honorable Discharge Certificate, or a Special Discharge form from the Coast Guard or Merchant Marines.

For assistance, schedule an appointment with a New York State Division of Veterans'

Affairs (NYS DVA) State Veterans Counselor. Please provide the name of the high school that the Veteran attended. Call the DVA Help Line at 1.888.838.7697, or contact the DVA by email. On the 4th of July, take inspiration from the Declaration of Independence, in which was proclaimed 238 years ago: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed."

We have a tendency to look back on these words and say, "of course." But in the 18th century these were radical ideas. That was the era of "Divine Right of Kings" and courts and aristocracies. The notion that we could live free was foreign and beyond reach.

On July 4th, 1776 we took a bold step and severed our ties to King

George and the British Empire and changed the course of history.

After winning our independence and initially struggling under the Articles of Confederation, "in order to form a more perfect union" we brought forward the Constitution. With this brilliant design, we balanced liberty and security and set forth a flourishing form of life with the animating principle of limiting governmental power through checks and balances and separating power across the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of government. Not content with this initial distribution of power, our Founders enacted further safeguards for our liberties, empowering states to check national power and undergirding all of that with our cherished Bill of Rights.

It has been said that the Constitution, Bill of Rights and the Federalist Papers, a compilation of essays designed to convince our countrymen to ratify the new governmental design, were among the most summoning words of political philosophy ever written. I agree. But it was much more than that. They were real. Indeed, beyond the lofty ideals expressed in the Declaration recited above, the rest of that document read like a legal brief listing many of the grievances that our Founders had with King George and his tyrannical rule. Later when the first 10 amendments of the Constitution were written - our Bill of Rights - these grievances were codified in protections for us so that never again would we be subject to those abuses: denial of basic freedoms like free speech, practice of religion, assembly, petition, bearing of arms, due process of law, protections against unlawful searches, just to name a few.

Indeed, ours is a way of life that is at once idealistic (the notion that we can live free) and realistic (knowing that the only way to preserve freedoms was to make "ambition counteract ambition").

So it was at the beginning, so it is today. While much has changed, and government has adapted to continue to secure "liberties for ourselves and our posterity," it's clear that the American Dream remains alive today because of our ideals articulated in those Founding documents. It's worth noting that as young of a country as we are in comparison to other nations across the globe, we have the longest standing stable Constitution in the world today. On our best day, other countries want to be like us because for all of our warts, we have a form of government and a way of life that best comports with human nature and our highest aspirations.

In the Congress, I staunchly defend these ideals because I know that we can live free and be a selfgoverning people. I have a strong record protecting the Bill of Rights, rejecting infringements on our free speech and privacy (opposing CISPA/SOPA), preserving our right to keep and bear arms (opposing the SAFE Act and voting to protect the 2nd Amendment in the Congress) and fighting to roll back the unconstitutional "Patriot Act" and NSA surveillance program on Americans to protect our 4th amendment right. In our district offices we do casework to protect the due process of our fellow citizens and to safeguard our rights and freedoms.

This optimistic view of our country and our people is what inspired me to serve 29 years in the military defending this cherished way of life, and I'm honored and privileged to serve you now in the Congress.

Yes, it's true our country is in a challenging period. We are struggling to revitalize the American Dream and restore faith in our country and each other. As challenging as these times are, we've seen worse. And we have always come through it - together.

I'm a proud Republican, but I'm an American first. I'm working hard in the Congress to rally our country, to bring people together to restore economic vitality, fiscal responsibility and to protect freedoms. We can do this - and we will.

Happy Independence Day! Let's enjoy the day and be thankful.

Governor Cuomo Announces Free Meals to Help Feed 400,000 Children this Summer -Proclamation issued marking July as Summer Meals Month

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo reminded parents that while the school year is drawing to a close, thousands of children remain eligible for free, nutritious meals at hundreds of sites around New York State this summer. State agencies are working with nonprofit and private partners to increase awareness of the Summer Food Service Program, which fills a gap for families that rely on free and reduced-price school meals during the school year to help feed their children. The Governor also issued a proclamation marking July as Summer Meals Month in New York State to highlight the issue.

"No child should have to go hungry and through the Summer Food Service Program we are working to feed hundreds of thousands of children who normally depend on their schools for free and reduced-price meals," Governor Cuomo said. "This program is vital to New Yorkers all across the State, and our administration is committed to making sure that it reaches as many families in need as possible."

The federally-funded Summer Food Service Program, administered by the New York State Education Department, provides free nutritious meals and snacks at participating sites, including schools, parks, recreation centers and other neighborhood locations. The program benefits children 18 years old and younger from lowincome households, as well as to young adults over age 18 that are enrolled in school programs for persons with disabilities.

Approximately 400,000 children a day will receive meals through the program this summer. Many summer meal sites also offer fun activities, so children and teens can stay active and spend time with friends while enjoying

healthy meals.

A recent study by the Food Research and Action Center (FRAC) notes that while the number of New York students participating in the program last year increased five percent over 2012; only an estimated three out of ten eligible students are being fed.

Various government agencies and non-profits are partnering to spread the word about the program, holding everything from local outreach events to disseminating information on social media using the #summermeals hashtag. The New York State Education Department has an interactive map online with information on all the summer meal sites in New York State that can be accessed here. The New York State Department of Health's Growing Up Healthy Hotline, 1-800-522-5006, can also help locate a summer meal site in your community.

"Only one in three families who rely on a food pantry or soup kitchen in New York City participate in the summer meal program - many simply do not know that free and nutritious meals are available for their children when school is out," Margarette Purvis, President & CEO of the Food Bank For New York City and the Chair of Governor Cuomo's Anti-Hunger Task Force. "Hunger doesn't take a summer vacation and thanks to the leadership of Governor Cuomo, neither will our efforts to provide New Yorkers the resources and information they need to feed themselves and their loved ones.'

