That day my friend Ereline and I were down in Koons Bros.' cow pasture picking and eating black cherries from the tree which grew on the bank overlooking the road, when we spied the convoy coming from the direction of Livingston Manor - team after team of mules, each team drawing a huge piece of machinery. We stood spell-bound and just watched until the last one went on up the road and disappeared from sight. And then we hurried up to the post office to tell my Dad what we had seen.

He looked at us, smiling, and said we must have witnessed a mirage, but then went on telling us Reese Sheriff Lumber from Williamsport, Company Pennsylvania, had recently bought a large tract of timber land just above Orchard Lake, and they were moving in along with their supplies that day to set up a sawmill, which they did. Issac Southard was the company's representative who became director of operations at the mill. He along with his wife and daughter joined our little church in Grooville. Mr. Southard and his daughter organized a church choir. She sang like a bird and played our church organ beautifully, and he had the nicest tenor voice I think I ever had the pleasure of listening to. As for me, I had the opportunity of singing with the choir.

Bloodroot: A beautiful Spring Flower with Many Names

Bloodroot, a native plant that blooms in early spring is so much more

than meets the eye. Before blooming, it looks like a simple, leafy plant. But when spring comes, before the leaves are on the trees, bloodroot erupts with pollen-rich white flowers.

Bloodroot (Sanguinaria Canadensis), a perennial herbaceous flowering plant is native to eastern North America. It is a member of the poppy family. The delicate, white flowers open and set seed in early spring. The large, scalloped leaves remain throughout the sum-



mer. The common name refers to the acrid red sap found throughout the plant.

Bloodroot is also known as Bloodwort, Coon Root, Indian Plant, Indian Red Paint, Pauson, Red Puccoon, Red Root, Sang-Dragon, Sang de Dragon, Sanguinaire, Sanguinaria, Sanguinaria canadensis, Snakebite, Sweet Slumber, and quite a few other names, too.

Bloodroot grows from approximately 7 inches up to 20 inches tall. It has one large basal leaf that measures about 4 1/2 inches across, with five to nine lobes. The leaves and flowers sprout from a reddish rhizome that grows at or slightly below the soil surface. The rhizomes grow longer each year, and branch to form colonies. After blooming the leaves expand to their full size and become dormant in mid to late summer

The flowers bloom from March to May depending on the region and weather. They have 8-12 delicate white petals, yellow stamens, and two sepals below the petals, which fall off after the flowers open. The flower stems are clasped by the leaves. The flowers produce pollen, but no nectar. Various bees and flies visit the flowers looking for nectar. Some types of flies and bees visit the flowers to collect pollen. Bees are the most effective pollinators.

The bloodroot has an interesting way of reproducing. After the plant is pollinated, seed pods will develop under the leaves and then split open and scatter seeds containing a food.

Bloodroot is one of many plants whose seeds are spread by ants by way of a process called myrmecochory. The seeds have a fleshy organ called an elaiosome that attracts ants. The ants take the seeds to their nest, where they eat the elaiosomes, and put the seeds in their nest debris, where they are protected until they germinate. The plants benefit from growing in soil made richer by the ant nest debris.

Bloodroot plants are found growing in moist to dry woods and thickets, often on flood plains and near shores or streams on slopes

A break in the surface of the plant, especially the roots, reveals the reddish sap.

This sap was a popular red natural dye used by the Native Americans

, especially when making baskets, arrowshafts. and clothing.

Perhaps it is better to admire the pretty little Bloodroot right where it is growing rather than in a little vase on your coffee table as the alkaloid-laden red latex sap is poisonous and can cause skin irritation. If you happen to spot a flowering bloodroot in the wild, make sure to take a moment to admire its beauty and its versatility!

Cheater's Game Mysterious Book Report No. 404

A series of fortunate events brought our attention this week, to an awesome crime fiction novelist and master of the thriller genre. His work is inspired, captivating and totally entertaining as he weaves a complex plot together in such an electrifying manner that the reader just can't put the book down. If you're craving an intricate, well-plotted suspense novel full of twists and turns that makes you think, South African author Deon Myer has everything you're looking for. His newest, The Last Hunt, (Grove Atlantic, \$27.00, 374 pages, ISBN 978-0-8021-5692-1) is his thirteenth, and most powerful novel to date, because it deals with political corruption at the national level and the

kleptocracy which accompanies it.

