

#### Who Was Black-Eyed Susan?

The bright yellow Black-eyed Susans are beginning blossom all over the Catskill countryside. They are native to North America and one of the most popular

wildflowers grown. They are easily recognized by their yellow flowers with a brownishpurple center that are two to three inches across. The plants can grow to over 3 feet tall, with leaves of 6 inches on stalks over 8 inches long.



Black-eyed Susans are biennial, which means they live for two years. In the first

year, the plant grows a rosette, which is a group of leaves growing from the center, low to the ground. In the second year, the plant sends up flower stalks. At the end of the second year, the plant dies.

Butterflies, bees and a variety of insects move the pollen from one plant to another as they drink the flower's nectar. The mature seeds are very light and move about easily with the wind.

Black-eyed Susans are a pioneer plant, that means they are one of the first plants to grow in a new field. In a garden, they can crowd out other plants and need to be controlled.

The genus name for all Black-Eyed Susans is Rudbeckia. Named for the Rudbecks, a very famous Swedish father and son from Upsala, Sweden. Olof the Elder (1630-1702) was a famous scientist known for his accomplishments in medicine (anatomy) and liguistics. He was also known for studies in botany and established the first botanical garden in Sweden, which was originally called Rudbeck's Garden.

His son, Olof the Younger, (1660-1740) a scientist and professor, continued many of the father's studies. One of his best-known students was another Swedish scientist, Carolus Linneaus, who devised our system of plant nomenclature.

But who was Black-eyed Susan?

Her story is one of the grand romantic tales of the wildflowers. No one's sure, but the legend says it all comes from an Old English poem of the post-Elizabethan era entitled simply, "Black-Eyed Susan," written by a very famous poet of the day named John Gay, 1685-1732All in the downs, the fleet was moored,

Banners waving in the wind.

When Black-Eyed Susan came aboard, and eyed the burly men.

"Tell me ye sailors, tell me true

Does my Sweet William sail with you?"

This charming poem tells one of the great "Legends of Love" in our wildflowers, and every summer it plays out just as the poem describes. Even though it's not a native, if you seed wild Sweet William with common Black-Eyed Susan, they'll bloom beautifully for you at exactly the same time. The Black-Eyed Susan's golden petals and Sweet William's majestic reds and purples blooming together is a pretty sight and will warm any gardner's heart!

## Legacy Mysterious Book Report No. 41



Mysterious Book Report No. 379 by John Dwaine McKenna

Europe has lived in the shadow, first of the Soviet Union, and more recently, of the *Rodina* . . . Mother Russia herself . . . since the end of World War II. It's the reason the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, or NATO, was formed by the US, Canada and several European nations for the purpose of joint security. An attack on one would be considered an attack on all. It has been an effective deterrent to another war for more than seventy years. But, what if . . . what if it stopped working?


That's the premise underlying a page-turning and electrifying new thriller that's perfect for your summer reading program. And, hey! Fair warning—don't worry about cutting the grass or washing the car once you begin reading this one, because it's too compelling to let you worry about the mundane.

Red Metal, (Berkley/ Penguin/Random House, \$27.00, 656 pages, ISBN 978-0-451-49041-4) by Mark Greaney and H. Ripley Rawlings IV, have combined their immense talents to produce the



best military action adventure since Tom Clancy wrote *The Hunt for Red October* nearly forty years ago. *Red Metal* opens in Kenya, where the Russians are mining a mountain of precious, rare earth minerals; a necessity in manufac-

turing everything high-tech, from satellites to cell phones, under an agreement with the government. It's a treaty signed in greed and ignorance, that hugely favors the Russians, and the Kenyans, with assistance from the United States, kick the Russians out by force . . . humiliating a Spetsnatz (Special Forces) Colonel named Yuri Borbikov in the process. He gets his revenge a few years later, when threats of war between China and US ally Taiwan cause the President to order nearly all US military assets to the Far East, leaving a lethargic, loosely defended Europe inadequately protected. Colonel Borbikov presents a war plan that he's drawn



