The event commemorated the start of construction on the project that, once complete, will house new Urgent Care and Primary Care services for Catskill Regional Medical Group. Attendees of the Groundbreaking Ceremony included members of Catskill Regional Medical Center's Board of Directors, physicians, staff, and local and state officials. local and state officials.

The 11,500 square-foot facility will employ between 30-40 employees once completed, and provide an urgent care center and primary care offices. Senator Bonacic delivered remarks at the event and thanked Catskill Regional Medical Group, especially CEO and Chief Medical Officer Dr. Gerard Galarneau, for their continued commitment to improving healthcare in Sullivan County. Senator Bonacic also emphasized the economic benefits of the new facility and its ability to help an under served community.



State Senator John Bonacic called this a big step forward for a county ranked second from bottom in the state for quality of healthcare.

"Believe me, that's all going to change for the best," Bonacic declared. "We have Sullivan 180 working hard. The state is looking at Sullivan County to come in with help. And, with this addition, the revenues that this will produce for the hospital, believe me, it's all good."

Catskill Regional Medical Center CEO Dr. Gerard Galarneau said

Wednesday this is just the start of something big.

#### River Scientist Brings Message of Love to the Catskills

Why are rivers important to humans? Why is it in our nature to want to be near them? And what can we do now to insure their future? We'll ponder these questions together with river scientist and author Dr. Kurt Fausch, Professor in the Department of Fish, Wildlife and Conservation Biology at Colorado State University, who will be the keynote presenter at the 3rd Annual Rondout Neversink Anglers Symposium Friday, October 21 at the Blue Hill Lodge's Claryville Event Center at 1:00 p.m. The venue is located at 1471 Denning Road, Claryville.

His book, For the Love of Rivers, draws readers across the reflective surfaces of streams to explore all that is beneath. While celebrating the beauty and mystery of rivers and streams, he uses his experience as a field biologist and rich collaborations with other scientists in the United States and Japan to explain the underlying science connecting these aquatic ecosystems to their streamside forests and the organisms found there - including humans. The book traces a groundbreaking research collaboration between American and Japanese scientists, a story told in the documentary Riverwebs. In 1995, a Japanese scientist named Shigeru Nakano embarked on an experiment that would change the way those who study streams and rivers think about these ecosystems. Nakano used the bold approach of covering a small stream in Hokkaido, northern Japan, with mosquito netting stretched over a greenhouse frame to cut off the insects falling into the stream from the streamside (riparian) forest. It also stopped the flow of adult aquatic insects that were emerging from the stream from entering the forest.

As Dr. Fausch describes in For the Love of Rivers, the results were astounding. Nakano and his colleagues, and later other scientists in other regions. found that about half or more of the animals in the forest that depend on insects emerging from streams, like bats, birds, lizards, and spiders, disappeared when a critical part of their food supply was cut off. Likewise, when forest insects no longer fell into the stream, half the fish left.

Tragically, Nakano drowned in 2000 while conducting field research in Mexico, but his work inspires many other river and stream ecologists to look more closely and delve more deeply into the unintended consequences of our human activities on

streams and their riparian forests.

Nearly every action we take in forests and grasslands, such as grazing cattle, cutting trees, mining metals, and spraying chemicals to kill insects or weeds can affect the flow of terrestrial insects that fall into streams and feed the fish. At the same time, nearly every action we take in streams, such as diverting water or straightening streams into ditches to speed flood waters away, can harm the immature invertebrates living on the stream bed and ultimately reduce the total amount of adult insects that emerge from the water surface and feed the animals that live along streams.

Our second speaker at Anglers 3 is Nat Gillespie of US Forest Service, who will talk about large wood and habitat restoration in the Northeast U.S. Nat is a familiar face in the Catskills from work in his early career out of Roscoe, N.Y. in the late 1990s when he led outreach efforts to improve riparian buffers on behalf of Trout Unlimited. The 3rd Annual Anglers Symposium will be recorded by Silver Hollow Audio and released as a podcast after the event. Registration is encouraged by emailing bwagner@rondoutneversink.org to register for this special event.