The story begins when a cold case file is given to Captain Benny Griessel and his partner, Captain Vaughan Cupido of the Serious and Violent Crimes Unit of the South African Police Force. It's an elite group of criminologists, known simply as 'The Hawks.' When Cupido asks, "Why are we being tasked with something like this?" The answer is succinct: "Because we are

the best . . ." The Hawks are also the least corrupted, or 'captured' as the ones on the take are called. That's important. Because the cold case murder of a private detective named Johnson Johnson on The Rovos the world's most luxurious train, as it journeys from Cape Town to Pretoria is just the beginning of what turns out to be a deep dive into murder, political intrigue and the awakening of an entire nation to the notion that the ideals which sparked a revolution and set them free from apartheid has been hijacked and sold out for greed.

At the same time that Griessel, Vaughan and the Hawks are trying to sort out the Johnson Johnson murder, a fifty-five year old South African man named Daniel Darret is living quietly in Bordeaux, France. He's working as a humble tradesman, apprenticing to a master antique restorer, trying to leave the revolutionary life he once led behind, and live out his days in quiet peace. Then, out of the blue, a comrade from Daniel's old life reappears and begs him to do one last job, using his special skill set to strike back at a corrupt regime.

Daniel Darret's decision and his actions will then collide with Benny Griessel and Vaughan Cupido's murder investigation and leads to a stunning, electrifying and shattering conclusion that will leave the reader gasping for their next breath!


Deon Myer's works have been translated into twenty-seven languages, several TV and movie dramas, and a truckload

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



just plain common sense, the plan to buy used, or to repair, and to repurpose the old spurs me to go on a fight against planned obsolescence and our "throw-away" abundance.

Thrift shops are a treasure trove of gently used or unloved items. At a fraction of the cost, one can look like a fashion plate by spotting upscale labels and new items that were rejected because someone deemed them the wrong color, a size too big or too small, a tad uncomfortable, or just un-flattering.

Our library and many other sites offer Repair Cafes. Many items can be fixed with a wrench, a screwdriver, or a replacement battery. Duct tape, WD-40, and tacky glue are essentials in my home.

Yard sales and on-line market places offer free and inexpensive household items. Someone's excess might just be what you need right now. Also shop "side of the road" giveaways that people put curbside, or in our case, roadside. My father used to cruise the neighborhood on garbage day and bring us treasures. It inspired him to get his Antique Dealer's license. Many of my crystal, silver, and china heirlooms came from someone's discard.

Buy misfits. A refrigerator with a dent or scratch that will not show against a wall might save you hundreds.

Pass on that book you enjoyed. Double a recipe and share it.

Buy bulk as long as you can use it all. Freeze small portions or cook three recipes from a whole chicken or the bulk package of ground beef.

One of my favorite ways to buy used is to visit the Town of Olive, and many other, transfer stations, commonly know as the dump, where there is a "give-away" section. I scored a brand new Shark Vacuum that had a stuck power button. A little WD-40 and a hammer fixed that! Two of my friends have dubbed the donation pile "the Olive Home Redecorating Center" and "the Bushkill Boutique."

Lastly, repurpose. i have a silver-plate pitcher that just collected dust until it became the toilet brush holder. An odd creamer that lost its mate, the sugar bowl, became the perfect size for spring flowers like violets and lily of the valley.

My grandmother's voice echoes with, "Make Do." "Use it all up." "Fix it." "Find a new use." "Share." "Waste not; want not."

Okay—now on to my book pick of the week. I read a lot (lots of different genres and types) but also a decent amount of YA. That's young adult for anyone unfamiliar. Typically, books fall into the YA category if their main characters are teenagers and the plot is appropriate for readers 12-18 years old. Anyways, this week I have fallen head-over-heals in love with a new to me YA series. It's called *The Rule of Three* by Eric Walters. The first book, The Rule of Three, was published in 2014 and there are a total of four in the series. It's the best kind of "post-apocalyptical" story as it's full of angst, worry, trepidation...but also with a full cast of hopeful characters who are trying to survive. I don't like to be a plot spoiler, but I do want to say that this book makes you think. So in the story, anything that runs on a modern computer—cars, planes, cell phones, cash registers, etc. stops working abruptly. No one knows why or for how long but after a few days things start to go awry...and the plot takes off.