up called *Operation Red Metal*, in which Russia tank forces and armored divisions will launch a lightning strike into Germany, and at the same time, commence an attack in Africa to retake the mine. To every senior Russian General's surprise, the Russian President approves the audacious plan and war—unthinkable only days earlier-is set in motion on land, air and sea . . . and in cyberspace. Once the war machine wheels start to turn, bullets fly, the computer hacking begins, and the action never stops as the authors tell the story from multiple points of view and all sides of each conflict, from the lowest NCO to the highest general. Whether you're a student of geopolitics, battle tactics, or just enjoy a good action adventure yarn, this one will keep you nailed to the page from start to finish, for hours at a time. 

In other news:

Visit our children's floor to see our new books—we've got quite the collections growing—including two, the 2023 Caldecott Medal Winner picture book, Hot Dog by Doug Salati and juvenile fiction 2023 Newberry Medal winner, Freewater by Amina Loqman-Dawson. The two were presented to our library during the Ruth Scully Awards held at the Tri Valley Elementary School June 16. In addition, we have started our collection of Wonderbooks—a combination print/audio book that allows readers to listen to the story as they read. DPL patrons can choose from the six in our collection, thanks to a generous grant by Stewarts!

Our year-long collaboration with the Tri Valley CSD Pre-K program culminated with the UPK graduation June 21. It was an honor to take part in the celebrations! Every year, DPL staff host two eight-week long programs at the school, one in the fall and the other in the spring, sharing their own passion for books and reading, along with felt stories. During the programs, children are encouraged to check out books staff has brought along weekly.

This Spring we launched a new chess club, in big part thanks to our resident chess expert, Mr. Eusi Rodney, who taught skills to the novice and polished moves with the masters. Friendly games were held for those who wished to learn, practice and just share in the fun. We will continue the club in August for Tri Valley residents grades three and up.



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#### **Bacon Wrapped Garlic Scapes**

A garlic scape is the slender bright green flower shoot that has shot up from the stem of a garlic bulb


12 six to eight inch long tender pieces of garlic scapes, peeled 12 pieces of thin-cut bacon

Tightly wrap each of the scapes with one piece of bacon, spiraling down the scape as you go. When all the scapes have been wrapped, heat a heavy skillet over medium heat and then add the scapes.


Cook the scapes until the bacon browns on one side and then turn them. Cover the pan with a lid (this helps to ensure the scapes inside the bacon are well-cooked), removing the lid and turning the scapes as needed until the bacon is brown on all sides.

Remove the bacon wrapped scapes and drain them on a paper towel.

Serve immediately.

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## Gillibrand Announces Bipartisan Legislation to Fend off Fentanyl Overdoses Poisoning the Hudson Valley 1.5x More People Die from Synthetic Opioids Than Car Crashes

NEW PALTZ, N.Y. - Today, U.S. Senator Kirsten Gillibrand announced the bipartisan FEND Off Fentanyl Act, legislation that would help reduce fentanyl overdoses. Fentanyl is a silent killer that cannot be detected by taste, smell, or sight when mixed with other drugs. The synthetic opioid is 50 times stronger than heroin. Last year, the Drug Enforcement Administration seized over 379,000,000 deadly doses of fentanyl across the U.S. - enough to supply a lethal dose to every American. Senator Gillibrand announced the bill at the New Paltz Police Department and was joined by County Executive Jen Metzger, Ulster County Sheriff Juan Figueroa, New Paltz Town Supervisor Neil Bettez, and advocate Jillian Nadiak-Bruck.

"No community, including the Hudson Valley, has been left untouched by the deadly impacts of silent killers like fentanyl. Just last year, the DEA seized enough deadly doses of fentanyl in New York for more than three times the state's population," said Senator Gillibrand. "The bipartisan FEND Off Fentanyl Act would target both cartels and individuals involved in producing and trafficking these dangerous drugs. It will better empower the government to sanction drug traffickers and combat money laundering schemes that make this trade profitable. We have lost far too many lives to fentanyl overdoses and I am committed to working with my colleagues in Congress to keep our communities safe."

