Junebugs are Emerging

While relaxing on the front porch the other day, I saw a June Bug who emerged a little early this year.

There are over species of the genus Phyllophaga Junebugs are named from their annual appearance in June. The adult bugs have begun emerging from the ground for the first time in their lives to live a few weeks flying, feeding on leaves and flowers, repro-

ducing and then dying.

The life cycle begins when a female Junebug constructs an earthen ball 1-6 inches deep among roots for her 50-100 white eggs that will hatch in a couple of weeks. The small larvae or grubs feed slowly on roots for the next 1-3 years, making this development stage one of the longest in the insect world. They undergo three phases between moltings, and molt twice before pupating.

Throughout the U.S. as in the Catskills, this is the most common grub fund when you dig up the ground. It's a plump white C-shape with a brown head and six short legs at the front end. It cannot bite you. If you look closely, you can see tiny breathing holes (spiracles) along both sides of the body. Also notice two rows of tiny stubby bristles down the back for burrowing. This arrangement enables a Junebug grub to wriggle along either upside down or right side up from root to root. Because they eat voraciously, large numbers of grubs can damage lawns and orchards.

By the second summer a grub pupates for several weeks and transforms itself into an adult Junebug that is a little less than one inch in length, dark brown to blackish in color. They have a hard casing and have wings. The top hard wings are made of the same protein as our fingernails. Small platelets overlap like a shingled roof. It is waterproof, frostproof and withstands seven times the radiation found in today's atmosphere. Scientists believe Junebugs have inhabited the Earth for millions of years and have adapted well to the changing environment.

Even after the Junebug has transformed into the adult stage, it will stay underground feeding on roots until late the followingspring when it will emerge and fly off to feed on leaves and find a mate. At mating time, receptive females produce a chemical called pheromone that males find irresistible and can detect fifty feet away. They follow the scent trail straight to the female. Within a week, the mother Junebug deposits her eggs in the ground to begin the 3-year cycle all over again.

Junebugs usually hide during the day and come out at night. They are attracted to lights. It's fun to watch a Junebug prepare to take off. They do so in a very well-planned fashion, unfolding its two pairs of wings in correct sequence. The hard cover tops, protecting its body, are lifted into locked horizontal position, then the soft underneath pair of wings are unfolded for flight, move up and down and zoom! They are airborne! This cumbersome arrangement makes landing somewhat uncontrolled and a bit more clumsy. Junebugs sort of crash land on their target.

To some people Junebugs can become a nuisance - especially at night, when they gather around a porch light. But, by summer all Junebugs will be gone. As Shakespeare said, "The shard-borne chafer (Junebug) sound is heard no more" - and then, maybe we will enjoy some warm summery weather, too.





Bestselling author Dale Brown has just launched a new, edge-of-your-seat military thriller that features a brand-new protagonist with a talent for smartassery, a nose for trouble and enough steel in his character to build a battleship. He's a U.S. Air Force Intelligence and Special Operations Officer whose rank is captain. His name is Nick Flynn, and *Arctic Storm Rising*, (Wm Morrow, \$28.99, 400 pages, ISBN 978-0-06-301504-3), is his coming-out party.

Nick runs afoul of a vindictive and less than competent CIA officer during a rescue mission in the Libyan desert, when the CIA man manages to pin the blame for mission failure on the lower ranking Air Force officer, rather than accepting responsibility for it. As a result, Nick is banished to a remote, early-warning radar station in the northernmost reaches of the Alaskan wilderness and put in charge of a rag-tag band of misfits, drawn from different services. They're not exactly the Dirty Dozen, but they're not exactly Uncle Sam's finest either. Nevertheless, Captain Flynn does his best to turn the lot of them into competent soldiers with the help of the one bright spot amongst his company, an Alaska National Guard First Sergeant who's a native of the state and an expert in cold weather operations.



At the same time, halfway around the world, the Russian Government is preparing for the final test flight of a supersecret, advanced technology stealth bomber, known as the PAK-DA. The bomber, on it's last test flight, and carrying

Moths" to be politically correct.



GRAHAMSVILLE-It all started when a Neversink native, Daniel Pierce, donated funds for the initial construction of our library. While he worked as a local farmer for the first half of his life, it wasn't until later (in his 40's) that he amassed a sizeable fortune in banking and real estate while in the Midwest. For whatever reason-and there are so many good ones-he decided that Grahamsville needed a library. Upon his financial investment, the DPL's charter was signed in 1898, giving rise to the first free library in Sullivan County.

And we've been going full steam ahead ever since.

Through the years, so many in our community have shared of themselves-whether that be through time, services, experience or monies-to uphold our continued promise to our patrons; to be a community hub of knowledge, of partnership, of fellowship in the best sense of the word.

And on Sunday, June 9 from 2PM to 4PM, we are inviting our patrons, friends and families to join us as we celebrate this incredible milestone. There will be a brief sharing of our history and synopsis of our current programs and events, self-guided tours of our beautiful grounds and building and birthday cake! Staff and DPL board of trustees' members will be on hand to answer questions.

Our "Boujee" Bingo tickets are sold out! Thank you to everyone who has purchased one. We are spending the next few days finalizing all of our plans so that our Friday, May 31 bingo will be just as legendary as past games. It's going to be a funfilled evening with so many great prizes!

The Child and Babysitting Safety Course is filling up fast, so if you have a child 11 to 15 years of age interested in starting their own baby-sitting business (especially with summer coming) this is the course for them. Science Cabaret A Night of Neuroscience Lectures and Performance at Farm Arts Collective in collaboration with The Waters Lab at Mt. Sinai NYC

Damascus, PA-- Farm Arts Collective presents a mindbending evening of neuro-science and performance with researchers from the Waters Lab at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mt. Sinai NYC and performers from the Farm Arts Collective community.