A second public event with Dr. Fausch is scheduled for Saturday, October 22 when the *Riverwebs* documentary (45 min.) will be screened at the Catskill Interpretive Center, 5096 Route 28 in Mt. Tremper, N.Y. at 1:00 p.m. followed by a book signing by Dr. Fausch. For more information, contact:

#### The Flood Planning Process Continues in Sundown

The flood planning process continues in Sundown with the next meeting set for October 13. This community project is the first step in eligibility for the Town and its residents to access a number of programs offering technical assistance and watershed funding to mitigate hazards caused by flooding. The result of the project is a helpful planning tool that models inundation levels at familiar locations that can be used for both prioritizing stream and road protection projects, and planning for improved flood preparedness.

A number of specific locations determined from the past meetings will be looked at closely to compare costs of flood reduction steps to the benefits the community can reap. We'll talk about whether practical modifications to infrastructure can help reduce impacts of storms of different sizes.

The LFA process is happening right now in many Catskills towns that have been given the same resources to explore solutions - from simple actions like securing fuel tanks to prevent them from floating away and dispersing their contents in a flood - to more complex problems created by flooding on our roads, culverts, bridges, and homes

that are situated in the floodplain.

Shaun McAdams and Wendell Buckman from the engineering firm of Barton and Loguidice are working on this project together with Rondout Neversink Stream Program and NYC DEP Stream Management staff. Two informational presentations were held so far. The next session date is Thursday, October 13 6:00 p.m. at Sundown Church Hall. The engineers will describe how we figure out costs for flood hazard mitigation projects and watershed program staff including John Mathiesen of Catskill Watershed Corporation will review the funding sources available to Towns and residents.

The Sundown Local Flood Analysis is a project of the Rondout Neversink Stream Program admin-istered by Sullivan County Soil & Water

#### SC Sheriff's Office New Scam Alert

The Sullivan County Sheriff's Office is alerting citizens to a new scam that is being attempted in Sullivan County. Residents are receiving phone calls from persons claiming to represent Publishers Clearing House.

The callers advise that the victim has won \$1.9 million dollars. The callers then say that the \$1.9 million dollars will be sent to the victim once they pay a \$350 processing fee. The victim is directed to send the processing fee in certified funds to a post office box in St. Croix, U.S. Virgin Islands.

There are several variations of this scam where the target is asked to send a money order, bank check or provide a credit card number. The perpetrators running this scam are said to be extremely aggressive and in one case, called the victim for three days straight until they agreed to send the money. A s with most of these scams, senior citizens appear to be the favorite target. Sheriff Mike Schiff is asking residents to be vigilant and check in on their elderly relatives in order to prevent these crimes from occurring.

#### Route 55A to be Closed for Bridge Work on Oct. 12

The New York City Department of Environmental Protection announced that it will close Route 55A to all traffic for six hours, from 9 am - 3 pm on Wednesday, Oct. 12. The road closure will allow workers to safely install structural steel associated with the replacement of Lows Corners Bridge at the head of Rondout Reservoir. The road will be closed from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. Local elected officials, schools, police, fire and other emergency responders have been informed of the temporary closure.

Temporary signs will be posted at both ends of the road several days ahead of time to inform motorists of the closure. Traffic will be detoured onto Route 55.

The Changing Moon

There's a certain nature-themed spirituality that is embedded in autumn when the days shorten and the nights lengthen. It is also around this time that people looking to the night sky will have the chance to see what is known as a Hunter's Moon, also known as a sanguine or "blood" moon. The Hunter's Moon has long been regarded as a significant event in traditional folklore. It

has been of interest to astronomers as it has a slight variation of a typical full moon. The Hunter's Moon appears in October, except once every four years when it doesn't appear until November.

The Moon usually rises 50 minutes later each day, however things are different for the Hunter's Moon (as well as the Harvest

Moon in September). Both of these Earth-Moon distance not to acale Earth-Moon distance not to scale moons usually rise 30 minutes later on each successive night. Sunset and moonrise are not far apart creating prolonged periods of light during this time of the year.

This difference between the timing of the sunset and moonrise is due to its orbit, meaning that the angle the Moon makes with the horizon is narrower during this time of year. The Hunter's Moon is generally not bigger or brighter than any of the other full moons. Thus, the only difference between it and other full moons is that the time between sunset and moonrise is shorter.

