Trout Lily (a/k/a Dog Tooth Violet; Adder's Tongue

It's that time of year that I like to head out in the back woods with my camera and look for pretty little things that I will enjoy looking at next



winter, that will remind me of how beautifully blessed we are this time of the year. So with my camera ready to go, it wasn'tbut a few steps into the woods when I saw one of the prettiest little spring flowers that you may spot this time of the year, a Yellow Dog Tooth Violet, (referring to the toothlike shape of the white underground bulb) a/k/a Adder's Tongue, but most commonly known in this area as a Trout Lily, which is a more suitable name since the flower is not a violet. The name Trout Lily arises because of the appearance of its gray-green leaves mottled with

brown, which allegedly resemble the coloring of a brook trout.

The Trout Lily is a herbaceous flowering plant in the family Liliaceae, that is one of our most common spring wildflowers.

A pair of brownish-mottled leaves sheath the base of a stalk that bears a solitary, nodding flower, yellow inside, bronzy outside. This colony-forming perennial sends up two, 3-6 inch, elliptic, mottled leaves and a slightly taller stalk that bears the single, nodding, yellow flower. Petals and sepals are bent backwards exposing six brown stamens. Single-leaved, non-flowering plants also occur. They are either too young or too crowded to flower.

Trout lilies produce large colonies of plants if they are left undisturbed for several decades. There have been trout lily colonies that are said to be 300 years old! Their habitat include moist to mesic deciduous woodlands and gentle slopes in wooded areas. An abundance of this plant is an indicator that a woodland has not been subjected to the plow or bulldozed over.

The blooming period occurs during mid-spring and lasts about 2 weeks. Each fertilized flower is replaced by a 3-chambered seed capsule that is ovoid and about 1/2" long. Each chamber of the seed capsule contains 2 rows of flattened seeds. The root system consists of a corm that is several inches below the surface of the ground; this corm produces fibrous roots at its base and occasionally sends out underground stolons that can form new plants a few inches away from the mother plant.

The flowers are primarily pollinated by bees, including honeybees and bumblebees, and also by ants. After a seed is planted, it will take up to seven years to make a mature plant. Only plants that have two leaves will flower.

The mature plant has two mottled basal leaves, and a small lily nodding from the top of a leafless stem. The lily opens each morning and closes each night, but during the middle of a bright day the petals open so far that they are all curved backwards.

If you are thinking about including a Trout Lily or two in your garden, a few pointers are that they like dappled sunlight during the spring, soil that is moist or has a moderate amount of water, and a rich loamy soil with abundant leaf mold. Shadier conditions are tolerated later in the year. The foliage withers away during the summer. It takes several years for a new plant to fully develop and bloom. Corms can be transplanted successfully during the fall, while the establishment of new plants from seeds is difficult and slow.

This tiny little lily is only six to ten inches tall, but definitely stands out. When you have a camera in hand and want to take some woodsy pictures, you can almost hear a Trout Lily call "Come and take my picture!"

Minutes later, the plane lands and the passenger in 34c is arrested by Turkish Police and escorted off the plane. Intrigued, as well as halfway through a fifth of Gilbey's

gin he smuggled onto the

Turkish Airways passenger jet, Drummond retrieves the man's book and finds instructions for a clandestine rendezvous.







depicting drawings and photographs - including "threedimensional" stereoptical prints from the Romanian scientist Emil Racovitza (1868-1947).Racovitza was one of the scientists selected to be part of Belgica's international crew. He was also a talented artist who produced numerous sketches and photographs during the expedition. Later in his career as a speleologist, Racovitza established in Romania the first Speological Institute in the world, and explored over 1,400 caves in France, Spain, Algeria, Italy, and

Slovenia. He served for four years as President of the Romanian Academy and went on to become one of Romania's most beloved promoters of the natural sciences.

The Racovitza collection is on generous loan from the Stephan cel Mare Museum in Vaslui, Romania.

