They also must have an 88 cumulative average since 9th grade and be enrolled in at least three Regents-level and/or college-credit courses and have a combined average of 88 in those courses. For honors or college-credit courses, the minimum grade requirement is 85. If they have qualified academically, teachers then rate the students in the areas of character, leadership, and service. These ratings are then factored in to decide whether they are or are not inducted.

[LIBERTY] - March is New York State Maple Syrup Month, a time when the sap is flowing from the trees and the sweet smell of maple syrup is coming from the sugarhouses. As part of a buy local effort, Cornell Cooperative Extension Sullivan County (CCE), Catskill Mountainkeeper, the County of Sullivan and Sullivan Renaissance have joined to promote the use of Sullivan County maple syrup.

On the Move for Maple Syrup. First initiated by Sullivan Renaissance and Mountainkeeper, this campaign to promote the use of Sullivan County maple syrup by connecting maple producers to eateries and other retail establishments. The campaign also raises awareness about the benefits of local maple syrup and is supported by the County of Sullivan through a legislative resolution. As part of the campaign, CCE has created a "Sullivan County Catskill Maple Syrup Directory." It contains educational information about maple syrup production, nutritional information and a list of current maple producers in Sullivan County.

Purchase Sullivan County maple syrup. Maple syrup production is a growing industry in Sullivan County and contributes to the overall and environmental Purchasing local maple syrup helps to support farms, forests and local economy. Maple syrup also has no additives, no added coloring and no preservatives.

Visit a local sugarhouse. The New York State Maple Producers Association invites families from across NYS and neighboring areas to learn about the production of maple syrup and other related products. Its goal during Maple Weekend is to share the taste of real maple syrup with the public. Many maple producers will also demonstrate how to make syrup - whether it's simply boiling the sap over an open fire or running it through highly scientific equipment. The Redwings are Back

I am so happy to hear that Carol Furman has heard the chattering of some red-winged blackbirds at the Furman Farm!! According to Peggy, as she wrote several years



back, "I saw a robin but it wasn't spring. I found peepers but it still wasn't spring. Then I heard a Redwing blackbird singing O-ka-lee down by the pond and it was spring!"

Despite what it looks like in our backyards, Spring is here!

Red-wing Blackbirds herald spring over the whole country and

belong to the large family, Icteridae, the family bears the name Redwing.

The male is about 8" long with a 12-14" wingspan. He's glossy black all over except for red shoulder epaulettes with yellow trim at the bottom. The female Redwing looks like a bird from a completely different family because she's dark brown with flecks of black and gray across her back and buff streaks on her under parts. A conspicuous tan stripe runs along her cheeks just above the eyes. It takes two years for a male Redwing to mature and during his first year he looks more like a female with rudimentary reddish shoulder patches.

Redwing blackbirds (Agelaius phoeniceus) are found near wetlands both fresh and saltwater, such as swamps. In the spring males usually return a couple of weeks before the females to establish nesting territories by singing O-ka-lee and displaying red shoulder patches. They control these feathers by raising or flattening them to make the patch brilliantly conspicuous or not. As a male checks out a possible territory, it won't display shoulder patches. When he finds a suitable spot where it isn't challenged by another male and decides to claim it, then it flashes the red epaulettes over and over.

If still unchallenged, it flies to a nearby higher open limb and sings O-ka-lee triumphantly. Territories are about 1/8 acre and strongly defended. If a male strays into another's claim inadvertently, he avoids confrontation by concealing his redwing patches.

Male and female Redwings establish a pair bond through ritual displays and songs. When there are more females than males, he will have several mates.

Each female makes her own nest without help, usually near water. She weaves dry grass and cattail leaves among several standing reeds and suspends her nest between them. The cup is several inches in diameter, lined with soft fibers and very well camouflaged from marauders like raccoons and heron! She will lay 3-4 bluegreen eggs an inch big which hatch about eleven days later into chicks born naked, blind and helpless.

For the next two weeks she works non-stop to raise her brood by herself. During that time the young are feathered but can't fly. They wander around in dense vegetation near the nest. If they should fall in the water, they're good swimmers and scramble back up into the cattails safely.

Baby Redwings are fed a high-protein diet of insects, spiders, glass hoppers and weevils. Once they can fend for themselves they add plant food like seeds, berries and grain. Adult Redwing diet is 73% plant seed and 25%. insect.