And while I'm reading this book, I'm talking to my family about what we would do in that situation. Would we have enough food in our pantry to make it? How would we communicate with our family who lives further away? If we were separated when everything stopped working, would we all know to move independently towards home? And all of that doesn't take into account what the characters in The Rule of Three are now facing as I've read more of the book—they're trying to protect their neighborhood from others trying to take their resources. What moral lines will be crossed when their situation lasts longer than three weeks, longer than three months? And would that be something to consider if it were to really happen. While of course, this story is fictional, it's just so plausible that it really makes you think. It's a great read so far and I hope others will check it out.

Internationally-collected artist, Lisa Lebofsky, will give an Artist's Talk on Saturday, 1 PM, May 3rd, at the Liberty Museum & Arts Center at 46 South Main Street in Liberty, NY.



Lebofsky is a nomadic plein air painter, collaborating with nature and people. She paints the susceptibility of nature, correlating its restlessness with our own human vulnerabilities. Her direct participation with the landscape is vital to imbue a painting

with the energy of a specific place, so that viewers can connect viscerally: to move, excite and engage them. The paintings are on surfaces that remain visible through various layers of paint, permeating the entire image. The push and pull of lights and darks, opacity and transparency, abstract and real, enhances the variability of these transient scenes. By painting in this dichotomous manner, nature becomes a metaphor for our emotional struggles and encounters.

Lebofsky finds inspiration by traveling extensively, often to remote parts of the world, in order to immerse herself in different environments and cultures. She seeks out areas around the globe that are particularly susceptible to the impacts of climate change, and meets with local residents to discuss how their community is impacted. To a great extent, these personal interactions inform what areas and what subject matter is ultimately painted. Recent regions visited include Antarctica, Newfoundland and Labrador, Greenland, and The Maldives.

Currently, Lisa is in the midst of a multi-year mission to travel around North America painting en plein air, to better know the changes happening in our environment and the people it is affecting.

The doors open at noon. The talk is part of the Grand Opening weekend for the Museum's Second Invitational Art Show, inaugurating the Museum's 2025 season. Admission is free.



DEC Announces Opening Day for Many Popular Coolwater Fish Species

Walleye, Northern Pike, Pickerel, and Tiger Muskellunge Fishing Season Begins May 1 Abundant Angling Opportunities for New Yorkers to 'Get Offline, Get Outside'

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Acting Commissioner Amanda Lefton today announced the fishing season for Walleye, Northern Pike, Pickerel, and Tiger Muskellunge begins on May 1. New York's coolwater fish species provide excellent fishing opportunities for anglers of all ability levels.

"Fishing is a great way to get outside and enjoy nature, and New Yorkers are fortunate to have such a large variety of popular sportfish to choose from in the state's abundant waterways," said Acting Commissioner Lefton. "I encourage all anglers to enjoy the great fishing that can be found here in New York and share the fun

with others, especially those new to the sport."

Anglers looking for walleye should not have to go far to find high quality fishing opportunities. Walleye occur in more than 140 waters and in every major watershed in New York State. Information on fishing locations for walleye can be found on DEC's website. Early to mid-spring can be particularly good for walleye fishing. Walleye are aggressive post-spawn feeders and can often be found in relatively shallow water near spawning locations this time of year. Typical gear used for walleye fishing includes spinning or baitcasting reels, medium weight rods, and monofilament or fluorocarbon line. Reliable baits include artificial lures, live baits, or both. Jigs, crankbaits, stickbaits, and live bait harnesses can all be effective. More information on fishing for walleye can be found on DEC's website.

Spring is also one of the best times to fish for northern pike. Northerns move into shallow tributaries, bays, and wetlands in early spring to spawn, typically just after ice-out. After spawning, these fish tend to stay near these shallow water areas and feed aggressively before returning to deeper water areas for the summer. Pike fishing gear typically includes a medium heavy rod and a spinning or baitcasting reel with monofilament or braided line used with a steel or heavy fluorocarbon leader. Casting swimbaits, crankbaits, spinnerbaits, and spoons along and around structures works well in the spring.

Although smaller than pike, pickerel can be relatively easy to catch and provide anglers with some great action when they are on the bite. Lures used for pickerel are similar to

those used for pike, but usually smaller in size.

Tiger Muskellunge, which is a cross between a Northern pike and muskellunge, can grow appreciably large. These fish are stocked by DEC at select waterbodies to provide anglers the opportunity to enjoy targeting big, hard-fighting fish.

