[Grahamsville, N.Y.] *The Ever Evolving Art of Quilting*, a new exhibition will open to the public on Saturday and Sunday, June 7th and 8th from noon to 4 p.m. at the Time and the Valleys Museum on St. Rt. 55 in Grahamsville, Sullivan County.

Curated by long time quilter Phyllis Coombe of Grahamville, this new exhibition tells the story of quilt and quilt making through the centuries, highlighted by beautiful local quilts from the 1800s through the present day. Besides the many beautiful quilts, many handmade, it includes a video history of quilting and puzzles for kids.

The exhibition will be open weekends through the end of September, noon to 4 p.m. and other times by appointment. Admission is \$10 for adults and \$5 for children, children under 6 FREE which includes admission to all exhibitions and the 1930s Catskill Farm. As I grow older, each season brings back many memories. When my children were growing up in the 1930's we usually took them for a visit to their grandmother's farm in Meridale, Delaware County. Before haying time, the hay would be low in the barn, and they had one game they always looked forward to playing. It frightened me, but my brother said it wasn't dangerous, and I guess it was O.K. for they never got hurt.

First, two kids would climb clear to the ceiling of the barn where they would lower the hay rope which was looped over a pulley. Another kid on the barn floor would grab the loosened rope. The two up above would hold the rope tightly and then jump off their perch. This quickly yanked the one on the floor upward nearly to the top of the barn, and then the other two (now on the floor) would lower them down.

Today they say, "How did you dare do it?" but it was fun. This was many years ago, but in my mind's eye it could have been yesterday.

The BarnSwallows have Returned!

Barn swallows are, called "neotropical migrants," meaning they spend six or more months in southern locations before returning north, to the Catskills in spring to mate and rear their young.

While spending their time in the Catskills this spring and summer, the barn



swallows will travel up to a half-mile to gather mud from the edges of ponds, puddles, and ditches to construct their nests. The collection sites will be marked with numerous small holes made by the birds as they poked their beaks into the mud several times to get a good load. You may also see swallows flying with feathers or grass that they will use in the final stages of nest building.

As its name implies, the Barn Swallow typically nests inside accessible buildings such as barns and

stables, or on the front porch.

Barn swallow's have had a close association with humans that goes back to Europe for over 2,000 years. It has been theorized that one reason barn swallows choose to nest on door stoops, light fixtures, and porch fronts is because the close proximity to humans keeps crows and other predators away. Of course, when we have a barn swallow nest on the front porch, we have to deal with the droppings and other debris they deposit. There are remedies: spread newspaper, an old sheet, or even install a board under the nest. It is worth it to watch these wonderful birds that feed on flying insects. In fact, did you know Swallows are federally protected? Once an adult swallow occupies a half-built nest, or a fully built nest, even without eggs, then the law protects it.

Once the nest has been completed, the female will lay two to seven, reddish-spotted white eggs that are about 0.6 x 0.8 in size, and weigh 0.07 oz, of which 5 percent is shell. The incubation period is normally 14-19 days; with another 18-23 days before the chicks develop wing feathers the young stay with, and are fed by the parents for about a week after leaving the nest. There are normally two broods, with the original nest being reused for the second brood and being repaired and reused in subsequent years. Occasionally, birds from the first brood will assist in feeding the second brood.

While there has been a decline of the Barn Swallows in some countries where they use DDT, there has been an increase in the population in North America due to greater availability of nesting sites and subsequent range expansion.

Because of their long journeys, barn swallows have been well observed. A swallow tattoo is popular amongst nautical men as a symbol of a safe return. The tradition was that a mariner would receive a tattoo of this fellow wanderer after sailing 5,000 nautical miles.

As we will observe during the spring and summer, swallows will dart and sail overhead, with airborne grace, a wonder to behold.

No bird in North America is better known as a welcome companion and a useful friend to the farmer, as it comes each spring to fly in and out of the wide-open barn door, delighting them with its cheerful twittering. It will fly about the barnyard in pursuit of the troublesome insects that annoy both man and beast.

As long as there are insects, the Barn Swallow will remain in its summer home.

This is main reason for their seasonal migration - the lack of insects to eat during winter in the north. Avoiding cold temperatures is actually a less important reason for leaving. Swallows will migrate during the day, catching flying insects along the way. They will fly from dawn to dusk, sometimes coming within inches of the ground to catch flying insects. Their airborne grace is a wonder to behold.

Legacy Mysterious Book Report No. 135 American Spy_

Mysterious Book Report No. 377

Near the end of the Cold War in the mid-1980s, the African continent was busy rediscovering itself. Having thrown off the restraints of colonialism, countries large and small were struggling to determine what form of self-governance best suited them

... a struggle that promoted much bloodshed. Civil wars, coups and military takeovers were common, as was behind-the-scenes meddling by the world's superpowers, who were eager to gain influence and easy access to the motherlodes of untapped natural resources the region had to offer. It's an epic awakening, and the setting for a searing new thriller by a much admired, talented and whip-smart debut novelist who's on a fast train to stardom.