"Stopping the fentanyl epidemic isn't about partisan politics- it's about public safety. No mother in Chester, father in Kingston, or grandparent in Beacon should have to experience the pain of losing a loved one to an overdose," said Congressman Pat Ryan. "I'm proud to support Senator Gillibrand on this legislation because we know the time for action is now. We need to attack the crisis head-on and crack down on this drug that is devastating Hudson Valley families."

"Removing Fentanyl from our streets is a life or death situation, and with 65% of overdoses involving Fentanyl, we need every possible tool to keep this deadly substance out of our communities. The FEND Off Fentanyl Act will finally bring the power of the Federal Government to crack down on trafficking from the source, and help give law enforcement officers the tools they need to fight this crisis and save lives. I applaud Senator Gillibrand for her work elevating this issue as a national emergency and look forward to the continued State and Federal partnerships we have to protect our community members from this deadly substance," said New York State Senator Michelle Hinchey.

Ulster County Executive Jen Metzger said, "Senator Gillibrand is leading the charge in the fight against this crisis with the introduction of the Fend Off Fentanyl Act. This deadly substance has caused the senseless loss of so much life in Ulster County and across the country, and has wreaked havoc on families, neighborhoods, and communities. Senator Gillibrand's dedication to our communities is evident in the comprehensive nature of this legislation, which elevates the urgency of the crisis, and mobilizes the necessary federal agencies and resources to disrupt supply chains and the money-laundering network supporting this deadly trade. Thank you Senator Gillibrand for your steadfast dedication to saving lives and bringing justice to the families and communities harmed by this insidious drug."

"The drug crisis is a national issue with a regional impact felt deeply by our communities and citizens," said SUNY New Paltz President Darrell P. Wheeler. "We appreciate Senator Gillibrand's efforts through the FEND Off Fentanyl Act to address the underlying factors that bring opioid trafficking to scale. This legislation will complement our continued localized work at the University to provide training and education, support resources, emergency NARCAN stations and more services, including for those in need of assistance."

The majority of illegal fentanyl entering the United States is made with Chinese precursor chemicals and manufactured in Mexico. This bill will empower the U.S. government to go after the cartels bringing these dangerous drugs into the United States and those producing and shipping the precursor materials. It also enhances sanctions enforcement and gives the Treasury Department tools to combat fentanyl-related money laundering.

Specifically, to disrupt the flow of illicit opioids into the United States, the FEND Off Fentanyl Act would:

o Declare the international trafficking of fentanyl a national emergency.

o Require the president to sanction transnational criminal organizations and drug cartels' key members engaged in international fentanyl trafficking.

o Enable the president to use proceeds of forfeited, sanctioned property of fentanyl traffickers to further law enforcement efforts. (Contd. Pg.

o Enhance the ability to enforce sanctions violations, making it more likely that people who defy U.S. law will be caught and prosecuted.

• Require the administration to report to Congress on actions the U.S. government is taking to reduce the international trafficking of fentanyl and related opioids.

o Allow the Treasury Department to utilize special measures to combat fentanyl-related money laundering.

o Require the Treasury Department to prioritize fentanyl-related suspicious transactions and include descriptions of drug cartels' financing actions in Suspicious Activity Reports.







NYS Department of Environmental Conservation DEC Delivers - Information to keep you connected and informed from the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation DEC Announces Falconry, Wildlife Rehabilitator, and Leashed Tracking Dog Examinations 2023 Exams to be Held Online Aug. 11; Registration Deadline Aug. 9

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) announced today that examinations for individuals seeking a license to practice the sport of falconry, become a volunteer wildlife rehabilitator, or use leashed tracking dogs to find wounded or injured big game animals are scheduled for Friday, Aug. 11, 2023.