For information on fishing destinations for northern pike and other esocids such as chain pickerel and tiger muskellunge see: Musky, Pike, Tiger Musky, and Pickerel Fishing Opportunities.

DEC offers a host of resources for those interested in getting started in fishing. Anglers are encouraged to check out DEC's 'Tackle Box' feature in the HuntFishNY App, which provides anglers one-stop shopping for waterbody-specific information on fishing regulations and fishing/boating access sites. 2025 Freshwater Fishing Regulations Guide

A digital version of the new guide is available to down-

load on DEC's website. Hard copies of the guide are available wherever sporting licenses are sold. For locations, visit DEC's website.

To help make fishing more affordable and help inspire the next generation of anglers, DEC partners with libraries across the state to provide a free fishing rod lending program. In addition to borrowing a book, patrons at participating libraries can sign out a fishing rod. This affordable opportunity for people to try fishing before purchasing their own gear supports Governor Hochul's "Get Offline, Get Outside" initiative, to promote physical and mental health by helping New York's kids and families to put down their phones and computers, take a break from social media, and enjoy recreation and outdoor social gatherings. DEC Announces Opening of Spring Turkey Season May 1 Youth Turkey Hunt Scheduled for April 26-27

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Acting Commissioner Amanda Lefton today announced that the regular spring turkey season for all licensed turkey hunters opens May 1 throughout upstate New York (north of the Bronx-Westchester County boundary) and in Suffolk County on Long Island. DEC is also holding a Youth Turkey Hunting Season in advance of the regular season this Saturday, April 26, and Sunday, April 27.

"Engaging youth hunters and their adult mentors is an opportunity to instill safety, responsibility, ethics, and an appreciation for the outdoors in the next generation of hunters," Acting Commissioner Lefton said. "Guided by experienced mentors, young hunters can gain hands-on skills while enjoying the challenge and excitement that turkey hunting offers."

Eligible hunters for the Youth Turkey Hunt weekend are 12 to 15 years of age who hold a hunting license and a turkey permit. All youth hunters must be accompanied by an adult, as required by law for a junior hunter. Some conservation organizations host specific events during the Youth Hunt weekend. Each youth hunter can harvest one bearded bird during the two-day season. For more information, visit the DEC website.

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Regular Season Opens May 1

New York is home to some of the best turkey hunting opportunities in the Northeast, with diverse landscapes and abundant turkey populations across the state. From hardwood forests and rolling hills in the Southern Tier, to agricultural fields and mixed woodlands in the Hudson Valley, hunters can find prime turkey habitat throughout New York. (Contd. (From Pg. 39)Spring turkey harvests in New York average 16,000 to 18,000 birds, fluctuating based on participation and turkey productivity in previous breeding seasons. With improved summer poult production in recent years, DEC expects an increase in turkey harvest this spring. Since hunters primarily target toms (2+ year-old birds), turkey harvest often reflects productivity trends from two years prior.

Although New York turkey populations experienced declines from their peak in the early 2000s, populations are generally stable statewide. DEC continues to monitor population trends and implement conservation efforts to support sustainable hunting opportunities. Hunters play an essential role in monitoring populations by reporting their harvest and participating in DEC hunter opinion surveys. These efforts help DEC assess population dynamics, hunter participation, hunter values, and help ensure sustainable turkey populations for the future.


Other Important Details for the Spring Turkey Season, May 1-31, 2025:

- o Hunting is permitted in most areas of the state, except for New York City and Nassau County;
- o Hunters must have a turkey hunting permit in addition to their hunting license;
- o Shooting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise to noon each day;
- o Hunters may take two bearded turkeys during the spring season, but only one bird per day and no more than one bird per season in Wildlife Management Unit 1C (Suffolk County);
- o Hunters may not use rifles or handguns firing a bullet. Hunters may hunt with a shotgun or handgun loaded with shot sizes no larger than No. 2 or smaller than No. 9, or with a bow or crossbow (except crossbows may not be used in Westchester or Suffolk counties);
- o Successful hunters must fill out the tag that comes with their turkey permit and immediately attach it to any turkey harvested;
- o Successful hunters must report their harvest within seven days of taking a bird. Call 1-866-426-3778 (1-866 GAMERPT) or report harvest online at DEC's Game Harvest Reporting webpage; and
- o For more information about turkey hunting in New York, see the 2024-25 Hunting and Trapping Regulations Guide or visit the "Turkey Hunting" pages of DEC's website.