American Spy, (Random House, \$27.99, 289 pages, ISBN 978-0-8129-9895-5) by Lauren Wilkerson, is an intelligent, complex, engaging, perceptive and chilling espionage novel that will, at times, make you think, make you uncomfortable, make you angry . . . and leave you squirming in place and wondering if you know anything, whatsoever, about another's point-of-view.

It's 1986 as the novel begins, and we meet a thirty-year-old black woman named Marie Mitchell who's an intelligence officer working for the FBI in New York City. She's smart, ambitious and frustrated. Pushed aside and relegated to mundane, spirit-destroying, monotonous routine tasks by the "old boy" network she's surrounded with, Marie is desperate for action of a more meaningful kind. So when she's offered a chance to join a shadowy covert task force that's aimed at undermining the newly-formed government of Thomas Sankara, the charismatic –and communist –leader of Burkina Faso, (Formerly known as Upper Volta. It's at about 10 o'clock, if the African continent was a clock-face.) she jumps at the chance, even though she secretly admires what he's doing for his country.

Marie Mitchell agrees to take the job . . . even though she's a woman in conflict over the untimely and mysterious death of her only sister, as well as a nagging belief that she's being used because of the color of her skin. So begins a year of subversion, seduction, treachery, revolution and a re-examination of what it means to be an American, a spy, a paramour and a traitor to love –all at the same time. Partially inspired by true events, *American Spy* is a pow-

erful and compelling work set against the backdrop of the Cold War and the world's wildest continent. It's the much talked about, highly-praised first novel of an emerging world-class talent who, no doubt, will have much more to say to all of us in the future!



Sullivan County Aired Big Tobacco's Dirty Laundry

[HURLEYVILLE, NY] - The Coalition for a Vape Free Sullivan celebrated World No Tobacco Day on Friday May 30, 2025 at the O&W Rail Trail in Hurleyville. This global celebration, created by the World Health Organization (WHO), informs the public on the dangers of using tobacco, the business practices of tobacco companies, what is being done to fight the epidemic and what people around the world can do to claim their health and protect future generations.

This year's theme was "Unmasking the Appeal" and focused on giving young people the truth about the tobacco and nicotine industry's carefully engineered products that are designed to entice young people with their candy flavors. According to the World Health Organization, there are more than 16,000 unique vape flavors on the market today that have hooked an estimated 37 million children aged 13-15 years old worldwide. The Hurleyville event on Friday featured an art display titled "Airing Big Tobacco's Dirty Laundry" which was created by nearly 50 local high school students participating in the Sullivan 180 Warrior Teens program.

Dr. Jessie Moore, Public Health Director for Sullivan County stated, "tobacco and nicotine use remain major public health challenges, particularly among youth. At the Sullivan County Department of Public Health, we are dedicated to supporting prevention efforts, promoting education, and helping our community make healthier choices." A proclamation endorsing World No Tobacco Day and encouraging smoking cessation was read by Sullivan County Legislator Catherine Scott. Community leaders spoke about the local effects of nicotine addiction, the impacts on schools and the resources available to help people quit. A very special youth speaker, Celeste D'Andrea, Monticello High School student shared, "as a society we need to start realizing that this is not simply teenage rebellion or a trend. Parents, educators and community leaders must shift from immediate discipline to proactive education and cessation for those teens who are hooked. Vaping is not a harmless trend. It is a threat to the health and future of our youth."

After the remarks, the trailhead turned into a 'Quit Party' inviting the public to kick start their quit journey with cessation resources and a fresh-air walk on the rail trail. Supportive community agencies including the American Lung Association, Ellenville Regional Hospital, Sullivan County Department of Health, Tobacco Free Action Communities, Restorative Management and Sullivan 180 tabled along the trailhead. Those who visited were able to sign up for a Freedom from Smoking class that is happening on Monday evenings in June and July at the Sullivan County Government Center.


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
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
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
Morning Glory Muffins

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F (190 degrees C). Lightly oil 18 muffin cups, or coat with nonstick cooking spray. In a medium bowl, whisk together eggs, egg whites, apple butter, oil and vanilla. In a large bowl, stir together flours, sugar, cinnamon, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Stir in carrots, apples and raisins. Stir in apple butter mixture until just moistened. Spoon the batter into the prepared muffin cups, filling them about 3/4 full. In a small bowl, combine walnuts andwheat germ; sprinkle over the muffin tops. Bake at 375 degrees F (190 degrees C) for 15 to 20 minutes, or until the tops are golden and spring back when lightly pressed.







New Medicare Card Scams on the rise

Have you received any calls from "Medicare" asking you to verify your Medicare number for the new card being sent your way? If so, hang up. This is a scam. Medicare will NOT call you, does not need you to verify your number (they already have it), and is NOT sending out new cards to beneficiaries.

This is a growing scam and we're receiving a rising number of reports of beneficiaries being inundated with calls. One beneficiary recently reported getting at least four calls a day, even after hanging up and telling the person he did not want a new card and that he wasn't going to give any information.

