# The Bats are Hanging Around

This time of the year, it is not surprising to see a few bats flying in and out of the posts on our front porch.



We welcome these little creatures, as they do a good job cleaning the bugs that are attracted to our front porch light.

In cultures all over the world, the peculiar characteristics of bats has captured the imagination of storytellers who claim they have mysterious and supernatural qualities giving the little bats a notorious, sinister reputation. Having them appear when they do, adds a spooky touch to the Halloween season!

A little research will reveal that we are fortunate to have these great little flying mammals make their abode, next door, in the bat houses that our son has built strategically in his back yard.

The small brown bats that are now 'hanging out" in Sundown most likely have flown hundreds of miles from the north, looking for a cave in the Catskills where they could huddle in a group over the winter as they survive off their fat reserves.

Bats are the only flying mammals (flying squirrels glide) that evolved to conquer the air ten million years ago and took advantage of the great food supply of night-flying insects.

Most bats have a breeding season, which is in the spring for species living in a temperate climate like ours. Bats may have one to three litters in a season, depending on the species and on environmental conditions, such as the availability of food and roost sites. Females generally have one offspring at a time, which could be a result of the mother's need to fly to feed while pregnant. Female bats nurse their young until they are nearly adult size, because a young bat cannot forage on its own until its wings are fully developed.

The teeth and skulls of fossil bats are monkey-like and suggest a common ancestor for both bats and primates which could mean that those flying visitors may be relatives swooping and diving erratically and cleaning a window or two, as they were looking for insects!



On looking back, life was much simpler when I was growing up in Grooville. I had no expensive Barbie Doll with an expensive wardrobe to play with. On very hot days my sisters Edith, Kathryn and I played on the back porch of our home.

We were truly happy to have the celluloid dolls with the dents in them that dad gave us. He couldn't sell them in the store as they were not perfect. I liked the five inch dolls the best because they had movable arms and legs. This made it easier to make dresses for them. I begged mother for scraps of material left over from her sewing projects for doll clothes. Often I would swap cloth scraps with my sisters, thus giving my doll a greater variety of colors and prints.

I used no pattern, I just folded a piece of cloth, cut it to fit right and made sure that the slit opening at the neck would fit over the doll's head. Then I sewed up the sides and "voila", I had a doll dress. We kept our dolls and clothes in an old trunk that dad said we could use and it was on the back porch. We'd sit and chat while we sewed and outfitted our dolls and we enjoyed doing it too.--"inexpensive fun."

When my sisters and I grew tired of snipping, sewing and chatting, they usually went to their bedroom to read and I hurried to my favorite spot in my maple tree, my friend and companion. My mother would say that the tree "never let the cat out of the bag" regardless of the many secrets that I shared with it


# Legacy Mysterious Book Report No. 150 **Just Thieves**

Just Thieves, (Melville House, \$26.99, 256 pages, ISBN 978-1-61219-937-5), by Gregory Galloway, is set in an unknown


corner of the United States, where a career thief and down-and- outer named "Rick" learned dishonesty from his father, a crooked building inspector. When his girlfriend, Denise, gives birth to a baby girl, she and Rick split the sheets. Not a very good father, with problems of his own, Rick doesn't like the new man in Denise's --and his daughter's --lives, not because he's hung up on his old girlfriend . . . but because he's a drug addict.



Rick seeks help from a shady character known only as "Froehmer," a longtime friend of his father, who soon takes care of the problem. No more druggie. Froehmer also fronts the money to put Rick through rehab, where he kicks his habit. In order to pay him back, Rick steals tools, equip- ment and supplies from construction sites on demand for Froehmer, who appears to be the spider at the center of a web of deceit, crime and mayhem. And surprise! Rick's good at it. He soon graduates to stealing items on demand in an ever-

widening sphere of crimes influenced by the arch-criminal. The burglaries become more and more sophisticated and Rick acquires a partner named Frank, who's adept with locks, burglar alarms and elec- tronic devices. But eventually the screws get tightened on the hapless thief, a murder occurs, and things start looking grim for the guy who seems to be the perfect dupe. This is a surprising and racy novel with superior characterization and a surprising plot. It'll keep readers guessing to the very last page.