Beginning around the night of October 15, 2016, we in the Northern Hemisphere will see a full-looking moon rising around the time as the sunset for several evenings

However, his year, though, this characteristic of the Hunter's Moon – close-to-sunset rising times for several nights in a row -won't be as pronounced as in past years.

Like many things in astronomy, the moon's appearance in our sky follows a cycle. A distinctive feature of this particular cycle is known as a minor lunar standstill, and it's diminishing the Hunter's Moon effect, as it did this year's Harvest Moon effect. It will continue to affect these two autumn moons for several years to come.

Our moon orbits Earth on nearly the same plane that Earth orbits the sun (aka the plane of the ecliptic). Thus, our moon's orbit is quite inclined to the plane of the Earth's equator.

The plane of the moon's orbit is inclined at 50 to the ecliptic (plane of the Earth's orbit). In a year when the moon's orbit intersects the ecliptic at the March equinox point, going from north to south, we have a minor lunar standstill year. Thereby, the lunar standstill points are 50 closer to the equator than the solstice points are (23.50  $5^{\circ}$  = 18.5° declination).

The inclination of the moon's orbital path to the plane of the Earth's equator changes over a cycle of 18.6 years. For instance, in the years 2006 and 2025, the moon in its monthly travels swings from about 28.50 south to 28.50 north of the Earth's equator. This extreme inclination is called a major lunar standstill. In years when a major lunar standstill is happening, it accentuates the effect of the Harvest and Hunter's Moon. In 2016, the opposite is true. It's a *minor lunar standstill* year, when the moon's monthly travels take the moon only from about 18.50 south to 18.50 north of the Earth's equator.

According to the northern Europeans who planned nocturnal activity around the moon, knowing the moon provided dusk-till-dawn light on the night of the full moon, this autumn full moon, The Blood Moon, was generally bestowed with special honor. It was an important feast day celebrated as a prime time to hunt as it was optimal for spotting prey. The term Hunter's Moon did not enter into usage for Europeans until after they made contact with Indigenous Americans when they began colonizing North America. The first recorded mention of a "Hunter's Moon" began in the early 18th century. 

## The Bone Labyrinth

Mysterious Book Report No. 260 by John Dwaine McKenna



Anyone who's passed by a mass-market paperback book rack has probably seen the name James Rollins, even if they have never read one of his many action-adventure yarns featuring Commander Gray Pierce and the Sigma Force Team. In Rollins's fictional world, the Sigma Group acts as the operational arm of DARPA: the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency. DARPA is real. It has a three billion dollar annual budget and is responsible for the development of emerging technologies for use by the U.S. military. Google it and see for yourself – it's where all of the whiz-bang, Buck Rogers, 25th century stuff is thought up and developed. And therein, I think, lies the secret of Mr. Rollins's success. He combines fact and fiction, science and superstition,



then overlays it all with a generous helping of history, geography, and bone-chilling-suspense. The result is a situation that plays out in the reader's mind as if it were the nightly news and not cutting-edge fiction.

The Bone Labyrinth, (WM. Morrow/Harper Collins, \$27.99, 471 pages, ISBN 978-0-06-238164-4) by James Rollins is his twenty-first work of fiction and has been judged by many to be the most exciting of all. It's about the evolution of human intelligence and the pending battle for control of the human genome, and with it the ability to gene-splice made-to-order creatures-including humans-of all kinds, shapes and sizes. As the novel begins, a group of archaeologists and researchers in a remote cavern deep in the mountains of Croatia make a startling discovery about early man and an explosion of knowledge which took place 50,000 years ago. They locate a hidden Catholic chapel containing the bones of a Neanderthal woman and an elaborate set of primitive paintings depicting a war between humans and monstrous giant creatures. But before they can announce their discovery, they're attacked, the bones are stolen and the chapel destroyed. At the same time, a primate research center in Atlanta, Georgia is attacked and their research, in the form of a genetically-modified and highly intelligent baby gorilla, is stolen and its scientist handler kidnapped in what may be an act of piracy, sabotage, or the opening salvo of a high-tech war in which the future of the entire human race hangs in the balance. As the Sigma Force deploys, the trail of the two events leads half of the group to Ecuador where they're plunged into a four-hundred year old mystery that's baffled some of the best minds in the world; while the other team members follow a faint trail to China, attempting a rescue that will put them into a death fight with some living monsters that are straight out of a nightmare.