To provide broader access to the examinations, DEC is offering the examinations online. In-person examinations will not be offered.

To register for any of these exams, visit DEC's website and follow the directions provided on the website. Participants will receive an email acknowledgment of registration, and later, an additional one-time link to use to access the website on the date of the exam.

The deadline for registering to take any of these free exams is Wednesday, Aug. 9. The link to the registration webpage can also be found on each of the individual special license webpages.

#### **Apprentice Falconry License**

Falconry has a rich history and tradition throughout the world and requires a significant commitment in time and effort. Apprentices are limited to possessing one bird, either an American kestrel or a red-tailed hawk. A falconry study guide and examination manual are available at no cost from DEC. The cost of a five-year falconry license is \$40.

To qualify for the Apprentice Falconry license, applicants must:

score 80 percent or higher on the written exam;

wildlife rehabilitator. A wildlife rehabilitator study guide and examination manual are available at no cost from DEC. There is no cost for the five-year wildlife rehabilitation license.

To qualify for the Wildlife Rehabilitator License, applicants must:

score 80 percent or higher on the written exam; be at least 16 years of age; be interviewed by DEC Regional Wildlife staff; and be a resident of New York State.

#### Leashed Tracking Dog Handler

Leashed tracking dog handlers use their dogs to track and recover dead, wounded, or injured big game. Leashed tracking dog handlers provide a valuable service in aiding hunters in locating wounded big game that otherwise may go unrecovered. A leashed tracking dog study guide is available at no cost from DEC. There is a \$50 license fee for the five-year leashed tracking dog license and a \$25 non-refundable application fee.

To qualify for a Leashed Tracking Dog Handler License, applicants must:

score 80 percent or higher on the written exam; and possess a valid New York State hunting license.

### Gillibrand Announces NY to Receive over Half a Billion in Federal Funding to Expand Broadband Access

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Today, U.S. Senator Kirsten Gillibrand announced that New York State will receive \$664,618,251.49 in federal funding authorized by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law to expand access to broadband. The funding was allocated through the National Telecommunications and Information Administration's Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) Program and will bring high-speed internet access to underserved communities across the state.

"Limited access to reliable high-speed internet makes it harder for kids to do their homework, for seniors to access telehealth appointments, and for workers to take advantage of remote employment opportunities," said Senator Gillibrand. "High-quality internet is no longer a luxury - it is a necessity for everyday life. This \$664+ million in funding will bring broadband to communities across New York that have lacked access for years, spur economic growth, and improve quality of life for New York families. I am proud to have fought to pass the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law to secure this funding for our state and I will keep fighting for federal resources to close the digital divide once and for all."

Gillibrand has long fought to bring reliable internet access to every community in the state. She worked to pass the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law and the American Rescue Plan, which together with other Biden administration efforts have delivered over \$1.5 billion in federal funding for high-speed internet infrastructure in New York, including \$100 million though the Capital Projects Fund, over \$9 million for tribal communities through the Tribal Broadband Connectivity Program, over \$31 million for rural communities through the ReConnect Loan and Grant Program, and over \$14 million for unserved and underserved communities through the Enabling Middle Mile Broadband Infrastructure Program.

## Governor Hochul Announces State Park Campground Accommodations for 2024 Solar Eclipse

Beginning the Week of July 3, 2023, Reservations Will Become Available at 335 Campsites at State Parks Across Eight Counties in New York Path of Totality to Pass Through Western New York, Finger Lakes, Central New York, and Adirondacks

Governor Kathy Hochul announced that people who want to experience a rare total solar eclipse in April 2024 can stay at seven State Park campgrounds that will open for the event. The early opening will help accommodate an expected influx of visitors heading to several regions of the state to witness the celestial event.

"Next year, New Yorkers and visitors alike will have the opportunity to witness an extraordinary, celestial show in our state as the solar eclipse passes over the heart of Western New York, the Finger Lakes, and the Adirondacks in 2024," Governor Hochul said. "Our State Parks will open campground accommodations early, prior to the traditional camping season, to ensure people can see this amazing display in one of New York's beautiful natural settings. I encourage all who are interested to reserve their spot beginning this week for this incredible event."