The exhibition will additionally include one of the largest exhibitions of photographs from the Belgica expedition ever assembled. Five of the 19 crew members had cameras, including Dr. Cook.


SC ROAD WORK NOTICE



Arts Funding in Sullivan County Artist and Non-profit Announced! Award Ceremony at the Forestburgh Playhouse

DVAA will present the awards at a public ceremony honoring the community groups and individual artists selected to receive funding in the 2024 grant cycle. The live in-person event will take place on Friday, May 31st, from 4 PM to 6 PM at the Forestburgh Playhouse, located at 39 Forestburgh Rd, Forestburgh, NY 12777. In addition to the award presentations, the event will feature remarks by Sullivan County Legislative Chair Nadia Rajsz, special performances, and a screening by current and recent grantees.

Dedicated to keeping the arts alive and strong in Sullivan County, the Delaware Valley Arts Alliance (DVAA) proudly announces the recipients of the 2024 Sullivan County Arts for Sullivan program, in which 33 grants, totaling \$80,000, were awarded to artists, arts organizations and community nonprofits, and the 2024 Sullivan County Arts & Heritage Grants, in which 11 grants totaling \$15,250 were awarded to arts organizations, and community nonprofits to support arts programming throughout Sullivan County.

Arts for Sullivan grants are funded through the New York State Council on the Arts' Statewide Community Regrant (SCR) program, administered by DVAA. In 2024, they will support 23 Arts for Sullivan Community Arts projects (\$62,000) as well as six Individual Artist Fellowships in Sullivan County. Artist Fellowships are awarded in Visual Arts, Literary Arts, and Compositional Arts, each receiving a \$2,500 award.

The Sullivan County Arts & Heritage Grants program is made possible through a Legislative Discretionary Fund grant awarded by the Sullivan County Legislature and administered by the Delaware Valley Arts Alliance. The funding DVAA distributes supports projects that focus on visual, performing, literary, media, and folk arts, as well as the culture and heritage of Sullivan County. Groups that may apply include libraries, theaters, music groups, historical societies, museums, community development groups, environmental groups, and more.

This year's projects range from concerts and performances to workshops for the young and the young-at-heart, from a film series focused on Indigenous Sci-Fi Films in Hurleyville to supporting the production of new plays by emerging playwrights in Forestburgh. They take place throughout nearly every corner of our county and will generate creative energy throughout the calendar year 2024!

"Sullivan County has a tremendous and vibrant cultural sector that makes our communities truly unique and special places to live, work, and visit. In 2024, through our partnership with the New York State Council on the Arts and the support of the Sullivan County Legislature, DVAA is ensuring that artists and arts organizations in Sullivan County are being supported like no year prior. Our regrants in 2024 total more than \$97,000 and reach every corner of the county. These funds will support projects totaling nearly \$500,000 in cultural activities that will have a multifaceted impact on the communities they serve." notes DVAA Executive Director Ariel Shanberg."





Governor Hochul Announcess \$39.6 Million ia Now Available to Low Income New Yorkers for Home Energy Efficiency and Electrification Ungrades

Upgrades
Governor Kathy Hochul joined U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) Secretary Granholm and White House Senior Advisor John Podesta at the Andromeda Community Initiative in Queens to celebrate New York State becoming the first state in the nation to offer the first phase of Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) Home Electrification and Appliance Rebates (HEAR) Program funding to consumers. The initial \$39.6 million formula grant will expand the reach of New York's EmPower+ program by allowing more low-income families to improve their homes with energy efficiency and electrification upgrades that will reduce energy costs and transition away from burning fossil fuels in their homes. Today's announcement supports the State's nationleading Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act (Climate Act) goal to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 85 percent by 2050 and requirement for at least 35 percent, with a goal of 40 percent of the benefits of clean energy investments supporting disadvantaged communities.


