# A Walk Among the Dead: Cemetery Talk and Self Guided Tour in the Towns of Denning and Neversink

Jacobus Davenport, Revolutionary War soldier, is buried a short distance from the Graham Massacre monu ment on Rt 55 outside Grahamsville.

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Grahamsville, NY ...... At 1 p.m. on Sunday September 20th A Walk Among the Dead: a talk and self-guided tour of many local cemeteries will be held at the Time and the Valleys Museum on St. Rt 55 in Grahamsville.

Attendees will have the opportunity to browse through cemetery research materials, ask questions of the archivists and learn about the importance of preserving gravestones and different techniques for recording burial information. At 2 p.m. some of the more prominent and unusual characters buried in these cemeteries will be highlighted in a presentation, such as R.T. Bird, a dinosaur hunter for the Museum of Natural History, Anthony Hasbrouck who was murdered by Cornelius Hardenbergh in 1840 and Henry Reynolds, the Town of Neversink's first supervisor in 1798.

Special guest Kathy Denman will answer questions about the Grahamsville Rural Cemetery on St. Rt. 55 in

Now that our cows are in the back pasture, Pete and I go back to check on them each day. On one such visit I happened to see a flock of cowbirds. That reminded me about an article I read some time ago concerning cowbirds. Did you know that cowbirds do not build nests and leave all of their family care to others? The female cowbirds hunts stealthily through the woods and fields until she discovers some small bird's nest containing eggs. Then she slips in while the nest is unguarded and lays her own egg. Usually the foster parent to be does not resent this, although sometimes they will eject the foreign egg. It is said, and I don't know how true it is, the cowbird egg will hatch a day or two sooner than the other eggs and therefore the unnatural guest is bigger, stronger and gets a head start. When the parents bring worms to feed the young birds, the cowbird's wide-open mouth reaches above the others and gets fed the most. Nature Column - Linda Comando A tribute to the memory of all of the Townsman ladies

#### A Tribute to Peggy and to "American Apple Pie"

By Peggy DeWire Did you know that George Washington is not only

the father of our country but may also be the father of apple pie?

In a 1779 letter he invites dinner guests to feast on two beefsteak pyes and one of apples since his cook had discovered that they made fine fruit pye. Hallelujah for the cook!

Before the Revolutionary War pies were traditionally made with meat.

However, after the war, American kitchens were so bare, including the one at Mount Vernon, that colonial cooks improvised recipes using apples and other native fruit.

People have eaten apples from very ancient times. Stone Age campsites have

yielded fossil cores. Greek legends tell how Hercules recovered the golden apples. Ancient Celts dipped for apples to predict the future and the custom survives today as our Halloween game of bobbing for apples.

Apples were brought to America by the earliest settlers and as the frontier moved westward, so did apple trees. One of the first things a pioneer did after clearing his homestead and building a log cabin was to plant some apple trees in his yard.

Pioneer families relied on apples for cider, vinegar to keep food from spoiling and dried apple rings for winter eating.

About this time an American legend grew around Jonathan Chapman (1774-1846) of Mass., who was widely known as Johnny Appleseed because he carried a backpack of apple seeds to plant as he wandered west through NY, PA and Ohio and Indiana. And he sold apple seedlings to homesteaders for 7 cents apiece.

A Rambo apple tree planted by Johnny Appleseed survives today on an Ohio farm that has been owned by the same family for 150 years. From this big old tree experts cut off a limb five years ago and sprouted dozens of new seedling trees. Five of them decorate Johnny Appleseed's grave in Fort Wayne, Ind. I feel connected to this spot because he was my uncle three generations back.

The ancestor of modern apples came from the Black sea region of Europe and still grows wild there. The apples are golf-ball size and more sour than our modern varieties.

Apple trees don't "breed true" meaning that new young trees don't produce apples that are exactly like the parent tree's fruit. Most of today's favorite varieties came from chance seedlings, enhanced over the last fifty years by scientific breeding.

American orchardists have perfected and upgraded apples by grafting a budding twig from a favorite variety onto a small size tree so that the twig becomes the top of the new tree producing apples.

These small stocky grafted trees are called dwarfs. They're easier to care for and harvest more crops than from the usual bigger trees.

Japan grows the ultimate dwarf, only one-foot high in a flower pot. The tiny Bonsai apple tree has marble size fruit.