Starting the week of July 3, 2023, reservations will become available from State Parks at a total of 335 campsites, cottages and cabins stretching across eight counties in western, central, and northern New York. On April 8, 2024, a total solar eclipse will trace a narrow path of totality across 15 U.S. states, including much of western and upstate New York. For visitors with reservations for the night of April 8, check-out time is 11:00 a.m. the following morning, so visitors can avoid traffic and enjoy the attractions of the region after the eclipse.

Reservations can be made nine months in advance for a minimum of two nights through ReserveAmerica.com.

Sites will be available April 4-8 at the following State Parks:

o Allegany State Park, 2373 ASP, Rte 1, Salamanca, NY 14779 (Allegany County), for 165 sites, including campsites, cabins, cottages, and a group camp. New reservations open July 4.

o Fair Haven Beach State Park, 14985 State Park Road, Fair Haven, NY 13064 (Cayuga County) for 29 cabins and one cottage. Reservations open July 5.

o Letchworth State Park, 1 Letchworth State Park, Castile, NY 14427 (Livingston/Wyoming counties) for 19 cabins and cottages. Reservations open July 5.

o Evangola State Park, 10191 Old Lake Shore Road, Irving, NY 14081 (Erie County) for 25 campsites. Reservations open July 5.

o Four Mile Creek State Park, 1055 Lake Road, Youngstown, NY 14174 (Niagara County) for 50 campsites. Reservations open July 5. o Golden Hill State Park, 9691 Lower Lake Road, Barker, NY 14012 (Niagara County) for 25 campsites. Reservations open July 5. o Wellesley Island State Park, 44927 Cross Island Road, Fineview, NY 13640 (Jefferson County) for 21 cabins and cottages. New reservations open July 5.

In the U.S., the eclipse will pass northeast through Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Missouri, Illinois, Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York, Vermont, New Hampshire, and Maine. The eclipse will begin in western New York shortly after 2 p.m. Eastern Daylight Time. Full totality will begin in Chautauqua County at 3:17 p.m., moving through the state to Plattsburgh at 3:25 p.m.. Locations in the path of totality could experience total darkness for up to 4 minutes. The eclipse will then enter Canada in southern Ontario, and continue through Quebec, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, and Cape Breton.



The next total solar eclipse that will be visible from the contiguous U.S. will not be until August 2044.

A total solar eclipse happens when the moon passes between the sun and earth, completely blocking the face of the sun. People viewing the eclipse from locations where the moon's shadow completely covers the Sun - known as the path of totality - will experience a total solar eclipse. The sky will become dark, as if it were dawn or dusk. Weather permitting, people along the path of totality will see the sun's corona, or outer atmosphere, which is usually obscured by the bright face of the sun.

Except during the brief total phase of a total solar eclipse, when the moon completely blocks the sun's bright face, it is unsafe to look directly at the sun without specialized eye protection for solar viewing. According to NASA, viewing any part of the sun through a camera lens, binoculars, or a telescope without a special-purpose solar filter secured over the front of the optics will instantly cause severe eye injury. The partial phases of the solar eclipse can only be safely observed directly with specialized solar viewing glasses ("eclipse glasses") or a handheld solar viewer. Regular sunglasses, polarized or otherwise, are not a safe replacement for solar eclipse glasses.

## New Social Services InitiativeAims to Ensure No 'Wrong Doors' Sullivan County Utilizing New Software Tool to Unite Providers

Liberty, NY - Sullivan County, in partnership with software vendor Unite Us, is rolling out a new referral service with local healthcare providers to make it easier for people to find the help they need.

"We have 34 partner agencies already looking to join and 27 employees who have started training to use this new platform," Health & Human Services Commissioner John Liddle said. "Our go-live goal is August 28, and I'm excited about this chance to bring our provider community closer together and make it easier for folks to access healthcare and social supports."