"As the first state in the nation to offer these Inflation Reduction Act rebates, we are expanding access to home improvements that will save New Yorkers money on their energy bills and reduce our reliance on fossil fuels," Governor Hochul said. "Thanks to our strong partnership between New York State, the Biden Administration, and U.S. Department of Energy, we are making important progress to make the clean energy transition afford-

able for all New Yorkers."

Today's announcement represents the first step in New York State deploying these IRA rebates to residents. Funding for the full portfolio of IRA Home Energy Rebate programs and deployment of additional rebates is expected later this year. The State is eligible to receive a total of \$317.7 million through the DOE's IRA Home Energy Rebate programs: \$159.3 million for the Home Efficiency Rebates program and \$158.4 million for HEAR program.

In April 2024, the U.S DOE approved the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority's (NYSERDA) partial-scope application for this initial funding, which allows NYSERDA's low income EmPower+ program to expand its current reach by providing funding for additional energy efficiency and beneficial electrification improvements, such as insulation and air sealing, heat pumps for space and water heating, and any necessary electrical upgrades to support those improvements.

Beginning today, eligible owners of one- to four-family households that have a household income below 80 percent of the Area Median Income or participate in a utility payment assistance program will automatically be enrolled to benefit from IRA HEAR incentives when they apply to the EmPower+ pro-



gram. Incentives are provided to residents through EmPower+ contractors to reduce the cost of installing energy efficiency and electrification upgrades in a home or apartment, making them more affordable for New Yorkers. For more information including the application process and eligibility requirements, please visit NYSERDA's website.

NYSERDA is currently working towards developing and submitting the full HEAR application to enable rebate offers to moderate-income residents, up to 150 percent of area median income, and to owners of larger low- and moderate-income multifamily buildings, including high-efficiency electric appliance rebates.

Buildings are one of the most significant sources of greenhouse gas emissions in New York State and through NYSERDA and utility programs over \$6.8 billion is being invested to decarbonize buildings. By improving energy efficiency in buildings and advancing statewide installations of onsite storage, renewables and electric vehicle charging equipment, the State will reduce its carbon pollution and advance toward the ambitious target of reducing on-site energy consumption by 185 TBtu by 2025, the equivalent of powering 1.8 million homes.

Funding for EmPower+ is provided through the Enacted FY 2023-2024 State Budget, the State's Clean Energy Fund, the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative, and the Federal Inflation Reduction Act. New York State's Nation-Leading Climate Plan

New York State's climate agenda calls for an orderly and just transition that creates family-sustaining jobs, continues to foster a green economy across all sectors and ensures that at least 35 percent, with a goal of 40 percent, of the benefits of clean energy investments are directed to disadvantaged communities. Guided by some of the nation's most aggressive climate and clean energy initiatives, New York is advancing a suite of efforts - including the New York Cap-and-Invest program (NYCI) and other complementary policies - to reduce greenhouse gas emissions 40 percent by 2030 and 85 percent by 2050 from 1990 levels. New York is also on a path to achieving a zero-emission electricity sector by 2040, including 70 percent renewable energy generation by 2030, and economywide carbon neutrality by mid-century. A cornerstone of this transition is New York's unprecedented clean energy investments, including more than \$28 billion in 61 large-scale renewable and transmission projects across the State, \$6.8 billion to reduce building emissions, \$3.3 billion to scale up solar, nearly \$3 billion for clean transportation initiatives and over \$2 billion in NY Green Bank commitments. These and other investments are supporting more than 170,000 jobs in New York's clean energy sector as of 2022 and over 3,000 percent growth in the distributed solar sector since 2011. To reduce greenhouse gas emissions and improve air quality, New York also adopted zero-emission vehicle regulations, including requiring all new passenger cars and light-duty trucks sold in the State be zero emission by 2035. Partnerships are continuing to advance New York's climate action with more than 400 registered and more than 130 certified Climate Smart Communities, nearly 500 Clean Energy Communities, and the State's largest community air monitoring initiative in 10 disadvantaged communities across the State to help target air pollution and combat climate change.

