

October 5, 1955 - Congratulations to Mrs. Cora Smith and Mrs. Andrew George who celebrated their 80th birthdays this week.

September 29, 1965 - Sullivan County became the center of operations over the weekend for a Civil Air Patrol exercise covering New York State and north eastern Pennsylvania. So successful was the exercise that plans are being formulated for a second similar drill.

# Pumpkins, Pumpkins, Everywhere - It's Pumpkin Party Time in Tri-Valley!

It's that time of the year for Pumpkin Picking in the Catskills! Many families from NYC journey to the Catskills in early autumn to enjoy the changing colors of the foliage and while here, may go apple picking, or look for a local pumpkin patch and pick a prize pumpkin to take home to enjoy for the fall fun and festivities that lie ahead.



But tourists aren't the only people seeking out the great pumpkin. You will find many locals, as well as visitors, joining the fun and activities at the Daniel Pierce Library Annual Pumpkin Party

and Parade that will be held this weekend, Saturday, October 3rd at the Fairgrounds.

But where did all these pumpkins come from? And why are they in such demand this time of year?

The word pumpkin originated from the Greek word Pepon which means large melon. The word gradually morphed by the French, English and then Americans into the word "pumpkin." Pumpkins and squash are believed to have originated in the ancient Americas. The oldest evidence of pumpkin-related seeds dates back to between 7000 and 5500 BC, were found in Mexico

The early Native American practiced an early form of sustainable agriculture. Archeologists have determined that variations of squash and pumpkins were cultivated along river and creek banks along with sunflowers and beans. This took place long before the emergence of maize (corn). After maize was introduced, the ancient farmers learned to grow squash with maize and beans using the "Three Sisters" - squash, corn and beans which grow and thrive together. The beans roots set nitrogen in the soil to nourish the corn. The bean vines help to stabilize the corn stalks on windy days. The squash plants shelter the shallow roots of the corn and shade the ground to discourage weeds and preserve moisture. Truly a symbiotic relationship.

All pumpkins are winter squash and are the mature fruit of certain species in the genus Cucurbita and the pumpkin that we are familiar with is a cultivar of the squash plant, most commonly of Cucurbita pepo, that is round, with smooth, slightly ribbed skin and deep yellow to orange coloration. The thick shell contains the seeds and pulp. The traditional Cucurbita pepo pumpkins generally weigh between 6 and 18 pounds, though the largest cultivars of the species C. maxima can reach weights of over 75 pounds.

Pumpkins produce both a male and female flowers and honeybees play a significant role in fertilization.

The color of pumpkins is derived from the orange pigments abundant in them. The main nutrients are lutein and both alpha and beta carotene, the latter of which generates vitamin A in the body.

By the time the Pilgrims landed in America, pumpkins were grown all over North America. The Native Americans introduced pumpkins and squashes to the Pilgrims. Pumpkins were an important food source for the pilgrims, as they stored well, which meant they would have a nutritious food source during the winter months. It is documented that pumpkins were served at the second Thanksgiving celebration.

Today pumpkins grow on every continent except Antarctica. Pumpkins are native to the Western Hemisphere, where they grew in a region stretching from the southwest United States to Peru. They have been cultivated for over 5,500 years, and are one of the New World's oldest known crops. It is said that Columbus carried pumpkin seeds back with him to Europe.

Pumpkins have their roots right here in America! Take a little pride in that that orange pumpkin you buy this weekend - it was made in America!




Fruit Fly Trap


# The Wolf in Winter

Can you believe it's already October? Where did the summer go? Oh well, fall is here now, and that means Halloween . . . which is giving Christmas a run for its money in the popularity department. To commemorate the holiday, all our book reviews for the month will touch on the otherworldly, the supernatural, eerie, weird, creepy and dystopian. So turn on all the lights and lock the doors, grab your silver amulet and runesword, and power up the Barcalounger. We're off to the nether-regions in search of action, adventure and the ghoulish way.