Many of these scammers can come across as very professional and some have access to a surprising amount of personal information. In some cases, they may know your address, your doctor's name, types of illnesses or conditions you may have. This is all to try to lure you into trusting them and giving them your Medicare and/or other personal information. They may also falsely tell you that Medicare is issuing an updated or new cardthat is a plastic one, metal one, or one with a chip.

While Medicare did start sending new Medicare cards to all beneficiaries in April 2018, all cards had been sent by January 2019. These cards have new numbers which were designed to better protect against identity theft by removing their Social Security number. And although the rollout of these updated cards was completed five years ago, scams around these new cards are continuing and rising.

Here are some red flags to be aware of:

- o Unsolicited calls from someone claiming to be from Medicare.
- o Anyone needing your information so that they can send you an updated Medicare card.
- o Anyone claiming that your card is expiring and that you will be charged a fine if you do not get a new one.
- o Anyone stating that Medicare is issuing new cards and you need to verify your number.

If you believe you have experienced potential fraud, report it to our California Senior Medicare Patrol (SMP) at 1-855-613-7080.

DEC Announces 2024-25 Deer Harvest Estimates

New Yorkers Encouraged to Remain Vigilant to Prevent the Spread of Chronic Wasting Disease; Response Report Released

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) today announced that hunters in New York harvested an estimated 223,304 deer during the 2024-25 hunting seasons. In addition, DEC announced the release of a report noting agency actions in response to the Herkimer County chronic wasting disease (CWD) incident and the State's plans for continued, intensified disease surveillance.

"New York hunters had another safe and productive hunting season, providing a sustainable food source for themselves and their families and helping DEC manage the state's deer herd," said DEC Commissioner Amanda Lefton. "By engaging in safe and ethical hunting practices and reporting their harvest, hunters continued the tradition of being conservation stewards. We also thank hunters and responsible landowners for assisting in actions to reduce the spread of CWD to New York's white-tailed deer and moose populations to help protect the future of deer hunting and support the sustainable use of venison."

The 2024-25 estimated deer harvest included 122,427 antlered bucks (i.e., adult males) and 100,877 antlerless deer (i.e., adult females and fawns of either sex). Statewide, this represents a nine percent increase in antlered buck harvest and a three percent increase in antlerless deer harvest from last season. However, the total deer harvest was slightly below the five-year average. The Western Finger Lakes and Lake Ontario Plains regions had the highest deer harvest densities, with more than 10 deer harvested per square mile in WMUs 8G, 8H, 8M, 8N, 8R, 8S, 8T, and 8X. Notable Numbers

- 1. 15.7 and 0.6 --- number of deer harvested per square mile in the units with the highest (WMU 8R) and lowest (WMU 5F) harvest density.
- 2. 66.9% --- portion of the adult buck harvest that was 2.5 years or older statewide, up from 52% a decade ago, and 30% in the 1990s.
- 3. 53.6% --- portion of successful deer hunters that reported their harvest as required by law. This is greater than the five-year average of 48.2%.
- 4. 13,488 --- number of hunter-harvested deer checked by DEC staff in 2024 to determine hunter reporting rate and collect biological data (e.g., age, sex, antler data). This represents 6% of the total 2024-25 deer harvest. 5. 18,372 --- number of deer harvested using a crossbow, less than half as many as were taken with a vertical bow.

Deer harvest data are gathered from two main sources: harvest reports required within seven days of harvest of all successful deer hunters and DEC's examination of harvested deer at meat processors and check stations across the state. Harvest estimates are made by cross-referencing these two data sources and calculating the total harvest from the reporting rate for each zone and tag type.

DEC's 2024-25 Deer Harvest Summary report provides tables, figures, and maps detailing the deer harvest and CWD surveillance efforts around the state. Past harvest summaries are also available on DEC's Deer and Bear Hunting webpage. Appendix two of DEC's Management Plan for White-tailed Deer provides information on how DEC sets deer population objectives throughout the state.

Chronic Wasting Disease Not Detected in Wild Deer

Last fall, a case of Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) was confirmed in a captive red deer herd in the town of Columbia, Herkimer County. In coordination with the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets (AGM) and U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), all captive red deer at the facility were tested. DEC also increased its sampling efforts for wild white-tailed deer. With the assistance of local hunters, landowners, and USDA Wildlife Services, DEC collected samples from more than 200 wild deer within the six towns surrounding the captive deer facility where CWD was confirmed in 2024; none tested positive, providing hope that CWD may not have spread into the wild deer herd.

A report of agency actions in response to the Herkimer County CWD incident and plans for continued intensified disease surveillance in the area are available on DEC's website


Statewide, DEC collected samples from and tested 3,189 deer for CWD in 2024, the largest sampling effort since 2008. Since 2002, DEC has collected and tested more than 69,000 deer for CWD. No positive cases of CWD have been detected in wild deer since 2005.