Often farmers complain that Redwing flocks eat corn and oats in the fields. Maybe so where locally abundant, but actually a Redwing prefers insects and weed seeds like ragweed over agricultural grain.

This fact has been proven true in surveys showing Redwings ate 75% weed seeds during summer when grain is readily available. And they continue feeding on wild seeds until insects become available.

Once young Redwings have learned to feed and take care of themselves, their families gather in very large flocks. These separate into two groups -one of mature males, the other of mature females and immature young.

If you wish to attract Red-winged blackbirds and welcome them to your back yard, they can be lured to your feeders with bread, seed mixtures and suet.

It is officially Spring and the Redwings are back.

Maybe you will be lucky, and hear the familiar chatter of the Red-winged Blackbird's song that is filled with hope that warm sunny weather will soon return to the Catskills.

Household Hints

Reshape your woolens

Shrunken woolen sweaters and other items can usually be stretched back to their former size or shape after boiling them in a solution of 1 part vinegar to 2 parts water for 25 minutes. Let the garment air-dry after you've finished stretching it.


Have you ever thought about any of the subcultures which exist in the midst of what we call 'normal' or regular society? Religious groups like the Amish, Mennonites, Hare Krishna's, Islamist's, Mormons, Sikhs and Hindus are all stitched into the fabric of America in plain sight . . . yet remain secretive and mostly unknown by all the rest of us. They have a common desire to be left alone, allowed to live by their own rules and reject all values other than those they themselves espouse, rules which usually involve a central authority figure who speaks for, as well as to the followers . . . with precise and rigid instructions about how one may only know God by devotion to the rules. Rules which are interpreted by men for the benefit of their women. Oh Yeah. Here's where it gets good . . . as long as you're not female.

One of the largest subcultures in America are the Hasidim . . . ultra-orthodox Jews who dress like 18th century Poles in black frock coats and hats, wear long side curls at their temples and speak Yiddish-who are concentrated in Brooklyn, and throughout the Catskill Mountains of upstate New

York. We've all seen them. They've become so numerous that they're almost ubiquitous in some places, but non-Hasidics know almost nothing about them. Invisible City, (Minotaur Books, \$24.99, 298 pages, ISBN 978-1-250-04339-9) is a sparkling debut from a veteran newspaper reporter named Julia Dahl that takes the reader into the secretive and insular world of the Brooklyn Hasidic community through the eyes of a beat reporter named Rebekah Roberts. She's a stringer, a parttime employee for a New York Tabloid called *The Tribune*, who is sent to gather the facts about a murdered woman whose naked body is found in a metal scrap yard along Brooklyn's Gowanus Canal-an area dominated by the Hasidic community. She quickly finds out that the ultra-Orthodox have their own ambulance and police forces, and heavy political influence with City Hall as well as the NYPD. When the woman's body is buried one day later, with neither an autopsy nor an investigation, Rebekah figures that a cover-up is taking place and risks her life and career to see justice done-while at the same time searching for her own mother-a Hasidic woman who abandoned her Lutheran husband and infant daughter, then disappeared twenty-four years earlier. She's the mother that Rebekah hasn't heard from since being abandoned by her. This is a riveting and suspenseful novel, written in a strong, forceful and compelling voice. I'm looking forward to Ms. Dahl's next installment of what is certain to be a popular and best-selling series.

At his boyhood home, just above Roxbury, NY, young Burroughs was uninterested in the farm chores that were the daily regimen of his hard-working, uneducated parents and eight brothers and sisters. He liked to read and write, and was keenly interested in books, poetry and the natural world around him.

8th Graders Excel at Tri-Valley's Fifth Annual Poetry Slam





Water, Water, Everywhere

Samuel Coleridge Taylor wrote in "The Rime of the Ancient Mariner:'

"Water, water, everywhere, And all the boards did shrink; Water, water, everywhere, Nor any drop to drink.

Those words played over and over in my mind as I drank bottled water on the river boat Queen Violeta as we sailed for six days on the Amazon River in Peru. I watched the Ribereno, River People, on the shore swim, fish, wash clothes, drink, and bathe in the "Yoo Hoo" colored, muddy water of the world's largest river. It was their life and life blood; it was my fear and enemy.