The SCCO performers include: Akiko Hosoi - violin, Chiu-Chen Liu - Viola, Kirsten Jermé - Cello, Andrew Trombley - Bass, Marisela Sager - Flute, Matt Sullivan - Oboe, Paul Cho - Clarinet, Joshua Butcher - Basson, and Sara Cyrus - Horn.

SCCO Artistic Director Andrew Trombley said, "The nonet is the perfect blend of timbres and colors, taking the essence of the symphony and presenting it with the intimacy of chamber music is spectacular. Louise Farrenc was a brilliant French composer and a virtuoso pianist and through her Nonet, found international success and received praises from Robert Schumann and Joseph Joachim. This success led her to demand equal pay to her male colleagues at the prestigious Paris Conservatoire. The nonet has also been an inspiration ensemble for various arrangements of performers and composers alike. Lee Hoiby composed his Variations on a theme by Schubert in 1979. Broom County Veteran Named to Senate Veterans' Hall of Fame Senator Oberacker selects Sergeant E-5 Robert L. Fish for Enshrinement



Senator Peter Oberacker (R/C-S c h e n e v u s) announced that Sergeant E-5 Robert L. Fish from Windsor is the 2024 inductee to the New York State Senate Veterans' Hall of Fame from the 51st Senate District.

"Sergeant E-5 Robert L. Fish is a

true patriot, and his service to our nation and his community deserves the highest recognition. It is my esteemed honor to select him as my 2024 inductee into the New York State Senate Veterans' Hall of Fame," said Senator Oberacker. "Robert's contributions, both at home and abroad, epitomize the definition of hero. Along with serving his country, Robert took on a post-military career in law enforcement and has also volunteered with local fire-rescue squads. Throughout his life, Robert has displayed great devotion and commitment to others."

Sergeant E-5 Robert L. Fish has spent his entire adult life in uniform serving with the United States Marine Corps, New York Army National Guard, and New York Air National Guard. His devotion to others has also included a career in law enforcement and time with multiple volunteer fire-rescue squads.

Robert entered service with the U.S. Marine Corps in June of 1997 and after completing training was stationed with the 2nd Battalion 8th Marines which included assignments in Japan and South Korea in support of Operation Freedom and Foal Eagle. Later he served in Panama as part of the security force for the Panama Canal and in Greece for a NATO/ Maritime Pre-Positioning exercise.

Shortly after completing his time with the Marine Corp, the tragic events of September 11, 2001, occurred prompting Robert to join the New York Army National Guard. His deployments included security duty in New York City, direct support of Operation Enduring Freedom 5 in Afghanistan, and over watch security and route clearing for the beginning stages of Afghanistan's National Highway.

Sergeant Fish then enlisted in the New York Air National Guard and was stationed at Stratton ANG Base in Schenectady as an Airport Crash Fire Rescue Fire Fighter. He was activated and stationed in Kuwait in support of Operation Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom.

The highly decorated veteran received numerous awards and honors during his service including Army Commendation Award, Air Force Meritorious Unit Award, Air Force Outstanding Unit Award, Marine Corps Good Conduct Medal, Air Reserve Forces Meritorious Service Medal, National Defense Medal, New York State Conspicuous Service Star, New York State Defense of Liberty Medal, and New York State Meritorious Service Medal.

Following his time with the military, Robert embarked on a 17-year career with the Broome County Sheriff's Office and continues to answer the call to service as a School Resource Officer with the Chenango Forks School District.

"We owe so much to our veterans, starting with our freedoms and our way of life. I commend and thank Sergeant Fish, the rest of the 2024 hall of fame induction class, and all veterans for their service and sacrifice to our nation," added Senator Oberacker.



"Home Life," an exhibition of large-scale paintings in vibrant colors, is inspired by Klebes' experience renting a furnished apartment for a few months from a Hemingway-esque artist man. Taxidermy of a big horned sheep and a boar adorned the walls, alongside a liquor cabinet that concealed a secret room with stained glass and a large bed. An inexplicable sense of ownership and pride enveloped the artist for that apartment. There was a humorous aspect to a queer female and her queer friends inhabiting a space that exuded a cliched masculine aesthetic.

In "Home Life" the artist presents a variety of intimate interior scenes where the figures embody comfort, allowing themselves to be vulnerable - often lost in thought, naked, surrounded by objects and community within den-like environments.

Danielle Klebes lives and works at Wassaic Project in Wassaic, NY. 

"Repossession: The Catskills" by photographer Glenn Lieberman presents a haunting portrayal of

Governor Hochul Meets with Advocates to Highlight Mental Health Resources for Young People and Efforts to Address Harmful Impacts of Social Media

Governor Kathy Hochul met with advocates from the Mental Health Association in New York State (MHANYS) to highlight her ongoing investments in mental health resources for young New Yorkers, including expanded access to innovative youth and teen Mental Health First Aid training programs. The Governor reiterated her commitment to enacting nation-leading legislation addressing online safety and the harmful impacts of social media in the final weeks of the 2024 State Legislative Session.

"We are working closely with mental health advocates and service providers to ensure young New Yorkers have access to the support they need," Governor Hochul said. "But even as we continue making progress, I know we still have more work to do. Meeting with advocates and families across the state has only reinforced my commitment to advance legislation to combat addictive social media feeds and protect kids online."

Today at MHANYS headquarters, Governor Hochul highlighted her investments to support Mental Health First Aid training programs offered by MHANYS and other organizations statewide to enable New Yorkers to assist friends, family or other community members who experience challenges with mental health or substance use. The State Office of Mental Health has provided \$1.5 million to support the organization's youth and teen Mental Health First Aid programs, which offer age-specific training to either adults or teens so they can support young people who may be facing challenges with mental health or addiction.