"This network will be a game-changer for us, allowing users to send and receive secure, electronic referrals and monitor patient outcomes in real-time," explained Director of Community Services Melissa Stickle. "We'll be able to more nimbly and effectively react to the needs of the people we serve every day."

"Our constant goal is to ensure there is no 'wrong door' for people to walk through to get the help they need, and this new initiative promises to get us a lot closer to that ideal," stated Liddle.

The "no wrong door" concept of delivering human serv-

ices isn't new, but Sullivan County aims to take this concept to a new level of efficiency that will enable providers to connect clients and patients with all of the services they need at any location in the developing network. Human service agencies and healthcare providers around the County who join the Unite Us network will be trained in the use of the network's referral system, allowing each network member to receive and generate referrals to other network partners. Network members will also have the ability to confirm the effectiveness of their referrals through closed loop feedback. Perhaps most importantly for the community, the network will only require service recipients to provide their personal information once to be able to obtain assistance from doctor's offices, social services, behavioral health providers, disability resource providers, workforce development, and many more.

Unite Us aims to help the County and its partners:

o Identify the right interventions for those being served

o Proactively and intelligently inform individual care management

o Design efficient community outreach, intervention, and funding strategies

Unite Us accomplishes these goals by collecting and sharing network data with partners who aim to improve social determinants of health in their communities.

The service is currently funded by a Healing Communities Study grant via Columbia University and will likely be funded in future years with opioid settlement funds. Unite Us does not charge not-for-profit agencies to join the network, and referral services come at no cost to clients and patients.



### **Calling for Snapback Sanctions on Iran**

This week a group of House members sent a letter to President Joe Biden calling for "snapback" sanctions on Iran once the rogue regime crosses the threshold of 90 percent nuclear enrichment. I strongly disagree with the premise of this letter. Signaling to the Islamic Republic of Iran that it should only face consequences for its reckless nuclear extortion if it reaches the dangerous threshold of 90 percent weapons-grade nuclear enrichment is deeply concerning.

Iran is already enriching uranium at 24 times the limit allowed by the failed and flawed JCPOA - the time for action is now, not after Iran blows past the critical benchmark of achieving weapons-grade enriched uranium.

Threatening snapback only after Iran reaches the 90 percent threshold also creates a new and dangerous standard that Iranian enrichment up to 89.9 percent is somehow acceptable. Let me be clear: it is absolutely not acceptable. We need to stop moving the goalposts and start increasing the pressure. The time for snapback is now.

### **Commending the Supreme Court for Constitutional Rulings on Student Loan Debt and Religious Liberty**

This week, the Supreme Court released their final decisions for this term, including important decisions on Biden's effort to cancel student loan debt and a decision protecting religious liberty. I applaud the Court's rulings in both cases.

Last year, the Biden administration tried to illegally bypass Congress to spend at least \$400 billion in taxpayer money to cancel student loan debt. This policy was unfair, costly, and unconstitutional. Thankfully the Supreme Court protected Constitutional checks and balances, reaffirming that the power of the purse belongs to the people's House, not the President.

Additionally, in another case, the Supreme Court reaffirmed that free speech and the ability to practice one's faith are fundamental rights guaranteed by the First Amendment. Individuals with deeply held religious beliefs acting in good faith should be protected under the law.

### Rep. Molinaro Slams U.S. Postal Service For Closing Westbrookville Post Office Without Notice, Potentially Violating Federal Law

Liberty, NY - U.S. Rep. Marc Molinaro (NY-19) today issued the following statement after the U.S. Postal Service abruptly closed the Westbrookville Post Office:

"The U.S. Postal Service is required to notify residents of an impending Post Office closure at least 60 days before shutting down a facility so affected residents are able to voice concerns. Closing a Post Office with only one day's notice is not only inconvenient, but potentially unlawful. This incident adds to the disturbing pattern of the Postal Service disregarding the needs and concerns of Sullivan County residents. I am vigorously demanding answers and accountability from the leadership at the U.S. Postal Service."