Tips for a Successful and Safe Turkey Hunting Season

Turkey hunting is safe and it is important that hunters remain vigilant to keep it that way.

- o Don't stalk. More than half of turkey hunting injuries happen when one hunter stalks another.
- o Always assume any call or footsteps you hear are from another hunter. Don't shoot until you clearly see the whole turkey and know its sex.
- o If you see another hunter, talk to him or her clearly, and don't move. Never wave or use a turkey call to alert another hunter.
- o When calling, sit still with your back against a big tree, to hide you from turkeys and stalkers.
- o Never wear turkey colors-red, white, or blue. Wear hunter orange when going in or out of the woods and when walking around. When sitting still waiting for a turkey, put hunter orange on a tree near you.
- o If you take a turkey or carry a decoy, wrap it in hunter orange.
- o Turkeys are tough. You need to be close (30 yards or less is best). You need to get a clear head and neck shot. Do not try to shoot them in the body or when they are flying.
- o Smaller shot, no. 4, 5, and 6, work better than larger shot, due to denser shot patterns. New shotshell technologies allow for shot sizes as small as 8 and 9 to be effective for turkeys. Do research and pattern your shotgun to learn what works for your setup.

Buy Sporting Licenses Online

Sporting licenses may be purchased online at any time and hunters, anglers, and trappers can immediately print a paper copy of their license at home. Licenses can also be displayed digitally using the HuntFishNY mobile app, available for download on the Apple App and Google Play stores, however a physical valid turkey carcass tag must be carried when hunting turkeys.

If purchasing a hunting license, permit, or privilege online or by phone and you do not have a valid email address and printer, allow up to 14 business days to receive your back tag, carcass tags, and license by mail. Sporting licenses are also available in person at more than 1,100 License Issuing Agents (LIAs) across New York State, where licenses and tags are printed immediately upon purchase. To locate a license vendor, use the LIA location search on DEC's sporting license sales website.

Legislature Appoints Members to Human Rights Commission

Monticello, NY - A majority of Sullivan County legislators this month approved naming the following members to the Human Rights Commission:

- o Joel Santiago, a small business owner from Monticello, former vice president of La Llave del Futuro and advocate through PathStone
- o Ari Mir-Pontier, a Barryville resident and former executive director of the Commission (having also served as a commissioner)
- o Amanda Ward, District 8 Legislator and South Fallsburg native
- o Charles Wade, a local DJ and resident of Wurtsboro
- o Margaret Gans, an energy management consultant from Cochecton with a law degree and 30 years' experience managing affordable housing properties
- o Bill Liblick, a prior member of the Com mission (chairing the Outreach Committee) and longtime advocate for and defender of the rights of the most vulnerable populations (including on national TV), who lives in Swan Lake
- o Ricardo Nieves, a local business owner from Woodridge
- o Miranda Behan, a longtime Hurleyville resident and Fallsburg Town Councilperson
- o Alex Portugal, a Jewish community leader from Monticello

These appointments come on the heels of County Manager Joshua Potosek's appointment of Ramone E. Wilson as the first full-time executive director of the Human Rights Commission.

"The Legislature is intent on having a Human Rights Commission that is relevant and responsive to our community," affirmed Legislature Chair Nadia Rajsz. "Our commitment is reflected by the fact that we aren't required by law to have such a Commission, but we would prefer citizens, nonprofits and businesses have someone local to reach out to - so we've made the necessary investment."

"I am immensely pleased and honored to both serve on the Human Rights Commission and to have spearheaded its rejuvenation," stated District 8 Legislator Amanda Ward. "My father served on the Commission formerly, and its mission is deeply important to me. It is imperative that we offer a conscientious and caring hand to anyone in our community who feels they have been discriminated against, to listen to their concerns, and to address them promptly."