As part of her discussion with MHANYS leadership, the Governor also continued to hear about the challenges facing young people today due to excessive and unhealthy use of social media. The Governor is focused on advancing two pieces of legislation by the end of the legislative session in June, including the Stop Addictive Feeds Exploitation (SAFE) for Kids Act to restrict the addictive features of social media, and the New York Child Data Protection Act to restrict the collection of minors' personal data by online sites.

This commitment is part of the Governor's broader effort to address the youth mental health crisis and ensure that young people can get the care and resources they need.

Just as physical first aid training such as CPR helps to assist someone having a heart attack, Mental Health First Aid enables New Yorkers to assist friends, family or other community members who experience challenges with mental health or substance use. Youth Mental Health First Aid teaches individuals how to identify, understand and respond to signs of mental health and substance use challenges among children and adolescents between the ages of 12 and 18, while teen Mental Health First Aid focuses on teaching teens between the ages 15 and 18 on how to support a friend or classmate with this evidence-based curriculum.

The work with MHANYS has resulted in the certification of 42 new youth instructors for the youth Mental Health First Aid, with an additional 16 expected to be trained by the end of June and the ability to reach more than 5,000 adults with this curriculum. The organization will have also trained nearly 30 new instructors for the teen Mental Health First Aid curriculum.

OMH is also investing \$200,000 to develop a pilot program to educate 48 trainers in Mental Health First Aid for Higher Education at up to a half dozen college campuses across New York State. These trainers will be able to teach this curriculum to rough-



ly 4,300 others at these colleges, including students, staff and faculty.

Additionally, as part of Governor Hochul's focus on youth mental health, OMH is developing social media resources for youth and caregivers to support young people and the adults in their lives in navigating this modern tool and its effects. These educational resources will include an evidence-based educational series around digital wellness tailored for caregivers, as well as resources for students that cover critical topics such as the risks of social media use, understanding privacy and protecting personal information, and reporting cyberbullying and online abuse and exploitation.

In the FY25 Enacted Budget, Governor Hochul expanded mental health support for children across the state, fulfilling an agenda she outlined in her State of the State address in January. This new state investment provides \$2 million to expand peer-to-peer mental wellness efforts among young people across the state, including training programs like Mental Health First Aid.

The Budget also provides \$20 million in start-up funding for school-based mental health clinics and a rolling application process to expedite these awards, which were previously secured through the state procurement process. This initiative builds on the \$5.1 million in state funding awarded in November to support 137 new school-based clinics -including 82 at high-needs schools -and bringing the total number to more than 1,200 statewide.

Governor Hochul also conducted a state-wide listening tour with young New Yorkers and hosted the first-ever state Summit on Youth Mental Health. Following the June 2023 summit, the state released a Youth Mental Health Listening Tour Report, which highlighted some of the key themes incorporated in the recommendations provided by more than 200 participants statewide.


DEC Announces Muskellunge Fishing Season Openers Season Starts June 1 for Inland Waters and June 15 for Great Lakes Waters

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Interim Commissioner Sean Mahar today announced the fishing seasons for muskellunge begin on June 1 in inland waters and on June 15 in Great Lakes waters-Lake Erie, Upper Niagara River, Lower Niagara River, Lake Ontario, St. Lawrence River, and tributaries to these waters.

"Muskies are a premier freshwater sportfish, and New York has some of the best trophy muskie fishing opportunities anywhere in the world," Interim Commissioner Mahar said. "DEC's fish and wildlife experts have done a remarkable job stewarding our fisheries and we encourage all anglers to take advantage of the high quality fishing opportunities across the state during this upcoming season."

Often referred to as the "fish of 10,000 casts," muskellunge, or "muskies," are considered the ultimate trophy by anglers who pursue them. They are the top predator in waters they inhabit and are legendary in their ability to challenge and confound the angler. It is that challenge, combined with the potential for massive size (sometimes exceeding 50 inches and 50 pounds) and a well-earned reputation as a powerful fighter, that has inspired many anglers to forsake other fish in pursuit of the elusive muskie.

The St. Lawrence River, Upper Niagara River, and Chautauqua Lake are popular hotspots for tro-

phy muskies. Other high-quality muskie waters are Waneta, Greenwood, Bear, and Cassadaga lakes, and the Susquehanna, Chenango, and Great Chazy rivers. In all, there are at least 13 lakes and 19 rivers that have muskellunge populations in New York State. Muskellunge are managed as a trophy fish in New York, reflected by minimum size regulations of 40 inches for inland waters and 54 inches for Great Lakes waters.

The New York State Department of Health (DOH) provides advice to anglers about what fish are safe to eat and how often. Visit DOH's website to search by waterbody location.






Karin is showing her recent photographic "jewels" of nature. They are moments of the unexpected - sur-



Damascus, PA--Farm Arts Collective, based on Willow Wisp Organic Farm will host a Grand Opening and Ribbon Cutting on Sunday June 2nd. The event celebrates the opening of modern new barn on the farm that provides a permanent home for Farm Arts Collective

Kowalchuk continues, "We look forward to now being able to expand activity and programs yearround focusing on farming and ecological education as well as artistic pursuits that celebrate and engage community."

The Collective's space in the barn includes a 40-foot by 40foot education and theatre venue, ADA compliant bathrooms, a greenroom, office, and technical areas. The rest of the barn will be utilized by Willow Wisp Organic Farm for daily operations, staff areas, and a shop for equipment maintenance.

Capital Campaign

GRANTS CORNER

APPLICATIONS OPEN FOR:

Funded under the American Rescue Plan (ARP) of 2021, the USDA Resilient Food Systems Infrastructure (RFSI) grant program aims to expand each state's middle-chain capacity and infrastructure for the aggregation, processing, manufacturing, storage, transporting, wholesaling, or distribution of targeted local and regional agricultural food products. Meat, poultry, cannabis, animal food and forage, fiber, and wild caught seafood products are not considered under this program. The application deadline is June 28, 2024 at 5pm.