First up for our month-long macabre-fest is an Irish author who set the literary world ablaze a while back when he began his series of novels featuring a tough-guy private eye named Charlie Parker, in which he combined two separate genres and produced a wholly new one where

the ordinary gets tangled up in the paranormal. See, Charlie fits into the traditional noirish gumshoe role-but, well, Charlie's different. Real different. Although we're never absolutely positive as readers, we're pretty sure Charlie Parker is one of the fallen angels who were cast out of Heaven with Lucifer, who became the Devil, ruler of Hades. All the other fallen ones became demons, in league with the Devil. One of their number however, was lost in the flaming descent from Paradise and it has been the object of an ages-old search by both angels and demons. The missing one is hiding in a human body while trying to redeem itself on order to

regain God's good graces and be readmitted to Heaven. Charlie Parker.

The newest installment of the series The Wolf of Winter, (Emily Bestler Books/Atria, a division of Simon & Shuster, \$26.00, 418 pages, ISBN 978-1-4767-0318-3) by John Connelly is the thirteenth . . . hmmm, interesting . . . of his Charlie Parker novels which, like fine wine, only get better with age. In this installment, Charlie gives up his quest to find and kill the Collector-a self-appointed judge, executioner, and dispatcher of souls . . . ones he's declared guilty of some grievous sin-when a homeless man reaches out for help finding his missing daughter. Her last known whereabouts; a small town located deep in the Maine wilderness. It's name is Prosperous and, as the name implies, it's doing well-and has always done well thank you very much-in a state traditionally bedevilled by economic malaise. All of Parker's efforts to locate the missing woman are met with stiff resistance from township officials, leaving the detective to conclude that they're hiding something. Something sinister. It has to do with an ancient church, moved stone-by-stone from the north of England three-hundred years earlier and protected by generations of town residents, dedicated to preserving its secret. In Parker they sense a grave threat, while he will face in the townspeople, his most vicious opponents yet . . . and his life hangs in the balance. Charlie Parker is marked to die . . . so that the town may survive. It's an edge of the seat thriller, possibly the best yet, from this acclaimed writer and international best-seller. It's a wild wild ride you won't soon forget. And hey! If you're turned on by this character and genre, check out Connolly's earlier work entitled The Black Angel, my personal favorite. It will leave you sweat-drenched, gasping for breath and howling for more. If you do-be sure to check out

the ossuary at the church of Sedlec in the Czech Republic. It's a life altering experience . . .







Jav "Fishv" Fullum, to receive the Poul Jorgensen Golden Hook Award

Livingston Manor, NY At the upcoming Hall of Fame Dinner on Saturday, October 10, at the Catskill Fly Fishing Center, 'Fishy' (as actually most people do not know his real name) will receive this highly coveted award recognizing an individual who maintains and keeps alive the art and craft of flytying. For over 20 years, Fishy has: written for FlyTyer magazine and many other publications; provided demonstrations and presentations at over 100 flyfishing shows; traveled the country doing seminars; and always has enough time to stop and share his knowledge with a newcomer at any age. He is a master of literally turning house dust into gold. Known to rummage through garbage, wander the aisles in the supermarket and craft stores, pick up scraps found in dumps and on sidewalks; literally, he seems to turn dust into flyfishing gold that catches fish. He continues to be innovative, eclectic, interesting and certainly talented. If Poul was here, he would certainly find Fishy deserving of recognition.

History of The Poul Jorgensen Golden Hook Award- Before his unexpected death in November 2004, world-recognized fly tyer, Poul Jorgensen, was working on a new award for innovations in fly tying called The Golden Hook Award. It was his wish to annually recognize a living fly tyer who has made major contributions to the art of fly tying. The criteria to be considered are developing tying innovations, creating fresh techniques that will aid future tyers, developing new materials or tools, publications, and instruction and teaching activities. As per Poul's wishes, this would not be a flytying competition, but recognition for a current contribution to the continuance of the art and craft of fly tying.