The action, adventure and thrills never stop in *The Bone Labyrinth*. It's an exquisite, intricately-plotted and science-oriented thriller that'll have you gasping for breath before it's finished and leave a sense of wonderment in everyone who reads it. For those who do, we strongly suggest reading the author's notes at the con-

clusion of the text. They're astonishing! They'll leave you thinking about this novel for a long, long time. Don't say we didn't warn ya!



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


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
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## The Olive Jar - By Carol LaMonda Freaked Out!

LIVINGSTON MANOR, NY - The Catskill Art Society presents "Design Poetics" and "Walls of Viet Nam," exhibitions of artwork by Tal Gluck and Melinda Wallach at the CAS Arts Center at 48 Main Street, Livingston Manor, NY from October 15 through November 20.

At the root of the three-dimensional sculptural objects by Tal Gluck is a desire to manipulate the viewer into an unresolvable state of creativity and problem solving. By producing objects from materials that often fall into the realm of technical and functional craft, but are clearly non-functional in and of themselves, Gluck leaves the viewer caught with one foot in the world of craft and one foot in the world of fine art. Governor Cuomo Announces Transformational Plan to Reimagine NY's Bridges and **Tunnels for 21st Century** 

 To Reduce Congestion, MTA's 7 Bridges and 2 Tunnels in Metropolitan Region to Adopt Automatic, or "Open Road" Tolling to Increase Traffic Flow for Millions of Travelers -Eliminating MTA Toll Booths

 To Combat Emerging Security Threats, Surge in Security Personnel to Take Effect at All Crossings, Plus Installation of State-of-the-Art Cameras and Sensors to Detect Toll Evaders, Scofflaws or

• To Harden Crossings, 500-Year Flood Barriers to be Installed at Both Tunnels Plus Increased Pumping Capacity; Half-Century-Old Bridges to Undergo Full Seismic Retrofit

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo today announced a transformational plan to reimagine New York's crossings for the 21st century. The plan will institute stateof-the-art automatic tolling at all MTA bridges and tunnels - reducing traffic congestion and decreasing emissions to improve the overall travel experience for millions of residents and visitors in New York State. At the Governor's direction, the state will also deploy cuttingedge technology and security personnel to high-profile crossings in New York to enhance public safety and fortify anti-terror efforts.

As part of the New York Crossings Project, the Governor also announced the state will implement new tunnel barriers to control major floods and seismic measures on bridges which will provide long-term protection from earthquakes and other natural forces. The transformational project also includes the addition of energy efficient LED lighting. In addition, the MTA will join cities around the globe in providing a renewed focus on public art to ensure our infrastructure projects reflect the grandeur of the Empire State. Under the Governor's plan, New York will redesign tunnel plazas with cutting-edge veils equipped with LED capability, and gantry structures supporting the new electronic toll equipment will feature artistic "wave" designs which will vary in size and scale.

"By investing in New York's transportation network today and equipping it to meet the challenges of tomorrow, we are cementing our state's position as a national leader in 21st century infrastructure and cutting-edge innovation," Governor Cuomo said. "From speeding up commutes and reducing emissions on key roadways with automatic tolling to bolstering resiliency on our bridges and tunnels and increasing security at key checkpoints, this transformational project will revolutionize transportation in New York and ensure

that our state is built to lead for generations to come."

The New York Crossings Project encompasses all seven MTA-operated bridges and its two tunnels, including the Henry Hudson Bridge, Whitestone Bridge, Throgs Neck Bridge, RFK Triborough Bridge, Queens Midtown Tunnel, Hugh L. Carey Brooklyn Battery Tunnel, Verrazano-Narrows Bridge, Marine Parkway-Gil Hodges Memorial Bridge, and Cross Bay Veterans Memorial Bridge. The coordinated lighting plan will include the George Washington Bridge operated by the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey. Funding for these transformational improvements is allocated as part of the MTA's \$27 billion capital plan.

New York's roads are some of the most congested in the nation, with commutes from Long Island, White Plains, and Northern and Southern New Jersey averaging upwards of two hours. On average, 800,000 vehicles cross MTA tunnels and bridges each day, and as a whole, New York drivers spend more than 6,400 hours per day waiting to pay tolls.

