The first time the Tri-Valley homecoming pep rally and bon fire was postponed, it was a precaution taken due to a bomb threat in the Monticello School District. The activities were rescheduled for September 28th. On the 28th, the Tri-Valley pep rally and bon fire, was again postponed, this time due to the fact that the gunman who fired shots inside Ellenville Hospital was on the loose and might still be in the area. You know what they say about the best laid plans! Some days you just can't win! Now the bon fire has been "re-rescheduled" for October 5th!

The Town of Neversink, created by the Ulster County Legislature in 1798, celebrates its 220th anniversary this year! Before that time it was simply known as Neversink Country. With some boundary changes, Neversink did become a part of Sullivan County in 1809. The Town of Neversink was again challenged when New York City, through eminent domain, took much land for the construction of the two reservoirs. The Neversink Reservoir is located completely in the Town of Neversink and about half of the Rondout Reservoir is within the Town of Neversink. I believe much of the water sources for the reservoirs are located in the Town of Denning, which was created by the Ulster County Legislature in 1849. The Neversink of long ago bears little resemblance to today's Neversink. Anyone interested in learning more about the history of the our Town should visit the Time and the Valleys Museum or the Daniel Pierce Library. There are several good books available.

Words of Wisdom: Oktoberfest, which originated in Germany, is now celebrated all over the world. The autumn weather is celebrated with German food and, of course, lots of beer. Nuts! An Autumn Treat

One of the fun things about fall in the Catskills is finding different nuts that have begun falling from the trees: acorns, hickory nuts, and black walnuts to name a

One of Nature's favorite few. treats are tiny little nuts that are often overlooked - the beechnuts that fall from the American beech tree in the fall. In contrast to the impressive Beechnut tree whose height can reach over 100 feet tall the tiny three-angled nut that resembles a half-pyramid. The American beech- Fagus grandifolia, (This is Latin for: Fagus, beech; grandi, great; folia, leaves)



is a species of beech tree that grows in the Catskills and across much of the eastern United States and southeastern Canada.

It is a large tree that grows 60 to 115 feet-high, with smooth gray bark and oval leaves. It is a familiar part of the hardwood forest and also

a popular shade and ornamental species. The tree is monoecious, with flowers of both sexes on the same tree. The flowers are small single-sex, wind-pollinated catkins, produced in spring shortly after the new leaves appear.

The fruit is a small, sharply 3angled nut approximately 1/2 long, borne in pairs in soft-spined husks known as cupules.



The American beech has two ways of reproducing: one is through the usual dispersal of seeds, and the other is through root sprouts, where the tree will have smaller trees growing out of its roots in differ-

ent locations. The leaves of the American Beech are dark green, simple and sparsely-toothed with the small teeth terminating at each vein. Leaves are usually 2 1/2 -5 in long,

with a short petiole. This time of the year in the Catskills, the foliage of the Beech tree turns gold or dark copper.

The winter twigs are distinctive among N North American trees. They are long and slender, about a half inch to three-quarters of an inch by less than a tenth of an inch with two rows of overlapping scales on the buds that are distinctly thin and long, resembling cigars; this characteristic makes beech trees relatively easy to identify.

Beech trees are high-branching with tall, stout trunks and smooth silver-grey bark. Beech bark is extremely thin and scars easily. Since the beech tree has such delicate bark, carvings, such as lovers' initials remain because the tree is unable to heal itself.

The timber of the Beech is used to make furniture. parquet floors, wooden bowls and even gunpowder. The wood's heating power rises above most other timber sources, and it was widely used to warm the home. It is an excellent firewood as it is easily split and burns for many hours with bright but calm flames.

The tasty little morsels of the American Beech are loved by deer, squirrels raccoon, grouse, bear, porcupines and humans.

Beechnuts have a mild flavor and can be eaten raw or cooked and are known to have an appreciable level of protein. To experience its woodsy autumn taste of the beechnut, you will earn every tasty morsel that is extracted. including the sore finger tips that will come with handling the spiny outer shells of the nuts. But it is well worth the effort.