Our Town is the National Endowment for the Arts' creative placemaking grants program, using arts, culture, and design to strengthen communities and advance local priorities such as health, community development, environment/climate, and public safety, among other community issues and aspirations. Application deadline is August 1, 2024.

Empire State Development's Division of Science, Technology, and Innovation's Innovation Matching Grants (IMG) Program aims to grow small businesses and support the development of new technologies in New York State by providing matching funds for federal Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) and Small Business Technology Transfer (STTR) grants.

The New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation is now accepting applications for the inaugural round of the new Green Resiliency Grant (GRG) program. Governor Kathy Hochul has made at least \$60 million available for green infrastructure projects such as green roofs, green streets, and permeable pavement. The new program will prioritize grants to flood-prone communities for projects that help protect New Yorkers from extreme weather events. Apply by August 16.

The 2024 Clean Heavy-Duty Vehicles Grant Program will support the adoption and deployment of eligible Class 6 and 7 zero-emission vehicles while also funding zero-emission vehicle fueling infrastructure and workforce development and training. Across the nation, over 3 million Class 6 and Class 7 vehicles are currently in use, spanning a wide variety of vehicle types. The program is divided into two, separate, sub-competitions: The School Bus Sub-Program for applicants replacing school buses and the Vocational Vehicles Sub-Program for applicants replacing non-school bus Class 6 and 7 vehicles, including box trucks, dump trucks, street sweepers, delivery trucks utility trucks and more. Apply by July 25.

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is accepting applications on a rolling basis for \$2 billion in Inflation Reduction Act funding available through its Community Change Grants Program to support community-driven projects that build capacity for communities to tackle environmental and climate justice challenges, strengthen their climate resilience, and advance clean energy. This opportunity will be available for a year, closing on November 21, 2024, and EPA will review applications on a rolling basis. This allows applicants to utilize technical assistance and possibly resubmit a new application if not initially selected. EPA encourages applicants to apply as early as

possible.

President Raisi, commonly referred to as the Butcher of Tehran for his barbaric treatment of the Iranian people, was killed in a helicopter crash on May 19, 2024. Since the 1980s, Raisi had violently imprisoned, tortured, and killed thousands of anti-regime Iranians, leading to his sanctioning by the U.S. Treasury Department and his addition to the U.S.-designated terrorist list.

Given his history, President Biden's State Department statement expressing condolences for Raisi's death is unjustifiable. Iran and the world are undoubtedly better off without this terrorist, raising serious concerns about why the Biden administration would offer any sympathies for his death. This week, I sent a letter to Secretary Blinken, demanding that the Biden administration explain why they mourn the death of this terrorist, an enemy of both America and the Iranian people.

Transparency in Congress and a well-informed electorate are vital to preserving our self-governing Constitutional Republic. My constituents deserve to know how their members of Congress vote, which is why I have explained every vote I have cast in Congress since I was first elected.

I voted "Yes" on H.R. 5863, the Federal Disaster Tax Relief Act of 2023. H.R. 5863 would provide tax relief to those impacted by certain disasters, including recent hurricanes, wildfires, and the Ohio train derailment. (Contd. Pg 59)

(From Pg. 58) Tax relief would be comprised of exempting compensation for losses from a taxpayer's adjusted gross income (AGI), as well as deducting losses from their AGI without itemizing their tax returns. I urge the Senate to expeditiously take up this legislation which would provide a lifeline to those in Upstate New York impacted by certain disasters. H.R. 5863 pass the House by a vote of 382-7.

I voted "Yes" on H.R. 5403, the CBDC Anti-Surveillance State Act. H.R. 5403 would prohibit the Federal Reserve from issuing a central bank digital currency (CBDC) without congressional authorization. Unelected bureaucrats should not have the power to issue a new currency without input from Congress. A CBDC would pose significant privacy concerns, as its implementation could potentially allow the federal government to track, or even prevent, the purchase of goods by all Americans. We have seen how this has played out in countless other countries throughout the world. Authoritarian regimes such as the Chinese Communist Party have implemented CBDC to impose Orwellian surveillance measures on their citizens. CBDCs fly in the face of the fundamental right to privacy and that is why I was proud to support this bill when it passed the House by a vote of 216-192.

I voted "Yes" on H.R. 4763, the Financial Innovation and Technology for the 21st Century Act. H.R. 4763 creates a framework at the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) and the Commodity Futures Trading Commission (CFTC) to federally regulate digital asset exchanges, crypto assets, and establishes the position that a digital asset itself is not a security, but that it can be offered as part of a securities contract. The current lack of congressional guidance over cryptocurrency has opened the door for Washington bureaucrats to arbitrarily target crypto companies and exchanges. This bill is crucial in establishing a federal structure for cryptocurrency in order to prevent confusion in the industry. H.R. 4763 passed the House by a vote of 279-136.

I voted "Yes" on H.R. 192, To prohibit individuals who are not citizens of the United States from voting in elections in the District of Columbia and to repeal the Local Resident Voting Rights Amendment Act of 2022. H.R. 192 prohibits an individual who is not a U.S. citizen from voting in D.C. local elections and repeals the Local Resident Voting Rights Amendment Act (D.C. Law 24-0242), which allows noncitizens, including illegal immigrants and foreign diplomats, to vote in D.C. local elections. The right to vote is a fundamental tenet of American citizenship and allowing noncitizens to vote dilutes U.S. citizens' power at the ballot box. Further, this D.C. law would allow foreign diplomats and agents living in D.C. to vote in U.S. elections. As chair of the Election Integrity Caucus, I will always fight to protect our elections and ensure that only U.S. citizens can vote. H.R. 192 passed the House by a vote of 262-143.