Poul worked with noted sculpture, the late Bud Wertheim, to create a bronze medallion to be awarded to each year's recipient. As with many

artists, there were difficulties on reaching an agreement on design and interpretation. According to Wertheim, "the medal was initially commissioned by Poul Jorgensen. Poul died before the medals were cast. The final design was completed and cast by my own decision. He had not wanted his own image on the face of the medal, but I thought he deserved full recognition for his contribution to fly tying. I made many sketches of him while he visited my studio, and I used them for the final portrait, which has been deemed, by Jim Krul, the executive director of the museum and a close personal friend of Poul's, to be extremely accurate with a sense of his humor and wit.







DEP Announces 2015 Reservoir Cleanup Day - DEP will partner with watershed community groups to remove litter and recyclables from public recreation areas at nine reservoirs in the Catskills and Hudson Valley

The New York City Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) today announced that it will team up with school groups, business leaders, local nonprofits and citizens across the watershed to remove litter and recyclables from public recreation areas at nine reservoirs in the Catskills and Hudson Valley. More than 150 volunteers are expected to participate in Reservoir Cleanup Day on Oct. 4 to remove debris from areas that are generally used for fishing and boating access. The effort is co-sponsored by the Catskill Watershed Corporation, which will provide gloves and bags for the volunteers.

This year's cleanup follows a successful effort in 2014, which removed an estimated 2,500 pounds of recyclables and debris from dozens of miles of shorelines at Cannonsville, Kensico, Lake Gleneida, Neversink, Pepacton and Rondout reservoirs. Volunteers last year collected 114 bags of debris that had blown onto

reservoir property from nearby roads, or had washed ashore from recent storms. Some had also been left behind at public access areas for fishing and boating. DEP's Reservoir Cleanup Day is among dozens of similar events happening across the state as part of the American Littoral Society's annual New York State Beach Cleanup, which organizes volunteers to remove debris from beaches, lakes and other popular bodies of water. DEP is among the government agencies, businesses and foundations that sponsor the statewide effort. In 2014, the New York State Beach Cleanup included more than 6,800 volunteers who removed some 46 tons of debris from 245 miles of shorelines across the state.

"I would like to thank the outdoor enthusiasts, school groups, local business owners and other volunteers who are pledging their time for Reservoir Cleanup Day," DEP Commissioner Emily Lloyd said. "The pristine nature of our reservoirs and forests attracts thousands of people, including local residents and visitors, to enjoy fishing and boating each year. We've been able to keep these natural resources free of debris thanks to this annual event and the year-round work of our dedicated staff at DEP."



Pepacton Reservoir: The cleanup will be led by Ann Roberti of the Catskill Mountain Club and Diane Galusha of the Catskill Watershed Corporation. Volunteers will meet at the Shavertown Bridge Boat Launch.

Rondout Reservoir: The cleanup will be led by Brenda Sloan from the Tri-Valley Central School. Volunteers will meet at the universal access parking lot located on Route 55A.

At each site, DEP and volunteers will keep a tally of the type and quantity of debris that is collected throughout the day. Data will be reported back to the American

Littoral Society at the end of the event.