State Education Commissioner, Dr. John B. King, Jr. said, "Good nutrition is essential to learning. That's why we provide breakfast and lunch to needy students throughout the school year. But the need for healthy meals doesn't end in June when school lets out. So we're happy to help coordinate The Summer Food Service Program here in New York, ensuring that children have access to nutritious meals at many sites throughout the State -- from schools to summer camps to migrant programs."

"The meals served at these sites prevent hunger and make a difference in communities all over the state,' New York State Office of Temporary Disability Assistance and Commissioner Kristin M. Proud said. "Our partners on the local level, and in the nonprofit and private sectors, are key to ensuring that no child misses a meal because they are unaware of these opportunities.

Senator Kirsten Gillibrand said, "Every child needs access to healthy meals and we all have to do our part to ensure that empty classrooms doesn't mean empty stomachs. This important summer meal program will help ensure that our children can get the nutritious food they need. When we invest in healthy meals for our youth, we improve their chances of success in the classroom and beyond."

Congresswoman Nita M. Lowey said, "It is vital that children who depend on the school lunch program have access to meals during summer vacation. As the top Democrat the House on Appropriations Committee, I have fought for increased funding for school lunches, and will continue to work with my colleagues in Congress and Governor Cuomo to make sure children in New York receive the nutritional lunches they need."

Governor Cuomo Approves Family Court Judges Bill

Assemblymember Kevin A. Cahill (D -Ulster, Dutchess) announced today that Assembly Bill A.10139, which establishes twenty-five more of these much-needed positions throughout the state, including Ulster and Dutchess counties, was signed into law today by Governor Cuomo. The was co-sponsored legislation Assemblymember Cahill. Earlier this week, Cahill responded to concerns by the Ulster County Executive's office regarding the costs associated with the addition of a new Family Court Judge for Ulster County.

In accordance with the state fiscal takeover of family courts decades ago, it is the Office of Court Administration that is responsible for paying the operational costs of the new positions, including the salaries and benefits for judges, non-judicial support staff, and security - not Ulster County. The only costs the county assumes are certain indirect costs, such as office space and the construction of new facilities.

"The harsh reality is that Family Court caseloads have become an unmanageable aspect of our counties' legal systems, and the judges who oversee these proceedings are in desperate need of relief," said Cahill. "The cases that come before these courts contain some of the most heartbreaking and meaningful subject matter within our communities by directly impacting the very essence and fabric of society: the stability, safety, and well-being of our home and family. Any ancillary, local expenditure related to setting up these new offices should be viewed as a necessary and small price to pay for protecting some of our most vulnerable citizens.

When learning of the new positions, Honorable Anthony McGinty, Ulster County Family Court Judge and President of the Family Court Judge Association, said: "As President of the Family Court Judges Association I can attest to the critical need for additional Family Court Judges across New York State. The Legislature's actions will allow us to act in a more efficient and timely manner benefitting the lives of countless children. Furthermore, as a Family Court Judge in Ulster County I personally have seen our caseloads increases exponentially given the new roles we play in Domestic Violence and Foster cases. The extra seat in our county will make a world of difference and change the lives of so many individuals. I thank Assemblyman Cahill for his continued commitment to this court and the people we both serve."

The Office of Court Administration issued this statement: "Both [Chief Administrative] Judge Prudenti and I are thrilled and gratified that this new legislation has passed as each year we have seen ever-growing caseloads in the family courts throughout the state," said Jonathan Lippman, Chief Judge of the State of New York and Chief Judge of the Court of Appeals. "These new judges will serve some of our most important litigants - the children and families of the state of New

Contrary to reports from the office of the Ulster County Executive, there is no reason to believe that the County Attorney, the Probation Department and Department of Social Services will need to increase staffing. "It is a fundamental mistake to believe that by increasing the number of judges, somehow caseloads will increase, crime will increase or social services demands will increase," said Assemblyman Cahill. "In fact, simple basic logic demands that the opposite will be true. If Ulster can process Family Court matters more expeditiously, caseloads will be reduced faster. Juveniles are not going to commit more delinquency because we have a new judge. Social Services derives their responsibilities from caring for our vulnerable populations, not court orders."

'The cry from the County Executive's office is a red herring, at best. Instead of complaining about the small cost associated with accommodating a new judge, they should be applauding the fact that Ulster County was given premiere consideration in Albany this year," Cahill

concluded.

#### New York Army National Guard Specialist Juan Cruz from Napanoch Earns Army Combat Lifesaver Certification

New York Army National Guard Specialist Juan Cruz, from Napanoch, NY, has completed a four day Combat Lifesaver course conducted at the Camp Smith Training Site near Peekskill.

Cruz is a member of the 104th Military Police Battalion, and was among 70 Soldiers who completed the training conducted by the Army National Guard's 106th Regional Training Institute.

The 40-hour training course is extensive. It covers care under fire, tactical care, controlling bleeding with and without a tourniquet, opening and managing the airway, treating an open chest wound and collapsed lung, treating torso trauma and tactical movement of an injured soldier.

The Soldiers used high-tech mannequins which simulated conditions ranging from an exposed intestine to an open chest wound to hone their skills.

The Combat Lifesaver program is credited with keeping reducing the number of Soldiers dying from wounds in Iraq and Afghanistan by 15 to 20 percent. More than 92 percent of all U.S. troops wounded in Afghanistan and Iraq survived-a record high-and a large part of that was due to the presence of medically trained Soldiers throughout units.

Along with their training the Soldiers are also issued an aid bag equipped with basic immediate medical care equipment.