I voted "Yes" on H.R. 3019, the Federal Prison Oversight Act. H.R. 3019 establishes new independent oversight of the Federal Bureau of Prisons (BOP). Specifically, it directs the U.S. Department of Justice Inspector General to give each BOP facility a risk score, with higher scoring facilities requiring more frequent inspection. This bill will help ensure that staffing shortages and safety issues at federal prisons are promptly addressed to keep our correctional officers and prisoners safe and secure. H.R. 3019 passed the House by a vote of 392-2.



BIPARTISAN FARM BILL ADVANCES TO HOUSE FLOOR WITH RELIEF FOR FARMERS, WORKING FAMILIES, 10 BIPARTISAN MOLINARO BILLS

Washington, DC - U.S. Rep. Marc Molinaro (NY-19) today announced the 2024 Farm Bill was voted out of the House Committee on Agriculture with bipartisan support and will advance to the House Floor. The Farm Bill sets agricultural, food, and nutrition policy in the United States for five years. The 2024 Farm Bill delivers relief for farmers and working families struggling with rising costs and includes ten bipartisan Molinaro-authored bills.

On food and nutrition policy, the bill increases Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits by preserving the program's cost of living adjustment, increases funding for food banks, and enables families to purchase more fruits and vegetables through food assistance programs. It also includes bipartisan Molinaro-authored bills to help food insecure seniors receive healthy meals and allow working individuals with disabilities aged 17 to 21 receive SNAP benefits.

On agricultural policy, the bill includes bipartisan Molinaro-authored bills to strengthen the Dairy Margin Coverage safety net program, increase funding for support services for farm families with disabilities, and deliver more support to organic farmers. Other bills that Rep. Molinaro wrote and got included in the Farm Bill will strengthen flood prevention efforts in rural communities and support workers at National Pipe & Plastics in Endicott.

Rep. Molinaro said, "This Farm Bill includes ten of my bills representing Upstate New York's priorities and passed with bipartisan support. It also increases SNAP, provides more money for food banks, and delivers more support for dairy farmers, specialty crop, organic producers, and farm families with disabilities. As working families and farmers face an affordability crisis, this will deliver much-needed relief."

Rep. Molinaro fought to ensure Upstate New York's priorities were reflected in the 2024 Farm Bill. Since coming to Congress, he has held 11 town hall meetings, three Farm Bill listening sessions, and met with hundreds of farmers, working families, and nutrition advocates in Upstate New York to hear what they want included in the bill.

Dairy Farm Resiliency Act: This bill will strengthen the Dairy Margin Coverage safety net program by insuring more milk production.

Delivering for Rural Seniors Act: This bill will allow seniors living in rural areas, seniors with disabilities, and those with mobility or transportation issues to receive home delivery services from food banks participating in the Commodity Supplemental Food Program. (Contd. Pg 60)

ThinkDIFFERENTLY Nutrition and Opportunities Act: Under current law, students with disabilities are allowed to be in secondary school until they're 21. If a student with disability aged 18 to 21 gets a part time job, their income gets counted for the purposes of SNAP and can result in a reduction of family benefits. This bipartisan bill prevents these working students from losing benefits.

ThinkDIFFERENTLY Agriculture Accessibility Act: This bill reauthorizes and increases funding for AgrAbility, a USDA program that provides funding for support services and assistive technology farmers/farm families with disabilities.

Flooding Prevention, Assessment, and Restoration Act: This bill incentivizes the construction of more resilient flood infrastructure and helps rural communities access federal funding for these projects.

Training and Nutrition Stability Act: This bill exempts income earned from SNAP Education and Training Programs from impacting participants' SNAP benefits. Currently, participants who earn income under these temporary workforce development programs can inadvertently disqualify themselves from SNAP. Organic Dairy Data Collection Act: This bill supports organic dairy farmers in Upstate New York by enhancing data collection at the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), allowing the agency and farmers to better understand the costs associated with producing organic milk.

Food Supply Chain Capacity and Resiliency Act: This bill will lower food costs by providing low-interest loans to businesses investing in food supply chain operations.

The Freight for Farms Act: This bill ensures the USDA Community Facilities Direct Loan & Grant Program includes freight rail infrastructure, so federal funds can be used to increase farmers access to freight rail, which will decrease costs. Leveraging Efficiency Awareness for Pumping Systems (LEAPS) Act: This bill makes efficient pump & irrigation systems more accessible to farmers and will support workers at National Pipe & Plastics in Endicott. Specifically it requires the USDA to update a webpage to offer accessible information on energy efficient pumps, highlighting the benefits of efficient irrigation systems and helping farmers implement these efficient practices.



Welcome to Kirsten's New York Minute! Here's what she's been up to this week:

1. Illegal guns off our streets

Thanks to Kirsten's legislation making gun trafficking a federal crime, this week, another gun trafficking ring in Brooklyn has been dismantled and 79 more illegal guns have been taken off our streets.

2. Funding fire departments

Firefighters risk their lives every day to keep our communi-

ties safe, yet many New York fire departments are facing staffing shortages and using equipment that is over 20 years old. Kirsten is fighting to get firefighters the resources they need.

This week, she announced her push to secure more money for the Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program (AFGP) in this year's government funding process. The AFGP provides local fire departments with funds to upgrade equipment like emergency vehicles and personal protective gear, while also helping to address staffing shortages.

Last year, Kirsten delivered over 200 grants totaling close to \$50 million for New York fire departments, but there is still a need for more funding. She will continue to fight so New York's firefighters have the resources they need to protect our communities

3. Expanding the police workforce

Police departments across New York are facing unprecedented workforce shortages. Kirsten is fighting to secure more resources to support the police workforce and improve public safety.