Governor Hochul Announces \$5 Million in Awards to 65 Domestic Violence Service Providers Statewide

Governor Kathy Hochul announced that 65 programs across the state will receive funding as part of a \$5 million investment to support the needs of survivors and victims of domestic violence. Delivering on Governor Hochul's State of the State priority, this year's Enacted Budget established the Survivors Access Financial Empowerment (SAFE) fund as a recurring funding stream for survivors of domestic violence. The Governor also secured \$35 million in the Budget to provide law enforcement and district attorneys with the tools they need to prevent and prosecute crimes of domestic violence through evidence-driven, survivor-centered, and trauma informed interventions.

"I remain deeply committed to supporting New Yorkers impacted by domestic violence and to investing in new strategies to address the harms of abuse," Governor Hochul said. "For many survivors, limited access to finances remains an obstacle to securing greater safety for themselves and their families. This investment in targeted emergency assistance will allow survivors to gain stability and focus on healing."

The awards will be distributed by the New York State Office for the Prevention of Domestic Violence to programs that directly



serve survivors and victims and will be used for critical needs such as education and training to secure employment, food and household supplies, moving expenses, legal assistance, utility payments, transportation, and physical and mental health services, as well as child-related services. New York remains one of only two states in the country to appropriate state dollars for this type of flexible financial assistance.

The New York State Office of Victim Services (OVS) also supports services through its statewide network of victim assistance programs, while offering financial assistance to provide a critical safety net and helps victims of crime, including domestic violence survivors, with medical and counseling expenses, funeral and burial expenses, lost wages and support. New York is the only state in the nation with no cap on medical or counseling costs, which means individuals can receive assistance as long as they need it. While eligibility for compensation or reimbursement is determined by an individual's access to resources, including health insurance, and restitution and civil settlements resulting from the crime, victim assistance programs provide services and support at no cost to anyone who needs them.

DEC Forest Rangers - Week in Review Recent Statewide Forest Ranger Actions

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Forest Rangers respond to search and rescue incidents statewide. Working with other state agencies, local emergency response organizations, and volunteer search and rescue groups, Forest Rangers locate, and extract lost, injured, or distressed people from across New York State.

In 2023, DEC Forest Rangers conducted 370 search and rescue missions, extinguished 146 wildfires covering nearly 1,400 acres, participated in 52 prescribed fires that served to rejuvenate more than 1,000 acres of land, and worked on cases that resulted in hundreds of tickets and arrests.

"Whether they are leading complex search and rescue incidents, suppressing wildfires, enforcing laws on State lands and easements, inspiring the next generation of environmental stewards, or encouraging responsible recreation, Forest Rangers stand ready to help when called," DEC Interim Commissioner Sean Mahar said. "Forest Rangers' wide-ranging expertise and collaboration with local, State, and federal partners are instrumental in protecting New York's public lands and the many visitors who use them."







Defending Medicare Advantage Plans for our Seniors

Last year, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) made a needed adjustment to the wage index for Upstate hospitals, treating geographically rural and rural reclassified hospitals equally. This change led to wage index increases of 20-40% across Upstate New York. While this provided significant relief for hospitals that had been severely underpaid by the feefor-service program, it inadvertently placed substantial financial pressure on regional Medicare Advantage (MA) plans, which are predominantly non-profit organizations. Because CMS did not account for these new costs in their benchmark rates for 2024, MA plans have experienced significant financial challenges that jeopardizes plans' ability to provide affordable, quality coverage to their beneficiaries. Without relief, health plans will be forced to cut benefits and increase premiums for seniors who can least afford it.

This week, I introduced legislation would address these dramatic reductions in access and benefits by granting CMS the ability to adjust their benchmark amounts to account for local areas with wage indices that grew by 20 percent or greater. This needed relief will ensure regional, non-profit MA plans remain viable and safeguard enrollees' robust benefits and access to quality care.

