UC Executive Mike Hein Announces the Opening of the New Carmine Liberta Memorial Bridge in New Paltz

Reinventing Infrastructure In Ulster County - Ahead Of Schedule Safer Passage, Improved Sustainability, Enhanced LED Lit Sidewalk, Greater Views New Paltz, NY - Ulster County Executive Mike Hein was joined by Angela Liberta, Wife of the late Carmine Liberta, the County Executive's Bridge Advisory Committee, local officials, business owners, and members of the community to announce the opening of the new

Carmine Liberta Memorial Bridge which spans the Wallkill River at the end of Main Street in New Paltz. The previous metal grid work style bridge has been replaced with a "Pony Arch" bridge allowing for motorists, bikers and pedestrians to access the iconic view of the Shawangunk Mountains and Mohonk the Watchtower. The new bridge includes an enhanced sidewalk and wider shoulders on both sides of the bridge. It is

designed to withstand the pressure of weather events and includes LED lights to light the bridge and handrails at night for safer travel. The County Executive consulted the community in designing the bridge, and the County Executive's Bridge Advisory Committee was formed to work closely with County Engineers. Before beginning construction on the new bridge a temporary bridge was installed in order to avoid disrupting traffic and negatively impacting local businesses, residents and visitors. The Carmine Liberta Memorial Bridge was completed as part of County Executive Hein's "Building a Better Ulster County" initiative which includes an unprecedented \$46 million investment in infrastructure over a 3 year period.

Jack Frost – The Personification of Season

Just at the break of dawn, with the moon so bright the hoar frost covering the fields looked like carpets of sparkling crystals this past Saturday morning. In a sense, you could say they were covered with crystals – ice crystals. Frost occurs when water vapor in the air condenses as ice on a surface that has a temperature below freezing.

At night, a blade of grass loses energy by emitting a non-lethal kind of radiation, but it absorbs energy emitted by surrounding objects. Under clear

rounding objects. Under clear nighttime skies, objects near the ground emit more radiation than they receive from the sky, and so a blade of grass cools due to the net energy loss. Once a grass blade gets cold enough, frost will form on it. Overnight cooling of

the air near the ground causes this morning frost on grass and often on your car windshields.

If you get outside early in the morning, you may notice frost formed in open fields but not under trees. Trees emit more radiation toward the ground than the clear sky does. Thus, grass under a tree loses less energy than grass in an open field. Grass in an open field cools faster and reaches the frost point first.

The heaviest coatings of frost usually do not occur at the coldest temperatures because very cold air cannot hold very much

water vapor. Instead, thick deposits of frost usually occur when the air temperature is close to 32 deg. F (0 deg. C).

The size of frost crystals varies depending on the time they have been building up and the amount of water vapor available. Frost crystals are translucent, but scatter light in many directions, so that a coating of frost appears white. There are many types of frost, such as Hoar frost, also known as radiation and window frost.

Hoar frost refers to the white ice crystals, loosely deposited on the ground or exposed objects, that form on cold clear nights when heat is lost into the open sky causing objects to become colder than the surrounding air. The name hoar comes from an Old English adjective for showing signs of old age, and is used in this context in reference to the frost which makes trees and bushes look like white hair. A related effect is flood frost or frost pocket which occurs when air cooled by ground-level radiation losses travels downhill to form pockets of very cold air in depressions, valleys, and hollows. Hoar frost can form in these areas even when the air temperature a few feet above ground is well above freezing. Nonetheless the frost itself will be at or below the freezing temperature of water.

Window frost forms when a glass pane is exposed to very cold air on the outside and moderately moist air on the inside. It forms a pattern on the glass that resembles fern. If the pane is not a good insulator (such as a single pane window), water vapor condens-

es on the glass forming patterns.

There are many tales about frost – Jack Frost, a/k/a Old Man Winter, who nips at your nose and is the son of the Frost King. Jack Frost's roots are believed to have originated from Anglo-Saxon and Norse winter customs. Different cultures have their own traditions of frost deities. In Russian culture he takes a different form as Grandfather Frost and English folklore tradition holds that Jack Frost is an elfish creature who would come through each year and paint each blade of grass with small thin crystals of ice overnight. Humanity's fascination with weather has been ingrained in storytelling, religion and mythology for centuries. Jack Frost continues to be the symbol of the forthcoming chill of winter and the personification of the season.







CWC Funds Stormwater Control Projects

The Catskill Watershed Corp. (CWC) Board of Directors on October 4 authorized reimbursement for stormwater design and implementation costs necessitated by a number of construction projects in the New York City Watershed west of the Hudson River.

Approximately \$6,400 will be reimbursed for stormwater designs for two community projects. The H. D. Lane Volunteer Fire Company in Lanesville, Town of Hunter has built an addition to the fire hall, and the

Town of Lexington is to build a pavilion at a new town park.

Additional costs were also approved for these previously funded stormwater projects: Windham homeowner Chris Barber (total \$40,085); DRNC Realty (Delaware Nursing and Rehabilitation Center in Delhi, total \$324,820); 3115 Route 28 LLC (total \$29,500 for an addition and parking lot at this Shokan, Town of Olive business. Owner Walter Grabowski is eligible to apply directly to NYC DEP for an equal amount.)