GRAHAMSVILLE-Fall brings with it the cooler temperatures, the colorful leaf displays, and so much going on at the DPL!

Our 2025 Fall Children's Programs start up this week. These 8-week long, age-specific, engaging programs are geared for children 12 months to 4 years-old and promote early literacy and spark a lifelong love of learning and reading through stories, crafts, music and friendship-building activities. Registration is online and available to families who reside within the Tri-Valley CSD boundaries. For more information regarding each group: Mother Goose, Toddler Time and Story Hour, please visit our website. We'll also be visiting the three UPK (pre-kindergarten) classes starting October 14, where we'll read stories, perform felt stories and allow the children to check out books from our mobile collection.

On Friday, October 17 from 1:00-2:30PM, we have a water-color painting program with local artist, Chris Parrow. She'll be taking participants on a journey through the world of floral still life painting. This one hour class includes lecture with active learning; you'll gain knowledge to take home on the practices of hearing your body speak, move energy for optimal vitality, meditation and breathwork to ground your mind, as well as, your body and spirit. # David Brooks - A Family Dedicated to Public Service

By Jenny Lee | Oral History Project October 13, 2025

I chatted with Town of Denning Supervisor David Brooks about the issues and opportunities in our small town, the work that he and his team have accomplished and what remains to be done. Our conversations took place in his office at Town Hall and on a ride in the Denning Dog Catcher's car to deliver lunch to the highway crew.

#### JL: Hi David! What was your path to Town Supervisor and how long have you served?

DB: Wow Jenny, you're asking tough questions. Lemme see... I was appointed to the Planning Board in 2004, which I co-chaired for four to five years. I got elected Planning Board Chair in 2009 to a four year term, then elected Supervisor in 2013. So I have served 12 years as Supervisor. Time flies when you're having fun! I chaired the committees that developed the Town Comprehensive Plan, re-did the Zoning Law and Subdivision Regulations.

**DB**: That's probably why I'm involved. My father, Clayton, first got involved in Denning's property tax assessment review. He was subsequently elected to Town Supervisor. Dad was instrumental in the founding of the Coalition of Watershed Towns (CWT) and the Catskill Watershed Corporation (CWC), where I met a lot of town leaders and people from NYS DEC and NYC DEP. The CWT and CWC are two important institutions that ensure watershed community interests are represented in decisions about watershed protection programs. In addition, Dad and I were in the auto body repair business together for 25 years. He undoubtedly had a great influence on me.

And you knew my late brother, Mikey. Dedicated over 20 years to serving the public, including as Sullivan County Legislator.

JL: Yes, I remember and miss your brother Mike Brooks. We became good friends through our work on broadband. A man of conviction who was willing to take the heat for what he thought was right. Let's pivot for a moment to talk a bit about the members of your team, including any specific role each of them may have.

**DB:** First, I have to say that I feel privileged to have a great team that's dedicated to promoting the best interests of our residents and the town's success. We are like a well-oiled machine with great collaboration and mutual respect.

We have four elected Town Council members. They are all trained and certified in the **National Incident Management System (NIM)** and **Incident Command System (ICS)**, as outlined in our Emergency Management Plan. NIM is a comprehensive nationwide system that includes ICS as its standardized on-scene incident management system. Our Council Members and additional roles are:

**Greg Vurckio** represents Denning at the Coalition of Watershed Towns. Greg is responsible for representing their town's specific needs and interests in discussions that affect both the local economy and the protection of New York City's drinking water supply, This involves participating in meetings to share information, identify concerns, and collaborate on solutions, Greg also serves pro-bono as Deputy Town Supervisor.

**Kevin Smith** is the coordinator for our Emergency Management Plan. He is also liaison to the Planning Board, which is presently reviewing our Short Term Rental law. Kevin will bring the Planning Board's recommendations, which the Town Board will review and make changes as warranted.