Our community's seniors deserve continued access to affordable, high-quality healthcare. I am dedicated to enacting policies that will ensure that Medicare Advantage plans continue to provide the robust benefits that so many members of our community rely on.

Dairy Farm Resiliency Act: This bill strengthens the Dairy Margin Coverage safety net program by insuring more milk production.

Delivering for Rural Seniors Act: This bill allows seniors living in rural areas, seniors with disabilities, and those with mobility or transportation issues to receive home delivery services from food banks participating in the Commodity Supplemental Food Program.

ThinkDIFFERENTLY Nutrition and Opportunities Act: Under current law, students with disabilities are allowed to be in secondary school until they're 21. If a student with disability aged 18 to 21 gets a part time job, their income gets counted for the purposes of SNAP and can result in a reduction of family benefits. This bipartisan bill prevents these working students from losing benefits.

ThinkDIFFERENTLY Agriculture Accessibility Act: This bill reauthorizes and increases funding for AgrAbility, a U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) program that provides funding for support services and assistive technology farmers/farm families with disabilities.

Flooding Prevention, Assessment, and Restoration Act: This bill incentivizes the construction of more resilient flood infrastructure and helps rural communities access federal funding for these projects.

Training and Nutrition Stability Act: This bill exempts income earned from SNAP Education and Training Programs from impacting participants' SNAP benefits. Currently, participants who earn income under these temporary workforce development programs can inadvertently disqualify themselves from SNAP.

Organic Dairy Data Collection Act: This bill supports organic dairy farmers in Upstate New York by enhancing data collection at the USDA, allowing the agency and farmers to better understand the costs associated with producing organic milk.

Food Supply Chain Capacity and Resiliency Act: This bill lowers food costs by providing low-interest loans to businesses

investing in food supply chain operations.

The Freight for Farms Act: This bill ensures the USDA Community Facilities Direct Loan & Grant Program includes freight rail infrastructure, so federal funds can be used to increase farmers access to freight rail, which will decrease costs.

Leveraging Efficiency Awareness for Pumping Systems (LEAPS) Act: This bill makes efficient pump & irrigation systems more accessible to farmers and will support workers at National Pipe & Plastics in Endicott. Specifically, it requires the USDA to update a webpage to offer accessible information on energy efficient pumps, highlighting the benefits of efficient irrigation systems and helping farmers implement these efficient practices.

Other key provisions in the Farm Bill:

Expands SNAP eligibility while protecting SNAP funding. Allows families to purchase more fruits and vegetables through food assistance programs.

Increases federal funding for food banks.

Mary Lucier Invitational Exhibition Opens June 29th

Catskill Art Space (CAS) will present an exhibition of video art and photography

Livingston Manor, NY - Catskill Art Space (CAS) will present an exhibition of video art and photography from Mary Lucier, the pioneering video artist. Mary Lucier opens on Saturday, June 29, with an artist talk from 3-4pm followed by a reception from 4-5pm; the show remains on view through August 24. The opening will coincide with the release of the eponymous catalog, including new critical text and an interview with the artist from Hearne Pardee and Emily Watlington. Mary Lucier's wide sweeping exhi-

bition at CAS marks the first time the organization has exhibited video art, an ambitious endeavor for an institution of this size. The presentation is grounded by major historical and new works, tracing the breadth of her career-from her experiments with early video camera technology of the 1970s, to recent installations reflecting on her personal lived experience and loss of her late husband and painter Robert Berlind. Bridging the room-sized installations, is a gallery of still photography from her installation Noah's Raven (1993), which captures catastrophic phenomena on the landscape and in the lives of individuals and cultures. Together, the exhibition examines the effects of ecological trauma, transformation, and resilience in the natural and artificial worlds. Lucier's work will be shown alongside long-term installations by James Turrell, Sol LeWitt, Francis Cape and Ellen Brooks on the second floor of the recently expanded multi-arts center.