In recent years, DEP has continued to expand recreational access and programs on many of its water supply lands and reservoir. More than 126,000 acres of cityowned land and water are currently open for recreation, including fishing, hiking and boating. Of that, more than 63,000 of those acres, known as public access areas, can be used by outdoor enthusiasts without a DEP access permit. DEP manages New York City's water supply, providing more than one billion gallons of high quality water each day to more than 9 million New Yorkers. This includes more than 70 upstate communities and institutions in Ulster, Orange, Putnam and Westchester counties who consume an average of 110 million total gallons of drinking water daily from New York City's water supply system. This water comes from the Catskill, Delaware, and Croton watersheds that extend more than 125 miles from the City, and the system comprises 19 reservoirs, three controlled lakes, and numerous tunnels and aqueducts. DEP has nearly 6,000 employees, including almost 1,000 scientists, engineers, surveyors, watershed maintainers and other professionals in the upstate watershed. In addition to its \$70 million payroll and \$157 million in annual taxes paid in upstate counties, DEP has invested more than \$1.7 billion in watershed protection programs-including partnership organizations such as the Catskill Watershed Corporation and the Watershed Agricultural Councilthat support sustainable farming practices, environmentally sensitive economic development, and local economic opportunity. In addition, DEP has a robust capital program with nearly \$14 billion in investments planned over the next 10 years that will create up to 3,000 construction-related jobs per year. Congressman Gibson announces passage of legislation honoring WWII hero from Kingston

Washington, DC - Congressman Chris Gibson (NY-19) announced the House of Representatives approved legislation he authored to rename the Post Office at 90 Cornell Street in Kingston in honor of Staff Sergeant Robert H. Dietz, a Medal of Honor recipient who was killed in action during World War II.

The bill passed the House on September 24, with

unanimous bipartisan support.

"It is a tremendous honor for me to pay tribute in this way to Staff Sergeant Dietz, a member of the Greatest Generation who answered the call to serve and made the ultimate sacrifice in defense of our cherished way of life," said Congressman Gibson. "Having served for most of my adult life in the U.S. Army and lost some of my own soldiers in combat, I have been especially proud to help my colleagues in Congress recognize Staff Sergeant Dietz and the heroism, bravery, and devotion to the cause of freedom that he personifies. Once again, I am grateful to the members of the New York Delegation for their strong support of this bill. My staff and I look forward to working with the Senate to pass this bill so that we can soon join the people of Kingston in celebration of Sergeant Dietz at the Post Office that will bear his name for generations to come."

Robert H. Dietz, a Kingston native, was killed in action at the age of 24 March 29, 1945 at Kirchain, Germany. He had advanced through intense enemy fire to disconnect bridge demolition charges and neutralize bazooka teams defending the road into town.

"By his intrepidity and valiant effort on his selfimposed mission, [Staff Sergeant Dietz] single-handedly opened the road for the capture of Kirchain and left with his comrades an inspiring example of gallantry in the face of formidable odds," reads the text of the Medal of Honor citation from the Army.

"Congress has a very special role to play in assuring the men and women who serve our nation in uniform are afforded the recognition and care they deserve," said Congressman Gibson. "My staff includes several veterans, and we stand ready to assist current and former service members-or any constituent-with a host of issues involving the federal government. As always, I encourage residents of the 19th Congressional District to contact me to let me know how we can be helpful."

Congressman Gibson's legislative efforts include the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act, a bipartisan bill he authored to support sailors exposed to Agent Orange. He is also the co-author of the Clay Hunt Suicide Prevention for American Veterans Act, which was signed into law last year, expanding peer-to-peer counseling and growing the ranks of mental health professionals across the military and VA system.

Congressman Gibson, a veteran of seven deployments, spoke about Staff Sergeant Dietz on the floor

'Art, Pleasure, Politics and Making a Living: 60 Years of Vera B. Williams' Works' in the Loft Gallery

A retrospective exhibit of drawings, paintings, and graphics titled "Art, Pleasure, Politics and Making a Living: 60 Years of Vera B. Williams' Works" opens with a reception on Friday, October 9 from 7 to 9 p.m. in the Loft Gallery at the Delaware Arts Center in Narrowsburg, NY. The exhibit is being staged in conjunction with the Delaware Valley Arts Alliance's 40th Anniversary Gala on October 17, where Williams is being honored with a Lifetime Achievement award.