#### Rep. Molinaro Calls For Post-Pandemic Federal Study to Address Learning Loss & Challenges Facing Students With Disabilities

Binghamton, NY - U.S. Rep. Marc Molinaro (NY-19), founder of the successful 'Think DIFFERENTLY' initiative, today called on the Government Accountability Office (GAO) to conduct a comprehensive study on how the COVID-19 pandemic impacted educational outcomes for students with disabilities. While there has been numerous studies on the significant learning setbacks experienced by school-aged children during the pandemic, little has been done to fully understand the challenges faced by students with disabilities.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, schools in Upstate New York and across the nation experienced prolonged closures, mask mandates, and various restrictions. Students with disabilities were particularly affected, with limited access to essential therapies, altered Individualized Education Program (IEP) goals, and extensive time away from the classroom.

In a letter to the GAO, Rep. Molinaro urged them to commission a study to fully explore how the pandemic impacted students with disabilities. The goal of the study is to understand the unique needs of these students so educators, parents, and lawmakers can develop informed solutions and never let this happen again.

Rep. Molinaro said, "I'm the father of four children, one of whom is on the autism spectrum. During the pandemic, parents like myself saw learning loss in their children firsthand. While many academic studies have sought to understand the full scope of these educational setbacks, very little attention has been given to the educational needs of students with disabilities. I'm working to commission a federal study so we can find solutions to address the challenges facing these students and never let this happen again. Every child of every ability deserves to have an education that gives them the opportunity to succeed."

The full text of the letter can be found here:

Dear Mr. Dodaro:

Students with disabilities face many unique challenges in achieving educational success. These challenges were only exacerbated during the COVID-19 pandemic through the closure of schools for many months and even years in some cases, the requiring of masks in schools, and more.

Certain decisions and restrictions led to significant time out of classroom, therapies limited, and IEP goals amended. We know regression has occurred but to what extend and at what cost to the individual student? For these reasons, I ask the GAO to conduct a study to determine the impact of COVID-19 and corresponding shutdowns on the average educational outcomes for students with disabilities. Subsequent lack of staff and new requirements on schools most certainly have led to impacts from before the COVID-19 pandemic, during, and then after. How those with disabilities have been impacted would shed an important light for educators, schools, students, parents, and lawmakers.

#### **Rep.** Molinaro Continues to Build On Think DIF-FERENTLY Initiative, Introduces Bipartisan Bill to Help Students With Disabilities Access Resources to Succeed in School

Washington, DC - U.S. Rep. Marc Molinaro (NY-19) today introduced the Think DIFFERENTLY About Education Act. This bipartisan bill helps parents of children with disabilities advocate for the resources their child needs to succeed in school. It builds on Rep. Molinaro's successful 'ThinkDIFFERENTLY' initiative. Rep. Molinaro introduced this bipartisan bill alongside U.S. Reps. Tony Cárdenas (D-CA-29), Anthony D'Esposito (R-NY-04), and Mike Lawler (R-NY-17).

In an annual IEP meeting, school staff and parents of a child with a disability meet to develop an educational plan for the student. Under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, parents have the right to bring a third-party advocate, such as a therapist, lawyer, or knowledgeable family member, to these meetings. However, most parents are not aware of this right.

The Think DIFFERENTLY About Education Act requires K-12 schools to inform parents of their right to bring an advocate to individualized education program (IEP) meetings.

Rep. Molinaro said, "As the father of four children, one of whom is on the autism spectrum, I understand what families go through. Working with school administrators to get your child the resources they need can be a daunting and confusing experience. My bipartisan bill, the Think DIFFERENTLY About Education Act, is going to change that. By having an advocate that supports parents and their child, families will be able to better access resources to help their child succeed in school."