For *Equinox* (1979/2016), a subversive meditation on nature and video, Lucier trained her video camera on the sun for twelve consecutive days, burning the camera tube and leaving more and more marks on the images, which are presented on seven pedestal-mounted monitors of increasing size. The burn marks track the movement of the sun, accumulating and creating a decidedly painterly effect with intoxicating washes of green over the glow of the rising sun. Presented nearly 50 years later, as we grapple with the impact of environmental degradation, the work reminds viewers of the orange glow that colored the city's skies amidst the 2023 Canada wildfires, underscoring the devastation of global change. In this context, the work is as much about the natural world degrading technology, as the inverse-a city laid vulnerable to the impact of climate change.

Leaving Earth (2024) is a multi-channel video and sound installation inspired by excerpts from the final journal of Lucier's late husband, the painter Robert Berlind. In this journal, Berlind fearlessly documented his thoughts on his impending death from a terminal illness. His writings reflect his appreciation of life with a remarkable lack of anxiety about the inevitable end-more curiosity than dread. The imagery in Lucier's work consists of sequences of protean video and still images filmed in both her domestic and working environments in Sullivan County and New York City. Most were shot after Berlind's passing, reflecting the world as she experienced it during his final days and after. Berlind's terse epigraphs appear throughout, serving as evocative companions to the flow of images in Leaving Earth.

pictures already formed more remembrance than presence.

Lucier describes this nine-channel installation as one where "words, pictures, and sound become interchangeable, not serving as descriptions but as a rumination on reality and a form of coping." Unlike much of Lucier's earlier work, it does not follow a synchronous and sequential internal structure, instead allowing for random juxtapositions, repetitive thoughts, and the possibility of chaos to occur, reflecting the potential disarray in the dying man's mind. The pictorial narrative in Leaving Earth is underscored by Berlind's description of his mental state:

a succession of discontinuous moments occur then disappear without the elemental structure of sequence And yet . . . I forget to fear death

Mary Lucier (b. 1944, Bucyrus, OH) has been noted for her contributions to the form of multi-monitor, multi-channel video installation since the early 1970s. Her work prior to her introduction to video was largely concerned with manipulation of the black and white image through a graphic performative process. She also produced several live performances with the feminist video collective Red White Yellow and Black (along with Shigeko Kubota, Cecilia Sandoval and Charlotte Warren) at the original Kitchen in 1972 and '73. Lucier's video installations have been shown in major museums and galleries around the world. Many now reside in important collections, including the Whitney Museum of American Art, NY; the Museum of Modern Art, NY; the Reina Sofia, Madrid; the Stedelijk Museum, Amsterdam; the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art; ZKM, Karlsruhe, Germany; the Milwaukee Art Museum; the Columbus Museum of Art, OH; and the National Academy of Design, NY, among others. She has also produced a significant body of single-channel works which have been screened in museums and festivals world-wide. From the austere black and white experiments of the 1970's to recent studies of Japanese Buddhist ceremonies and Dakota Sioux dances, these works acknowledge the influence of both Avant Garde and documentary practices in American art and cinema.

Lucier has been the recipient of many awards and fellowships, including the National Endowment for the Arts, the John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation, the Rockefeller Foundation, Creative Capital, Anonymous Was a Woman, the Nancy Graves Foundation, USA Artists, the American Film Institute, the Jerome Foundation, the New York State council on the Arts, and the Japan-US Friendship Commission. Her teaching appointments have included the Distinguished Visiting Professor in Art and Art History at UC Davis; Skowhegan School of Painting and Sculpture; adjunct professor in the department of VES at Harvard University; and Visiting Professor in Video Art at University of Wisconsin, Milwaukee, among others. She lives and works in New York City and Cochecton, NY, where she has established a studio and archive for video art.