Our fragile North American stomachs could not tolerate the parasites of the water that grew our fruits and vegetables. Many of us on the ship took turns of being "un-well" with La Turista stomach troubles. Fortified with Imodium, modern antibiotics, vaccines and Deet, we all participated in events I never thought possible. We fished for and ate Piranha. I got bit by a fire ant. We saw pink dol-phins frolicking in ink-black water. I rode in a dug out canoe as a river teenager paddled and I bailed. We rode in Tuk-tuk carts, and we ate foods native to the area. My husband joked at one point that we had bananas every which way to Sunday. Fried bananas, banana chips, banana juice, banana mash, and banana cake. Every day was the freshest fish, the most natural of chicken, wild venison, fruits I never knew existed and vegetables that seemed strange because of their huge shape. There were

It was all worth it to meet and actually interact with the River People, natives of an ancient mixture of Asian and Indian with the conquerers of Spanish descent. Our guide was the youngest of thirteen children who was brought up in such a river village, so we visited a school, ate (with our RIGHT hands) a typical meal of venison, rice and eggs, roasted fish, and blue corn drink. We ate in the village's largest house which had one large outside, covered porch and a small inside room where Luisa, her husband and youngest of ten children slept on mats and in a hammock. No roads, no electricity, no plumbing, no bathroom, and no connection to the outside world except their dug-out

I moved from "those poor people" to "how for-tunate and happy they are." The river village we visited first was called Monte Alegre which means "Happy Mountain" even though the elevation was one twelve feet above the high-water level of the rainy season. They were happy people. No taxes, no government, no utility bills, and no stress from work or politics. Women and men were equal but

had separate roles.

I came as tourist, but I left as a person longing for the peace and community of a river village. We gave them bags of salt, machetes, and school supplies for the small village of thirty-something. They gave us the lesson of a lifetime. Possessions are extraneous. Barefoot and muddy, they had it all. The river provided all they needed to raise a family and be happy in the everyday survival.

UC Exec Mike Hein Launches Comprehensive Animal Abuse Prevention Initiative - The Multi-Faceted Initiative Builds Upon The Success Of The County Dog Park And Anti-Tethering Law To Improve The Quality Of Life For County Residents And Their Pets

Kingston, N.Y. - Today, County Executive Mike Hein launched a comprehensive Animal Abuse Prevention Initiative in conjunction with area representatives from the New York State Humane Society of the United States, New York State Humane Association, Ulster County SPCA, For Paws of Ulster, Inc. and many other area animal protection advocates. The initiative, which has several components, builds upon the success of both the very popular county-wide Dog Park which opened in New Paltz this past summer and the important anti-tethering law that the County Executive signed in December to provide law enforcement important additional tools to protect animals in danger.

This community oriented initiative contains several components:

A Domestic Violence Shelter/Safe Boarding Plan - to assist victims of domestic violence to ensure their pets' safety when they leave abusive situations;

o An Animal Abuse Registry - to inform citizens if an individual has been convicted of animal abuse is residing in their neighborhood;

 A Humane Feral Cat Program - to reduce the exposure to either rabies or other serious diseases through a trap, neuter, return (TNR) approach to reduce the growth of the feral cat population; and

 An Animal Abuse Prevention Advisory Task Force - to assist and advise the County Executive on matters pertaining to animal protection issues in Ulster County.

Shelter/Safe Boarding

An agreement with Family of Woodstock will allow victims of domestic violence to leave an abusive situation without leaving their pet behind. Under the agreement, a victim of domestic violence will be able to find assistance at a safe, professionally staffed domestic violence shelter and their pet will also have a safe place to stay. Unfortunately, an abuser will often use the family pet as leverage, and so many victims of domestic violence will not leave an abusive relationship because they do not want to leave their pet behind and fear for its safety.

"No one should feel trapped and unable to escape an unsafe environment because they fear for their family pets or be forced to abandon them," said County Executive Mike Hein. "This agreement with Family of Woodstock provides a real choice and a safe place for both people and pets. I want to thank Michael Berg, the Executive Director of Family of Woodstock, for his partnership."

Animal Abuse Registry

The County Executive has called for the creation of a county-wide Animal Abuse Registry. The registry will list individuals who have been convicted of various forms of animal abuse and will serve as an important tool to prevent an individual from committing future acts of abuse. Additionally, since numerous studies and research have demonstrated a likelihood that a person who commits animal abuse will also engage in other forms of abuse, the registry will be a resource for law enforcement, other professionals and the public.