It is important that hunters remain vigilant to prevent the spread of CWD and practice the following guidelines:

- 1. If hunting any type of deer, elk, moose, or caribou outside of New York, debone the harvest before bringing it back to the state. DEC will confiscate and destroy illegally imported carcasses and parts;
- 2. Avoid deer urine-based lures or attractant scents, as these could contain infectious material. If using lures, use synthetics;
- 3. Dispose of carcass waste in a landfill, not out on the landscape;
- 4. Hunt only wild deer and support fair chase hunting principles;
- 5. Do not consume game that appears sick or diseased; and 6. Contact the nearest DEC regional wildlife office or Environmental Conservation Police Officer to report a deer that appears sick, unusually thin, or behaves abnormally.







Advancing America's Energy Dominance t hrough Nuclear Power

President Trump has furthered his commitment to advancing American energy dominance by signing three pivotal Executive Orders (EOs) that bolster our nation's nuclear power capabilities. The EO's- Deploying Advanced Nuclear Reactor Technologies for National Security, Ordering the Reform of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, and Reforming Nuclear Reactor Testing at the Department of Energy - will streamline unnecessary and duplicative regulations, overhaul archaic Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) practices, and pave the way for innovation in new nuclear technologies.

Nuclear will play a crucial role in powering the next generation of American technological advancements. Department of Energy reports show that data centers alone could consume as much as 12% of all power generated in the United States by 2028. To remain ahead of our growing energy needs, it is vital that we have affordable and reliable baseload power. As constituents of NY-24 know full well, the energy output and consistency offered by nuclear technologies is immense. The three nuclear plants in my District-Nine Mile Point, James A. FitzPatrick, and Ginna- supply a whopping 22% of the entire state's energy. In order for Americans to continue to have dependable, 24/7 energy, we must do everything we

can to reverse the past decades of backward, alarmist Washington regulations that hindered this great industry.

As your representative in Congress, my top priority is championing legislative initiatives that benefit you and your families. Each week, I review numerous bills and letters, engaging in thorough discussions with members of our community to determine which actions to support and address your needs. Below are a few bills I recently cosponsored.

H.R.3325, the CHEERS Act: This bill supports local businesses, bars, and restaurants by expanding tax incentives for energy-efficient systems to include kegs and tap properties. Local restaurants and bars are the backbone of the Finger Lakes region, and during this time of high prices it has never been more imperative that we support our local establishments.

H.Res.408, Censuring Representative LaMonica McIver of New Jersey: This resolution formally censures Rep. LaMonica McIver of New Jersey for her disgraceful and illegal actions at the Delaney Hall Detention Center in Newark, New Jersey. Rep. McIver unlawfully entered a secure federal facility, interfered with official proceedings, and compromised the safety of law enforcement personnel and others present. This type of behavior is beyond unacceptable for a sitter member of Congress.

H.R. 3514 Improving Seniors' Timely Access to Care Act: This bill establishes an electronic prior authorization process for Medicare Advantage (MA) plans and includes standardization processes that are more transparent. This expands beneficiary protections against fraud and clarifies timeline standards for prior authorizations and expedited determinations. Modernizing and improving our Medicare system in a way that decreases wait times and establishes more transparency for beneficiaries will safeguard this program for our future.

Thank you to everyone who joined us in Fulton for the annual
Fire Watch ceremony to honor and remember our fallen servicemembers. It was a privilege to stand alongside County Clerk Terry

ultimate sacrifice. Our community stands with our servicemembers and will never forget their sacrifice. I also want to thank the
Gold Star Families and loved ones of the fallen. As the mother of
an active-duty Marine, it is a true honor to stand with the families
of loved ones who have served, and I am deeply grateful for everyone who came together for this solemn event.

I was honored to recognize Memorial Day with communities across the Hudson Valley last weekend, including in Kingston , Newburgh , Town of Woodbury , and Town of Wappinger .

I will always fight to preserve the memory of our fallen heroes and take care of everyone who has served.

CELEBRATING WEST POINT CADETS AND DEMAND-ING THE BEST FOR OUR VETERANS

I love West Point. I love the cadets. And I love our country. As a proud alum and the Academy's representative in Congress, I was honored to participate in last weekend's graduation and celebrate these inspiring young men and women. They deserved the day to be totally focused on their selfless dedication to serving our country.

Unfortunately, that is not the speech they got from the President. Instead, donning a bright red MAGA hat, he delivered an overtly political and incredibly divisive campaign speech. Trump didn't even have the decency to stay and shake the graduating cadets' hands, a longstanding tradition embraced by every president from Biden to Reagan - instead he went golfing.

DELIVERING RELIEF FOR ORANGE COUNTY FLOOD VICTIMS

This week I was excited to announce that we secured the Town of Woodbury \$2 million to repair severe damage to the Earl River Dam.

The dam, which was built in 1912, sustained substantial damage during July 2023's severe storms and flooding incidents. Fixing the damages is critical; if the dam were to burst, there would be widespread damage to surrounding homes, roads, and utilities.