State-of-the-Art Automatic Tolling

Under the Governor's leadership, New York State is making record investments in increasing regional public transit capacity. To further reduce traffic congestion, the state is implementing automatic tolling, or "open road tolling." These new, automated tolls will significantly enhance traffic flow, reduce congestion and decrease commute times making it easier for New Yorkers to get where they need to go. Sensors and cameras will be suspended over the highway on structures called "gantries" and vehicles will not be required to stop. Vehicles with E-ZPass will be automatically charged, and non-E-ZPass vehicles will have their license plate recorded and a bill will be mailed to the registered owner of the vehicle.

Automatic tolling is projected to save commuters up to 21 hours of drive time every year. Additionally, automatic tolling reduces emissions and significantly decreases amount of fuel burned by drivers, who will no longer have to stop and start waiting to pay tolls. This will conserve approximately one million gallons of fuel and save \$2.3 million each year. Automatic tolling will begin at select bridges in January and be completed on all MTAoperated bridges by the end of next year.

Enhanced Security at New York Crossings
New York is increasingly a target of threats to security. In recognition of this threat, the New York Crossings Project will integrate emerging technologies into the security design of bridges and tunnels across the state, deploying additional personnel and equipment. At each crossing, and at structurally sensitive points on bridges and tunnels, advanced cameras and sensors will be installed to read license plates and test emerging facial recognition software and equipment. These technologies will be applied across airports and transit hubs - including the Penn-Farley Complex - to ultimately develop one system-wide plan.

Anti-terrorism teams will be combined with traffic enforcement at crossings and will develop new operating protocols across agencies. Approximately 525 TBTA officers will provide security and traffic management at bridges and tunnels and will collaborate with State Police on toll enforcement; 150 members of State Police Troop NYC will be assigned at crossings to handle security and anti-terror activities; and 150 National Guardsmen will reinforce troopers on security and anti-terror initiatives. Special barricade trucks will be positioned at both ends of each crossing to serve as intercept vehicles and mobile barriers in the event of an emergency.

Flood Resiliency Previously, New York's tunnels were built to protect against a 100-year flood, but the devastation wrought by Hurricanes Sandy and Irene demonstrated a need to enhance protections to withstand a 500-year flood. Tunnels will have new barriers installed to block floodwater from entering with water-tight barriers to protect the tunnel and its facilities. Additionally, tunnels will have increased submersible pumping capacity to protect against flooding. For more information, click here.

Seismic Measures MTA's bridges - like many in the Metropolitan region were built nearly a century ago. The plan includes comprehensive seismic upgrades to make MTA bridges more flexible in the event of an earthquake. All existing bridge bearings will be replaced with "seismic isolation bearings" that allow for rotation, reducing the transfer of seismic forces and mitigating damage. Bridges will have added reinforcement to bridge columns and piers to provide greater resistance to seismic forces. Concrete armor units around the underwater portion of bridge piers will be installed to provide long-term protections beyond seismic events. For more information, click here.

Building the New New York - Public Art Under Governor Cuomo, New York is recapturing the bold spirit that made it the Empire State in the first place. In the past, New York built projects that were not only practical, but works of public art, like the New York State Capitol, Grand Central Terminal, the original Penn Station and the Central Mall Mosaics at Jones Beach. The MTA has made efforts to incorporate art underground, but this plan will bring back

public art aboveground.

The New York Crossings Project will reconfigure toll plazas into modern transportation gateways. Plaza walls will be transformed by veils that shield security personnel and equipment, while acting as LED message boards. Intercept vehicles will be stationed behind the veil and security personnel will have line-of-sight monitoring portals. While plaza redesign will vary, each automated tolling structure on MTA-operated bridges and tunnels will be covered with a decorative artwork presenting a "wave" effect. The wave will be constructed from chainmail fabric which moves with the wind.

LED lighting will be adopted on all MTA bridges and tunnels. LED lights use 40 to 80 percent less power and last six times longer than other types of roadway lighting. In addition to costing less and lasting significantly longer, LED lights can be programmed into different col-

ors and patterns.