Humane Feral Cat Program

Ulster County will also contract with the Ulster County SPCA and begin a program aimed at humanely controlling the growth of feral cat colonies in communities through trap, neuter and return (TNR). The program will humanely address the issue by instituting a spaying/neutering campaign.

Animal Abuse Prevention Advisory Task Force

The County Executive also formed the Animal Abuse Prevention Advisory Task Force, to be chaired by local veterinarian Dr. Beth Alden who directs and oversees SUNY Ulster's veterinary technology program. The members of the County Executive's Animal Abuse Prevention Advisory Task Force are: Dr. Beth Alden; Brian Shapiro, Director, New York State Humane Society of the United States; Adam Saunders, Executive Director of the Ulster County SPCA; Christine DeBoer and Marion DuBois, Boardmembers of For Paws of Ulster, Inc.; Merle Borenstein, animal protection advocate; Pat Valusek, New York State Humane Association; Jill Shufeldt, Town of Rochester Animal Control Officer; and Kirsti Gholson, community advocate.

"I am proud to work with a team of caring professionals to shield animals from abuse and take critical steps to make our community a better place for everyone. Due to the various components of this initiative it is critical that each is thoughtfully developed and successfully implemented, which is why we have assembled a group of caring experts for assistance and advice," continued County Executive Hein. "It is this type of community involvement which is invaluable in the process and ensures that government simply gets it right, and I look forward to working with the Ulster County Legislature to complete a comprehensive program."

Sullivan County Sheriff Mike Schiff Thanks all who Helped Coordinate the Dissemination of the Amber Alert

On Tuesday March 17, 2015, a warrant was issued for Alfred Franklin, Jr., 30 and Tina Esquilin, 27 by Sullivan County Family Court. The pair had missed a scheduled court appearance concerning four children that were in their custody. Esquilin is the mother of all four children, Franklin is the father of only one child..

A court order was then issued by Sullivan County Family Court removing custody of the children from the suspects due to a history of child neglect, violent behavior and substance abuse.

On Wednesday March 18, 2015 the Sullivan County Sheriff's Office issued an "Amber Alert" regarding the four children after it was discovered that they were taken from their home in Monticello. Information was developed that the two suspects may have been be en route to North Carolina or Florida with the children.

On Thursday Morning, March 19, 2015, Sheriff's Deputies began receiving numerous tips from the Amber Alert system. At about 10:00 AM, Deputies located the four children at a residence in the Town of Cochecton. The house belonged to their Great Grandmother. Their ages are 6 months, 2 years, 4 years and 5 years old.

At around the same time, Sheriff's Deputies and the Monticello Police located the two suspects at the Horizons Housing complex on West Broadway in Monticello. They were taken into custody without inci-

The suspects was arraigned in Family Court later that afternoon (3/19/15).

Sheriff Mike Schiff thanked the New York State Police and the New York Intelligence Center who helped coordinate the dissemination of the Amber Alter. "The system worked incredibly well", said the Sheriff. "We had quality, real time information that helped us quickly close this case".



Calls on local visual artists to join this popular surrealist parlor game turned art exhibition, bringing diverse artists and ideas together in the Catskills

Livingston Manor - Ellie Ohiso and Akira Ohiso, the names behind popular social projects such as Green Door Magazine, have partnered with the Catskill Art Society (CAS) to launch an interactive exhibition this Summer that includes an open call to visual artists to participate in a parlor game turned art exhibition entitled Exquisite Corpse of the Catskills.

ICYMI:VICE Backs Gillibrand's Paid Leave Bill

In an op-ed published on Medium this afternoon, VICE Chief Operating Officer and former White House Deputy Chief of Staff Alyssa Mastromonaco backed Senator Kirsten Gillibrand's paid family and sick leave proposal. VICE, a growing and renowned New York-based media company, is among the leading businesses and organizations that endorse Gillibrand's federal paid leave including Google/YouTube, Morgan Stanley and the Small Business Majority.

Mastromonaco wrote that employees without paid leave are, "Left to choose between raising your kids and being able to afford them. That's a pretty shabby choice to have to make."