Have you discovered the star hidden inside every apple? Cut off the top half and look at the five-pointed seed chamber. George Washington's cook knew about this as he prepared the first American apple pye.

Though some say Chapman had picked up his nickname by 1806, it wasn't until after his death in 1845 that the legend of Johnny Appleseed really took off. Considering his distinctive look, uncommon views, and contribution to the settling of the frontier, it's little wonder his legend proved so powerful

#### Healthy Apple Cider Vinegar

Apple cider vinegar soothes a sore throat.

As soon as you feel the prickle of a sore throat, employ germ-busting apple cider vinegar to help head off the infection at the pass.

Turns out, most germs can't survive in the acidic environment vinegar creates. Just mix 1/4 cup apple cider vinegar with 1/4 cup warm water and gargle every hour or so.



#### The Cartel

Mysterious Book Report No. 210

by John Dwaine McKenna





The Cartel, (Alfred A. Knopf, Random House/Penguin, \$27.95, 617 pages, ISBN 978-1-101-87499-8) by Don Winslow has been published to rave reviews by the likes of: Lee Child-Sensationally good, Harlen Coben-Absolute must-read, Michael Connelly-First rate thriller, James Ellroy-Stunningly plotted . . . to which I'm going to add my own humble accolades.

The Cartel is a big, hefty novel that will give the reader a true picture of what's happening "South of the border, down Mexico way,"

to quote the old song, while at the same time enthralling him, or her, with a fast-paced and wildly entertaining thriller that has more

intrigue, treachery, mayhem, violence, blood-letting and murder than a Shakespearian drama or a Borgia political campaign.

It is an epic story that reads as if it was ripped from the daily news. The novel begins in 2004, when we meet DEA agent Art Keller, who's spent the last thirty years battling a Mexican drug lord named Adan Barrera. He leads El Federacion, the most powerful congress of drug cartels in the world. Keller finally succeeds in destroying the organization and putting Barrera in a maximum security federal penitentiary in the United States . . . but at a tremendous cost. His partner is brutally tortured and murdered, his wife-and his belief in justice-is gone, as is any chance of a normal life. Keller's a hunted man with a price on his head, payable to any sicario, (cartel soldier-gunman) who kills him.

Then, Adan Barrera gets himself transferred to a Mexican "Super-Max" prison where he lives like a prince, and quietly begins rebuilding his drug empire. When Barrera engineers his escape, Keller vows that he won't live in a world with Barrera in it . . . setting off a ten year conflict, a war within a war, as the two men try to kill one another . . . all set against a larger backdrop of the killing fields of Mexico, as the drug lords war against each other, the Mexican police, and American law enforcement agencies. It's a battle to the death, across all Mexico, for control of the plazas that lead to El Norte and its insatiable American appetite for drugs and infinite profit potential for the Narcos.

The Cartel has been called the 'War and Peace' of drug novels. It is epic and ambitious in scope, educational and entertaining in content, and one helluva an adventure in fact. Inspired by actual events, the book is dedicated to 131 journalists-all individually named-who've been killed or "disappeared" for their reporting efforts on the drug violence in Mexico. Those brave men and women are only a small fraction of the number of causalities-100,000 Mexican citizens have died in drug related violence in the last ten years-due to the so-called war on drugs, now in its fifth decade with no end in sight.

FSD Hosts Teen Intervene Training

(From Pg. 1) In addition to a dozen administrators, social workers and school psychologists, FCSD hosted about twelve members of different social service agencies from Sullivan County. Dr. Katz par-

ticipated in the training.

Teen Intervene is an evidenced-based program from the renowned Hazelden Betty Ford Foundation specifically designed for youth that are experiencing mild to moderate problems related to alcohol or other drug use. This three session individualized brief intervention works directly with the youth and the parents to offer education, guidance and support for them in hopes of addressing the mild to moderate problems associated with alcohol or other drug use. Teen Intervene integrates the stages of change model, motivational interviewing, and cognitive-behavioral therapy. The program has been shown to help reduce substance use, and the consequences of use, by intervening in the early stages of abuse.