In Cicero , Irondequoit , and Albany , Kirsten stood with local law enforcement officers to announce her bipartisan Providing Child Care for Police Officers Act . The bill would provide \$24 million in federal funding annually for the next 5 fiscal years to expand child care services for our police officers to accommodate their nontraditional work hours and boost recruitment.

4. Meeting with transportation workers

This week, Kirsten met with members of the Transport Workers Union from across New York State to discuss their priorities and how she is fighting to improve transportation worker safety and increase transportation funding.

5. Honoring a sports legend

Throughout her career, Billie Jean King has been a trailblazer in women's sports and a pioneer for gender equality. This week, Kirsten announced that her legislation to award Billie Jean King the Congressional Gold Medal to honor her lifetime of achievement unanimously passed the Senate. If the bill is passed by the House, King would be the first ever individual woman athlete to be presented with the prestigious award.

6. ATTN: Olean area small businesses

On Monday, June 3rd at 11:00 AM, Kirsten's office will partner with the Olean Business Development Center to host a workshop to discuss opportunities for government support available to small business owners.

Representatives from the Department of Commerce, the Small Business Administration, and the Small Business Development Center (SBDC) at Jamestown Community College will be on hand to discuss their respective resources and funding opportunities.

7. LISTEN: Kirsten on WAMC

Kirsten joined WAMC's Congressional Corner to talk about what she is working on in Washington, including her legislative wins, her efforts to recruit more police officers by providing them with child care, and much more.

8. Helping New York's nonprofits

A sustainability nonprofit organization reached out to Kirsten's office for help when it needed to expedite its request for 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status or risk delays for important project milestones. Kirsten's team contacted the IRS on the nonprofit's behalf, and the organization was promptly granted 501(c)(3) status.

DEC Delivers Banner Stay Connected with Your Environment DEC Forest Rangers Week in Review Recent Statewide Forest Ranger Actions

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Forest Rangers respond to search and rescue incidents statewide. Working with other state agencies, local emergency response organizations, and volunteer search and rescue groups, Forest Rangers locate, and extract lost, injured, or distressed people from across New York State.

In 2023, DEC Forest Rangers conducted 370 search and rescue missions, extinguished 146 wildfires covering nearly 1,400 acres, participated in 52 prescribed fires that served to rejuvenate more than 1,000 acres of land, and worked on cases that resulted in hundreds of tickets and arrests.

"Whether they are leading complex search and rescue incidents, suppressing wildfires, enforcing laws on State lands and easements, inspiring the next generation of environmental stewards, or encouraging responsible recreation, Forest Rangers stand ready to help when called," DEC Interim Commissioner Sean Mahar said. "Forest Rangers' wide-ranging expertise and collaboration with local, State, and federal partners are instrumental in protecting New York's public lands and the many visitors who use them."

Village of Wurtsboro Sullivan County

Accident Response: On May 15 at 2:45 p.m., Forest Ranger Jahn was flagged down by a motorist who had witnessed an accident on Route 209. Ranger Jahn found the subject ejected from a vehicle that had veered off the road and down an embankment. The subject was unresponsive but had a pulse. Ranger Jahn began rescue breathing until EMS arrived with supplemental oxygen. Otisville and Westbrookville Volunteer Fire Departments, New York State Police, and Mamakating First Aid Squad helped carry the patient out of the woods to an ambulance.

Village of Millerton Dutchess County

Wilderness Rescue: On May 14 at 2:28 p.m., Forest Rangers Pries and Russo responded to a call for two injured hikers at the bottom of the waterfall off Quarry Hill trail at Taconic State Park. A 28-year-old from LaGrange with an arm injury walked out on her own. A 33-year-old from Poughkeepsie with a suspected head injury was pulled out of the water by EMS, who determined the subject had suffered a hip injury, as well. Rangers assisted rope technicians from Copake Fire Department with a high-angle rope rescue. The New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation and the Amenia and Millerton Fire Departments also assisted with the rescue. The subject was flown to the hospital and resources were clear at 5 p.m

Town of Hunter Greene County

Campground Fire: On May 18 at 4:49 p.m., Forest Ranger Lieutenant Slade and Ranger Peterson responded to North-South Lake Campground for a report of a camper fire that had spread. A pull-behind camper was fully involved and spread to 0.1 acres of woods behind the camper. Local fire departments extinguished the fire. No injuries were reported.

Permit Requirements and Special Regulations for Peekamoose Valley Riparian Corridor and Blue Hole in the Sundown Wild Forest

Special regulations are in effect for the Blue Hole and Peekamoose Valley because of the huge increase in visitors. The purpose of these regulations is to increase public safety and reduce impacts to the environmental resources. Permits are required to visit the Blue Hole, or to camp at the nearby campsites in the Peekamoose Valley. The Special regulations:

- o Require visitors to obtain a permit for a \$10 fee through Reserve America, consistent with fees for other recreation-oriented Day Use areas in the Forest Preserve;
- o Limit parking to designated parking areas only. Parking along the shoulder of the road is prohibited by the Town and is a Tow Away Zone;
- o Users are required to use portable restroom facilities for human waste disposal and the dumpster for all other waste
- o Except for the nearby designated camping area, the Blue Hole is only open to the public from one half hour before sunrise to one half hour after sunset.
- o Parking is limited to designated parking areas only. Parking along the shoulder of the road is prohibited by the Town and is a Tow Away Zone.