I've kept up the fight for infrastructure funding to both fix the damage and ensure we are better prepared for floods in the future. This money is a monumental investment not just for Woodbury but also the entire Orange County community.

By building back the Earl Reservoir Dam and increasing its resilience, countless families will be spared from widespread damage and fallout from a future storm.

I'll keep pushing to ensure everyone in our Hudson Valley community gets the relief they deserve.

FY2024 Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) and Fire Prevention & Safety (FP&S)

The SAFER Program provides funding directly to fire departments and volunteer firefighter interest organizations to assist in increasing the number of firefighters.

The FP&S Program supports projects that enhance the safety of the public and firefighters from fire and related hazards.

The FY2024 SAFER and FP&S application periods opened May 23 at 9 a.m. ET and will close on THURSDAY July 3 at 5 p.m. ET.

First Round of FY 2026 New York State Council on the Arts Grants

FY2025 Regional Food System Partnerships Program (RFSP)

\$80 Million in Clean Water, Clean Air and Green Jobs Environmental Bond Act Funding Now Available to Support Resiliency Initiatives

Last week, Governor Hochul announced \$80 million in new grant funding available to communities across New York State for climate resiliency projects. The grants, funded through the \$4.2 billion Clean Water, Clean Air and Green Jobs Environmental Bond Act of 2022, will support nature-based and green infrastructure projects designed to reduce flood risk and enhance community resilience to extreme weather.

The three resiliency related grant programs are:

Resilient Watersheds Grant Program: \$45 million will be made available through the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC), building on the success of the Resilient NY program and advancing the State's goal of strengthening infrastructure and protecting New Yorkers from the impacts of extreme weather.

Coastal Rehabilitation and Resilience Projects Program: \$20 million will be made available through the Department of State (DOS) for coastal communities. The program prioritizes projects using nature-based solutions to enhance community resilience while also delivering environmental, economic and social benefits.

Inland Flooding and Local Waterfront Revitalization Implementation Projects Program: \$15 million will be made available through DOS for implementation projects that improve waterfront and watershed resiliency and reduce climate impacts, particularly flooding.

Applications for all three funding opportunities can be submitted through the Consolidated Funding Application (CFA) portal. Applications are due by 4 p.m. on Friday, June 6, 2025.

High priority areas of focus may include (but are not limited to) topics such as violent crime prevention, immigration issues and border security, child trafficking, street gangs, recruitment and hiring, gun violence and the enforcement of gun laws, opioids and drug market interruption, law enforcement task force engagement, homelessness and squatting, nuisance abatement, and other crime and disorder problems

All for-profit (commercial) and nonprofit institutions, institutions of higher education, community groups, and faith-based organizations are eligible to apply, and up to \$8 million is available for this program.

Applications are due by June 30, 2025 at 4:59 PM ET.

Collaborative Reform Initiative (CRI)

The Collaborative Reform Initiative encompasses technical assistance programs offering expert services to state, local, territorial, and tribal law enforcement agencies, ranging in scope and complexity. Together, the services are designed to highlight best practices of law enforcement agencies and the many ways they are protecting Americans, enhancing officer safety and wellness, building agencies' capacity for self-improvement and effectiveness, and promoting community policing practices nationwide.

Safer Outcomes: Enhancing De-Escalation and Crisis Response Training for Law Enforcement (Safer Outcomes)

Safer Outcomes funds are used to promote training on de-escalation and crisis response for law enforcement officers, support personnel employed by law enforcement agencies, and mental health professionals working on crisis intervention teams as employees of a law enforcement agency or under a legal agreement with a law enforcement agency.

Supported training programs must address one or more of the following areas of focus: de-escalation tactics and alternatives to use of force; safely responding to an individual experiencing a mental or behavioral health or suicidal crisis; safe encounters with individuals with disabilities; successfully participating on a crisis intervention team; and making referrals to community-based services and support.

COPS Blue Alert Program

The COPS Office administers the National Blue Alert Network, a voluntary nationwide system to give authorities an early warning of threats against law enforcement and to aid in the apprehension of suspects who have killed or seriously injured an officer or deputy.

The 2025 COPS Blue Alert Program seeks applications from organizations to support the COPS Office with coordinating the Blue Alert system. The primary objectives of the cooperative agreement to be funded are to expand awareness of the Blue Alert system through efforts that educate and inform non-Blue Alert states of the Blue Alert Network and develop monthly summaries of Blue Alert activations throughout the country, including highlighting accounts of heroism by law enforcement surrounding Blue Alert events.

His leadership took him across the country to California's 426th Civil Affairs Company, where he served as a Military Police Supervisor. But perhaps his greatest impact came when he returned home, mentoring young recruits as a First Sergeant with the 1165th Training Unit-instilling discipline, purpose, and pride in the next generation of American soldiers.

With nearly 40 years in uniform, Bunk's list of accolades is long and well-earned: the National Defense Service Medal, Vietnam Service Medal, Vietnam Campaign Medal, Army Commendation Medal, and

Humanitarian Service Medal, to name just a few.