Presenting an overview and details of how the Teen Intervene Program is implemented were Mr. Colavito, who is Director of Prevention for Catholic Charities Community Services of Orange County, and his Assistant Director Dawn Wilkin. For over six hours, plus a break for lunch, the presenters maintained the focus and attention of all participants. Alternating roles in front of the group, Colavito and Wilkin showed a thorough knowledge of their material. They engaged the audience with lively stories from hours of experience in the field working closely with adolescents, parents, and various drug treatment programs over the past forty five years col-lectively. In the process, they encouraged the experienced professionals in the audience to share their experiences as well. It was evident that this workshop was geared to serve the needs of school and social services agencies present.

The results of the workshop were to empower administrators, social workers and psychologists to observe adolescents and to create their own Brief Intervention programs to deal with 12-19 year olds, and even younger, that may be thinking about or have begun using alcohol and other drugs. The trainers emphasized many guiding principles for the work in this type program. Some of these are: learning how to "read" who you are dealing with; navigating the client (the adolescent) towards a solution; and guiding people to know that they can make a choice and getting them to buy in.

By the end of the day, Colavito and Wilkin had offered sufficient scientific research data, case studies, and so much of their own experiences with Brief Intervention Therapy, that the professionals felt inspired and ready to meet the challenges immediately ahead with the beginning of school. Several school personnel indicated how prepared they felt after the workshop.

When asked for one idea they were taking with them, long time elementary school social work Gwen Billups-Newton said, "Start where the client is." School psychologist Gabriella Calvello realized that "this is a process and it takes time." Social Workers Shannon Cook and Katrina Uhrig learned new clinical methods and resources at their disposal. "More tools are available in our tool box and more resources are coming to Sullivan County," concluded Ms. Uhrig.

Dr. Katz was pleased with the great turnout from the County and from the School District. He acknowledged Mr. Colavito and Ms. Wilkin for their excellent presentation.

(From Pg. 10 The June sessions were so productive, FCSD invited EPIC Director of Operations and Family Engagement Ms. Tara Burgess and Regional Director Phyllis Eig to provide training for a larger group of teaching staff during the Superintendent's Professional Development Week on September 2, 2015 prior to the opening of classes. Ms. Eig and Ms. Mary Beth Debus led the workshop entitled "Culturally Responsive Family Engagement: An Introduction" in two sessions for over 60 teachers.

In the research-based training, participants learn that family engagement is a shared responsibility in partnership among schools, community agencies, children and families. Also family engagement is continuous across a child's life and involves an enduring commitment but changing parent roles as children develop. Finally the research shows that effective family involvement reinforces learning in the multiple venues where children learn-at home, in prekindergarten

programs, in school, in after school programs, in faithbased settings, and in the community.



New York's Second Firefighting Crew Returns
After Battling 37,400 Acre Wildfire in California
Governor Cuomo today announced the safe return of the second 20-member crew of Forest Rangers, employees including Howard Kreft from Ulster County, and volunteers from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation who battled three California fires on the Mad River Complex for the past two

weeks. The Mad River fires have burned a total of 37,462 acres, now with 100-percent containment. Governor Cuomo dispatched a total of 44 New York firefighters to assist in containing the West Coast fires

Once again, New York firefighters rose to the occasion and put their own safety on the line in order to help a neighbor in need, Governor Cuomo said. "I thankful for their safe return and am proud of the bravery and professionalism they exhibited throughout this

The returning crew was part of a group of 95 firefighters which worked to contain the Mad River Complex Fires for the past two

weeks. In late July 2015, lightning ignited the Mad River Complex fires in northwest California's Six Rivers National Forest. The three fires are now contained, but dry conditions require crews to maintain a constant presence to keep the fire contained. presence to keep the fire contained.

The crew assisted in creating control lines to contain the wildfires, clearing materials from the path of the fires and completing burnout operations in which crews purposefully set land within the control line on fire to remove the larger fire's fuel. The crew worked in rough terrain and endured daily high temperatures. Following its two-week assignment, the crew flew back to Harrisburg, PA, rested overnight, then boarded buses to return home this morning.

This year may not have produced the largest fires in recent history, but it has definitely produced one of the worst seasons in regards to conditions, †DEC Acting Commissioner Marc Gerstman said. I'm thankful to our DEC Forest Rangers angers, employees and New York volunteers for their courage and willingness to help in this time of need and happy to welcome them home today in their safe return.