Long-term Installations

Following a major renovation and expansion, Catskill Art Space reopened in October 2022 with a long-term presentation of James Turrell's Avaar (1982) in a custom-built gallery on the building's second floor. A room-sized installation, Avaar is an important example of the artist's early, wallbased "aperture" works, which function by creating two areas within a room. There is a "viewing space," where one stands to see and experience the work, and a "sensing space," which is an ambiguously defined area of diffused light. Avaar is one of the rare examples of Turrell's aperture works to make use of white lighting only; no colors will be present in the installation. This work is in the collection of the Seattle Art Museum, which has granted CAS a special long-term loan to exhibit the work. The presentation at CAS marks the first time the work has been shown since the 1970s, giving audiences from the Catskills and beyond the rare opportunity to experience a major Turrell work that has not been seen in nearly five decades.

On the second floor's central landing, Sol LeWitt's vibrant Wall Drawing #992 unfolds in three sections, each consisting of 10,000 straight lines drawn in color marker, to create a mesmerizing arrangement of primary colors. On the fourth wall, presenting LeWitt's Wall Drawing #991, straight, arced, and organic lines will encompass the wall in black marker and pencil. The conceptual, minimalist artist conceived guidelines for his two-dimensional works to be drawn directly on the wall. Much like Turrell's Avaar, the LeWitt works were realized for CAS's space; in this instance, they are generously loaned by the artist's estate. This work

was overseen by a draftsperson, who determined the length and placement of the lines, and executed by five artists local to the area over nearly two weeks.

The newly realized performance space on CAS's second floor hosts British sculptor Francis Cape's A Gathering of Utopian Benches-an installation of meticulous copies of benches built and used by communal societies. Cape's installations have always argued that design and craft express belief. Utopian Benches, which has toured extensively throughout the US, was built from poplar grown near Cape's studio in Narrowsburg, NY. To be considered both as contemporary sculpture as well as furniture that visitors can actively use, the benches reference the societies who first used them, inviting visitors to utilize them for exchange, discourse, and community. The installation, which is meant to be used by visitors both for contemplation and may be used for performance seating, overlooks an expansive wall of windows onto the Willowemoc Creek.

Ellen Brooks inaugurates an intimate gallery space, framed by a partially open staircase, with Hang (2022), an installation suspending over 30 feet of scrolls of film negatives from the ceiling. The artist hangs transparencies and negatives in all formats and from clips attached to the ceiling, mimicking the practice of film photography. Hanging negatives reference the surrounding natural landscaping, evoking a cascading waterfall with coils of film collecting on the ground floor gallery.

Catskill Art Space (CAS) explores contemporary art practices of emerging and established artists. Through exhibitions, performances, classes, lectures, and screenings, CAS fosters creative community in the Catskills.

Established as Catskill Art Society in 1971, CAS reopened in October 2022 as Catskill Art Space following a major renovation and expansion of its multi-arts center, located in the picturesque hamlet of Livingston Manor in the Western Catskills. CAS presents a rotating slate of exhibitions, performances and other events featuring national and regional talents, alongside long-term installations of works by James Turrell, Sol LeWitt, Francis Cape, and Ellen Brooks. The film centers on the pampered socialite (Claudette Colbert) trying to get out from under her father's thumb and falls in love with a roguish bum of a reporter (Clark Gable). The screenplay by Robert Riskin is based on the August 1933 short story "Night Bus" by Samuel Hopkins Adams, which provided the shorting title

which provided the shooting title.

A "POVERTY ROW STUDIO," thats what COLUMBIA PICTURES was considered in 1934 at the film's release. Both MGM and Warner Bros. would lend out temperamental actors to Columbia as a punishment for real, or imagined, imfractions. Columbia CEO Harry Cohn who loathed paying for his own roster of contract stars during the early '30s, would invariably assign them to work on Frank Capra's films.

Although the studio had received Academy Award nominations prior to this film, this film's success virtually, single-handedly lifted Columbia out of the ranks of "Poverty Row".