Formed by the Legislature in October 2005, the Human Rights Commission's mission is:

- o To foster mutual respect and understanding in the general population for the rights of all persons in Sullivan County.
- o To encourage equality of treatment for, and discourage discrimination against, a person on the basis of race, creed, color, religion or national origin, gender, age, disability, actual or perceived sexual orientation/preference, marital status, or criminal conviction to the extent provided by Correction Law §752.
- o To inquire into incidents of tension and conflict among or between various racial, religious, and nationality groups, and to act and relieve such tensions.
- o To conduct and recommend programs of education to increase good will among the inhabitants of Sullivan County.
- o To receive complaints of alleged discrimination on the basis of race, creed, color, religion or national origin, gender, age, disability, actual or perceived sexual orientation/preference, marital status, or criminal conviction to the extent provided by Correction Law §752, and attempt to resolve such conflicts through intervention or referral.

The Commission does not have investigatory powers that authority rests with the NYS Division of Human Rights, to which the County's Commission may refer serious cases requiring formal investigation.

The Human Rights Commission has also been tasked with focusing on consumer affairs, mediating and educating about customer/business issues.

Specifically, this bill allows infrastructure projects to opt out of federal National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) reviews in states like New York, where state environmental regulations are stricter than those of the NEPA. This bill will help expedite investments in New York State and lower the duplicative regulatory burdens on these projects.

H.R. 803, the Sergeant Gary Beikirch Medal of Honor Act: This bill would allow a surviving spouse of a Medal of Honor recipient to receive a special pension simultaneously with dependency compensation. No Medal of Honor recipient should have to worry about their spouse's income after they pass. This bill will provide peace of mind to our Medal of Honor recipients and ensure their spouses will always have financial security.

H.R. 2452, the Keep Our Girls Safe Act: This bill prohibits locker rooms from being used by individuals of multiple biological sexes at the same time. The Biden administrations' radical pro-gender mutilation policies required schools to allow biological men in women's locker rooms, putting our children at risk. This bill will ensure that biological men are never allowed to use a women's locker room while biological women are using that space.

GRANTS CORNER: APPLICATIONS OPEN FOR:

FY 2025 Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A)

The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) established the Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) competitive grant program with \$5 billion in appropriated funds over 5 years, 2022-2026. The SS4A program funds regional, local, and Tribal initiatives through grants to prevent roadway fatalities and serious injuries. The SS4A program provides funding for two main types of grants: Planning and Demonstration Grants for Action Plans, including supplemental safety planning and/or safety demonstration activities, and Implementation Grants.

The FY 2025 NOFO substantively differs from the FY 2024 NOFO, be sure to review It closely. The deadline for applications is June 26, 2025, at 5:00 p.m. (EDT)

Municipal Parks and Recreation Grant Program (MPR)

The New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation (OPRHP) is preparing to launch a new grant program to fund the development and improvement of municipal parks and recreation sites. Funds for the MPR Grant Program are provided by the Clean Water, Clean Air, and Green Jobs Environmental Bond Act of 2022.

MPR funding is available for the construction of recreational facilities and other improvements to municipally owned recreation-

al sites and parks. Examples include playgrounds, courts, playing fields, and facilities for swimming, biking, boating, picnicking, hiking, fishing, camping or other recreational activities.

Applications will be available March 19, 2025, through the on-line Consolidated Funding Application with a deadline of May 2, 2025, at 4 p.m.

\$80 Million in Clean Water, Clean Air and Green Jobs Environmental Bond Act Funding Now Available to Support Resiliency Initiatives

Last week, Governor Hochul announced \$80 million in new grant funding available to communities across New York State for climate resiliency projects. The grants, funded through the \$4.2 billion Clean Water, Clean Air and Green Jobs Environmental Bond Act of 2022, will support nature-based and green infrastructure projects designed to reduce flood risk and enhance community resilience to extreme weather.

The three resiliency related grant programs are:

Resilient Watersheds Grant Program: \$45 million will be made available through the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC), building on the success of the Resilient NY program and advancing the State's goal of strengthening infrastructure and protecting New Yorkers from the impacts of extreme weather.

Coastal Rehabilitation and Resilience Projects Program: \$20 million will be made available through the Department of State (DOS) for coastal communities. The program prioritizes projects using nature-based solutions to enhance community resilience while also delivering environmental, economic and social benefits.

Inland Flooding and Local Waterfront Revitalization Implementation Projects Program: \$15 million will be made available through DOS for implementation projects that improve waterfront and watershed resiliency and reduce climate impacts, particularly flooding.

Applications for all three funding opportunities can be submitted through the Consolidated Funding Application (CFA) portal . Applications are due by 4 p.m. on Friday, June 6, 2025.