**Mike Dean** is the liaison to the Highway Department. The department presents its needs to Mike who then brings them to the Board for discussion and resolution. Mike performs a crucial function as budget allocations to the Highway Department accounts for 70% to 75% of the town's annual budget of around \$1.2-\$1.4 million.

**Scott Michelson** is Court Security Officer at the meeting room (next door) where court cases are heard. Scott monitors the metal detector and checks and clears everything if there is an issue. The cases are mostly Peekamoose Blue Hole violations, so you can imagine out-of-towners that are unhappy with their case outcomes. You know Scott. He is well-suited to deal with irate people.

**Leonard Johnson** is our Highway Superintendent with a crew of four. Lenny started out as a highway employee for 4 to 5 years before he got elected Superintendent. He's learning and getting the hang of things. He knows his way around because he has lived here his whole life.

**Nancy Parrow,** our Town Clerk, also an elected position, is doing a great job building on the tremendous groundwork laid by Joy who, as you know, is a tough act to follow. (Contd. Pg. 27)

Nancy is always up to date and responsive to our community, She keeps our residents informed by publishing notices and she is very meticulous and timely with our board minutes.

JL: Joy! That's former Town Clerk, Joy Monforte. She was my introduction to Town Hall over 10 years ago. I have to say that I have enjoyed working with you and your team. Our partnership has been productive and beneficial to our residents. So could you summarize some of the team's achievements under your leadership?

**DB:** You know I don't like tooting my own horn, but some of the impactful accomplishments include:

- achieving the biggest tax cut ever in Denning with very good fund balances;
- signing inter-municipal agreements which is especially important for our small town with limited resources;
- getting Spectrum to build out most of the town;
- putting in new wells at both town buildings;
- acquiring new heavy-duty trucks (2 new backhoes, reconditioned loader, 3 new pickups and an arm tractor to mow roads in Denning another first);
- insulating our highway garage and totally redoing our garage's lunch room for our highway crew;
- repairing multiple bridges; and
- getting our roads blacktopped another first for Denning.

**JL:** Wow, do you even sleep at all? Ha ha. But seriously, Dave, it sounds to me like you and your team have an outstanding record. What are the next-or continuing-set of issues, and how are they being met?

**DB:** If I had to pick one priority and vexing challenge, it would be communications. The town lacks radio and cell service, which means my highway crew and I cannot talk to one another when they are out during emergencies. Remember how we struggled to keep our communities safe and informed during the Peekamoose fires last November? Well, we are presently working hard on getting towers where we can co-locate radio and cell. My team and I very much appreciate your support in this regard.

Just at that moment the phone rang. It was Ulster County Deputy Director of Emergency Services Steve Peterson with an update on a proposed tower in Denning. Serendipity meets Team Brooks's indefatigable efforts to improve the lives of Denning tax-payers.

#### Ulster County Executive Jen Metzger Recommends Seven Housing Projects for Funding through Housing Action Fund

\$3.15 Million Proposed for Affordable Housing, Plus Youth Emergency Housing Project

KINGSTON, NY - Ulster County Executive Jen Metzger has recommended \$3.15 million in support from the Ulster County Housing Action Fund to support six affordable housing projects and one youth emergency housing project. The County Executive and Legislature created the \$15 million Fund in 2023 - augmented annually with 25% of revenues from the bed tax on motels and short-term rentals - to incentivize new housing that is affordable.

The projects recommended for the 2025 round of funding were reviewed, vetted, and scored by the Housing Policy and Oversight Committee, an expert body that oversees the Fund's operations. Based on the Committee's review, County Executive Metzger is recommending that the Legislature release \$3.15 million from the Housing Action Fund to support the development of the following projects, all of which meet the Fund's affordability and sustainability requirements:

- o Rehabilitation Support Services, Inc. (\$300,000) for construction of Stone Creek Commons, a 47-unit mixed-use affordable housing project (60% AMI) in the Town of Saugerties, with integrated supportive services and 24 units reserved for individuals recovering from mental illness
- o RUPCO (\$700,000) to create 10 affordable rental units (five 60% AMI units, five 80% AMI units) as part of the restoration of the historic Wellington Hotel in Pine Hill

(Town of Shandaken).