Here's more:

"The United States is the only developed country in the world that doesn't guarantee paid family leave for its work-

"For our part, Vice offers paid leave for medical disability, for women having children, for new fathers, and for employees caring for an immediate family member who's ill... But it isn't good enough that we're leaving this up to individual companies. Nationally, only 13 percent of American workers have access to paid family leave from their employers. A federal law on the books requires companies with more than 50 employees to offer 12 weeks of unpaid leave for new parents-basically, your boss can't fire you taking off work to be with your newborn, but he doesn't have

to pay you a dime while you're gone...
"Later today, Senator Kirsten Gillibrand will be introducing a bill to fix this problem on the national level. Under the FAMILY Act, as it's called, employees and employers would both make small, regular contributions to a federal trust fund that would, in turn, pay out benefits to workers taking leave. Workers would be able to take advantage of paid leave whether they're male or female, self-employed or employed at a company-and whether they're taking leave to care for themselves, for a family member, or for a new baby.

Gillibrand's Family and Medical Insurance Leave (FAMILY) Act would establish a national, gender-neutral paid leave program to ensure that American workers would no longer have to choose between their paycheck and caring for themselves or their family. It will be

introduced later today.

"This is a problem that impacts everything from businesses to hospitals and schools, and we

need to make a bold investment to change that and ensure every New Yorker has fast, reliable Internet access. By implementing this proposal we can lay the foundation for a stronger and more competitive New York years into the future, so let's start making broadband for all a reality this year."

"Connecting all New Yorkers to broadband is the single most important step that we can take to ensure New York's future," said Rachel Haot, Deputy Secretary for Technology. "Already, Governor Cuomo has committed more to New York's connectivity infrastructure than any other state in history. The New NY Broadband Program will help us fulfill the greatest infrastructure need of our age, and Governor Cuomo's visionary plan will ensure New York's economic, education, health and safety success for not just years but generations to come

Broadband refers to wide bandwidth data transmission, and this technology enables the fastest, most reliable Internet access service available today. One of the most transformative innovations of the current era, investing in broadband infrastructure is on par with technological breakthroughs such as running water, electricity and the interstate highway system. Broadband is overwhelmingly important to a myriad of tasks in the 21st century, from banking to schoolwork to telemedicine and business operations yet too many households and organizations across the state lack sufficient access.

o Western New York: Allegany, Cattaraugus and Chautauqua Counties

The Facts: o Today, 55,000 businesses and more than 5.4 million New Yorkers - more than 25 percent of the State's population - lack broadband access, defined by the Federal Communications Commission as 25 megabits per second (Mbps).

o More than 2,000 of New York's public schools report speeds lower than the recommended minimum capacity of 100 Mbps. Nearly 500 public schools have no

broadband service at all. o Internet usage by consumers and businesses has more than tripled on a per user basis over the past five years, and growth is projected to continue.

o In fact, in 2018, the average American Internet household will generate 139 percent more Internet traffic per month compared to today.

o Regardless of industry, broadband is considered responsible for 43 percent of all new jobs created by businesses since 2013.

o Across the United States, the number of Internet users grew from more than 122 million in 2000 to nearly 280 million in 2014. Viewed as a percentage of the national population, Internet users now account for roughly 84 percent of the American people, compared to just 43 percent in 2000.

o Nationwide, the amount of annual ecommerce sales from web-only merchants ballooned from approximately \$9.72 billion in 2003 to nearly \$106 billion in 2013.

Broadband has changed the world, but today the United States is falling behind on the global stage. Building on Governor Cuomo's unparalleled commitments to date, New York State must make significant investments in its broadband infrastructure in order to be competitive in education, healthcare, the economy, public safety, communications, tourism and overall quality of life in the immediate term and for generations to come.

The Plan: Universal Broadband

Access by the End of 2018

To accomplish this, Governor Cuomo will invest \$500 million to jumpstart the New NY Broadband Program utilizing capital funds from bank settlements to incentivize the private sector to expand high-speed broadband access in underserved and unserved areas. Broadband providers and communities will utilize this funding to deliver service in a given area, and must adhere to the following qualifications:

 Matching private-sector investments. Broadband providers will contribute, on average, at least 50 percent of the capital needed, which will push the size of the program above \$1 billion. The State's investment will serve to stimulate competition in the broadband market where none or little exists; improving affordability and quality of service. Unprecedented broadband speed. Broadband providers must provide Internet access rates of at least 100 Mbps, with funding priority given to those delivering the highest speeds at the lowest cost. In certain limited cases, providers may offer 25 Mbps rates to the exceptionally remote unserved and underserved areas of the state (more than three times the current standard) scalable to 100 Mbps or more - if this provides the best means of achieving universal broadband access to the

o Local input to guide development. Building on the successful Connect NY model, each Regional Economic Development Council (REDC) will submit a comprehensive plan to the State that: 1) identifies unserved and underserved areas; 2) aggregates demand across residential, institutional and business sectors; 3) details the most cost-effective means to provide universal access; and 4) leverages state-owned assets where possible.