His medals only tell part of the story. Bunk didn't wear the uniform for glory. He wore it because he believed it was a sacred honor, an oath to serve some-


Acting Ulster County Clerk Taylor Bruck remarked:







Town of Thompson Announces Switch to .gov:

ThompsonNY.gov Now Live with Added Security & Features June 2, 2025, Town of Thompson, NY – The Town of Thompson has converted its website from

Town of Thompson.com to Thompson NY.gov, as per New York State mandate. According to New York County Law Section 55, all municipal corporations with a population of 1,500 or more must maintain a .GOV domain by June 19, 2025. This will also change all town emails to the new domain. For example, supervisor@townofthompson.com is now supervisor@thompsonNY.gov.

There are many benefits of this switch for residents and for the Town of Thompson; most importantly, enhanced security and trust. Only verified U.S. government organizations can utilize a .gov domain name. Plus, as a .gov website, the Town is required to have an HTTPS (SSL/TLS encryption) - this essentially ensures that the Town website is highly secure. The Town already had the SSL/TLS technology in place, but the .gov domain adds another layer of security.

"We were proactive in getting our website and emails switched over to .GOV well before the deadline. We've ensured that the website is secure and running smoothly! In addition, we've just launched the MuniCollab platform on our website which provides unprecedented access, transparency, and convenience for anyone submitting or wanting to view applications to the Thompson Planning Board," said Town Supervisor Bill Rieber, Jr.







Land with Prehistoric 'Rock Piles' on Overlook Mountain Sold to Nonprofit

After A Dozen Years Overlook Mountain Center Finally Takes Possession of Land Containing Petroforms and Serpent Walls

May 30, 2025, Woodstock, NY - Since its founding in 2012, the Overlook Mountain Center (OMC) has had three main goals for a 37 acre property on Overlook Mountain: to research the 'mysterious' stone piles and rock walls found on the site; to educate the public about its findings and share with them this remarkable property; and to protect the property for posterity so it can be studied and enjoyed by the population in the future.

The small nonprofit has made good on its goals, regularly conducting public tours of the property and facilitating scientific research that in 2020 dated two of the stone mounds (or petroforms) to 1540 and 1650 CE (+/-50 years), making them among the oldest documented man-made structures in Ulster County, NY.

Now it's made good on its third and most ambitious goal: taking ownership of the property from Guardian Antiquities Research, Inc. (GAR), a limited liability corporation the Villchur Foundation established on behalf of OMC to protect the property in perpetuity. Over the past two years, Villchur and OMC have been working toward the land transfer by having the land surveyed and appraised.

GAR purchased the property in May, 2014 from Lewis Hollow Corporation which was established in the 1970s by three local families to protect the property. In late December, 2024, GAR transferred the property to OMC and the new deed was recorded in the Ulster County Clerk's office. Additionally, OMC applied to the Woodstock, NY tax assessor's office and in April, 2025, obtained a tax exemption for the property. OMC was represented by pro-bono legal counsel through the nonprofit New York Lawyers for Public Interest (nylpi.org). In the coming months, OMC will amend and re-file the deed to protect it in perpetuity.

OMC is also working with the New York State Office of Parks Recreation and Historic Preservation (OPRHP) to have the site listed in the state's Cultural Resource Inventory System (CRIS) database. An announcement is forthcoming.

"We were thrilled and honored to have helped OMC protect this important and beautiful property for these past years," said Robyn Pollins, Director, Villchur Foundation, a Woodstock-based nonprofit. "It's finally in the right hands and we'll eagerly support OMC to continue to research the stone formations and share this spell-binding property with the public."

"This is a great day for the land, and for the public," said OMC chairperson and co-founder Glenn Kreisberg. "We will be able to permanently protect the land in order for many generations to enjoy and study it in the future."

Research Solves Mystery

In 2020, OMC received a grant for Dr. James K.

Feathers, Research Associate Director, Department of Anthropology, University of Washington, to conduct research using optical stimulated luminescence (OSL) to date two mounds on Overlook Mountain in Woodstock, NY. Results revealed a suggested construction dates of 1390 and 1550 CE (+/- 50 years) based on sediment analysis, likely making them among the oldest documented man-made structures in Ulster County, NY. These results are based on samples collected in the fall of 2020.

"Although the age corresponds to the time of earliest European contact, it predates European settlement and was likely constructed by Indigenous Communities who lived in the area prior to contact with Europeans," said Dr. Feathers whose research was published in

Quaternary Geochronology 73 (2022).

Dr. Feathers, along with colleague Dr. Marine Frouin, Assistant Professor, Department of Geosciences, Stony Brook University, took samples from two man-made stone structures on the south slope of Overlook Mountain. OSL is used when scientists and researchers want to minimally disturb the structures they are studying. It can work on a variety of materials - ceramics, lithics, quartz or feldspar sediments - and determines when sunlight was last shown on minerals in stones and sediments. Prior to the OSL dating, everything about the mounds' age - they were made by the Works Progress Administration in the 1930s or by hippies in the 1960s was conjecture. In fact, one local archeologist dismissed the mounds entirely, considering them nothing more than the work of Irish quarrymen expressing their Celtic heritage. The OSL research proves otherwise.