Drug-Free Communities (DFC) Support Program

The DFC Support Program is the nation's leading effort to mobilize communities to prevent youth substance use. It provides community-based coalitions with up to 10 years of funding to promote positive youth engagement and address the local conditions that drive youth substance use. The grant is a 5-year grant with a maximum award of \$125,000 per year.

CCE Sullivan's FreshRx Program Offers Benefits to Orange County Community Members Who Attend Workshops and Events

ORANGE COUNTY, NY - Spring is here, and the bounty of farmers' market season is close behind! Summer brings so many wonderful opportunities, including the continuation of the FreshRx Produce Prescription Program, provided by Garnet Health in partnership with Cornell Cooperative Extension Sullivan County. This collaborative program, offered to community members in Sullivan and Orange counties, is designed to increase fruit and vegetable consumption and educate community members on how to make impactful lifestyle changes that will lead to improved health.

In Orange County, 9.8% of the population lives with food insecurity. "We know that access to food plays an essential role in living a healthy lifestyle. But those who face food insecurity are often forced to choose between food and other essentials," said Moira Mencher, manager of community health for Garnet Health. "What this grant does is help us reach those in the community facing these challenges, who can benefit not only from educational nutrition programs but also from access to fresh fruits and vegetables."

Eligible recipients will receive \$40 per workshop in FreshRx vouchers, redeemable for fresh fruits and vegetables at participating farmers markets in Orange and Sullivan counties.

To receive the produce vouchers, eligible participants must:

- o Participate in or be eligible for SNAP or Medicaid.
- o Live in Orange or Sullivan County.
- o Participate in Garnet Health's Diabetes Prevention Program or one of the approved nutrition or physical activity classes offered by Cornell Cooperative Extension

The goals of the FreshRx Produce Prescription Program are to:

- o Improve health outcomes in Orange and Sullivan Counties through increased consumption of fresh fruits and vegetables.
- o Reduce individual and household food insecurity.
- o Reduce healthcare use and associated costs.

How the program works:

Eligible participants will be screened for pre-diabetes and offered several paths to improve their health.

If a patient screens positive for pre-diabetes:

- o They will be offered enrollment in the Diabetes Prevention Program. Throughout this year-long program, eligible participants receive vouchers in exchange for produce at local farmers markets or freshly pre-packaged boxes of produce.
- o Patients can also choose to enroll in Cornell Cooperative Extension classes on physical activity and nutrition education and will receive vouchers after the completion of each class.

If patient screens negative for pre-diabetes:

o They can enroll in Cornell Cooperative Extension classes on physical activity and nutrition education and will receive vouchers after completion of each class.



Shortly after the end of the Reform War, Benito Juarez's army is triumphant and enters Mexico City. The few remaining conservatives are exiled or start a guerrilla war. Meanwhile, in Paris, France, a group of Mexican conservatives (José María Gutiérrez de Estrada, José Manuel Hidalgo and Juan Nepomuceno Almonte - illegitimate son of José María Morelos y Pavón) have an audience with Emperor Napoleon III during Don Giovanni's opera, to whom they explain the situation in Mexico. Full of ambition, he decides to send an expedition to Mexico under General Ferdinand Latrille (William Miller), Earl of Lorencez, who gladly accepts the new company. Months later, the representatives of France, Spain and the United Kingdom in London would meet to organize an invasion of Mexican territories.

In January 1862, Juan (Christian Vázquez) and Artemio (Javier Oliván), two lookouts from the port of Veracruz, spotted a large fleet emerging from the fog. It was the Spanish ships from Cuba. Upon learning of the invasion, Mexican troops at the port are quickly withdrawn to regroup on the way to the capital. European troops in Veracruz begin to suffer from black vomit from moisture and relief. Meanwhile, in the capital, President Juarez sends delegate Manuel Doblado to talk to Spanish general Juan Prim (Ginés García Millán), who feels that the invasion itself was not a very good idea. Not so thought the French diplomat Dubois de Saligny (Alvaro García Trujillo), who understood the emperor's entrusting and awaited the arrival of Lorencez. Once in Mexico, Lorencez and Saligny reveal the intentions of marching to the capital along with Gral. Almonte and declare the tripartite alliance broken.

General Ignacio Zaragoza (Kuno Becker) bids farewell to his dying wife while appointed in charge of national defense and left for Orizaba, where he begins to assemble Juarez's army.