CSEA message to New York state drivers: "Don't Zone Out" This Week is National Work Zone Awareness Safety week

With the roadwork season nearly upon us, scores of CSEA members will be out on roads, bridges and highways repairing the damage inflicted during the brutal winter months. These men and women are at serious risk for injury or death at the hands of drivers who ignore the law and blast through work zones unaware that lives are at stake, including their own.

March 23-27 is National Work Zone Awareness Week. There is no better time to remind motorists about the dangers of distracted driving and driving carefully through work zones.

Distracted driving is a serious problem and for CSEA, it's personal. Too many road workers lose their lives or are injured each year. Since recordkeeping began in 1983, nearly 50 CSEA members have lost their lives on the job in highway work zones. These incidents are not only tragic,

they are preventable.

"In an instant, distracted driving can kill and change lives forever," said CSEA President Danny Donohue. "Keep in mind that most traffic zone deaths and injuries involve the traveling public; so when you pay attention, the life you save may be your own." CSEA is promoting its Don't Zone Out message through a variety of traditional and social media channels and is also working with minor league baseball teams in New York to get the word out throughout the season again. CSEA has had great success reaching hundreds of thousands of people with our safety message.

Since CSEA's "Don't Zone Out" campaign began in 2010, many other awareness campaigns across the country have also been established. As a result, distracted driving related deaths and injuries were dramatically decreased. Nationwide, in 2009 distracted driving reportedly killed almost 6,000 people. In 2012 (most recent statistic on record), the number fell to 3,000 deaths, but the message must always be reinforced.

CSEA is also reminding drivers about the state's "move over law." Nearly three years ago, CSEA successfully supported an amendment to the state "move over law" to include road workers. Motorists are required, when possible, to change lanes when they approach an incident where there is a vehicle with flashing red lights (such as police or fire) but also for amber lights (road workers) as well. When it is not possible to move over or there is only one lane, drivers must slow down. The penalty is a moving violation, can carry penalties of 5 points on your license, up to \$400 fine plus court surcharges and a possible jail sentence. WHAT THE PUBLIC CAN DO:

Move over for amber lights, or police lights; Obey posted speed limits; Put the phone down and drive;

Never send or read text messages while driving; In work zones, focus only on your driving; If someone calls you while you're driving, ignore it; Help spread the word; Join the Don't Zone Out Facebook community and help build awareness: www.facebook.com/DontZoneOut

Cahill Appointed to Joint Budget Subcommittee on Health (Albany, NY) - Assemblymember Kevin A. Cahill (D-Ulster, Dutchess) was appointed last week by Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie and Ways and Means Chair Herman D. Farrell, Jr. to serve on the Health Joint Budget Subcommittee.

The Joint Budget Conference Subcommittees are intended to provide public transparency of the budgetary process. The bi-partisan panels include representatives from each house who have a wealth of experience in their subcommittee area and are charged with the task of negotiating specific provisions within our state spending plan.

"I am honored to have been selected again to help lead health deliberations this year," said Assemblymember Cahill. "As both Chair of the Assembly Standing Committee on Insurance and longtime member of the Assembly Standing Committee on Health, I am well aware of the importance of this section of the budget and its great impact on the well-being of citizens across the state.'

The Health Subcommittee, cochaired by Assemblymember Richard Gottfried, (D-Chelsea) and Senator Kemp Hannon, (R-Nassau) met for the first time last night. They outlined a plan for negotiations that focuses on the New York State of Health Benefit Exchange, Medicaid redesign efforts, ensuring a smooth transition to managed care, prescriber prevails, prescription drug pricing and reimbursement and the Spinal Cord Injury Research Program. Health continues to account for the single largest part of the state budget, with Medicaid appropriations alone making up approximately 40% of total spending. The panel will be meeting several times over the next two weeks to discuss these and other aspects of the health portion of the state budget.

"I look forward to working with my colleagues in the legislature to foster meaningful debate and craft legislation that will appropriate adequate and fair funding to every facet of the healthcare system in New York State," concluded