Ulster County Breaks Ground for New Resilient Emergency Communications Center in New Paltz

KINGSTON, NY - Ulster County Executive Jen Metzger, alongside elected officials, emergency personnel, and community leaders, celebrated the groundbreaking of the Ulster County Emergency Communications Center (ECC) today, a state-of-the-art facility to strengthen coordinated emergency response capabilities and improve the climate resilience of the County's emergency management system.

The 16,350-square-foot Emergency Communications Center, located on Paradies Lane in New Paltz, will house the Department of Emergency Services, including the Emergency-911 Center, which operates 24/7, an Emergency Operations Center to provide a rapid, coordinated response to natural disasters and larger emergencies, and the Divisions of Fire Services and Emergency Medical Services. The new ECC will also include a dedicated quiet room for dispatchers to decompress after handling stressful or traumatic calls

Earlier this year, Ulster County was awarded a \$2 million NYSERDA grant to support the facility's energy-conscious design, including super-insulated walls, geothermal heating and cooling, and rooftop solar with battery backup. A substantial portion of the property will also be dedicated to a ground-mounted solar array to power 100% of this facility and as well as other County buildings.

"The new Emergency Communications Center is an essential investment in resilient emergency management infrastructure that will greatly enhance our ability to coordinate emergency response and disaster relief. The ECC will replace older facilities that are outdated, undersized, and vulnerable to severe weather and power outages, and will greatly strengthen our capacity to respond under any conditions," said Ulster County Executive Jen Metzger. "I want to recognize the Legislature for its support of this important project and thank my team who have invested so much of their time, energy, and expertise in careful planning for this project over the last several years, including Emergency Services Director Everett Erichsen, Planning Director Dennis Doyle, and Deputy County Executive Jamie Capuano. We're also grateful to NYSER-DA for \$2 million in grant funding to make this facility a model in clean energy, as well as to Assembly Member Sarahana Shrestha for a \$40,000 capital grant through her office."

"Delivering for our first responders and keeping Hudson Valley families safe is one of my top priorities. That's why, going back to my time as County Executive and continuing in Congress, I've pushed relentlessly to build a new, state-of-the-art Emergency Operations Center. I am incredibly proud and excited to see this crucial public safety initiative moving forward," said Congressman Pat Ryan. "I'll continue to use every tool at my disposal to get this project the federal support it needs, including the over \$1M House Republicans removed from the last government funding bill. We cannot afford to let public safety get bogged down in politics—when we invest in our first responders, our entire community is safer."

"Breaking ground on this facility marks a major operational leap forward for public safety in Ulster County," said Everett Erichsen, Director of Ulster County Emergency Services. "Every day, our emergency services professionals work together to answer life-critical calls, coordinate complex incidents, and prepare for evolving threats, often simultaneously and under pressure. This facility brings those functions together under one roof for the first time, streamlining coordination, strengthening communication, and supporting faster, more effective response."

"This is definitely an exciting day in Ulster County," said Gina Hansut, Ulster County Legislator and Law Enforcement and Public

Safety Committee Chair. "After doing our due diligence, as we first introduced the resolution to initiate this project in November of 2022, much work has been done to get us here today. We have been steadfast that the Paradies Lane location will serve us well. Public safety, in my opinion, is the government's number one priority, and today as we officially launch the ECC, we thank all who have already put so much into this. Ulster County is committed to public safety, and this will only make us stronger."

"Projects like the new Emergency Communications Center, built under a cost-saving project labor agreement, support local contractors while providing workers with stable, well-paying jobs and valuable benefits, helping to strengthen the local economy and improve lives," said Michael Ham, Representative for Operating Engineers Local 825 and Chair of the Ulster County Industrial Development Agency. "We thank County Executive Metzger and the Ulster County Legislature for partnering with Hudson Valley Building The ECC is being developed by a project Trade Unions." team, led by Urbahn Architects as the lead architect, The Palombo Group as construction manager, and Alfandre Architecture as consulting architect. Additional engineering and design partners include GPI, overseeing structural, civil, and MEP engineering, and Cerami Associates, responsible for telecommunications, IT, security, audiovisual, and data systems design. The construction team consists of Andron Construction as general contractor, Perreca Electric for electrical work, The YMI Group handling mechanical and plumbing, and Merritt Construction managing site work. The New York State Technology Enterprise Corporation (NYSTEC), a consulting firm, is also contributing to the project. A Project Labor Agreement is in place with the Hudson Valley Building and Construction Trades Council and the associated local unions.