Vera B. Williams is an American children's writer, illustrator, and activist. Her best-known work, "A Chair for My Mother," has won multiple awards including two Caldecott Honors. It was recently chosen as one of the best 100 books of the past century by the New York Public Library, the first of a series Flu vaccine is free to all adults who bring their of four books featuring a waitress and family with a "Bread and Roses" theme reflecting her childhood in the great depression. Published, as were all her books, by Greenwillow Books.

For her lifetime contribution as a children's illustrator, Williams was U.S. nominee in 2004 for the biennial, international Hans Christian Andersen Award, the highest recognition available to creators of children's books. Additionally, she was awarded the 2009 NSK Neustadt Prize for Children's Literature.

Vera Baker Williams was born on Hollywood, CA in 1927 and later her family moved here and there in the Bronx, NY. Encouraged by their parents, she and her sister explored the arts at the neighborhood Bronx House, then studied at The High School of Music & Art. She went on to the experimental Black

Mountain College in North Carolina, where she graduated in Graphic Arts in 1949.

Williams was one of the founders and a long time resident of the Gate Hill Cooperative Community, where her three children grew up. She was also very busy in the progressive school movement. She helped to start an alternative school in New York and then Ontario, Canada throughout the 1960s and 1970s. She had long been eager to write and illustrate books for children and got her chance to illustrate "Hooray For Me" through her friend, Remy Charlip. At the time she was living on a houseboat in Vancouver, British Columbia.

Williams has long supported nonviolent and nuclear disarmament causes. In 1981, she spent a month in

Alderson Federal Prison camp following an arrest at a women's peaceful blockade of the Pentagon. She served on the executive committee of the War Resisters League from 1984 to 1987.

Today, Williams lives in New York City and Narrowsburg, NY and remains active in local groups such as OWN (Older Womens' Network) and participated in the 2007 PEN World Voices literary festival. She has been a part of the Upper Delaware Writers Collective. Her book, "Amber was Brave Essie was Smart," is a narrative in

This retrospective exhibition covers over 50 years of work by the author, artist, and activist, and will include

drawings, paintings, book illustrations, and political art.

# CCE Sullivan Receives \$1.25 Million to Promote Wellness

LIBERTY, NY - Cornell Cooperative Extension Sullivan County (CCESC) is among 26 organizations statewide to receive New York State Department of Health Creating Healthy Schools and Communities funding. CCESC will reach out to local schools, worksites, and community based organizations in the Fallsburg, Liberty, and Monticello school district catchment areas which also include the towns of Mamakating, Thompson, Bethel, and Forestburgh. Smarter Lunchrooms, Complete Streets community planning efforts, and adopting policies that are conducive to wellness are among several strategies that four new CCESC educators will be charged with working on over the next five years. These additions to the growing staff will assist with combating obesity and other chronic diseases in these high need school districts and their surrounding communities.

CCESC will work directly with the Sullivan County Department of Public Health Services, schools, food retailers, and local employers to improve access to nutritious foods as well as increase opportunities for daily physical activity.

"Poor nutrition and physical inactivity are the major risk factors contributing to Sullivan County's poor health outcomes," said Colleen Monaghan, CCESC Executive Director.

"This multi-faceted project will help communities organize in a way that makes it easier for people to access and make healthier choices."

The Creating Healthy Schools and Communities (CHSC) project at CCESC comes as a welcome addition to the Eat Smart New York (ESNY) program, which re-started just last week after a one year hiatus due to changes to the funding at the state level. Combined, the two projects will host five professional CCE educators who provide science-backed information to the public, assist employers in creating an environment that promotes wellness for its employees, and provides municipalities with tools and resources to get healthy foods and opportunities to move in front of people.

These efforts will complement wellness activities happening throughout the county, including individual school district projects, the Rural Health Network, the Farm to School Committee with Public Health Services and Sullivan Renaissance, the expansion of Farmers' Markets, Catskill Mountainkeeper's Edible Garden Projects, and the development of SUNY Sullivan's Healthy World Institute. While change takes time, these combined efforts are laying the foundation for a healthier Sullivan County.