- o Kingston Housing Authority (\$700,000) for 68 new ADA-adaptable 1-bedroom units (30% and 80% AMI) for seniors as part of the Penn Court Expansion Project in the City of Kingston.
- o TapRoot Community Land Trust (\$120,000) to preserve two affordable rental units (60% AMI) at 587 Abeel Street in Kingston, and place the property in the TapRoot Community Land Trust to ensure permanent affordability.
- o Kingston City Land Bank (\$700,000) for the development of 12 affordable condominium units (80% AMI) at 46 Grand Street in Kingston.
- o GBC Kingston LLC (\$380,000) for the Frog Alley Project, a new 46-unit development in Kingston that will include six affordable units (five at 60% AMI, one at 80% AMI).
- o Center for Creative Education (\$250,000) for Ubuntu Village, a redevelopment project to create youth emergency housing in Kingston, with seven beds.


The Legislature will take up the County Executive's recommendations at its October 21 session. If approved, the awards will pave the way for the creation of 185 units of housing, as well as a new emergency shelter for youth. By providing crucial gap funding for these projects, the Fund is enabling a combined housing investment in Ulster County exceeding \$157 million.


"Safe, affordable housing is a cornerstone of a healthy community, and these seven projects will help address a very pressing need of our residents for housing they can afford," said County Executive Jen Metzger. "With this \$3.15 million investment from the Housing Action Fund, we are supporting the development of 185 new affordable units while also advancing our climate and energy affordability goals through high-efficient and all-electric design. I want to thank the Housing Policy and Oversight Committee for their thoughtful review and recommendations, and I look forward to working with the Legislature to move these projects forward."

"On behalf of the Housing Policy and Oversight Committee, I want to thank the County Planning Department staff for their insights and support throughout the application review process," said Fawn Tantillo, Chair of the Housing Policy and Oversight Committee. "These projects reflect our commitment to building a more inclusive and resilient Ulster County, and the Housing Action Fund continues to be a powerful tool in creating housing that meets the needs of our residents."

The Ulster County Housing Action Fund supports the creation of healthy, energy-efficient, and climate-responsible housing units that serve households at or below 80% of Ulster County Area Median Income, with an emphasis on housing that serves the County's most vulnerable populations. The first round of awards in 2024 provided funding for five projects, totaling 164 units, with both rental and homeownership opportunities.





"Vaping is not a harmless trend. It is a threat to the health and future of our youth," said Celeste D'Andrea, Monticello High School student.



#### Impact of the Shutdown on New York's Working Families

The Democrat-led government shutdown is now in its second week, bringing serious consequences for New York's working families, seniors, and small businesses. H.R. 1542, the Pay Our Coast Guard Parity Act of 2025: This bill would provide appropriations to the U.S. Coast Guard (USCG) for the salaries and expenses of personnel who are required to continue working during a lapse in federal funding. The servicemen and women at the USCG put their lives on the line every day to protect the homeland, run search and rescue operations, and enforce maritime laws. It is imperative that USCG personnel and their families are cared for during their essential service protecting our communities.

H.R. 2172, the Preserving Patient Access to Home Infusion Act: This bill would ensure Medicare patients with serious infections, heart failure, immune diseases, cancer, and other conditions receive the intravenous (IV) medications they need while at home. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) implemented a benefit for Medicare Part B home infusion drugs, requiring a nurse to be physically present in the patient's home for providers to be reimbursed. This bill would ensure that Medicare recipients can continue to receive life-saving drugs in a safe and effective manner, in the comfort of their own homes.

H.R. 2350, the Cellphone Jamming Reform Act of 2025: This bill would prevent prison inmates from using contraband cellphones in prison facilities by allowing state and federal prisons to use cellphone jamming systems. Contraband cellphones are a major security threat in our prisons, allowing criminals to coordinate crimes while incarcerated. This bipartisan bill is important to keep our prisons safe and ensure that our communities are protected from prisoners.

#### 1. Fighting rising health care costs