The following are prohibited at the Blue Hole (limited use will be allowed at the nearby designated camping area only):

- o Camping
- o All fires (including charcoal fires, wood fires, gas grills, propane stoves or other portable stoves)
- o Use of portable generators
- o Alcohol
- o Glass containers
- o Coolers larger than 12" in any dimension
- o Radios and other audio devices

DEC and Canal Corporation Remind Water Recreationists to 'Clean, Drain, Dry' Watercraft and Equipment to Protect New York's Waters from Aquatic Invasive Species Boat Stewards to Conduct Inspections and Educate Recreating Public at Launches Statewide Began Memorial Day Weekend

New Mobile Boat Wash Equipment to be Deployed at Canal Launches

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) and the New York State Canal Corporation joined together today to remind those planning to visit New York's waters to Clean, Drain, Dry their boats, trailers, fishing gear, and other equipment before recreating in New York's waters to prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species (AIS). Starting Friday, May 24, watercraft inspection stewards, also known as boat stewards, will be stationed at more than 220 boat launches and decontamination stations throughout the state to educate and assist the public in cleaning their equipment. Identified by their blue vests, boat stewards can provide a refresher on how to inspect boats and gear and offer information on AIS in New York.

"Since the Watercraft Inspection Steward Program began, boat stewards statewide have conducted more than one million inspections, playing a crucial role in protecting thousands of lakes, ponds, and rivers throughout New York State from invasive pests," DEC Interim Commissioner Sean Mahar said. "In 2023, boat stewards intercepted more than 11,000 aquatic invasives at boat launches statewide. DEC asks that all boaters Clean, Drain, and Dry before launching to support sustained efforts to protect New York's waters."

This year, DEC celebrated the 2024 season launch of the Watercraft Inspection Steward Program (WISP) at Champlain Canal Lock C-1 in Waterford on the Hudson River in conjunction with the State Canal Corporation. This location is significant as it is the first physical barrier along the Champlain Canal against the movement of round goby (Neogobius melanostomus), an invasive fish threatening to expand its range into the Upper Hudson River. Both Lock C-1 and neighboring Lock C-2 in Halfmoon are actively utilized to mitigate the movement of the round goby through scheduled lockings and double draining of the locks prior to vessels entering. The force of water released during the double-draining procedure deters the round goby from swimming near and into the lock chamber.

DEC and the State Canal Corporation continue to implement a comprehensive effort, including a rapid response plan, to combat the potential spread of the invasive round goby to the Lake Champlain Basin following the discovery of the fish in the Hudson River near Troy in July 2021. Aquatic invasive species can out-compete native fish species, disrupting ecosystems and damaging local economies dependent on water recreation and related activities.

Through WISP, a new mobile boat wash decontamination unit will be deployed at launches along the Canal system in the Capital Region this season. The Canal Corporation purchased the unit which contains a hot water pressure washer with a wastewater recovery and filtration system. Operated by boat stewards, the hot pressurized water will remove AIS from the trailer, hull, anchors, and vessel motor. Internal components of the watercraft (bilge, ballast, lower unit of the motor, and live wells) may also be decontaminated.

New York State Canal Corporation Director Brian U. Stratton said, "As we enter this year's navigation season, we remain committed to collaborating with DEC and our Canal users to mitigate the potential spread of the round goby and other aquatic invasive species. The new decontamination unit being deployed to Canal system boat launches is one tool in our toolbox to ensure the Canal is resilient for the future. We ask everyone, boaters, anglers, and other water recreational users, to do their part to protect New York's waterways."

All water recreationists are advised to follow these steps to help prevent the spread of AIS:

- o Clean mud, plants, and animals off boats, trailers, fishing gear, and other equipment (trailer bunks, axles, rollers, lights, transducers, and license plates; motor props; waders; diving gear; anchors; etc.) and discard the material in a trash can or at a disposal station;
- o Drain all water-holding compartments, including ballast tanks, live wells, and bilge areas, before leaving an access site;
- o Dry everything thoroughly before using boats or equipment in another waterbody. Drying times can vary, but five to seven days in dry, warm conditions is recommended:
- o When there's no time to dry between uses, disinfect boats and equipment with hot water that is at least 140 degrees Fahrenheit or visit a decontamination site;
- o Use certified bait that is non-invasive and disease free; and
- o Do not dump aquarium contents in any waterbodies, drainage ditches, or sewers.

All New York residents and visitors have a role to play in protecting state waters from invasive species. Visit DEC's website for more information on how to Clean, Drain, Dry boats, fishing gear, and other equipment. A step by step guide for ridding boats and equipment of AIS with video can also be found on DEC's YouTube channel.

DEC also reminds New Yorkers to treat boat stewards safety and respectfully. New York State does not tolerate harassment of any kind. Stewards are directed to report inappropriate behavior or treatment by anyone at boat launch locations. We encourage members of the community to help stop harassment by reporting misconduct or harassment to DEC, partner organizations, or local law enforcement as appropriate.

DEC Announces Start of 2024 'NYHABS' Online Notification and Reporting System for Harmful Algal Blooms

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Interim Commissioner Sean Mahar and State Department of Health (DOH) Commissioner Dr. James McDonald today remind New Yorkers to learn about and be aware of harmful algal blooms, or "HABs," as the 2024 HABs notification season starts. DEC's New York Harmful Algal Bloom System (NYHABS) is now active, providing New Yorkers, including trained citizens, to send reports of HABs to DEC electronically via a simple user- and mobile phone-friendly form.

"As New York experiences warming temperatures, DEC is working closely with the State Department of Health and our local partners to investigate harmful algal blooms and make significant investments to prevent excess nutrients and other contaminants from negatively affecting water quality," DEC Interim Commissioner Mahar said. "DEC's updated map and reporting system allows for more effective monitoring of potential threats to the health or recreational use of waterbodies, and we encourage New Yorkers to be on the lookout for HABs and report any sightings."

DEC and DOH evaluates HABs reports and once confirmed, reports are posted to the NYHABS page. The system features an interactive map of current and archived bloom locations to help keep New Yorkers informed about potential HABs. With resources such as the online HABs map and reporting system, New York continues to be a national leader in supporting initiatives to address HABs across the state and to ensure effective communication to the public. DEC works with DOH, the State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation (OPRHP), and other State and local partners in leading the most comprehensive HABs monitoring and reporting program in the nation. In cooperation with its partners, DEC monitors hundreds of waterbodies annually and works with DOH and OPRHP to ensure the public and environment are protected.