Robyn Linscott, Director of Education and Family Policy for The Arc said, "The special education system is complex and the majority of parents and families navigating it don't fully know their rights. One of those often undisclosed and obstructed rights is the ability to have a third party present for IEP meetings. We are pleased that the 'Think DIFFERENTLY About Education Bill' would ensure parents and families are notified of this right at the start of every school year."

Cyrus Huncharek, Director of Policy & Advocacy for the National Down Syndrome Congress said, "Despite the fact that IDEA clearly allows parents to invite other individuals to special education meetings who have knowledge or special expertise regarding their child, we know of parents who have been told they cannot bring a third party to these meetings. Parents and students with Down syndrome are entitled to bring additional individuals who have knowledge of the student and the 'Think DIF-FERENTLY About Education Act' will ensure that parents are aware of this by requiring schools to notify parents of this right on an annual basis"

# **EDITOR NOTES:**

We are always trying to improve The Townsman and makeit better for everyone. This past weekend I was asked by one of our readers how they could print out just one page, or several pages of The Townsman.

It really is easy – if you know what 'buttons' to push.

Depending on what computer, cell phone, tablet, etc. that you are using will make a slight difference, but basically here are the steps to print out a single page, or several pages.

#### METHOD 1

o Step one: Open any PDF reader of your choice. You may also 'right click' on the page you want to print and follow the steps.

o Step two: To upload your files, select the document you want to print by clicking on File > Print in your Print window.

o Step three: Other options to choose Print range and/or number of Copies will be displayed. Enter your required Print range and number of Copies, then click OK to print.


### METHOD 2

- 1. Open the PDF in Adobe Reader or Acrobat.
- 2. Open the Pages tab on the left side of the document window if it isn't already open. ...
- 3. Ctrl-click (Windows) or Command-click (macOS) the page thumbnails you want to print.
- 4. Choose File > Print. ...
- 5. Click OK or Print.

#### METHOD 3

Select the page thumbnails and choose File > Print, or in the Print dialog box, select Pages and then enter the page numbers or ranges you want to print, separating them by commas.


The prompt screen for printing on your device my look something like one of the following. Look for the box that asks what page(s) you want to print. You will only be able to print pages that are sequenced. For example, if you want to print page 1 and page 4, you will have to print each page separately.



## A Fake Attempted Russian Coup?





# **RUNNING TO KEEP PACE WITH THE STATE**

### BY JOSHUA POTOSEK, COUNTY MANAGER

On the one hand, I'm glad to report that Sullivan County is collecting more sales and room taxes than ever before, with us on track to hit our projection of \$66 million in sales tax revenues alone this year.

The net effect: the County's budget no longer has to rely so heavily on property taxes, and I'm eyeing a potential zeropercent increase in land taxes for 2024 (subject to County Legislature approval later this year).

On the other hand, New York State's leaders have embarked upon a series of measures which threaten to vacuum up that revenue. Here's what's going to hit us hardest:

Municipalities won't be able to keep profits from tax foreclosure sales anymore.
Instead, whatever we collect at a tax auction in excess of what we're owed in taxes and fees will have to be given to the delinquent property owner. Estimated impact:
\$4-\$5 million a year.

• Certain Medicaid dollars from the Federal government, which are supposed to be passed through the State to counties like Sullivan, will now be kept by the State, forcing us to pay \$100,000 more a week in Medicaid costs next year. Estimated impact: \$3.5-\$4 million a year.

• The pay rate for assigned counsel (lawyers who represent those who cannot afford one themselves) is rising to \$158 an

hour, doubling our costs. Estimated impact: \$192,000 a year.

I'll also note that our sales tax revenues appeared to be leveling off earlier this year, so coupled with inflation and the usual operational expense increases, we may be looking at some belt-tightening this time next year.

I'll know and share more as we begin developing the 2024 County Budget.

For most of the past two years, Sullivan County has led all of New York State - including New York City in job growth, according to NYS Dept. of Labor statistics.

Where do we need to grow? Manufacturing and educational/health services could use a boost, and professional services and financial activities job growth remains flat.