Board approval was also given to spend \$17,800 to have the CWC parking lot and handicap access ramp repayed by Evergreen Construction. This project required a Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan for the ramp, which was prepared by Lamont Engineers at a cost of \$5,328.

The CWC is a non-profit, Local Development Corporation responsible for several environmental protection, accorporate development and education.

DEC Ask that Anglers Do Not Fish the Esopus Creek from the Portal Down to the Ashokan Reservoir

NYS DEC has requested that the City drastically reduce the flow from the Shandaken Tunnel to the Esopus Creek. NYS DEC and DYC DEP have posted pictures and additional information about this this on our FaceBook pages at: https://www.facebook.com/NYSDEC/ and https://www.facebook.com/nycwatershed

Here is the text from the DEC post: Anglers: Please don't fish the Esopus Creek from the Shandaken Portal

down to the Ashokan Reservoir right now.

If you live near, or fish the upper reach of the Esopus Creek, you probably have noticed that the water level has dropped and the creek has become brown with suspended sediment.

Normally, water from the Schoharie Reservoir enters the Esopus via the Shandaken Portal, supplementing the natural flow of the creek and helping

to maintain its trout population.

Unfortunately, drought has reduced water levels in the Schoharie Reservoir and the portal has been bringing highly turbid (sediment laden) water into the Esopus. DEC Fisheries staff are concerned that this turbid water will hurt the stream ecosystem and trout spawning, which begins soon. In response, we have reduced the amount of water from the Schoharie Reservoir to the Esopus.

Water levels in the Esopus will drop further, drastically reducing aquatic habitat. Fish in the Esopus Creek could be very vulnerable to anglers and natural predators. Nonetheless, DEC Fisheries staff believe the trout population will be better off than if the trout try to spawn in mud-laden water.

DEC will continue to monitor the flow, water turbidity, and the stream ecosystem. We ask that anglers do not fish the Esopus Creek from the portal down to the Ashokan Reservoir during these stressful conditions.

Emergency regulations will soon temporarily prohibit fishing downstream of the portal. We'll let you know when this happens.

The artificial lure, or "fly," is an artifice - a clever deception. It is the tenuous connection between angler and that elusive, watery creature - the trout. Fur, feather and sometimes artificial materials are lashed to steel with thread so as to mimic the size, shape, color and natural behavior of the aquatic

insects that trout depend on for food.

Certain furs and feathers behave differently when cast upon the water. Some remain stiff and high-floating. Others become slinky and sinuous when soaked. The selection, manner and method in which these materials are deployed on the hook - the fly "pattern" - draws upon a deep body of generational wisdom, regional diversity and folk art. Some patterns are deceptively simple to tie and fish. Others are complex architectural constructs built to exacting specifications.

When these beautiful miniature sculptures are photographed at high resolution and enlarged to poster size, the art behind the artifice is revealed. The fishing flies in Loete's photographic series were created for the Jerry Bartlett Angling Collection at the Phoenicia Library in Phoenicia, NY. 



ter inclusion through camps.



Record Number Of New Yorkers Register To Vote Online By October 14 Deadline To Participate In Upcoming Presidential Election

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo today announced from October 1 to October 14, the Department of Motor Vehicles automated online system processed 214,356 online voter registration applications, including 122,147 from first-time voters. The number of applications received during those two weeks shaftered the previous one month record of 140,602 applications, including 78,432 from first time voters in September. Two single day records were also set in October, with 59,018 applications processed on Thursday, October 13 and 67,782 processed on Friday, October 14.

"Our online voter registration system has broken down barriers and enabled hundreds of thousands of New Yorkers to participate in the electoral process," Governor Cuomo said. "These new records demonstrate the ease and success of this system and I am proud these New Yorkers are

ensuring their voices are heard."

Since Governor Cuomo launched the online application system in 2012, the DMV website has processed 822,014 online voter registration applications, including 383,118 from first time voters.

DMV Executive Deputy Commissioner Terri Egan said, "Since day one, Governor Cuomo has made it a priority for New Yorkers to access their government more efficiently. DMV's online voter registration system is a perfect example of how effectively these strategies are working. With unprecedented activity on our website leading up to the October 14 deadline, hundreds of thousands of new voters will now have an opportunity to vote in this year's presidential election.

The DMV recently updated its website to allow New Yorkers to register to vote without signing up for a MyDMV account. Applicants must enter information from their New York State driver license, permit, or non-driver ID, their date of birth, current zip code, last four digits of their Social Security Number, and email address. The information provided is validated to ensure accuracy and

security.

The upcoming presidential election is on Tuesday, November 8. DMV does not approve or deny voter registration applications. Upon completion, DMV sends the voter registration applications to the appropriate County Board of Elections for review and action. Once processed, the county will notify the applicants that they are registered to vote, or that additional information is needed to complete the application. New Yorkers can also visit the New York State Board of Elections to check their voter registration status.