State Health Commissioner Dr. James McDonald said, "Exposure to harmful algae blooms can cause health effects in people and animals, including pets, when water with blooms is touched, swallowed, or when airborne droplets are inhaled. New York State is aggressively proactive in monitoring and combatting these blooms to protect public health, and this new map and reporting system will allow New Yorkers to better 'Know it, Avoid it, and Report it."

While cyanobacteria are naturally occurring in the environment, certain conditions lead to accumulations that become HABs. Blooms are likely triggered by a combination of factors that include excess nutrients such as phosphorus and nitrogen, lots of sunlight, low-water or low-flow conditions, calm water, and warm temperatures. HAB occurrence and reporting typically increase throughout the season with the most reports received during the warmest months of August and September. Regardless of the presence of toxins, HABs can pose a risk to public health.

When it comes to HABs, DEC encourages New Yorkers to "KNOW IT, AVOID IT, REPORT IT."

KNOW IT - HABs vary in appearance from scattered green dots in the water, to long, linear green streaks, pea soup or spilled green paint, to blue-green or white coloration.

AVOID IT - People, pets, and livestock should avoid contact with water that is discolored or has algal scums on the surface.

REPORT IT - If members of the public suspect a HAB, report it

through the NYHABs online reporting form available on DEC's website. Symptoms or health concerns related to HABs should be reported to DOH at harmfulalgae@health.ny.gov.

For more information about HABs, including bloom notifications, which are updated daily through fall, visit_DEC's Harmful Algal Blooms webpage. The_HAB Program Guide, which includes information and links to resources regarding bloom prevention, management, and control, can also be downloaded from the DEC website. Visit DOH's website for DOH's public health information.

DEC water quality monitoring programs such as the Lake Classification and Inventory Program conduct HAB monitoring statewide to complement data and information generated by NYHABS. These programs carry out monitoring surveys that generate datasets to characterize statewide conditions. These monitoring strategies are well established, recommended, and utilized by DEC's federal partners such as the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, and help identify occurrences of HABs that inform statewide HAB trends analyses. Surface water quality data generated by DEC is reviewed according to standard quality assurance procedures and made publicly available through the Division of Water Monitoring Portal. These data, along with applied research efforts, provide insight into management of HABs and water quality issues across New York. DEC's Harmful Algal Blooms webpage provides access to these research efforts targeting management of HABs in addition to information on understanding HABs, potential health risks, and efforts to develop plans to reduce nutrients as the main controllable factor driving HABs. Additionally, DEC published its HABs Research Guide to inform statewide research priorities.

Using the most up-to-date research on controllable causes, DEC established a holistic approach to managing and reducing HABs in the state. DEC's approach includes:

- o Deliberate Clean Water Planning to improve nutrient reduction efforts;
- o Funding to implement nutrient reduction;
- o Applied research on HABs; and
- o Short-term HAB mitigation efforts.

Combining these long- and short-term strategies along with advancing research and understanding of HABs provides a strong and foundation for HAB reduction and management in New York State.

To date, New York has awarded more than \$428 million in grants designed to reduce the frequency of algal blooms across the state by targeting phosphorus and nitrogen pollution, controllable factors that can contribute to the occurrence of HABs, and more than \$14 million to research and development, pilot projects, and advanced HABs monitoring.

As directed in Governor Kathy Hochul's 2024 State of the State initiatives to protect clean water, DEC is currently developing guidance values for phosphorus to reduce the frequency of HABs that negatively impact drinking water quality and access to swimming and recreation in New York's waters.

In addition, earlier this year Governor Hochul announced 2023 grant awards totaling \$56 million to 47 planning and implementation projects aimed at nutrient reduction to help reduce the occurrence of HABs through the Water Quality Improvement Project (WQIP) program_and Non-Agricultural Nonpoint Source Planning and MS4 Mapping Grant (NPG). View the full list of 2023 awarded projects. Grant project types that target reduction of phosphorus and nitrogen pollution include wastewater treatment, non-agricultural nonpoint abatement and control, and land acquisition for source water protection. These grants are now open for 2024 applications as part of the recently announced Consolidated Funding Application (CFA). At least \$215 million in funding is available through WQIP and up to \$3 million in funding is available through NPG.

Senator Oberacker's Bill Streamlining Local Court Proceedings Receives Senate Approval Measure will save money for taxpayers in Delaware, Otsego, and Schoharie counties

ALBANY, 05/21/24 -- State Senator Peter Oberacker (R/C -Schenevus) today announced legislation (S.6798) he sponsors to streamline court proceedings in Delaware, Otsego, and Schoharie

counties was approved unanimously by the state senate.

"During the COVID-19 pandemic, a number of policies were instituted in order to adhere to social distancing guidelines," said Senator Oberacker. "One policy that proved advantageous was the use of virtual arraignments for court proceedings. This bill will allow Otsego, Delaware, and Schoharie counties to utilize this technology at their discretion moving forward."

Senator Oberacker's legislation allows Delaware, Otsego, and Schoharie counties to join thirty-seven other counties across the state that have been granted the authority to conduct arraignments

electronically.

"Our rural police departments and courts are stretched incredibly thin and any policy change that helps with efficiency has my full support. I speak with our local sheriffs and county officials on a regular basis as we work together to formulate policies that will meet the needs of those we represent and this is an idea that they favor," added Senator Oberacker.

Companion legislation (A.6738) sponsored by Assemblyman Chris Tague was previously approved. The bill must now be signed by the governor to become law.

"Permitting the use of virtual arraignments will save taxpayers money, help streamline court proceedings and allow our police to focus on other job responsibilities keeping the public safe," concluded Senator Oberacker.