Typically one or two crews are sent to assist each year. In addition to helping contain the western wildfires and minimize damage, these crews also gain valuable experience that can be used in fighting wildfires in New York. All personnel travel and administrative costs for the crew is paid directly by the U.S. Forest Service or reimbursed

To date, over 8.5 million acres have burned in the United States this year which is already more than triple the total in 2014. This year, the stage was set by an abnormally hot and dry June with record-long heat waves. In fact, June 2015 was the hottest on record for states of Washington, Oregon, California and Idaho and nearly all of these states are facing severe drought. Scientists and forecasters hope that the strong El Nino predicted for this year will provide relief and overcome the ridge of high pressure that has blocked moisture from reaching parts of the region.

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Legislators Request Expression of Interest for County Owned **Railroad Operations** 

(Kingston, NY) 2016 is the scheduled end of the current Ulster County railroad operator's contract but it may not be the end of railroad operations on county owned railroads.

Ulster County Legislators serving on the Railroad Advisory Committee, expressed concern with missed opportunities and lost potential concerning the maintenance of the U&D Corridor for the future when they voted unanimously at their September 8th meeting to distribute a Request for Expression of Interest from railroad operators.

The Expression of Interest enables the Railroad Advisory Committee to scope out potential opportunities that may continue in a future bidding

The point is, so far we have not asked any rail-





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road operators if there is any interest in continuing railroad operations in Ulster County after this lease agreement expires, stated Railroad Advisory Committee Chairman David Donaldson.

"I look forward to learning what interest there may be," stated Railroad Advisory Committee member Manna Jo Greene. "This is not a formal request for a proposal. It's only a request for expression of interest, which may provide some interesting options that we're not yet aware of. Exploring options for future use of the Ulster & Delaware Corridor can help the Legislature to make more informed decisions moving forward.

This Request for Expression of Interest seeks to determine interest in operating any one, or a combination of the scenarios of short segments, long segments, and full segment as well as other reasonable and serious proposals.

Future opportunities for the county owned railroad is an economic engine that we can not ignore, concluded Railroad Advisory Committee Chairman Donaldson.

The request for expression of interest and the history of the railroad operations in Ulster County document will be posted, until the submission due date of November 2, 2015, at the Ulster County Legislature's websitewww.co.ulster.ny.us/legislature.



Science educator Gene Weinstein mastered, over many years, the art of photographing both ends of this size spectrum. Now, his images of eagles and hum-mingbirds alike make up a new exhibition -- Feathers Massive, Feathers Micro -- at the Old Stone House of Hasbrouck. It all takes flight with an opening reception on Sept. 20, from 2-5 pm, after which doors will be open from noon-4 pm on weekends through Oct. 18.

Weinstein taught biology at Monticello High School for 33 years, spending two of those decades as Science Dept. chair. Following retirement, he volunteered as a bald eagle monitor in a program to restore NY State's eagle population, which over the last century had been decimated by pesticides, toxic heavy metals and

"Bald eagles are the nation's symbol for good reason," says Weinstein. "With

that exquisite seven-foot wingspan, and impressive feather and color pattern, they perfectly represent strength, durability and freedom." On the other hand, they are often best observed -- and photographed -- in winter and spring. That left Weinstein with an available extra season or two for studying some other feathered friends. So upon retirement from

In the world of bird watching, size makes a dramatic difference. Huge raptors -- like our area's native bald eagles -- command

attention with their majestic wingspans and soaring spirals across the sky. Tiny hummingbirds enchant us instead with their closeup antics at every available blossom, and that singular ability to hover using a pair

teaching, he added hummingbirds to his list of avian interests.

As a perfect contrast to eagles, which might be 2,000 times their body weight, hummers were perfect for summer observation. In our zone, only the ruby-throated species is native, the males notable for their flashing crimson throat feathers. But with hummingbirds, one species is more than enough to witness ample activity.

Photographing such small birds presented real challenges. "I had to stock up on new lenses," Weinstein says, "and train myself on completely different camera settings for more up-close-and-personal shots, especially with the wing speeds they reach."

While a bald eagle might ride air currents for hours with barely a twitch of wing or tail, ruby-throats will flap their wings 90 times per second (during courtship even faster) while hanging above a flower sipping nectar. Even a moderate shutter speed simply won't stop such rapid action.

Weinstein's eagle photos have appeared in exhibits throughout this area, and in numerous national publications, and were also part of a cultural exchange program with South Korea.

"It's a privilege to study, and photograph, both eagles and hummers," he says, "and a thrill to share all of their images with visitors at The House.'