Household Hints Eliminate Mold and Mildew

Use white distilled vinegar and pour it into a spray bottle without watering it down. Spray the vinegar onto the mold or mildew covered surface and leave it to sit for an hour. Finally, wipe the area clean with water and allow the surface to dry. Any smell from the vinegar should clear within a few hours

The Spy Across The Table Mysterious Book Report No. 290 by John Dwaine McKenna

Although prognostication and predicting the future isn't what we normally do here at the MBR, there's always exceptions, and this is one. I'm gonna stick my neck all the way out to the *cut-on-the-dotted-line* tattoo and forecast the near future. In about a week and a-half – June 20th to be exact – a new thriller will be released that I think will be the hottest read of the sum-

mer season, if not the whole year. I know, I know, that's a bold statement, but it's one helluva bold book. *The Spy Across The Table*, (Simon & Schuster, \$26.00, 435 pages, ISBN 978-1-4767-9491-4) by Barry Lancet, is the fourth-and most electrifying installment-of his highly acclaimed, widely praised Jim Brodie series of international thriller/mysteries. Brodie, a San Francisco art dealer specializing in high-end Japanese antiques, just wants to be an ordinary guy, a widower and single parent of a precocious and endearing seven-year old daughter named Jenny . . . but circumstances and a most

unique skill-set prevent that from ever happening. That's because he grew up in Tokyo, where his father owned an investigative agency. Brodie's a martial-arts master, an expert in the art, antiquities, history and culture of Japan . . . and speaks, reads and writes fluent Japanese. Hello, and welcome to the

MysteriousBookReport.com. Our first question today is:

Why do you write?

It fills a void. I found my initial subject with the JIM BRODIE books, and some of the void was filled. With my next book, a stand-alone, I hope to fill in the rest of it.

Where do you write?

Anywhere. Seriously. When I was writing JAPAN-TOWN, I had a family with young kids and was working sixty-hour weeks, so I taught myself to work *standing up* on a crowded commuter train, using a clipboard. That is no exaggeration. I had such a busy schedule that I needed to use the 45-minute-commute time to write. It took two months of trial and error before I could keep my balance, tune everything out, and write usable prose. But I got it done. I no longer need to work under such severe conditions, but now I can write pretty much anywhere and tune out any distractions.

When do you write?

I keep an unusual schedule and I've yet to run into any other author who does the same. I write in two sessions. In the morning at home, and in the afternoon at one of the many coffee houses around my place. The second session begins after I take a long break in between to relax, so in effect I have two "morning" sessions.

Who's your favorite literary character?

Let's talk favorites, plural. And a selection. In random order, I like **Robert B**. **Parker** for his precision, humor, characters. I like Kurt Vonnegut, who I recently rediscovered for his clarity, wit, casualness, and originality (as in "Billy Pilgrim has come unstuck in time.")

I am also a long time fan of Alexandre Dumas and Victor Hugo, both of whom are not only great writers but also early practioners of the thriller-in the age before radio, television and shorter attention spans. I like Jane Austen for her language, wit and observations, particularly Pride and Prejudice. And I like Dostoyevsky, especially Crime and Punishment, one of the best psychological thrillers of all time (though the beginning is slow.)

Do you read your reviews?

Yes, I read them if I find them. I don't get many negative reviews, but all authors get some. Still, I don't worry about them. Stuff happens and life is short.

What's your advice for aspiring writers?

As a former book editor, I've been asked this question more times than you can imagine, so I added a Writer's Corner to my website, with a collection of information based on both my editorial and writing experience. Some of it is counterintuitive. Anyone interested can find the page there

Does luck play into success?

If by "luck" you mean a satisfying, fleshed out novel that works on all the levels it should, then no. That is about hard work and perseverance. If you are talking about commercial success, then yes. It takes a variety of factors falling into place.

The Scene Too By Jane Harrison

I love open mics. (Did I mention 'open mic' is short for 'open microphone'?) Most of the time for me it's connecting with friends and acquaintances who are musicians and singers. And every so often, I get to see a 'realignment' of these and new-tome musicians that is not only worthy of note but has that WOW factor that just can't be passed over. That's what happened at Heartbeat, Music Hall of Grahamsville last Wednesday night. It had been a really long day and it was going to be a short evening...that was until Mike Cervone, drummer extraordinaire, walked in. Followed by Greg Fiske, whose sax work I first became acquainted with in JAZZMOSIS. I did not know the others, but I knew that if Greg and Mike were involved, I could pretty much guarantee their caliber.

I was not disappointed. They are calling themselves, at least for now, THE OTHER BAND. And in a brief conversation with James Ratner, lead guitar and vocals, I got the feeling that maybe either the band name or the principle members had been around for a while. What is the Land Bank?