The New York Crossings Project will lead the nation by encompassing all MTA-operated bridges and tunnels in New York City, plus the George Washington Bridge. "The City That Never Sleeps," a dusk to dawn lighting schedule, will illuminate these crossings with spectacular, multi-color light shows that will be visible for miles. Illuminating New York's already awe-inspiring structures will transform them into international tourist attractions with the potential to drive additional tourism revenue. LED installations are set to begin this January.

#### New York is the Third Largest Exporter of Diary in the U.S., Exporting Nearly 13 Million Gallons a Year

New Canadian Regulations Create Trade Barriers; Limiting New York Dairy Farmers' Ability to Export Products

Washington, D.C. - U.S. Senators Charles E. Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand and other Representatives from New York, including Chris Gibson (NY-19) and Sean Patrick Maloney (NY-18) in a bipartisan letter urged President Obama to address Canada's restrictive and arbitrary trade barriers and preserve market access as negotiated under the NAFTA agreement.

"We must take all necessary actions to eliminate unfair barriers to trade and preserve access for our dairy

farmers. New York dairy companies have made substantial investments to produce a product intended specifically for export to Canadian cheese manufacturers. This investment and the sales that followed were made in response to the duty-free access secured under the North American Free Trade Agreement," lawmakers wrote in their joint letter. "Dairy companies from our state indicated they have already lost considerable export sales as a result of pricing policies. The proposed regulations limit the opportunity of U.S. dairy exporters. It is imperative that the Administration take decisive action and reject Canada's restrictive trade policies and reinforce the value of concessions previously secured under NAFTA."

Dean Of The School Of Business At SUNY New Paltz To Speak About New Programs, The University's Regional Impact, and Other Relevant Topics





#### Schneiderman Issues Know Your Rights **Brochure Supporting Victims in Honor** of Domestic Violence Awareness Month

Attorney General Eric T. Schneiderman announced the release of an updated "Victims of Domestic Violence: Know Your Rights!" brochure to mark the 29th annual Domestic Violence Awareness Month. The purple brochure, the awareness campaign's theme color, describes key legal protections and services available to victims of domestic violence, particularly in the areas of housing and employment, under New York law and the 1994 federal Violence Against Women Act. The updated brochure includes information about new protections stemming from New York State's recently-enacted Women's Equality Agenda. In 1989, the U.S. Congress designated October as National Domestic Violence Awareness month.

"We've made tremendous progress protecting victims of domestic violence through enhanced legal protections and enforcement actions. Yet this month, we must recognize that our work keeping New Yorkers safe from domestic violence is far from over," said Attorney General Schneiderman. "We know that domestic violence victims are often some of the most vulnerable residents of our state. Our hope is that our enforcement actions, as well as our education and outreach efforts, will assist domestic violence victims to escape the violence they face at the hands of their abusers and assist them in building safe, productive lives."

#### A Statement from Senator Bonacic: October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month

October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Nearly everyone in our community has likely been touched by breast cancer in some way - whether personally or through the experience of a family member, friend, or coworker. Among women, breast cancer continues to be the most frequently diagnosed cancer other than skin cancer. You can help save lives and create a world with less breast cancer and more birthdays by encouraging your community to stay well by taking steps to help reduce their risk of developing breast cancer or find it early.

The key to celebrating more birthdays is to stay healthy. Receiving a yearly mammogram is the most important action that women can take to find breast cancer early - before physical symptoms develop - when the disease is most treatable.

The American Cancer Society's current breast cancer screening guidelines are as follows:

Yearly mammograms should begin at age 40 and continue for as long as a woman is in good health;

 A clinical breast exam should be part of a periodic health exam - about every three years for women in their 20s and 30s and every year for women age 40 and older; and

 Women should know how their breasts normally look and feel and report any breast change to a health care professional right away. Breast self-exam is an option for women starting in their 20s.

I'm pleased to report that I supported landmark legislation this year, which the Governor has signed into law, that improves access to, and coverage for, breast screenings. The legislation, S8093, eliminates insurance cost requirements for breast cancer screenings, extends hours for mammography services throughout New York, and allows New York City residents to take up to four hours of excused leave from work, per year, for breast screenings.

Working together we can help create a world with more birthday's and less breast cancer. I am committed to helping

achieve that goal.