"Ulster County's leadership directed the designers to focus on resiliency, redundancy, efficiency, and longevity of the new facility," said Urbahn Architects Associate Principal Christopher Young. "The facility will be constructed on a five-inch slab-on-grade concrete foundation and have a gray standing-seam metal roofing system. The perimeter walls will feature an insulated concrete form system of interlocking blocks of insulation that create the formwork for a concrete core. This system will provide continuous insulation for the entire building without thermal leaks, as well as good sound insulation. Additionally, Urbahn designed the building to be in line with Ulster County Executive Order 01-2023, so the facility will meet New York State's NYStretch Energy Code 2020 standards for energy efficiency in public buildings."

Site work will include constructing access roads and an asphalt parking surface with 71 spaces, as well as landscaping of trees, bushes and grasses.

BACKGROUND

The County purchased the 57.3-acre property in May 2024 for \$2.8 million - \$200,000 less than the 2022 agreed price between the property owner and the County. County Executive Metzger negotiated the price reduction to more fully account for environmental remediation costs, as the site is in the NYS Brownfield Program, and site remediation will be consistent with what is required by NYS Department of Environmental Conservation.

The 2024 Executive Budget created an \$18 million capital reserve for the Emergency Communications Center. By dedicating these funds from the County's excess fund balance in a reserve, tax-payers will save more than \$1 million annually in borrowing costs.

The New Paltz location provides access to reliable, uninterrupted power and redundant fiber optic infrastructure, and is also ideally located to provide quick access to major thoroughfares: the New York State Thruway, and Routes 32 and 9W.

Currently, the County's Emergency-911 call center answers more than 130,000 emergency and non-emergency calls per year.

Governor Hochul's Op-Ed in Empire Report: Washington Republicans are Trying to Take Your Health Care

In just a few weeks, we will be observing the 60th anniversary of the signing of Medicaid by President Lyndon B. Johnson. When President Johnson signed this transformational policy into law, he told us all that there is a tradition we share. A tradition that calls upon us to never be indifferent to despair, to never turn away from helplessness, and to never ignore or spurn those who suffer in a land bursting with abundance.

Well this past week, Washington Republicans turned their back on that longstanding, righteous tradition when they passed a budget that takes a sledgehammer to our health care system.

Let's be crystal clear about what Washington Republicans are doing in their budget: they are gutting Medicaid. Not trimming or tweaking it. Certainly not improving it. No, their budget would slash nearly \$700 billion from Medicaid over the next decade.

In short, they are aiming a wrecking ball directly at working families, children, seniors, and people with disabilities.

Here in New York, we stand to lose \$13.5 billion for Medicaid each year. That's not some hypothetical number on a spreadsheet. That's 1.5 MILLION of our neighbors who will lose their health insurance entirely. That's hospitals across this state - from Long Island to North Country - who will see their budgets slashed, staff cut, and care delayed.

And New York's seven GOP representatives happily voted for all this devastation, just so they could fund tax cuts for billionaires. That's their idea of putting America First. Well I think it's just Robin Hood in reverse.

It couldn't be more at odds with what I am fighting for here in New York. Because while Washington Republicans are trying to take health care away, I've worked hard to expand it.

From raising the eligibility threshold for the Essential Plan and giving more than 1.5 million New Yorkers access to high-quality, affordable coverage; to investing millions in health insurance subsidies; strengthening hospital financial assistance; and protecting hard working families from medical debt, I'm fighting every day to increase access to high-quality, affordable health care. And I'm proud to say that as a result, New York has the lowest uninsured rate of any large state.

But all that progress - and more - is now under threat.

I'd like to ask every single New York Republican who just sold out their constituents, how do you justify your vote to the people who elected you to represent them?

And to the Republicans who are hiding behind the thin excuse of work requirements, I say: red tape masquerading as 'work requirements' isn't about helping people find jobs. It's about kicking them off their health insurance. The facts are clear: most people on Medicaid are already working, in school, or too sick to hold a job. And the people who get caught in that red tape - the ones who lose coverage - are often those least able to navigate it. It's not that they stop needing care. They just show up later and sicker, at a higher cost to our system, putting a greater strain on our hospitals. This isn't smart policy. It isn't saving us any money. It's just plain cruel.

Medicaid is a lifeline for one out of every three New Yorkers, including 50% of every child in this state. But the reality is, even if you

don't rely on Medicaid, these cuts affect you. Because when millions lose coverage, hospitals and other vital healthcare providers lose funding. And that strains the entire system.

These cuts could mean that your local hospital or health center shuts down. They could look like you being forced to drive farther just to find a doctor. Or that you have to wait twice as long at the ER.

The bottom line is these cuts won't just hurt the most vulnerable - they'll make health care harder to get and more expensive for everyone.

Well I've never abandoned New Yorkers, and I certainly won't now.

So to New York's seven congressional representatives - and every Republican down in Washington - let me say this as clearly as I can: health care is not negotiable in the Empire State.

And to every New Yorker reading this: Pick up the phone. Call your representative. Tell them this is your red line. Tell them that we will not let them dismantle the safety net that millions of our neighbors rely on. Because here in New York, we fight for our kids. We care for our elderly. We show up for our neighbors. If Washington's forgotten that, then it's time we remind them.

This is the fight. I'm ready for it. And I know New York is ready for it too.


